Only shareholders of record at the close of business on November 8, 2018 will be entitled to receive notice of, and to vote at, the Meeting or any adjournment thereof. Registered shareholders who are unable to or who do not wish to attend the Meeting in person are requested to date and sign the enclosed Proxy form promptly and return it in the self-addressed envelope enclosed for that purpose or by any of the other methods indicated on the Proxy form. To be used at the Meeting, proxies must be received by Computershare Trust Company of Canada, Proxy Department, 100 University Avenue, 8th Floor, Toronto, Ontario M5J 2Y1 no later than 48 hours (excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays) before the time of the Meeting, or any adjournment thereof, or received by the chair of the Meeting before the commencement of the Meeting, or any adjournment thereof. If a registered shareholder receives more than one Proxy form because such shareholder owns shares registered in different names or addresses, each Proxy form should be completed and returned.

If you are a non-registered shareholder of the Company and receive these materials through your broker or through another intermediary, you must complete and return your voting instructions in accordance with the procedures provided by your broker or such other intermediary.

INFORMATION CIRCULAR

GENERAL INFORMATION

This Information Circular is furnished to the holders (“shareholders”) of common shares (“Common Shares”) of Galileo Exploration Ltd. (the “Company”) by management of the Company in connection with the solicitation of proxies to be voted at the annual general meeting (the “Meeting”) of the shareholders to be held on December 13, 2018 and at any adjournment thereof, for the purposes set forth in the accompanying Notice of Meeting.

PROXIES

Solicitation of Proxies

The enclosed Proxy is solicited by and on behalf of management of the Company. The persons named in the enclosed Proxy form are management-designated proxyholders. A registered shareholder desiring to appoint some other person (who need not be a shareholder) to represent the shareholder at the Meeting may do so either by inserting such other person’s name in the blank space provided in the Proxy form or by completing another form of proxy. To be used at the Meeting, proxies must be received by Computershare Trust Company of Canada, Proxy Department, 100 University Avenue, 8th Floor, Toronto, Ontario M5J 2Y1 no later than 48 hours (excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays) prior to the time of the Meeting, or any adjournment thereof, or received by the chair of the Meeting prior to the commencement of the Meeting, or any adjournment thereof. Solicitation will be primarily by mail, but some proxies may be solicited personally or by telephone by regular employees or directors of the Company at a nominal cost. The cost of solicitation by management of the Company will be borne by the Company.

Non-Registered Holders

Only registered holders of Common Shares or the persons they appoint as their proxyholders are permitted to vote at the Meeting. In many cases, however, Common Shares beneficially owned by a holder (a “Non-Registered Holder”) are registered either:

- (a) in the name of an Intermediary (an “Intermediary”) that the Non-Registered Holder deals with in respect of the shares. Intermediaries include banks, trust companies, securities dealers or brokers, and trustees or administrators of self-administered RRSPs, RRIAs, RESPs and similar plans, or
- (b) in the name of a clearing agency (such as The Canadian Depository for Securities Limited (CDS)) of which the Intermediary is a participant.

Non-Registered Holders who have not objected to their Intermediary disclosing certain ownership information about themselves to the Company are referred to as “NOBOs”. Those Non-Registered Holders who have objected to their Intermediary disclosing ownership information about themselves to the Company are referred to as “OBOs”.

Pursuant to National Instrument 54-101 (“NI 54-101”) of the Canadian Securities Administrators, the Company is distributing copies of proxy-related materials in connection with this Meeting (including this Information Circular) indirectly to Non-Registered Holders.

The Company is not relying on the notice and access delivery procedures outlined in NI 54-101 to distribute copies of proxy-related materials in connection with the Meeting.

Intermediaries which receive the proxy-related materials are required to forward the proxy-related materials to Non-Registered Holders unless a Non-Registered Holder has waived the right to receive them. Intermediaries often use service companies to forward the proxy-related materials to Non-Registered Holders.

The Company will not be paying for Intermediaries to deliver to OBOs (who have not otherwise waived their right to receive proxy-related materials) copies of the proxy-related materials and related documents. Accordingly, an OBO will not receive copies of the proxy-related materials and related documents unless the OBO’s Intermediary assumes the costs of delivery.

Generally, Non-Registered Holders who have not waived the right to receive proxy-related materials (including OBOs who have made the necessary arrangements with their Intermediary for the payment of delivery and receipt of such proxy-related materials) will be sent a voting instruction form which must be completed, signed and returned by the Non-Registered Holder in accordance with the Intermediary’s directions on the voting instruction form. In some cases, such Non-Registered Holders will instead be given a proxy which has already been signed by the Intermediary (typically by a facsimile, stamped signature) which is restricted as to the number of Common Shares beneficially owned by the Non-Registered Holder but which is otherwise not completed. This form of proxy does not need to be signed by the Non-Registered Holder, but, to be used at the Meeting, needs to be properly completed and deposited with Computershare Trust Company of Canada as described under “Solicitation of Proxies”.

The purpose of these procedures is to permit Non-Registered Holders to direct the voting of the Common Shares that they beneficially own. Should a Non-Registered Holder wish to attend and vote at the Meeting in person (or have another person attend and vote on behalf of the Non-Registered Holder), the Non-Registered Holder should insert the Non-Registered Holder’s (or such other person’s) name in the blank space provided or, in the case of a voting instruction form, follow the corresponding instructions on the form.

Non-Registered Holders should carefully follow the instructions of their Intermediaries and their service companies, including instructions regarding when and where the voting instruction form or Proxy form is to be delivered.

Revocability of Proxies

A registered shareholder who has given a Proxy may revoke it by an instrument in writing:

- (a) executed by the shareholder giving same or by the shareholder’s attorney authorized in writing or, where the shareholder is a corporation, by a duly authorized officer or attorney of the corporation, and
- (b) delivered either at the registered office of the Company (19th Floor, 885 West Georgia Street, Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada V6C 3H4) at any time up to and including the last business day before the day of the Meeting, or any adjournment thereof, or to the chair of the Meeting on the day of the Meeting or any adjournment thereof before any vote in respect of which the Proxy is to be used shall have been taken,

or in any other manner provided by law.

Non-Registered Holders who wish to revoke a voting instruction form or a waiver of the right to receive proxy-related materials should contact their Intermediaries for instructions.

Voting of Proxies

Common Shares represented by a shareholder's Proxy form will be voted or withheld from voting in accordance with the shareholder's instructions on any ballot that may be called for at the Meeting and, if the shareholder specifies a choice with respect to any matter to be acted upon, the Common Shares will be voted accordingly. **In the absence of any instructions, the management-designated proxy agent named on the Proxy form will cast the shareholder's votes in favour of the passage of the resolutions set forth herein and in the Notice of Meeting.**

The enclosed Proxy form confers discretionary authority upon the persons named therein with respect to (a) amendments or variations to matters identified in the Notice of Meeting and (b) other matters which may properly come before the Meeting or any adjournment thereof. At the time of printing of this Information Circular, management of the Company knows of no such amendments, variations or other matters to come before the Meeting other than the matters referred to in the Notice of Meeting.

VOTING SHARES AND PRINCIPAL HOLDERS THEREOF

The Company has an authorized capital of an unlimited number of Common Shares. Each Common Share carries the right to one vote at the Meeting. The board of directors of the Company ("Board of Directors" or "Board") has fixed November 8, 2018 as the record date for the determination of shareholders entitled to receive notice of and to vote at the Meeting and at any adjournment thereof, and only shareholders of record at the close of business on that date are entitled to receive such notice and to vote at the Meeting. As of November 8, 2018, 24,151,681 Common Shares were issued and outstanding as fully paid and non-assessable shares. A complete list of the shareholders entitled to vote at the Meeting will be open to examination by any shareholder for any purpose germane to the Meeting, during ordinary business hours for a period of 10 days prior to the Meeting, at the office of Computershare Trust Company of Canada, at 510 Burrard Street, Vancouver, British Columbia V6C 3B9.

To the knowledge of the directors or executive officers of the Company, as at November 8, 2018, no person beneficially owned, or controlled or directed, Common Shares carrying 10% or more of the voting rights attached to the Company's issued and outstanding Common Shares, except for the following:

VOTES NECESSARY TO PASS RESOLUTIONS AT THE MEETING

Under the Company's Articles, the quorum for the transaction of business at the Meeting is one person who is, or who represents by proxy, one or more shareholders who, in the aggregate, hold at least 5% of the issued Common Shares. A simple majority of the votes cast at the Meeting (in person or by proxy) is required in order to pass the resolutions referred to in the accompanying Notice of Meeting.

APPOINTMENT OF AUDITOR

The persons named in the enclosed Proxy form intend to vote for the appointment of MNP LLP, Chartered Professional Accountants as the auditor of the Company to hold office until the next annual general meeting of shareholders and to authorize the Board of Directors to fix the remuneration of the auditor. MNP LLP has been the auditor of the Company since December 2011.

ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

The number of directors of the Company is currently fixed at three. At the Meeting, the shareholders will be asked to fix the number of directors at three and to elect three directors. The persons named below are the three nominees of management for election as directors, all of whom are current directors of the Company. Each director elected will hold office until the next annual general meeting or until the director's successor is elected or appointed unless the director's office is earlier vacated under any of the relevant provisions of the Articles of the Company or the Business Corporations Act (British Columbia). It is the intention of the persons named as proxyholders in the enclosed Proxy form to vote for the election to the Board of Directors of those persons hereinafter designated as nominees for election as directors. The Board of Directors does not contemplate that any of such nominees will be unable to serve as a director; however, if for any reason any of the proposed nominees do not stand for election or are unable to serve as such, **proxies in favour of management designees will be voted for another nominee in their discretion unless the shareholder has specified in such shareholder's Proxy that such shareholder's shares are to be withheld from voting in the election of directors.**

No proposed director has, within the ten years preceding the date of this Information Circular, become bankrupt, made a proposal under any legislation relating to bankruptcy or insolvency, or become subject to or instituted any proceedings, arrangement or compromise with creditors, or had a receiver, receiver manager or trustee appointed to hold the assets of that person.

No proposed director has been subject to (a) any penalties or sanctions imposed by a court relating to securities legislation or by a securities regulatory authority or has entered into a settlement agreement with a securities regulatory authority, or (b) any other penalties or sanctions imposed by a court or regulatory body that would likely be considered important to a reasonable securityholder in deciding whether to vote for a proposed director.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE DISCLOSURE

The following description of the corporate governance practices of the Company is provided further to National Instrument 58-101 on “Disclosure of Corporate Governance Practices” (“NI 58-101”) and the disclosure prescribed for “Venture Issuers” such as the Company.

Board of Directors

The Board of Directors currently consists of three directors, one of whom is considered to be independent. Marc G. Blythe is considered independent. The remaining directors are not considered independent as they presently act as executive officers of the Company – John Kanderka is the interim Chief Executive Officer of the Company and Wesley J. Adams is the interim Chief Financial Officer of the Company.

The Board considers that management is effectively supervised by the independent directors on an informal basis, as the independent directors are regularly involved in reviewing and supervising the operations of the Company and have regular and full access to management. At the present time, the Board believes that the knowledge, experience and qualifications of its independent director are sufficient to ensure that the Board can function independently of management and discharge its responsibilities.

Orientation and Continuing Education

While the Company does not have formal orientation and training programs, new Board members are provided with:

1. information respecting the functioning of the Board of Directors, committees and copies of the Company's corporate governance policies;
2. access to recent, publicly filed documents of the Company; and
3. access to management.

Board members are encouraged to communicate with management, the auditor and technical consultants to keep themselves current with industry trends and developments and changes in legislation with management's assistance and to attend related industry seminars. Board members have full access to the Company's records

Ethical Business Conduct

The Board views good corporate governance and ethical business conduct as an integral component to the success of the Company and to meet responsibilities to shareholders. Due to the size of the Company and its present level of activity, the Company has not adopted a formal Code of Conduct.

The Board expects that fiduciary duties placed on individual directors by the Company's governing corporate legislation and the common law, as well as provisions under corporate legislation for required disclosures by directors and senior officers to the Company of transactions with the Company in which they may have an interest and of any other conflicts of duties and interests, are sufficient to ensure that these persons conduct themselves in the best interests of the Company. The Board will consider the need to implement a formal Code of Conduct as the Company's operational activities continue to grow.

Nomination of Directors

The Board has responsibility for identifying potential Board candidates. The Board assesses potential Board candidates to fill perceived needs on the Board for required skills, expertise, independence and other factors. The Board determines new nominees to the Board through recommendations of the Corporate Governance and Compensation Committee. The nominees may also be the result of recruitment efforts by other Board members, including both formal and informal discussions among Board members and the President and Chief Executive Officer. The Corporate Governance and Compensation Committee monitors the performance of individual Board members and committee members and their respective contributions.

Compensation

The current independent director is Marc G. Blythe. The independent director has the responsibility for determining compensation for the directors and senior management based on recommendations received from the Corporate Governance and Compensation Committee.

Other Board Committees

In addition to the Audit Committee, the Company has a Corporate Governance and Compensation Committee which is tasked with the responsibility of, among other things, selecting (or recommending that the Board select) the director nominees for the next annual meeting of shareholders. In carrying out such responsibilities, the Corporate Governance and Compensation Committee has the sole authority to retain and terminate any search firm to be used to identify director candidates and has authority to approve the search firm's fees and other retention terms.

The Corporate Governance and Compensation Committee is also tasked with the following responsibilities:

- (i.) developing qualification criteria for Board members for recommendation to the Board in accordance with the Company's corporate governance guidelines;
- (ii.) in conjunction with the Chairman, assigning Board members to the various committees of the Board;
- (iii.) reviewing annually, or more often if appropriate: (a) committee members' qualifications and requirements; (b) committee structure (including authority to delegate); and (c) committee performance (including reporting to the Board). The Corporate Governance and Compensation Committee is to make recommendations to the Board, as appropriate, based on its review;
- (iv.) recommending to the Board compensation policies and guidelines for the Company and for implementing and overseeing compensation policies approved by the Board;
- (v.) developing and recommending to the Board corporate governance principles applicable to the Company;
- (vi.) monitoring the Company's overall approach to corporate governance issues and administering a corporate governance system which is effective in the discharge of the Company's obligations to its shareholders;
- (vii.) in conjunction with the Chairman, overseeing the evaluation of the Board and of the Company and making recommendations to the Board as appropriate;
- (viii.) reviewing and reassessing at least annually the adequacy of the Company's corporate governance guidelines and the Corporate Governance and Compensation Committee's terms of reference and recommending any proposed changes to the Board for approval. The Corporate Governance and Compensation Committee must also annually review its own performance;
- (ix.) monitoring and making recommendations to the Board with respect to total compensation paid by the Company to its senior executives; and
- (x.) reviewing the adequacy and form of compensation of directors and ensuring that the compensation realistically reflects the responsibilities and risks involved in being a director.

Assessments

The Board annually, and at such other times as it deems appropriate, reviews the performance and effectiveness of the Board, the directors and its committees to determine whether changes in size, personnel or responsibilities are warranted.

AUDIT COMMITTEE DISCLOSURE

Pursuant to the Business Corporations Act (British Columbia) and National Instrument 52-110 on "Audit Committees" ("NI 52-110"), the Company is required to have an audit committee.

Audit Committee Charter

Pursuant to NI 52-110, the Company's Audit Committee is required to have a charter. A copy of the Company's Audit Committee Charter is set out in Appendix A.

Relevant Education and Experience

The following describes the relevant education and experience of the members of the Audit Committee:

Marc G. Blythe – Mr. Blythe received a Master of Business Administration from La Trobe University in Melbourne and a Bachelor of Mining Engineering degree from the Western Australian School of Mines. Mr. Blythe acted as Vice President, Mining of Almaden Minerals Ltd. from 2006 until July 2011. He was Corporate Senior Mining Engineer for Placer Dome Inc. based in Vancouver from 2004 until 2006, where he completed internal and external mine evaluation, including advising on potential acquisitions and mining technology implementation. Mr. Blythe has managed mines for both Placer Dome Inc. and WMC Resources Ltd. (formerly Western Mining Corporation). As a result of his background and career, Mr. Blythe is financially literate and familiar with public company financial statements and the accounting principles used in reading and preparing financial statements.

John Kanderka – Mr. Kanderka has held many surface, mineral, gas marketing and administrative positions with POCO Petroleum Ltd., Wellore Energy Inc. and Voyager Energy Inc. Mr. Kanderka was a Co-Founder and the Landman for Trimox Energy Inc. and Terraquest Energy Corporation both successful oil and gas production companies, bought out by Canext Energy Ltd. and Masters Energy Inc. respectively. Mr. Kanderka was Vice President Land at Richland Petroleum Corporation when it merged with Provident Energy Trust. Mr. Kanderka became Vice President of Land at Baytex Energy as the result of a merger with Dorset Exploration Ltd., a corporation with over one million undeveloped acres of land. In the course of that experience, he has reviewed financial statements, attained familiarity with various accounting principles and considered the requirements for an understanding of the needs for internal controls and procedures.

Wesley J. Adams – Mr. Adams is the President of Energy Fuels Environmental from July 2014 to present and was an investor relations consultant of Sandspring USA Ltd. from 2009 to 2014. He brings significant resource sector financing and mineral exploration experience.

Audit Committee Oversight

At no time since July 1, 2017 was a recommendation of the Audit Committee to nominate or compensate an external auditor not adopted by the Company's Board of Directors.

Reliance on Certain Exemptions

At no time since July 1, 2017 has the Company relied on the exemption in section 2.4 of NI 52-110 (*De Minimis Non-audit Services*), subsection 6.1.1(4) of NI 52-110 (*Circumstances Affecting the Business or Operations of the Venture Issuer*), subsection 6.1.1(5) of NI 52-110 (*Events Outside Control of Member*), subsection 6.1.1(6) (*Death, Incapacity or Resignation*) or an exemption from NI 52-110, in whole or in part, granted under Part 8 (*Exemption*) of NI 52-110 by a securities regulatory authority or regulator.

As the Stock Option Plan is a "rolling percentage plan", the Stock Option Plan must be re-approved on an annual basis by the shareholders at each annual general meeting of the Company as required by the policies of the Exchange. See "Approval of Other Matters To Be Acted Upon – Approval of Stock Option Plan".

The Company's Stock Option Plan includes the following provisions:

- The number of Common Shares reserved and authorized for issuance pursuant to options granted under the Stock Option Plan is 10% of the issued and outstanding Common Shares from time to time;
- The aggregate number of optioned Common Shares granted to any one optionee in a 12 month period must not exceed 5% of the issued and outstanding Common Shares, unless the Company has obtained disinterested shareholder approval if and as may be required by the Exchange;
- The number of optioned Common Shares granted to any one consultant in a 12 month period must not exceed 2% of the issued and outstanding Common Shares;
- The aggregate number of optioned Common Shares granted to optionees who are employed to provide investor relations activities must not exceed 2% of the issued and outstanding Common Shares of the Company in any 12 month period;
- The exercise price for options granted under the Stock Option Plan will not be less than the market price of the Common Shares less applicable discounts permitted by the Exchange. The Company has followed the practice of granting all stock options at or above the market price of the Common Shares;
- Options may be exercisable for a term up to five years, subject to earlier termination in the event of death or the optionee's cessation of services to the Company;
- Options granted under the Stock Option Plan are non-assignable, except by will or the laws of descent and distribution;
- Options granted to any optionee who is a director, officer, employee, consultant or person engaged in investor relation services shall expire the earlier of: (a) that date which is 30 days after the optionee ceases to be in at least one of such categories unless an earlier date is provided for in the optionee's

option agreement; and (b) the expiry of the option period. The Company may extend the period specified in the aforementioned subparagraph (a) in respect of any option for a specified period up to the expiry of the option period;

- For so long as the Common Shares are listed on the Exchange, any Common Shares issued pursuant to the exercise of options that (a) were granted to an optionee who was a director, officer, promoter or significant shareholder of the Company; or (b) had an exercise price per share that was less than the market price, would be subject to a four-month hold period commencing on the date of grant of the option;
- The Board of Directors may, in its discretion but subject to any necessary regulatory approvals, provide for the extension of the exercisability of a stock option, accelerate the vesting or exercisability of any option, eliminate or make less restrictive any restrictions contained in an option, waive any restriction or other provision of the Stock Option Plan or an option or otherwise amend or modify an option in any manner that is either (a) not adverse to the optionee or (b) consented to by such optionee;
- The vesting schedule for each option shall be determined by the Board of Directors at the time the option is granted and shall be specified in the option agreement in respect of the option; and

Employment, Consulting and Management Agreements

Compensation for Ron Rieder as Chief Executive Officer was determined in January 1, 2017 and increased in April 1, 2017 and then decreased on March 1, 2018. Mr. Rieder was indirectly compensated for his services as CEO through invoicing from a consulting business, RRico Consulting, owned by Mr. Rieder, on a monthly basis until December 2017 and effective January 2018 was paid to Mr. Rieder directly. Mr. Rieder received option based compensation periodically. Mr. Rieder resigned effective June 26, 2018.

Compensation for Mark T. Brown as Chief Financial Officer was determined in January 1, 2008 and remains unchanged. Mr. Brown was indirectly compensated through a consulting agreement between the Company and Pacific Opportunity Capital Ltd., a firm controlled by Mr. Brown, pursuant to which the Company paid consulting fees for the services of Mr. Brown as CFO and for financial and administrative services, which included the review and analysis of the preparation of financial statements and the management discussion and analysis, review and analysis of contractual documents, supervision of the accounting staff, preparation of financial information for auditors and tax-related filings. All of the consulting fees paid to Pacific Opportunity Capital Ltd. could be attributed to Mr. Brown's services as CFO. Mr. Brown was the President and a director of Pacific Opportunity Capital Ltd. Mr. Brown also received option based compensation periodically. Mr. Brown resigned effective December 22, 2017.

Oversight and Description of Director and NEO Compensation

The independent directors are responsible for reviewing and making recommendations to the Board of Directors regarding the compensation of directors and NEOs. The independent directors carry out the function of monitoring executive compensation levels, evaluating the performance of NEOs and directors in light of corporate goals and objectives, and determining (or making recommendations to the Board with respect to) the level of compensation arrangements for the executive, officers and directors. See "Employment, Consulting and Management Agreements" for compensation arrangements for the Company's NEOs.

At no time since the completion of the Company's financial years ended June 30, 2018 and June 30, 2017, did the Company retain a compensation consultant or advisor to assist the Board of Directors or the independent directors in determining compensation for any of the Company's directors or executive officers.

The Company does not have a formal compensation program with set benchmarks. Individual compensation is not directly tied to performance goals which are based on any specific objective and identifiable measure, such as the Company's share price or earnings per share. However, the Company does have a compensation program which seeks to reward an executive officer's current and future expected performance. Individual performance is reviewed for all executive officers based largely on a qualitative evaluation of the Company's achievement of corporate milestones and objectives. The general objectives of the Company's compensation strategy are to:

- (a) compensate management in a manner that encourages and rewards a high level of performance and outstanding results with a view to increasing long-term shareholder value;
- (b) align management's interests with the long-term interest of shareholders;
- (c) provide a compensation package that is commensurate with other junior natural resource companies to enable the Company to attract and retain talent; and
- (d) to ensure that the total compensation package is designed in a manner that takes into account the constraints that the Company is under by virtue of the fact that it is a junior natural resource company without a history of earnings.

The independent directors ensure that total compensation paid to all Named Executive Officers, as hereinafter defined, is fair and reasonable. The independent directors rely on the experience of its members as officers and directors with other junior natural resource companies in assessing compensation levels.

Base salary provides the Named Executive Officers a set amount of money during the year with the expectation that each Named Executive Officer will perform his responsibilities to the best of his ability and in the best interests of the Company.

The Company considers the granting of incentive stock options to be a significant component of executive compensation as it allows the Company to reward each Named Executive Officer's efforts to increase value for shareholders without requiring the Company to use cash from its treasury. Stock options are generally awarded to directors, officers, consultants and employees at the commencement of employment and periodically thereafter. The terms and conditions of the Company's stock option grants, including vesting provisions and exercise prices, are governed by the terms of the Company's stock option plan.

Other than as described herein, no management functions of the Company are to any substantial degree performed by a person other than the directors or executive officers of the Company.

APPENDIX A

GALILEO EXPLORATION LTD. (the “Company”)

Audit Committee Charter

Mandate

The primary function of the audit committee (the “Committee”) is to assist the Board of Directors (“Board”) in fulfilling its financial oversight responsibilities by reviewing the financial reports and other financial information provided by the Company to regulatory authorities and shareholders, the Company’s systems of internal controls regarding finance and accounting and the Company’s auditing, accounting and financial reporting processes. The Committee’s primary duties and responsibilities are to:

- serve as an independent and objective party to monitor the Company’s financial reporting and internal control system and review the Company’s financial statements;
- review and appraise the performance of the Company’s external auditor; and
- provide an open avenue of communication among the Company’s auditor, financial and senior management and the Board.

Composition

The Committee shall be comprised of at least three directors as determined by the Board, all of whom shall be “independent” directors except as permitted by applicable securities regulatory guidelines (including applicable exemptions while the Company is a “venture issuer” within the meaning of applicable securities legislation). A quorum of the Committee shall be a majority of the members. Each member of the Committee will be a member of the Board. In the event of an equality of votes, the Chair of the Committee shall not have a second casting vote.

The members of the Committee shall be elected by the Board at its first meeting following the annual shareholders’ meeting. Unless a Chair is elected by the Board, the members of the Committee may designate a Chair by a majority vote of the full Committee membership.

Meetings

The Committee shall meet at least once annually, or more frequently as circumstances dictate or as may be prescribed by securities regulatory requirements. As part of its job to foster open communication, the Committee will meet at least annually with the Chief Financial Officer and the external auditor in separate sessions.

Responsibilities and Duties

To fulfill its responsibilities and duties, the Committee shall:

1. Documents/Reports
 - (a) review and update, if applicable or necessary, this Audit Committee Charter annually;
 - (b) review with management and the independent auditor the Company’s annual and interim financial statements, management’s discussion and analysis, any annual and interim earnings

press releases and any reports or other financial information to be submitted to any governmental and/or regulatory body, or the public, including any certification, report, opinion, or review rendered by the external auditor for the purpose of recommending their approval to the Board prior to their filing, issue or publication. The Chair of the Committee may represent the entire Committee for purposes of this review in circumstances where time does not allow the full Committee to be available;

- (c) review analyses prepared by management and/or the external auditor setting forth significant financial reporting issues and judgements made in connection with the preparation of the financial statements, including analyses of the effects of alternative GAAP methods on the financial statements;
- (d) review the effect of regulatory and accounting initiatives, as well as off balance sheet structures, on the financial statements of the Company;
- (e) review policies and procedures with respect to directors' and officers' expense accounts and management perquisites and benefits, including their use of corporate assets and expenditures related to executive travel and entertainment, and review the results of the procedures performed in these areas by the external auditor, based on the terms of reference agreed upon by the external auditor and the Committee;
- (f) review expenses of the Board Chair and Chief Executive Officer, Chief Financial Officer and Chief Operating Officer annually; and
- (g) ensure that adequate procedures are in place for the review of the Company's public disclosure of financial information extracted or derived from the Company's financial statements, as well as review any financial information and earnings guidance provided to analysts and rating agencies, and periodically assess the adequacy of those procedures.

2. External Auditor

- (a) review annually, the performance of the external auditor who shall be ultimately accountable to the Board and the Committee as representatives of the shareholders of the Company;
- (b) obtain annually, a formal written statement of external auditor setting forth all relationships between the external auditor and the Company;
- (c) review and discuss with the external auditor any disclosed relationships or services that may have an impact on the objectivity and independence of the external auditor;
- (d) take, or recommend that the Board take, appropriate action to oversee the independence of the external auditor, including the resolution of disagreements between management and the external auditor regarding financial reporting;
- (e) recommend to the Board the selection and, where applicable, the replacement of the external auditor nominated annually for shareholder approval;
- (f) recommend to the Board the compensation to be paid to the external auditor;
- (g) at each meeting, where desired, consult with the external auditor, without the presence of management, about the quality of the Company's accounting principles, internal controls and the completeness and accuracy of the Company's financial statements;

- (h) review and approve the Company's hiring policies regarding partners, employees and former partners and employees of the present and former external auditor of the Company;
- (i) review with management and the external auditor the audit plan for the year-end financial statements; and
- (j) review and pre-approve all audit and audit-related services and the fees and other compensation related thereto, and any non-audit services, provided by the Company's external auditor. The authority to pre-approve non-audit services may be delegated by the Committee to one or more independent members of the Committee, provided that such pre-approval must be presented to the Committee's first scheduled meeting following such pre-approval. Pre-approval of non-audit services is satisfied if:
 - (i) the aggregate amount of all the non-audit services that were not pre-approved is reasonably expected to constitute no more than 5% of the total amount of fees paid by the Company and subsidiaries to the Company's external auditor during the fiscal year in which the services are provided;
 - (ii) the Company or a subsidiary did not recognize the services as non-audit services at the time of the engagement; and
 - (iii) the services are promptly brought to the attention of the Committee and approved, prior to completion of the audit, by the Committee or by one or more of its members to whom authority to grant such approvals has been delegated by the Committee.

3. Financial Reporting Processes

- (a) in consultation with the external auditor, review with management the integrity of the Company's financial reporting process, both internal and external;
- (b) consider the external auditor's judgments about the quality and appropriateness of the Company's accounting principles as applied in its financial reporting;
- (c) consider and approve, if appropriate, changes to the Company's auditing and accounting principles and practices as suggested by the external auditor and management;
- (d) review significant judgments made by management in the preparation of the financial statements and the view of the external auditor as to appropriateness of such judgments;
- (e) following completion of the annual audit, review separately with management and the external auditor any significant difficulties encountered during the course of the audit, including any restrictions on the scope of work or access to required information;
- (f) review any significant disagreement among management and the external auditor in connection with the preparation of the financial statements;
- (g) review with the external auditor and management the extent to which changes and improvements in financial or accounting practices have been implemented;
- (h) review any complaints or concerns about any questionable accounting, internal accounting controls or auditing matters;
- (i) review certification process;

- (j) establish a procedure for the receipt, retention and treatment of complaints received by the Company regarding accounting, internal accounting controls or auditing matters; and
- (k) establish a procedure for the confidential, anonymous submission by employees of the Company of concerns regarding questionable accounting or auditing matters.

4. Other

- (a) review any material related party transactions;
- (b) engage independent counsel and other advisors as it determines necessary to carry out its duties; and
- (c) to set and pay compensation for any independent counsel and other advisors employed by the Committee.
