OceanLake Commerce Inc. a wholly owned subsidiary of Automated Recycling Inc., announced a partnering agreement with BCB Voice Systems (BIV: CDNX) to provide voice technology that OceanLake will integrate into its Mobile eBusiness Products. This agreement provides OceanLake with the capability to build voice navigation and voice-authenticated security into wireless applications.

Currently, OceanLake is developing a wireless commerce channel for The Shopping Channel, a Rogers Media company, which provides customers all the navigation, shopping functionality and a shopping cart for wireless purchases using RIM blackberry or other wireless devices such as cell phones and PDAs, making the most of “anytime-anywhere” internet commerce productivity.
