MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS
For the Period Ended April 30, 2022

The following Management's Discussion and Analysis ("MD&A"), prepared as at June 29, 2022 should be read in conjunction with the unaudited condensed interim consolidated financial statements of Superior Mining International Corporation (the "Company" or "Superior") for the period ended April 30, 2022 and the related notes thereto, which have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

Readers may also want to refer to the July 31, 2021 audited consolidated financial statements and the accompanying notes.

This MD&A contains "forward-looking statements" that are subject to risk factors set out in a cautionary note contained herein. All figures are stated in Canadian dollars unless otherwise indicated.

Company Overview

The Company is a Canadian company originally incorporated in the Yukon Territory, but now continued and registered as incorporated in British Columbia. It is listed on the TSX Venture Exchange under the symbol SUI. The Company was engaged in the acquisition and exploration of mineral properties in Canada. To date, the Company has not earned significant revenues and is considered to be in the exploration stage.

The Company is in the process of exploring its mineral properties and has not yet determined whether the properties contain reserves that are economically recoverable or not. The recoverability of the amounts shown for mineral properties and related deferred exploration costs are dependent upon the existence of economically recoverable reserves, the ability of the Company to obtain necessary financing to complete the development of those reserves and upon future profitable production.

In March 2020, the World Health Organization declared coronavirus COVID-19 a global pandemic. This contagious disease outbreak, which has continued to spread, and any related adverse public health developments, has adversely affected workforces, economies, and financial markets globally, potentially leading to an economic downturn. It is not possible for the Company to predict the duration or magnitude of the adverse results of the outbreak and its effects on the Company's business or ability to raise funds.

Monexco Group Property

On November 30, 2021, the Company announced the acquisition of the Monexco Group Property located about 10km north of the town of Chibougamau, Northern Quebec region. The Property, extending for 30km on its longest axis, is comprised of 204 claims totalling more than 11,000 hectares.

Highlights:

- Superior Mining International Corp. will obtain 100% of Monexco Group Property, north of Chibougamau, Québec
- The property includes known high-grade gold surface occurrences distributed over about 400 metres of strike length
- Property straddling a newly defined regional structure with proven fertility for gold
- Close to infrastructures and all year long accessibility

The Monexco gold trend has several historical gold grades in the 10 g/t to up to 126.8 g/t* range from various stripped areas distributed over 400 metres of strike length. The whole land package is centered on the Faribault Fault Zone and associated cross cutting structures identified for its gold potential by the province of Québec MERN (Ministère Énergie et Ressources Natuelles).

Chibougamau Area

The Chibougamau segment corresponds to the northeastern portion of the Abitibi greenstone Belt. The area can be represented as a folded sequence of mafic to felsic volcanic sequences interlayered with sediments. An allmark of the area is the extensive layered mafic and ultramafic intrusions interposed in the stratigraphic sequence. The Doré Lake complex is the main host of the Chibougamau Central Camp and had historical production of 74Mt for a metal production of 4.3 Moz and 1.3Mt of copper extracted from polymetallic veins and shears zones.

The regional geology was well documented over decades of mapping and drilling works, mainly through favorable outcropping conditions when compared to the remainder of the Abitibi Belt. Unlike the copper bearing veins exploration, little attention was devoted to gold systems. Monexco gold showings (see map) follow a North-East inferred strike slip fault intersecting the East-West Faribault shear and fault zone.

Monexco Gold Trend and Showings

The Monexco cluster of high-grade gold showings covers an area making approximately 400 metres along strike and 400 metres across the main structure. The quartz-tourmaline veins and quartz-carbonate-pyrite veins sets follow East-West and North-East orientations, hosted in strong iron carbonate alteration affecting both mafic volcanic, gabbros and quartzo-feldspathic dykes. A dozen or so stripped and sampled areas were recorded accurately by a previous operator.

Faribault Fault Potential

The Province, through the MERN (Ministère Energie Ressources Naturelle), has highlighted an area south of the Faribault Fault Zone extending along the property for about 5km of strike length as a favorability zone for orogenic gold deposits. The structure shows similarities with other regional gold bearing structures of the Abitibi Belt such as the proximity of discordant lithological contacts, strong iron carbonate alteration, a high density of dykes and cross cutting north-east strike slip faults.

The Monexco Group Property covers about 30km of this main structure, it also extending over north-east trending lineament which were recognized using magnetic data enhancement and filtering.

Results of Operations for the Nine Months Ended April 30, 2022:

During the nine months ended April 30, 2022, the Company had a comprehensive loss of \$211,950 (2021 – \$457,765). Significant fluctuations occurred in the following categories:

- a) Accrued interest of \$Nil (2021 – \$2,005) decreased due to loans settled by issuing shares in last year.
- b) Consulting of \$46,512 (2021 – \$61,664) decreased due to the timing of consulting fees incurred in the comparative period.
- c) Regulatory and filing fees of \$24,099 (2021 – \$14,443) increased primarily due to fees paid for stock option plan during the current period.
- d) Management and director fees of \$84,078 (2021 – \$66,127) increased primarily due to fees paid or accrued to directors during the current period.
- e) Loss on debt settlement of \$Nil (2021 – \$253,648) relates to the issuance of shares for debt in the comparative period. The loss was a result of the difference between the deemed price and the fair value at the date of issuance.
- f) Travel and promotion of \$3,149 (2021 – \$12,080) decreased due to more trips by management in the comparative period.
- g) Professional fees of \$47,906 (2021 – \$39,413) increased primarily due to timing of accounting fees during the current period.

Results of Operations for the Three Months Ended April 30, 2022:

During the three months ended April 30, 2022, the Company had a comprehensive loss of \$77,400 (2021 – \$78,680). Significant fluctuations occurred in the following categories:

- Foreign exchange gain of \$186 (2021 – loss of \$3,644) relates to the conversion of outstanding foreign currency accounts payables into the functional currency of the Canadian dollar.
- Management and director fees of \$28,177 (2021 – \$21,550) increased primarily due to fees paid or accrued to directors during the current period.
- Travel and promotion of \$2,934 (2021 – \$12,080) decreased due to more trips by management in the comparative period.
- Professional fees of \$18,226 (2021 – \$13,751) increased primarily due to timing of accounting fees during the current period.

During the quarter ended April 30, 2022, loss and comprehensive loss increased to \$77,400 compared to a loss of \$68,141 for the quarter ended January 31, 2022. The increase was due to more trips taken by management and timing of accounting fees during the current quarter.

During the quarter ended October 31, 2021, loss and comprehensive loss decreased to \$66,409 compared to a loss of \$143,805 for the quarter ended July 31, 2021. The decrease was due to the write-off of \$111,980 related to the carrying value of the Jumping Moose Property in the comparative quarter.

During the quarter ended July 31, 2021, loss and comprehensive loss increased to \$143,805 compared to \$78,680 for the quarter ended April 30, 2021. The increase was due to the write-off of \$111,980 related to the carrying value of the Jumping Moose Property.

During the quarter ended April 30, 2021, loss and comprehensive loss decreased to \$78,680 compared to \$312,792 for the quarter ended January 31, 2021. The decrease was due to the settlement of debt in the comparative quarter.

During the quarter ended January 31, 2021, loss and comprehensive loss increased to \$312,792 compared to \$66,293 for the quarter ended October 31, 2020. The increase was due to an aggregate total of \$190,982 outstanding accounts payables and accrued liabilities being settled with shares, resulting in a loss of \$253,648 on the settlement of debt.

During the quarter ended October 31, 2020, loss and comprehensive loss decreased to \$66,293 compared to \$1,676,135 for the quarter ended July 31, 2020. The decrease was primarily due to share-based compensation of \$1,513,600 related to the issuance of stock options during the comparative quarter.

Liquidity and Capital Resources

The Company's cash position as at April 30, 2022 was \$16,766 (July 31, 2021 – \$130,192).

Net cash used in operating activities for the period ended April 30, 2022 was \$142,989 compared to \$257,269 during the comparative period. The cash utilized by operating activities for the period consists primarily of the operating expenses and changes in non-cash working capital.

Net cash used in investing activities for the period ended April 30, 2022 was \$Nil compared to \$51,162 during the comparative period. The cash utilized by investing activities for the period consists primarily of exploration and evaluation asset expenditures.

Net cash provided by financing activities for the period ended April 30, 2022 was \$29,563 compared to \$500,000 during the comparative period. The cash provided by financing activities for the period consists primarily of advance from directors and for the comparative period consists primarily of subscriptions received.

Other related party transactions

At April 30, 2022, the amount advanced from directors was \$46,490 (July 31, 2021 – \$16,927).

The amounts due to related parties and the amount advanced from directors are unsecured, with no repayment terms, and without interest.

Capital Management

The Company's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the entity's ability to continue as a going concern.

In the management of capital, the Company monitors its adjusted capital which comprises all components of equity (i.e. capital stock, reserves, and deficit).

The Company sets the amount of capital in proportion to risk. The Company manages the capital structure and makes adjustments to it in the light of changes in economic conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the Company may issue common shares through private placements. The Company is not exposed to any externally imposed capital requirements. The Company's policy remains unchanged from the prior period.

Financial Instruments

The Company's financial instruments consist of cash, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, loans payable and advance from directors. Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Company is not exposed to significant interest or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of these financial instruments approximates their carrying value, unless otherwise noted.

The Company's risk exposures and the impact on the Company's financial instruments are summarized in Note 9 to the Company's consolidated financial statements.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Company may be exposed to risks of varying degrees of significance which could affect its ability to achieve its strategic objectives. The Company manages risks to minimize potential losses. The main objective of the Company's risk management process is to ensure that the risks are properly identified and that the capital base is adequate in relation to those risks. The additional risks to which the Company is exposed are described below.

The Company's operations and results are subject to a number of different risks at any given time. These factors, include, but are not limited to, disclosure regarding exploration, additional financing, project delay, price fluctuations and share price volatility, operating hazards, insurable risks and limitations of insurance, management, foreign country and regulatory requirements, currency fluctuations and environmental regulations risks.

The key determinants as to the Company's operational outcomes are as follows:

- a) the state of capital markets, which will affect the ability of the Company to finance further mineral property acquisitions and expand its contemplated exploration programs;
- b) the prevailing market prices for base metals and precious metals; and
- c) the ability of the Company to identify and successfully acquire additional properties in which the Company may acquire an interest whether by option, joint venture or otherwise, in addition to or as an alternative to the property.

Exploration and Mining Risks: Exploration for mineral resources involves a high degree of risk. Few properties that are explored are ultimately developed into producing mines. The cost of conducting programs may be substantial and the likelihood of success is difficult to assess. The Company has limited financial resources and, as pointed out above, has no current source of recurring income with which to cushion financial setbacks. In future there is no assurance that the Company will produce revenue, operate profitably or provide a return on investment. The Company seeks to counter this risk as far as possible by selecting exploration areas on the basis of their recognized geological potential to host economic deposits. The focus of the Company is on areas in which the geological setting is well understood by management.

Metal Price Risk: Metal prices have historically fluctuated widely and are affected by numerous factors beyond the Company's control, including international, economic and political trends, expectations for inflation, currency exchange fluctuations, interest rates, global or regional consumption patterns, speculative activities and worldwide production levels. The price of gold is affected by numerous factors beyond the control of the Company and can be extremely volatile. The price of this metal greatly affects the value of the Company.

Financial Markets: The Company is dependent on the equity markets as its sole source of operating working capital and the Company's capital resources are largely determined by the strength of the junior resource markets and by the status of the Company's projects in relation to these markets, and its ability to compete for the investor support of its projects.

Permits and Licenses: The Company's operations may require licenses and permits from various governmental authorities. There can be no assurance that the Company will be able to obtain all necessary licenses and permits that may be required to carry out exploration, development and mining operations at its projects.

Industry: The Company is engaged in the acquisition and exploration of resource properties, an inherently risky business, and there is no assurance that an economic mineral deposit will ever be discovered and subsequently put into production. Most exploration projects do not result in the discovery of commercially mineable deposits.

Capital Needs: The exploration of the Company's future properties will require additional financing. The only current source of future funds available to the Company is the sale of additional equity capital. There is no assurance that such funding will be available to the Company or that it will be obtained on terms favorable to the Company or will provide the Company with sufficient funds to meet its objectives, which may adversely affect the Company's business and financial position. Failure to obtain sufficient financing may result in delaying or indefinite postponement of exploration activities on the Company's future properties or even a loss of a property interest.

Critical Accounting Policies

Reference should be made to the Company's significant accounting policies contained in Note 3 of the Company's audited consolidated financial statements. These accounting policies can have a significant impact of the financial performance and financial position of the Company.

Going Concern

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with IFRS on a going concern basis, which presume the realization of assets and discharge of liabilities in the normal course of business for the foreseeable future. In assessing whether the going concern assumption is appropriate, management takes into account all available information about the future, which is at least, but not limited to, twelve months from the end of the reporting period. Management is aware, in making its assessment, of material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt upon the entity's ability to continue as a going concern.

The Company does not generate sufficient cash flow from operations to adequately fund its future exploration activities and has relied principally upon issuance of securities and loans from related parties to fund its exploration and administrative expenditures. The Company may also seek to option out its properties in order to generate cash flows. These conditions raise substantial doubt regarding the Company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The Company will require additional capital to fund its future property acquisitions and exploration programs as well as for administrative purposes. If the management is unable to obtain new funding, the Company may be unable to continue its operations, and amounts realized for assets may be less than amounts reflected in these financial statements.

The financial statements do not include adjustments to amounts and classifications of assets and liabilities that might be necessary should the Company be unable to continue operations.
