INTRODUCTION

This Management Discussion and Analysis (the “MDA”) provides relevant information on the operations of GR Silver Mining Ltd. (the “Company” or “GR Silver”) to the Report Date and the financial condition of the Company for the year ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

All monetary amounts in this MDA and in the consolidated financial statements are expressed in Canadian dollars, unless otherwise stated. Financial results are being reported in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (“IFRS”).

The common shares of the Company trade on the TSX Venture Exchange under the ticker symbol “GRSL” and on the OTCQX under the ticker symbol “GRSLF”. The Company is a reporting issuer in provinces of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario.

The Company’s certifying officers, based on their knowledge, having exercised reasonable diligence, are also responsible to ensure that these filings do not contain any untrue or misleading statements nor do they omit stating material facts required to be stated in light of the circumstances under which they were made, with respect to the period covered by these filings, and the audited consolidated financial statements together with other financial information included in these filings. The Board of Directors approves the audited consolidated financial statements and MDA and ensures that management has discharged its financial responsibilities.

The MDA should be read in conjunction with the Company’s consolidated audited financial statements and notes thereto for the year ended December 31, 2022 and 2021.

Mr. Fonseca is not independent of the Company, as he is an officer and director of the Company.

DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS

The Company is in the business of mineral exploration. Consistent with the Company’s business plan, a land consolidation phase has been completed and the focus shifted to the Plomosas Property, the San Marcial Property and the La Trinidad Property (collectively, the “Plomosas Project”). Together these properties comprise a continuous land package, with numerous mineralized zones, past producing mine sites and old workings, located approximately 90 to 100 kilometres east-southeast of Mazatlán, Sinaloa, Mexico (Figure 1). The Plomosas Project is in a prolific mining area, the Rosario Mining District, with nearby historical precious metal producers. The Company has now identified multiple epithermal veins and hydrothermal breccias on the Plomosas Project.

The main business activities include the evaluation and exploration of mineral exploration properties to define economic mineral deposits aiming for potential development. The Company is currently focused on resource expansion at the Plomosas Mine and San Marcial Areas, as well as exploring for new discoveries elsewhere on the Plomosas Project. The carrying values of the Company’s exploration and evaluation assets are dependent upon the discovery of economically recoverable reserves and future

profitable production or proceeds from the disposition of these assets. These carrying values do not necessarily reflect their present or future values.

The Company is a British Columbia corporation. The Company's head office address is Suite 1050 – 400 Burrard Street, Vancouver B.C. V6C 3A6. The Company's registered and records office is Suite 600 – 890 West Pender Street, Vancouver, B.C. V6C 1J9.

HIGHLIGHTS – YEAR AND QUARTER ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2022 & SUBSEQUENT TO THE YEAR END

- During the three months ended December 31, 2022, GR Silver advanced its planned drill programs at the Plomosas Mine Area, the San Marcial Area and the San Juan-La Colorada Area. At the Plomosas Mine, 44 underground holes were drilled totalling 2,539.6 metres, while at San Marcial, 5 surface holes were drilled totalling 1,710.5 metres, all located in the SE Area, and eight underground and surface holes were drilled at San Juan-La Colorada totalling 670.5 metres.
- During the twelve months ended December 31, 2022, GR Silver drilled 170 underground and surface holes totalling 8,272.5 metres at the Plomosas Mine, 54 surface holes totalling 7,451.7 metres at San Marcial, including 24 surface holes totalling 4,740.6 metres in the SE Area discovery zone, and 19 underground and surface holes totalling 785.6 metres at San Juan-La Colorada.
- As announced in the news release of August 8, 2022, GR Silver discovered wide, high-grade silver mineralization approximately 250 metres southeast of the southernmost boundary of the San Marcial Resource Area, in an area known as the Southeast Area ("SE Area")(Figure 2). **Discovery hole SMS22-10 intersected 101.6 m at 308 g/t Ag (from 98.5 m down hole), including multiple intervals grading over 1,000 g/t Ag.** Subsequent drilling, announced in the news releases of September 7, October 17, November 21, 2022 and January 16, 2023 demonstrates the geometry, lateral extent and continuity of the new zone along strike to the southeast of the discovery hole, in which silver-rich mineralization is hosted in breccia and intense hematite-quartz stockwork veining. The Company continues to identify additional targets on this part of the San Marcial Property, utilizing geophysical, geochemical and geological mapping studies, and will continue to test the lateral extent of high-grade Ag mineralization along the target contact. Drilling concluded at San Marcial in December 2022 in preparation for the 2023 Mineral Resource Estimate update.
- After delivery of the Plomosas Mine and San Juan Areas Mineral Resource Estimate in August 2021, GR Silver embarked on a program of surgical infill drilling in the Plomosas Mine Area, to replace some of the historical holes used in the estimate that were selectively sampled, as well as to test new near-surface and underground high-grade Ag-Au mineralized zones. News releases on April 27, May 24, September 12, October 31, December 13, 2022, and February 21 and March 1, 2023 detailed results from this successful program. The results of this drilling demonstrate new discoveries in several un-mined zones in the primary polymetallic hydrothermal breccia, as well as newly discovered footwall and hanging wall precious metal mineralization associated with cross cutting faults (e.g., hole **PLI22-23: 44.5 m at 518 g/t AgEq - 268 g/t Ag, 1.0 g/t Au, 2.4% Pb, 1.7% Zn, 0.2% Cu**).
- On February 16, 2023, GR Silver announced the closing of a non-brokered private placement offering, issuing 30,300,000 units of the Company at a price of \$0.10 per unit for aggregate gross proceeds of \$3,030,000, including 1,169,400 units sold pursuant to finder's fees. Each unit consisted of one common share in the capital of the Company and one-half of one common share purchase warrant. Each whole warrant is exercisable to acquire one common share for a period of 24 months following the closing of the Offering at an exercise price of \$0.15 per common share.

- On March 20, 2023, the Company released details of its Plomosas Project NI 43-101 Mineral Resource Estimate, updating resources for the San Marcial, Plomosas Mine and San Juan-La Colorada Areas. The combined **Mineral Resource Estimate consisted of 55 Moz AgE (Indicated) and 22 Moz Ag (Inferred)**, representing a 72% increase in Indicated Ag mineral resources and a 20% increase in Inferred Ag mineral resources. Details of the combined Plomosas Project Mineral Resource Estimate are shown in Table 1, and the Mineral Resource Estimate is broken down by area in Table 2. Parameters for the estimate are shown in Table 3.

The Resource Estimate released on March 20, 2023 was completed by ARSENEAU Consulting Services Inc. ("ACS") and Mr. S. T. Crowie (Sr. Metallurgist with JDS Energy & Mining Inc.), both of Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, and integrates resources for the San Marcial, Plomosas Mine and San Juan-La Colorada Areas within the Plomosas Project.

A total of 75 GR Silver drill holes (10,500 metres) were added to the 52 holes used in the previous resource estimate, totalling 122 holes (19,000 metres) for the San Marcial Area including the SE Area discovery. At the Plomosas Mine Area, a total of 223 drill holes (16,380 metres) were drilled in specific areas of the existing underground historical mine as part of the infill drilling program. A total of 424 drill holes (60,020 metres) comprises the Plomosas Mine Area database supporting the Resource Estimate.

The Plomosas Project Resource Estimate adopts the key parameter of having a reasonable prospect of economic extraction, utilizing a combination of open pit and underground assumptions. Capping was applied to the original assay values prior to compositing in the mineral resource estimation process.

Highlights of the Resource Estimate (Table 1) including comparison to the previous mineral resource estimates¹ (Tables 5 and 7) are:

- 72% increase in indicated mineral resources from 32 Moz to 55 Moz Ag
- 20% increase in inferred mineral resources from 18 Moz to 22 Moz Ag

San Marcial Area

- Indicated mineral resources of 9.7 Mt at 148 g/t Ag
- Inferred mineral resources of 3.0 Mt at 145 g/t Ag
- 91% of the 46 Moz Ag San Marcial indicated resources are potentially amenable to open pit extraction
- True width of the modelled San Marcial mineralization averages 22 metres, while the SE Area discovery averages 53 metres in thickness, supporting potential for low-cost bulk mineable open pit and/or underground mining methods

Plomosas Mine Area

- 2022 infill drilling resulted in an increase of 137% in the indicated mineral resource tonnage
- 281% increase in indicated mineral resources from 2.1 Moz to 8 Moz Ag
- Ag grade increased by 64% in indicated mineral resources in relation to the previous resource estimate
- True width of modelled mineralization at the Plomosas Mine Area averages 20 metres, supporting potential for low-cost bulk mineable open pit and/or underground mining methods

Key Statistics

- GR Silver Mining has successfully expanded resources at a low cost of exploration and acquisition (US\$0.25/oz) at the Plomosas Project
- Since previous resource estimates in 2019 and 2021, the Company has achieved an estimated exploration cost of US\$0.17/oz AgEq discovered
- Indicated Ag ounces have increased 206% since the Company's inception
- Inferred Ag ounces have increased 406% since the Company's inception
- The proportion of total indicated resource (oz Ag) increased since the previous resource estimate, now representing 71% of total resources at the Plomosas Project (Table 1).

PLOMOSAS PROJECT

History and Background

GR Silver has, over several years, assembled a portfolio of mining concessions, which are wholly-owned but subject to various royalties, totalling approximately 734 square kilometres in the Rosario Mining District, Sinaloa State, Mexico. The three key properties which comprise the Plomosas Project, cover 432 square kilometres, encompass two past producing mines and three camps, and feature excellent road access and power to multiple locations. Plomosas Project concessions and their applicable royalties are detailed in Tables 4 and 13, respectively, with locations indicated in Figure 1.

In March 2020, GR Silver completed the acquisition of 100% of Minera La Rastra S.A. de C.V. ("MLR"), the company holding the Plomosas Property and other concessions, from First Majestic Silver Corp. The Plomosas Property includes the past-producing Plomosas Mine - a shallow underground mine from which Grupo Mexico historically produced 67,600 t of lead concentrate and 31,400 t of zinc concentrate, with silver - gold credits, between 1986 and 2000. This mine was closed in 2001 due to then prevailing low commodity prices. As a result of the mine's continuous care and maintenance since that time, 7.4 km of underground tunnels and developments have remained in good condition, providing immediate access for exploration and potential future mining activities. MLR also owns 349 hectares of land covering most of the underground mine and vicinity at the Plomosas Mine. As the Plomosas Mine is a past producer, valid surface rights agreements, as well as some other essential permits, remain in place for current and future use by the Company.

In addition, the Plomosas Property includes mineralization at the San Juan-La Colorada Area, located approximately three kilometres west of the Plomosas Mine, and near the eastern margin of a small, third-party held concession currently being mined for gold. Artisanal workings are present, as well as shallow underground workings developed on a breccia, known as the San Juan Breccia.

In March 2021, the Company concluded the acquisition of 100% of Marlin Gold Mining Ltd. (“Marlin”) from Mako Mining Corp. (“Mako”). Marlin owns 100% of Oro Gold de Mexico, S.A. de C.V., a Mexican company, that includes the past producing La Trinidad open pit gold mine (“La Trinidad”), that ceased operating in 2019 after producing over 164,000 oz of gold^{2,3,4}, and additional highly prospective concessions in the Rosario Mining District. The La Trinidad open pit area is currently undergoing reclamation under a “Closure Plan” that remains the responsibility of Mako. The Closure Plan period expiry was November 8, 2022 however, a five-year extension was received by the Company from SEMARNAT (Secretary of the Environment and Natural Resources), the Mexican environmental authority, on March 16, 2023, with a new expiry date of November 8, 2027.

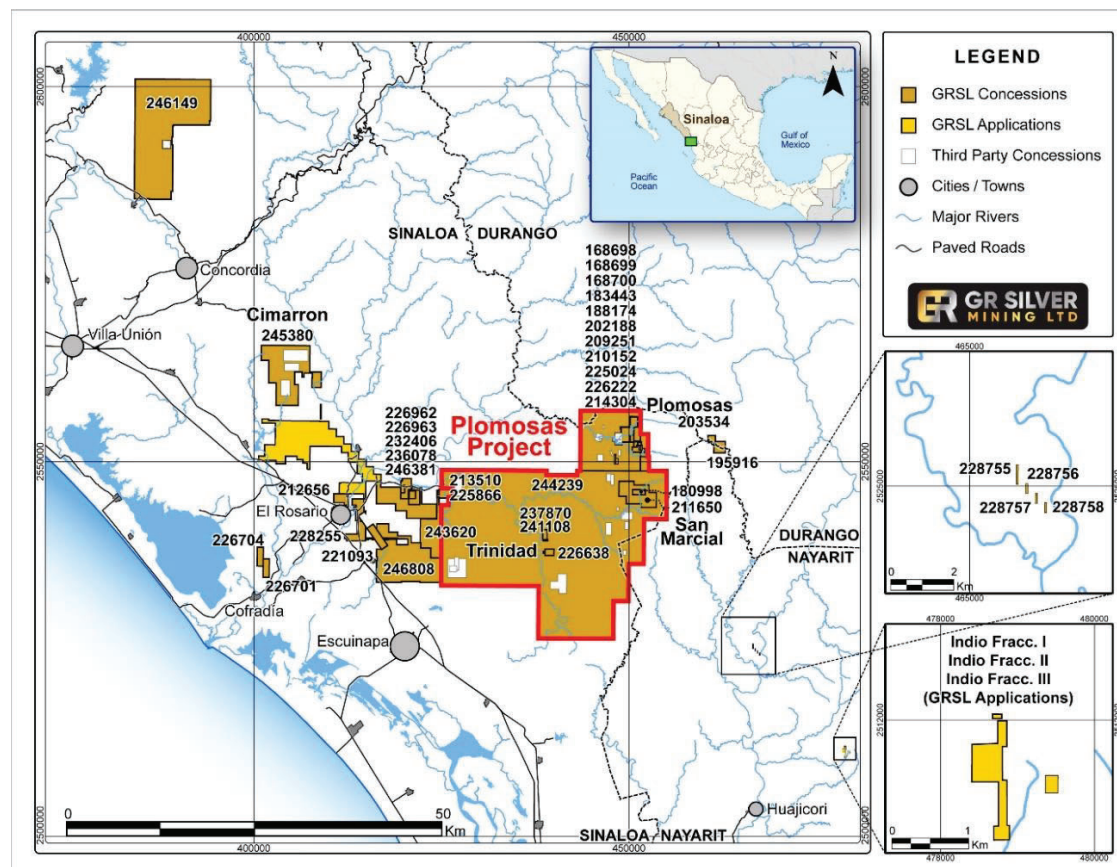
On May 6, 2021, following a successful three-year period of exploration and resource expansion under an option agreement, GR Silver acquired Compañia Minera San Marcial S.A. de C.V., which owns the San Marcial Property.

The Company has now integrated the historical databases for the Plomosas Project, obtained through the aforementioned acquisitions, into a single regional database. The Company's Plomosas Project lies in one of the most prolific geological settings for the discovery of high-grade silver-gold epithermal mineralized systems in Mexico, along the western edge of the Sierra Madre Occidental. A number of world class deposits have been discovered in this setting, including the San Dimas deposit, just 125 kilometres north of the Plomosas Project, and the El Rosario Mine which historically produced millions of ounces of precious metals.

In addition to the Plomosas Project, the Company holds over 300 square kilometres of highly prospective "non-core" mining concessions, which include the Cimarron gold deposit (Figure 1), as well as mining concessions and applications close to the El Rosario Mine, namely Rosario, El Habal, La Union 2, El Habal Sur, Yauco, San Isidro and El Placer II (Tables 11 and 12).

Geology and Resources

The silver-gold-lead-zinc mineralization at the **San Marcial Property** is typical of epithermal systems, and is hosted in a hydrothermal breccia and stockwork zone near the contact between felsic and mafic volcanic units on the western edge of the Sierra Madre Occidental Geologic Province. Along an extensive mineralized trend, supported by positive surface exploration results over seven additional drill targets, there are highly altered hydrothermal breccias, conglomerates and a relatively fresh dacite porphyry intrusive. Faulting is an important structural feature related to the silver-gold-lead-zinc mineralization, and the intersections of NE with NW trending structures are considered the most prospective areas for exploration at the San Marcial Property.

In February 2019, the Company released an updated NI 43-101 mineral resource estimate, amended on June 12, 2020 (Table 5). This resource update was an increase on the previous 2008 mineral resource estimate that consisted of only 30 drill holes completed up to November 2008. An additional 22 drill holes, drilled in 2010, were integrated into the updated NI 43-101 mineral resource estimate by the Company in 2019. Preliminary metallurgical results from oxide, transitional and sulphide samples from San Marcial indicate excellent column leach test silver recoveries in the range from 82% to 94% over a 96-hour leach period.

The known deposit, as detailed in the 2019 mineral resource estimate, was extended down dip by the 2021 underground drilling program which encountered high-grade silver over significant widths below the 2019 resource. High-grade and wide silver intercepts were: **SMI21-03 - 18.5 m at 773 g/t Ag, including 5.6 m at 1,792 g/t Ag;** and **SMI21-04 – 38.0 m at 299 g/t Ag, including 3.5 m at 1,002 g/t Ag.** Additionally, the new silver discovery in the SE Area, highlighted by the wide, high-grade intersections in SMS22-10, has also extended the previous mineral resource estimate. The discovery was the result of successful targeting utilizing detailed geological and structural mapping, a recent ground based geophysical survey (magnetics and 3D IP) and systematic surface geochemistry focused on the target contact along strike to the southeast of the San Marcial Resource Area (Figure 2).

Mining at the **Plomosas Mine** took place from 1986 to 2000. A total of 2.5 Mt of ore were processed through a 600 tpd crushing-milling flotation circuit (Table 6). During the 14 years of operation, lead and zinc concentrates were the main products, with reported high-grade silver and gold credits. The historical reports indicate annual average grades for each commodity within the following ranges: zinc (1.85% to 2.66%), lead (1.19% to 3.37%), silver (79 g/t to 338 g/t) and gold (0.76 g/t to 1.74 g/t). The room and pillar underground operation selectively mined to only 260 metres depth of a polymetallic hydrothermal breccia hosted in a shallow-dipping regional fault. Extensive historical and current drilling data show additional continuity down dip and along strike as well as new mineralized zones on the footwall and hanging wall of the main zone.

The drilling data also indicate high-grade silver and gold mineralization in unmined hanging wall and footwall zones around the mineralized hydrothermal breccia. The Company confirmed the multi-commodity nature of the mineralization and high-grade silver and gold zones through its re-examination of the extensive drilling database, its re-logging and re-sampling work, and its delineation of new

mineralized zones outside of the historically mined area as a result of its 15,944 metre surface and underground drilling program during 2020 and early 2021 (see News Release dated July 7, 2021).

The high-grade silver-gold mineralization drilled by GR Silver at the Plomosas Mine Area displays the alteration, textures, mineralogy and deposit geometry characteristics of a low to intermediate sulphidation epithermal silver-gold-base metal mineralized vein/breccia system. Previous exploration was focused on the main polymetallic (lead-zinc) shallow mineralization, hosted in NW-SE structures in the vicinity of the Plomosas Mine. The E-W portion of the mineralization and extensions of the main N-S fault underlying the Plomosas Mine remain under-explored, however have both recently provided positive drilling results defining new mineralized zones.

Despite historical production and subsequent drilling campaigns by previous owners, GR Silver was the first company to integrate all data into a 3D model and complete NI 43-101 resource estimates. On August 23, 2021, the Company released details of initial mineral resource estimates for the Plomosas Mine and San Juan Areas. The major highlights were as follows:

- Indicated Resources: 3.4 Moz Ag, 53 koz Au, 73 Mlbs Zn and 48 Mlbs Pb for 10.3 Moz AgEq*
- Inferred Resources: 8.6 Moz Ag, 85 koz Au, 149 Mlbs Zn and 116 Mlbs Pb for 21.0 Moz AgEq*
- Estimates included 80 new GR Silver drill holes and 476 historical drill holes representing a total of 100,672 m of drilling covering two areas, the Plomosas Mine and San Juan Areas.
- The mineral resource estimates were based on a conservative approach. Sampling of historical drill holes by previous companies was frequently incomplete, leaving a large amount of available drill core unsampled. Missing and unassayed drill hole intervals within mineralized zones were conservatively assigned zero values for purposes of the resource estimates. Further drilling was subsequently undertaken in 2022 to address these unsampled areas and continue growth of the resource inventory at the Plomosas Mine and San Juan Areas.

- v. 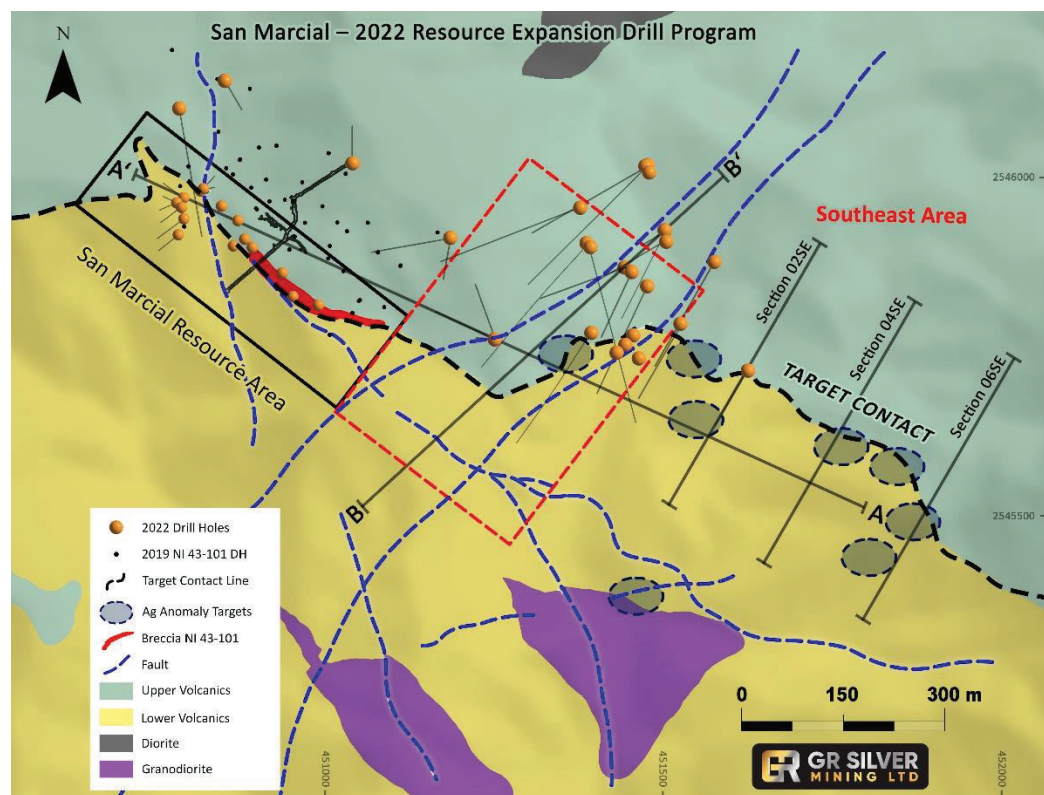

As announced in the news release of August 8, 2022, GR Silver discovered wide, high-grade silver mineralization in the SE Area, approximately 250 metres southeast of the southernmost boundary of the San Marcial Resource Area (Figure 2). Hole SMS22-10 intersected 101.6 m at 308 g/t Ag (from 98.5 m down hole), including multiple intervals grading over 1,000 g/t Ag. Subsequent drilling, announced in the news releases of September 7, October 17, November 21, 2022 and January 16, 2023 has advanced the Company's understanding of the geometry, lateral extent, and continuity of this newly discovered zone, in which silver-rich mineralization is hosted in breccias and intense hematite-quartz stockwork veining.

Drill holes SMS22-17 to SMS22-24 were drilled to test both depth and along strike extensions of the SE Area mineralization. Two northeasterly trending faults (Figure 2) appear to create a corridor that hosts the SE Area discovery.

Drill holes SMS22-09, SMS22-17, SMS22-21 and SMS22-24 were drilled on the north side of the NE-trending corridor that hosts the SE Area mineralization, testing down dip extensions to the high-grade San Marcial Breccia style mineralization encountered in the 2021 underground drill program, and any potential connection with the SE Area.

SMS22-09 intersected similar textures to those in the SMS22-10 discovery hole on the contact of the San Marcial Breccia, down dip from high-grade mineralization in the 2019 Resource Area. However, at depth below that contact, the hole intersected a narrow, very high-grade polymetallic vein containing 0.3 m at 26,150 g/t Ag with >30% Pb and 18.6% Zn. This E-W trending vein has been intercepted only in one other drill hole, SMS22-17, and opens up a new exploration target at depth that cross cuts the volcano-sedimentary unit. SMS22-17 was designed to test the northern margin of the NE-trending mineralized corridor, at depth 115 m below the discovery hole, SMS22-10. SMS22-17 intersected 14.1 m at 186 g/t Ag including a high-grade intercept of 0.2 m at 6,405 g/t Ag that also contained 10.1% Pb and 17.9% Zn. This geochemical combination suggests that this hole position is transitional between the SE Area Ag-rich mineralization and the more typical Ag-Pb-Zn San Marcial Breccia style of mineralization in the 2019 Resource Area.

SMS22-21 and SMS22-24 were planned to test mineralization at similar elevation to the mineralization intersected in the SE Area - between 625 m and 550 m elevation – but further to the north, and down dip from the 2019 Resource Area. Drill hole SMS22-21 intersected similar breccias in chloritic facies of the volcano-sedimentary unit, but reduced Ag mineralization. SMS22-24, located approximately 100 m NW of SMS22-21, intersected the San Marcial Breccia but not the chloritic facies of the volcano-sedimentary unit indicating significant differences in control of the mineralization between the SE Area and the Resource Area, possibly related to N-S faults. The best interval was 1.4 m at 70 g/t Ag.

Drill holes SMS22-18, SMS22-19 and SMS22-22 were drilled within the SE Area NE-trending corridor. While SMS22-18 (73.5 m at 72 g/t Ag) and SMS22-22 (82.7 m at 121 g/t Ag) intersected good widths of mineralization with locally high silver grades, SMS22-19 resulted in lower Ag grades and a narrower (28.9 m apparent thickness) intercept. This latter hole was targeting the up dip extent of the SE Area

mineralization and suggests that there is likely a vertical component to the higher-grade mineralization, which pinches out up dip.

SMS22-20 was an important strategic hole that was oriented perpendicular to the NE-trending mineralized corridor that hosts the SE Area discovery mineralization. It was designed to confirm the geometry of the mineralization and validate the importance of the two NE-trending faults that appear to control the location of the high-grade Ag mineralization. Both NE-trending faults were successfully cut by this drill hole, while also intersecting the wide high-grade mineralized zones identified in the discovery hole SMS22-10 as well as SMS22-11 and SMS22-16. The hole resulted in an interval of 185.5 m at 111 g/t Ag, including numerous intercepts >1,000 g/t Ag – one of the best holes drilled to date at San Marcial. This hole provided the Company with much greater confidence to create a cohesive 3D model of the new SE Area mineralized zone. In addition to the significant Ag mineralization in hole SMS22-20, the hole also produced the first ever examples of visible gold in drilling at San Marcial. At depth outside (to the south) of the NE-trending Ag mineralized corridor, a crystalline quartz-calcite vein, within a silicified volcano-sedimentary unit, was identified with fine grained disseminated visible Au within a sample that returned 1.0 m at 31.3 g/t Au.

SMS22-23 was drilled outside, and to the south of, the NE-trending (fault-bounded) corridor that hosts the SE Area discovery (Figure 2). However, SMS22-23 has shown that the same style of Ag mineralization in the SE Area can be found outside the NE trending corridor, in subparallel structural corridors similar to hole SMS22-10. This is a significant revelation that demonstrates the exploration potential further to the southeast of the SE Area discovery, along the target contact zone and in other subparallel prospective structures. SMS22-23 also has a narrow high-grade gold zone – 0.6 m at 14.3 g/t Au – in the vicinity of the gold zone previously reported for SMS22-20, opening up the exploration potential for narrow high-grade gold veins in the SE Area.

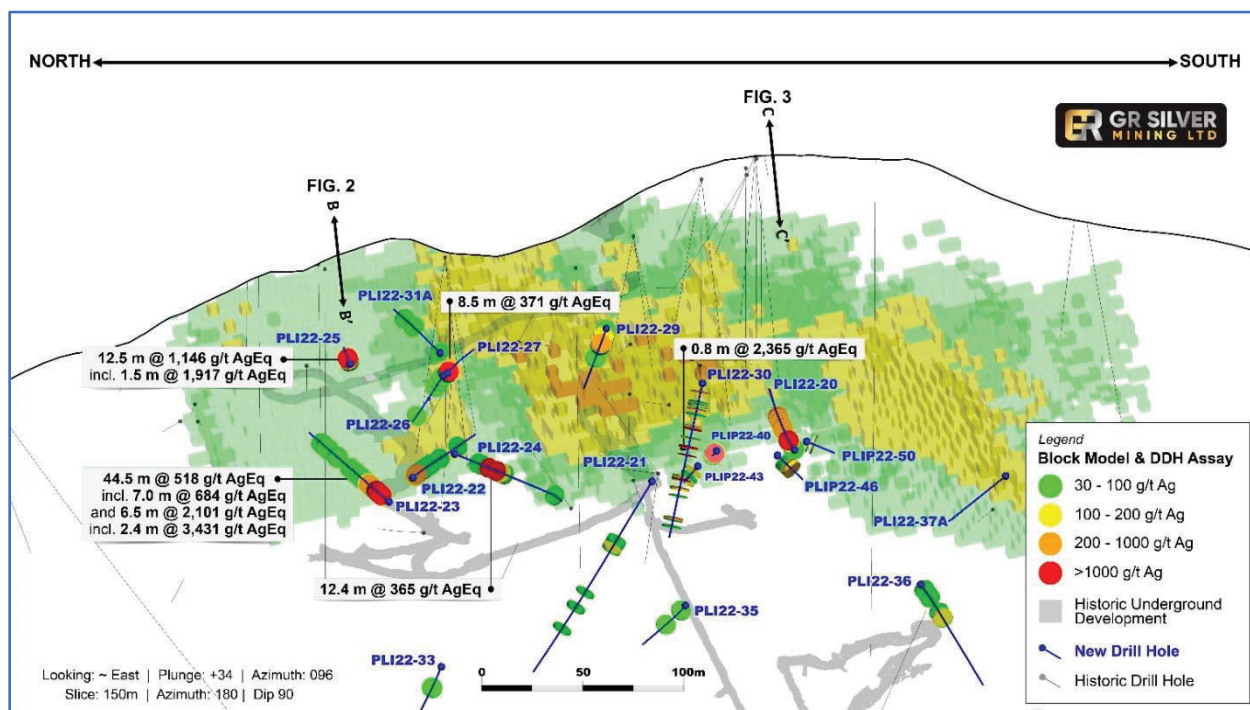
The Company continues to identify additional targets to the southeast of the San Marcial Resource Area utilizing geophysical, geochemical and geological mapping studies, and will continue to test the lateral extent of high-grade Ag mineralization along the target contact. The recent positive results along strike encourage the Company to continue exploration and drilling along the target contact during 2023, aiming to discover new zones similar to the SE Area discovery.

The Company has completed the following work from October 1 to December 31, 2022 on the Plomosas Mine Area (Table 9).

Following the delivery of the Plomosas Mine and San Juan Areas Mineral Resource Estimate in August 2021, GR Silver embarked on a program of infill drilling at the Plomosas Mine Area to replace some of the historical holes used in the estimate which had not been fully assayed, as well as to test new near-surface and underground high-grade Ag-Au targets. News releases on April 27, May 24, September 12, October 31 and December 13, 2022 and February 21, March 1 and March 20, 2023 detailed results from this successful program. Since August 2021, the Company has released the results from 188 new holes (11,636.6 m), which demonstrate new discoveries in several un-mined parts of the primary polymetallic hydrothermal breccia (Figure 3), as well as newly discovered footwall and hanging wall precious metal mineralization associated with cross cutting faults (e.g., hole PLI22-23: 44.5 m at 518 g/t AgEq - 268 g/t Ag, 1.0 g/t Au, 2.4% Pb, 1.7% Zn, 0.2% Cu; PLIP22-28: 7.3 m at 1,242 g/t AgEq - 55 g/t Ag, 8.66 g/t Au, 2.7% Pb, 6.6% Zn and 0.5% Cu).

All holes drilled by the Company prior to the end of December 2022 were included in the update of mineral resource estimates, released on March 20, 2023.

The Company has completed the following work from October 1 to December 31, 2022 on the San Juan-La Colorada Area (Table 10).

At the San Juan-La Colorada Area, the historical drilling completed by Grupo Mexico was selectively sampled, and core is only available for selected intervals and drill holes. The GR Silver seven-hole underground drilling program undertaken at San Juan in the December quarter of 2022, aimed to replace some of the historical drill holes within the resource model, where this aspect of selective sampling required adoption of zero values in the previous resource estimation. GR Silver results included 17.7 m at 124 g/t Ag, 0.14 g/t Au, 0.1% Pb and 0.5% Zn, including 4.4 m at 409 g/t Ag, 0.35 g/t Au, 0.4% Pb and 1.1% Zn from SJI22-02.

GR Silver drilling also targeted new mineralized structures, recently mapped in the adjacent underground La Colorada mine, with one surface drill hole, with potential to define new mineralized zones for incorporation in the Mineral Resource model.

The La Trinidad Property was on care and maintenance during 2022, while the Company's focus was on completing the drill programs and mineral resource updates for the San Marcial, Plomosas Mine and San Juan-La Colorada Areas. Since the end of the December quarter, the Company has commenced initial prospecting activities in the La Trinidad concession, immediately adjacent and to the south of the San Marcial property.

Outlook

Following the December 2022 completion of drilling programs leading into the recently released Plomosas Project NI 43-101 Mineral Resource Update, the Company immediately commenced exploration activities to the south and southeast of the San Marcial Resource Area and new SE Area mineralization. A combination of detailed mapping, geophysical interpretations and surface litho-geochemical anomalies supported this area as being highly prospective for expanding the San Marcial resource. The target contact, that is the focus for the San Marcial and SE Area resources, is known to continue further to the southeast and coincides with a number of silver geochemical anomalies (Figure 2). A chargeability anomaly and a number of coincident intrusive bodies have also been identified in this area. Detailed mapping, channel sampling and geochemical sampling, with portable XRF analyses, are underway with a number of drill targets having been defined in the 600 metres immediately to the southeast along the target contact.

OTHER PROJECTS

GR Silver subsidiaries hold title to the following additional mining concessions (Table 11) and mining concession applications (Table 12) in the Rosario Mining District, with no exploration activities during the year ended December 31, 2022. Applicable royalties are noted in Table 13. Note that the El Salto and El Salto Sur concessions are subject to a sale agreement to a third party (see News Release dated December 20, 2021) and completion of this sale is pending regulatory confirmation.

During fiscal 2022, the Company issued 63,900,742 common shares for gross proceeds of \$12,874,871 and incurred share issue costs of \$1,233,282. The Company incurred a loss of \$18,794,177, which included exploration expenditures of \$13,953,350, share based compensation of \$453,446 (non-cash expense), salaries of \$2,050,881, impairment on value added tax of \$693,251 and a gain on concession fee of \$2,612,428.

During fiscal 2021, the Company issued 36,552,644 common shares for gross proceeds of \$18,036,204 and incurred share issue costs of \$1,001,615. The Company incurred a loss of \$18,197,243, which included exploration expenditures of \$12,442,672, share based compensation of \$1,532,335 (non-cash expense), salaries of \$1,575,121, impairment on value added tax of \$450,642 and a gain on concession fees forgiveness of \$584,421.

During fiscal 2020, the Company issued 41,973,149 common shares for gross proceeds of \$11,466,455 and incurred share issue costs of \$886,344. The Company acquired the Plomosas Property and recorded net assets acquired of \$3,167,843. The Company incurred a loss of \$8,743,671, which included exploration expenditures of \$4,355,090, share based compensation of \$1,049,075 (non-cash expense) and impairment on exploration and evaluation assets of \$560,268.

Overview - 2022

Results of Operations for the years ended December 31, 2022.

This review of the Results of Operations should be read in conjunction with the consolidated audited financial statements of the Company for the year ended December 31, 2022.

During the year ended December 31, 2022, the Company incurred a net loss of \$18,794,177 (2021 – \$18,197,243).

The following discussion explains the variations in key components of these numbers but, as with most junior mineral exploration companies, the results of operations are not the main factor in evaluating the financial health of the Company. Of far greater significance are the mineral properties in which the Company has, or may earn, an interest, its working capital and how many shares it has outstanding. Quarterly results can vary significantly depending on whether the Company has abandoned any properties or granted any stock options.

The Company's expenses were \$19,308,526 (2021 - \$18,240,091) including general and administrative \$6,900,410 (2021 - \$5,979,002) and exploration expenditures of \$13,953,350 (2021 - \$12,442,672), and reviews of the major items are as follows:

- Exploration expenditures of \$13,953,350 (2021 - \$12,442,672) of which \$2,417,331 (2021 – \$2,758,101) was spent on the San Marcial property, \$4,473,444 (2021 - \$7,017,974) on the Plomosas property, \$6,915,921 (2021 - \$2,582,976) on the La Trinidad property and \$146,654 (2021 - \$83,621) on the El Habal property. The expenditures increased slightly over the prior year as the Company received funding and the Company continued to remain active in its exploration efforts;
- Consulting of \$108,610 (2021 - \$300,076) consisting of fees paid for financing strategy of \$36,461 (2021 - \$120,000), employment recruitment of \$Nil (2021 - \$36,000), Mexican subsidiaries of \$Nil (2021 - \$35,563), corporate communication of \$40,250 (2021 - \$17,990) and other of \$31,903 (2021 - \$90,523);
- Professional fees of \$575,206 (2021 - \$564,040) consists of legal of \$361,325 (2021 - \$350,703) and audit and accounting of \$213,881 (2021 - \$213,337,);

- Salaries and director fees of \$2,050,881 (2021 - \$1,575,121) consisting of salaries and benefits in Canada of \$1,126,570 (2021 - \$943,826) and Mexico of \$872,459 (2021 - \$527,545) and directors' fees of \$51,852 (2021 - \$103,750);
- Share-based compensation of \$453,446 (2021 - \$1,532,335) for options issued decreased as fewer options were granted in 2022 (920,000) than 2021 (3,660,000);
- Regulatory and transfer agent of \$179,631 (2021-\$101,159) consists of transfer agent of \$70,318 (2021 - \$47,320), regulatory of \$91,191 (2021 - \$36,330) and OTCQB listing of \$18,122 (2021 - \$17,509); and

- Gain on concession fees as a result of fees becoming statute barred and are no longer payable resulting in a gain on retirement of concession fees of \$2,612,428(2021 - \$584,421).

During the quarter ended December 31, 2022, The Company incurred expenses of \$6,548,424, which included \$4,273,916 in exploration expenditures, salaries of \$546,046, professional fees of \$143,808 and impairment on value added tax of \$693,251.

During the quarter ended September 30, 2022, the Company completed a private placement and received gross proceeds of \$5,439,450. The Company incurred expenses of \$3,946,408, which included \$3,839,045 in exploration expenditures, salaries of \$431,990, professional fees of \$148,471 and gain on concession fees of \$1,723,586.

During the quarter ended June 30, 2022, the Company incurred expenses of \$4,158,493, which included \$2,417,789 in exploration expenditures, salaries of \$442,778 and professional fees of \$137,802

During the quarter ended March 31, 2022, the Company completed a conversion of special warrants financing to units and received gross proceeds of \$7,353,924 and \$67,097 on the exercise of warrants. The Company incurred expenses of \$4,031,782, which included \$3,422,600 in exploration expenditures, salaries of \$630,067, professional fees of \$145,125, share-based compensation of \$254,775 and gain on concession fees of \$831,621.

During the quarter ended December 31, 2021, the Company incurred expenses of \$4,527,216, which included \$3,556,311 in exploration expenditures, salaries of \$496,291, professional fees of \$137,857 and impairment on value added tax in Mexico of \$523,009.

During the quarter ended September 30, 2021, the Company incurred expenses of \$4,733,871, which included \$3,549,096 in exploration expenditures, salaries of \$559,610 and professional fees of \$110,037.

During the quarter ended June 30, 2021, the Company completed a bought deal financing and received gross proceeds of \$11,534,500, received \$5,550 on the exercise of options and \$5,540,333 on the exercise of warrants. - Consulting of \$22,169 (2021 - \$46,550) consisting of fees paid or accrued for strategic business planning of \$Nil (2021 - \$15,000), corporate communication of \$9,870 (2021 - \$17,990) and other of \$12,299 (2021 - \$13,560);

- Salaries of \$546,046 (2021 - \$496,291) consisting of salaries and benefits in Canada and Mexico of \$534,046 (2021 - \$492,291) and directors' fees of \$12,000 (2021 - \$4,000);

LIQUIDITY AND CAPITAL RESOURCES

Because of economic conditions, globally, there is uncertainty in capital markets, particularly for small exploration companies, and the Company anticipates that it and its peers will have limited access to capital in 2023. Although the business and assets of the Company have not changed, overall investor interest in shares of junior exploration companies appears to have diminished. The Company continually monitors its financing alternatives and expects to finance its fiscal 2023 operating overhead and acquisition and exploration expenditures through private placements.

The quantity of funds to be raised and the terms of any equity financing that may be undertaken will be negotiated by management as opportunities to raise funds arise. There can be no assurance that such funds will be available on favorable terms, or at all. As at December 31, 2022 the Company had a working capital deficiency of \$17,104,845 consisting primarily of concession fees payable. The Company is looking at options to address the concession fees payable.

As at December 31, 2022, the Company reported cash of \$902,238 compared to \$3,077,796 as at December 31, 2021. The decrease in cash on hand and change in working capital was the result of cash from financing activities of \$11,641,589 and cash used in operating activities of \$13,561,462 and investing activities of \$255,685.

During the year ended December 31, 2022;

- The Company issued 400,987 common shares on the exercise of warrants for proceeds of \$81,497. Share issue costs of \$385 were incurred and was recorded as an offset to share capital, as share issue costs.
- The Company issued 136,909 common shares valued at \$28,751 as debt settlement resulting in a gain on settlement of \$4,792. Share issue costs of \$556 were incurred and was recorded as an offset to share capital, as share issue costs.
- Completed conversion of 27,236,755 special warrants (the "Special Warrants") to 27,236,755 units. The Special Warrants were previously issued upon completion of a private placement at a price of \$0.27 per Special Warrant for gross proceeds of \$7,353,924. Upon receipt of a final short form prospectus, each Special Warrant was automatically exercised, at no additional cost to the holder thereof, for one Unit. Each Unit was comprised of one common share and one-half of one common share purchase warrant. Each whole warrant is exercisable to acquire one share at an exercise price of \$0.37 per share to March 29, 2025. The Company valued the warrants at \$2,315,124 using the residual value approach. On completion of the private placement, the

Company paid cash finders fees of \$422,931 and issued 1,566,410 special agent warrants valued at \$190,844. Upon receipt of a final short form prospectus, each special agent warrant was automatically exercised, at no additional cost to the holder thereof, for one broker warrant. Each broker warrant is exercisable for one common share until March 29, 2025, at an exercise price of \$0.27 per share. Additional share issue costs of \$266,298 were incurred in connection with this financing, and was recorded as an offset to share capital, as share issue costs.

- Completed a brokered private placement of 36,263,000 units at a price of \$0.15 per unit for gross proceeds of \$5,439,450. Each unit consisted of one common share in the capital of the Company and one-half of one common share purchase warrant and each whole warrant is exercisable into one common share of the Company at an exercise price of \$0.22 per share until August 30, 2025. The Company valued the warrants at \$543,945 using the residual value approach. The Company paid cash finders fees of \$271,458 and issued 1,809,720 agent warrants valued at \$118,761. The Company also paid a corporate finance fee of \$50,000, recorded as an offset to share capital, as share issue costs and issued 339,000 agent warrants valued at \$22,246. Each agent warrant is exercisable into one common share at an exercise price of \$0.15 per share until to August 30, 2025. Additional share issue costs of \$221,354 were incurred in connection with this financing, and was recorded as an offset to share capital, as share issue costs.
- Subsequent to year end, completed a private placement of 30,300,000 units at a price of \$0.10 per unit for gross proceeds of \$3,030,000. Each unit consisted of one common share in the capital of the Company and one-half of one common share purchase warrant and each whole warrant is exercisable into one common share of the Company at an exercise price of \$0.15 per warrant to February 14, 2025, subject to an acceleration clause. The Company paid cash finders fees of \$116,940 and issued 1,169,400 agent warrants. Each agent warrant is exercisable at an exercise price of \$0.15 per agent warrant to February 14, 2025.

INVESTOR RELATIONS

The Company has no investor relations contracts and Eric Zaunscherb, CEO handles all matters in regard to investor relations.

PROPOSED TRANSACTIONS

Currently the Company is not a party to any material undisclosed transactions or pending transactions. The Company continually evaluates new opportunities, including new properties by staking, acquisition or joint venture, and corporate consolidation or merger opportunities.

CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES

The preparation of the Company's condensed interim consolidated financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the condensed interim consolidated financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting year. Areas requiring the use of estimates in the preparation of the Company's consolidated audited financial statements the carrying value and the recoverability of the exploration and evaluation assets included in the Consolidated Statement of Financial Position, the assumptions used to determine the fair value of share-based payments in the Consolidated Statement of Comprehensive Loss, and the estimated amounts of reclamation and environmental obligations. Management believes the estimates used are reasonable; however, actual results could differ materially from those estimates and, if so, would impact future results of operations and cash flows.

CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES INCLUDING INITIAL ADOPTION

There were no changes in the Company's significant accounting policies during the year ended December 31, 2022, that had a material effect on its consolidated financial statements. The Company's significant accounting policies are disclosed in Note 2 to its consolidated financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2022.

New standards and interpretations

Certain new standards, interpretations, amendments, and improvements to existing standards were issued by IASB or IFRIC that are mandatory for future accounting periods which are not expected to have a material effect on the Company's consolidated financial statements. There were no new standards

adopted by the Company during the year having a material effect on the Company's consolidated financial statements.

RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

Liquidity, Financing and Going Concern Risks

The Company has limited financial resources. There is no assurance given by the Company that it will be able to secure the financing necessary to explore, develop and produce its mineral properties. The Company does not presently have sufficient financial resources or operating cash-flow to undertake by itself all of its planned exploration and development programs. Further exploration and development of the Company's properties will therefore depend on the Company's ability to obtain additional required financing. There is no assurance the Company will be successful in obtaining the required financing on terms acceptable to it, or at all, the lack of which could result in the loss or substantial dilution of its interests (as existing or as proposed to be acquired) in its properties. The Company's ability to continue as a going concern is dependent on its ability to raise equity capital financings, exploration success, the attainment of profitable operations and the completion of further share issuances to satisfy working capital and operating needs. The Company, as of December 31, 2022, had a working capital deficiency of \$17,104,844, and does not have sufficient funds to cover the deficiency and fund ongoing obligations. The Company will need to raise further funds to complete additional exploration programs at the Plomosas Project, as well as to retain key personnel, finance general and administration costs and maintain its listing on the TSXV. In addition, the Company will also need to raise additional funds to complete exploration programs on any of its other properties, should it determine to advance such properties in future.

COVID-19 Pandemic

The Company's business, operations and financial condition could be materially and adversely affected by the outbreak of epidemics or pandemics or other health crises, including the ongoing outbreak of the coronavirus (COVID-19). To date, there have been many temporary business closures, quarantines and a general reduction in consumer activity in Canada, Mexico and worldwide. The outbreak has caused companies and various governmental bodies to impose travel, gathering and other public health restrictions from time to time. While these restrictions, when imposed, are expected to be temporary, and in many locations have been lifted, there is no guarantee that they will not be reinstated and consequently the duration of the various disruptions to the Company's business cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

The COVID-19 and numerous variants outbreak could persist for a prolonged period. The global COVID-19 pandemic could result in adverse development results due to workforce reductions, supply and/or demand interruptions, travel restrictions and downturn in new equity and debt financings for mining projects. The Company's employees, contractors and suppliers could be affected by contagious diseases, including COVID-19, that could result in a reduction in the Company's workforce due to illness or quarantine, critical supply disruptions, transportation and travel restrictions, and other factors beyond the Company's control. These and other factors could negatively affect the Company's business in complex ways, which are difficult or impossible to predict. While the Company's operating activities have not been materially impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic to date, the pandemic may create uncertainty around the timing of exploration activities at any of its properties and available financing opportunities. The Company continues to closely monitor and assess the impact of COVID-19 on its planned exploration activities and available financing opportunities. The Company has and will continue to take measures recommended by local health authorities and applicable regulatory bodies, as appropriate. The extent to which COVID-19 will or may impact the Company is uncertain and these factors are beyond the Company's

control. It is possible that COVID-19 may have a material adverse effect on the Company's business, results of operations and financial condition.

Climate Change Risks

Governments are moving to introduce climate change legislation and treaties at the international, national, state/provincial and local levels. Regulations relating to greenhouse gas emission levels (such as carbon taxes) and energy efficiency are becoming more stringent. If the current regulatory trend continues, and the increased transitional risks evolve as society and industry work to reduce their reliance on carbon, the Company's operating costs could increase at its operations. In addition, the physical risks of climate change may also have an adverse effect on the Company's operations. These physical risks include changes in rainfall rates, rising sea levels, reduced water availability, higher temperatures, increased snowpack and extreme weather events. Such events could materially disrupt the Company's operations if they affect any of the Company's property sites, impact local infrastructure or threaten the health and safety of the Company's employees and contractors, and there can be no assurances that the Company will be able to predict, respond to, measure, monitor or manage the physical risks posed as a result of climate change factors. Climate-related risks could also result in shifts in demand for certain commodities, including precious metals. The Company's operations in Mexico are exposed to climate-related risks as a result of geographical location. The Company's operations may be adversely affected by climate change factors.

The occurrence of any climate change violation or enforcement action may have an adverse impact on the Company's operations, the Company's reputation and could adversely affect the Company's results of operations. As well, environmental hazards caused by third parties may exist on a property in which the owners or operators of the mining projects are not aware at present, and which could impair the commercial success, levels of production and continued feasibility and project development and mining operations on these properties.

The Company acknowledges international and community concerns around climate change and supports initiatives consistent with international initiatives on climate change.

Exploration and Development Risks

There is no assurance given by the Company that its exploration and development programs and properties will result in the discovery, development or production of a commercially viable deposit or ore body. The business of exploration for minerals and mining involves a high degree of risk. Few properties that are explored are ultimately developed into producing mines. There is no assurance that the Company's mineral exploration activities will result in any discoveries of bodies of commercial ore. The economics of developing mineral properties are affected by many factors including capital and operating costs, variations of the grades and tonnages of ore mined, fluctuating metal prices, costs of mining and processing equipment and such other factors as government regulations, including regulations relating to royalties, allowable production, importing and exporting of minerals and environmental protection. Substantial expenditures are required to establish resources or reserves through drilling and other work, to develop metallurgical processes to extract metal from ore, and to develop the mining and processing facilities and infrastructure at any site chosen for mining. No assurance can be given that funds required for exploration and/or development can be obtained on a timely basis. The marketability of any metals or minerals acquired or discovered may be affected by numerous factors which are beyond the Company's control and which cannot be accurately foreseen or predicted, such as market fluctuations, the global marketing conditions for precious and base metals, the proximity and capacity of required processing facilities, mineral markets and required processing equipment, and such other factors as government

regulations, including regulations relating to royalties, allowable production, importing and exporting minerals and environmental protection.

Estimates of Mineral Deposits

The Company provides no assurance that any estimates of mineral deposits or resources will materialize on any of its properties. No assurance can be given that any identified mineralization will be developed into a coherent mineralization deposit, or that such deposit will even qualify as a commercially viable and mineable ore body that can be legally and economically exploited. Estimates regarding mineralized deposits can also be affected by many factors such as permitting regulations and requirements, weather, environmental factors, unforeseen technical difficulties, unusual or unexpected geological formations and work interruptions. In addition, the grades and tonnages of ore ultimately mined may differ from that indicated by drilling results and other exploration and development work. There can be no assurance that test work and results conducted and recovered in small-scale laboratory tests will be duplicated in large-scale tests under on-site conditions. Material changes in mineralized tonnages, grades, dilution and stripping ratios or recovery rates may affect the economic viability of projects. The existence of mineralization or mineralized deposits should not be interpreted as assurances of the future delineation of ore reserves or the profitability of any future operations.

Commodity Prices

The Company has no control over future commodity prices. The mining industry is competitive and commodity prices fluctuate constantly so that there is no assurance, even if commercial quantities of a mineral resource are discovered, that a profitable market will exist for the sale of same. Factors beyond the control of the Company may affect the marketability of any substances discovered. The prices of precious and base metals fluctuate on a daily basis, have experienced volatile and significant price movements over short periods of time, and are affected by numerous factors beyond the Company's control, including international economic and political trends, expectations of inflation, currency exchange fluctuations (specifically, the U.S. dollar relative to other currencies), interest rates, central bank transactions, world supply for precious and base metals, international investments, monetary systems, and global or regional consumption patterns (such as the development of gold coin programs), speculative activities and increased production due to improved mining and production methods. The supply of and demand for precious and base metals are affected by various factors, including political events, economic conditions and production costs in major producing regions, and governmental policies with respect to precious metal holdings by a nation or its citizens. The exact effect of these factors cannot be accurately predicted, and the combination of these factors may result in the Company not receiving adequate returns on invested capital or the investments retaining their respective values. There is no assurance that the prices of gold, silver and other precious and base metals will be such that the Company properties can be mined at a profit. The Company is particularly exposed to the risk of movement in the price of silver and gold. Declining market prices for silver and/or gold could have a material effect on the Company's perceived value and profitability potential.

Cost Estimates May not be Accurate

The Company prepares budgets and estimates of cash costs and capital costs for our operations and our main costs relate to material costs, workforce and contractor costs, and energy costs. As a result of the substantial expenditures involved in the exploration and development of mineral projects and the fluctuation of costs over time, projects may be prone to material cost overruns. Our actual costs may vary from estimates for a variety of reasons, including short-term operating factors; revisions to exploration and development plans; risks and hazards associated with exploration, development and mining; natural

phenomena, such as inclement weather conditions, water availability and unexpected labour issues, labour shortages, strikes or community blockades and quality of existing infrastructure being less than expected. Many of these factors are beyond the Company's control and the inaccuracy of any estimates may result in the Company requiring additional capital and time to execute on its exploration and development plans.

Operating Hazards and Other Uncertainties

The Company's business operations are subject to risks and hazards inherent in the mining industry. The exploration for and the development of mineral deposits involves significant risk, including but not limited to:

- environmental hazards;
- discharge of pollutants or hazardous chemicals;
- industrial accidents;
- labour disputes and shortages;
- supply and shipping problems and delays;
- shortage of equipment and contractor availability;
- unusual or unexpected geological or operating conditions;
- fire;
- changes in the regulatory environment; and
- natural phenomena such as inclement weather conditions, floods and earthquakes.

These or other occurrences could result in damage to, or destruction of, mineral properties, personal injury or death, environmental damage, delays in mining, monetary losses and possible legal liability. The Company could also incur liabilities as a result of pollution and other casualties all of which could be very costly and could have a material adverse effect on the Company's financial position and results of operations.

Competition

The Company competes with larger, better capitalized competitors in the mining industry and the Company provides no assurance that it can compete for mineral properties, future financings, technical expertise, the recruitment and retention of qualified employees and the purchase or lease of equipment and third-party servicing companies.

Title Matters

The Company provides no assurance given that it owns legal title to its mineral properties and concessions. The acquisition of title to mineral properties and concessions is a very detailed and time-consuming process. Title to any of its mining concessions, claims and/or leases may come under dispute. While the Company has diligently investigated title considerations to its mineral properties and concessions, in certain circumstances, the Company has only relied upon representations of property partners and government agencies. There is no guarantee of title to any of its properties or concession holdings. The properties and concessions may be subject to prior unregistered agreements or transfers, government claims for concession fees and title may be affected adversely by unidentified and undetected defects and by different interpretations of the law. Native land claims or claims of aboriginal or indigenous title may be asserted over areas in which the Company's properties are located. The Company provides no assurances that the concessions it holds or that are under application will be granted to it.

Community Groups

There is an ongoing level of public concern relating to the effects of mining on the natural landscape, on communities and on the environment. Certain non-governmental organizations, public interest groups and reporting organizations (“NGOs”) who oppose resource development can be vocal critics of the mining industry regardless of merit. In addition, there have been many instances in which local community groups have opposed resource extraction activities, which have resulted in disruption and delays to the relevant operation. While the Company seeks to operate in a socially responsible manner and believes it has good relationships with local communities in the jurisdictions in which it owns properties, NGOs or local community organizations could direct adverse publicity and/or disrupt the Company’s operations in respect of one or more of its properties due to political factors, activities of unrelated third parties on lands in which it has an interest or its operations specifically. Any such actions and the resulting media coverage could have an adverse effect on the Company’s reputation and financial condition or its relationships with the communities in which it operates, which could have a material adverse effect on its business, financial condition, results of operations, cash flows or prospects.

Permits and Licenses Risks

The operations of the Company will require licenses and permits from various governmental authorities. The Company believes it will be able to obtain in the future all necessary licenses and permits to carry on the activities which it intends to conduct and intends to comply in all material respects with the terms of such licenses and permits. There can be no guarantee, however, that the Company will be able to obtain and maintain, at all times, all licenses and permits required to undertake its proposed exploration or to place its properties into commercial production and to operate mining facilities if its exploration programs are successful. Amendments to current laws and regulations governing the operating and activities of the Company and the more stringent implementation thereof could have a substantial adverse impact on the business, financial condition and the results of operations of the Company. Obtaining necessary permits, leases and licenses can be a complex, time consuming process and the Company cannot be certain that it will be able to obtain necessary permits on acceptable terms, in a timely manner or at all. The costs and delays associated with obtaining necessary permits, leases and licenses and complying with these permits and applicable laws and regulations could stop, delay or restrict the Company from proceeding with the development of an exploration project or the development and operation of a mine. Any failure to comply with applicable laws and regulations or permits could result in interruption or closure of exploration, development or mining operations, or fines, penalties or other liabilities. The Company could also lose its licenses or permits under the terms of its existing agreements.

Environmental and Other Regulatory Requirements

The Company provides no assurance that it has met all environmental or regulatory requirements. The current or future operations of the Company, including exploration and development activities and commencement of production on its properties, require permits from various foreign, federal, state and local governmental authorities and such operations are and will be governed by laws and regulations governing prospecting, development, mining, production, exports, taxes, labour standards, occupational health, waste disposal, toxic substances, land use, environmental protection, mine safety and other matters. Companies engaged in the development and operation of mines and related facilities generally experience increased costs, and delays in production and other schedules as a result of the need to comply with applicable laws, regulations and permits. There can be no assurance that approvals and permits required in order for the Company to commence exploration, development or production on its various properties will be obtained. Additional permits and studies, which may include environmental impact studies conducted before permits can be obtained, are necessary prior to operation of the other

properties in which the Company has interests and there can be no assurance that the Company will be able to obtain or maintain all necessary permits that may be required to commence exploration, construction, development or operation of mining facilities at these properties on terms which enable operations to be conducted at economically justifiable costs.

Failure to comply with applicable laws, regulations, and permitting requirements may result in enforcement actions including orders issued by regulatory or judicial authorities causing operations to cease or be curtailed, and may include corrective measures requiring capital expenditures, installation of additional equipment or remedial actions. Parties engaged in exploration, development and mining operations may be required to compensate those suffering loss or damage by reason of such activities and may have civil or criminal fines or penalties imposed for violations of applicable laws or regulations. New laws or regulations or amendments to current laws, regulations and permits governing operations and activities of exploration and mining companies, or more stringent implementation of current laws, regulations or permits, could have a material adverse impact on the Company and cause increases in capital expenditures or production costs or reduction in levels of production at producing properties or require abandonment or delays in development of new mining properties.

Reclamation

Land reclamation requirements for the Company's properties may be burdensome. There is a risk that monies and accruals allotted for land reclamation may not be sufficient to cover all risks, due to changes in the nature of any potential waste rock and/or tailings and/or revisions to government regulations. Therefore, additional funds, or reclamation bonds or other forms of financial assurance may be required over the tenure of the Company's properties to cover potential risks. These additional costs may have material adverse impact on the financial condition and results of the Company.

Unknown Environmental Risks for Past Activities

Exploration and mining operations involve a potential risk of releases to soil, surface water and groundwater of metals, chemicals, fuels, liquids having acidic properties and other contaminants. In recent years, regulatory requirements and improved technology have significantly reduced those risks. However, those risks have not been eliminated, and the risk of environmental contamination from present and past exploration or mining activities exists for mining companies. Companies may be liable for environmental contamination and natural resource damages relating to properties that they currently own or operate or at which environmental contamination occurred while or before they owned or operated the properties. However, no assurance can be given that potential liabilities for such contamination or damages caused by past activities at these properties do not exist.

Geopolitical Risk

The Company may be affected in varying degrees by government regulations with respect to, but not limited to, restrictions on future exploitation and production, price controls, export controls, currency availability, income taxes, delays in obtaining or the inability to obtain necessary permits, opposition to mining from environmental and other non-governmental organizations, expropriation of property, ownership of assets, environmental legislation, labour relations, limitations on mineral exports, increased financing costs, and site safety. In addition, legislative enactments may be delayed or announced without being enacted and future political action that may adversely affect the Company cannot be predicted. Any changes in regulations or shifts in political attitudes that may result, among other things, in significant changes to mining laws or any other national legal body of regulations or policies are beyond the control of the Company and may adversely affect its business.

Foreign Countries and Regulatory Requirements

The Company's mineral property interests are located in countries outside of Canada, and mineral exploration and mining activities may be affected in varying degrees by political stability, changes in foreign policy, and government regulations relating to the mining industry. Any changes in regulations, foreign policy, or shifts in political attitudes may vary from country to country and are beyond the control of the Company and may adversely affect its business and its ability to operate in foreign jurisdictions. Such changes have, in the past, included nationalization of foreign owned businesses and properties. The Company's ability to operate its business may be affected in varying degrees by government regulations with respect to, but not limited to, restrictions on production, price controls, export controls, income and other taxes and duties, tariffs, trade, expropriation of property, environmental legislation and mine safety. These uncertainties may make it more difficult for the Company to obtain any required financing for its mineral properties.

Litigation affecting Mineral Properties

Potential litigation may arise on a mineral property on which the Company has an interest (for example, litigation with the original property owners or neighboring property owners). The results of litigation cannot be predicted with certainty and defense and settlement costs of legal claims can be substantial, even with respect to claims that have no merit. If the Company is unable to resolve these disputes favorably or if the cost of the resolution is substantial, such events may have a material adverse impact on the ability of the Company to carry out its business plan.

Changes in Tax Laws and Regulations Impacting the Company

There can be no assurance that new tax laws, mining and other regulations, policies or interpretations will not be enacted or brought into being in the jurisdictions where the Company has interests that could have a material adverse effect on the Company. Any such change or implementation of new tax laws or regulations could adversely affect the Company's ability to conduct its business. No assurance can be given that new taxation rules or accounting policies will not be enacted or that existing rules will not be applied in a manner which could result in the profits of the Company being subject to additional taxation or which could otherwise have a material adverse effect on the profitability of the Company, the Company's results of operations, financial condition and the trading price of the Company's securities. In addition, the introduction of new tax rules or accounting policies, or changes to, or differing interpretations of, or application of, existing tax rules or accounting policies could make royalties or other investments and dispositions by the Company less attractive to counterparties. Such changes could adversely affect the ability of the Company to acquire new assets or make future investments and dispositions.

The Canadian Extractive Sector Transparency Measures Act (Canada) ("**ESTMA**"), which became effective June 1, 2015, requires public disclosure of payments to governments by mining and oil and gas companies engaged in the commercial development of oil, gas and minerals who are either publicly listed in Canada or with business or assets in Canada. Mandatory annual reporting is required for extractive companies with respect to payments made to foreign and domestic governments at all levels, including entities established by two or more governments and including Indigenous groups. ESTMA requires reporting on the payments of any taxes, royalties, fees, production entitlements, bonuses, dividends, infrastructure improvement payments, and any other prescribed payment over \$100,000. Failure to report, false reporting or structuring payments to avoid reporting may result in fines. If the Company becomes subject

to an enforcement action or in violation of ESTMA, this may result in significant penalties, fines and/or sanctions imposed on us resulting in a material adverse effect on our reputation.

Uninsured Risks

The Company provides no assurance that it is adequately insured against all risks. The Company maintains insurance in such amounts as it considers to be reasonable, however, such insurance may not cover all the potential risks associated with its activities, including any future mining operations. The Company may not be able to obtain or maintain insurance to cover its risks at economically feasible premiums, or at all. Insurance coverage may not be available or may not be adequate to cover any resulting liability. Moreover, insurance against risks such as environmental pollution or other hazards as a result of exploration or production may not be available to the Company on acceptable terms. The Company might also become subject to liability for pollution or other hazards which it does not insure against or in future may not insure against because of premium costs or other reasons. Losses from these events may cause the Company to incur significant costs which could have a material adverse effect on Company's business, financial condition, results of operations or prospects.

Historical Negative Cash Flow and No Assurance of Profitability

The Company had negative cash flow from operating activities during the financial year ended December 31, 2022 and it is expected that the Company will experience negative cash flows in the immediate future. The Company has experienced net losses in the past and will incur losses in the future until and unless it can derive sufficient cash flows from its investments in mineral projects. Future negative cash flows could have an adverse effect on the market price of the Company's common shares and on its ability to continue as a going concern.

The Company has no history of earnings and due to the nature of its business there can be no assurance that the Company will ever be profitable. The Company has not paid dividends on its shares since incorporation and does not anticipate doing so in the foreseeable future. The only present source of funds available to the Company is from the sale of its common shares or from the sale or optioning of a portion of its interest in its resource properties. Even if the results of exploration are encouraging, the Company may not have sufficient funds to conduct the further exploration that may be necessary to determine whether a commercial deposit exists. While the Company may generate additional working capital through further equity offerings or through the sale or syndication of its properties, there can be no assurance that any such funds will be available on favorable terms, or at all. At present, it is impossible to determine what amounts of additional funds, if any, may be required. Failure to raise such additional capital could put the continued viability of the Company at risk.

Currency Fluctuation and Foreign Exchange Controls

The Company maintains a portion of its funds in U.S. dollars and Mexican pesos denominated accounts. Certain of its property and related contracts are denominated in U.S. dollars and Mexican Pesos. The Company's operations in countries other than Canada are normally carried out in the currency of that country and make the Company subject to foreign currency fluctuations and such fluctuations may materially affect its financial position and results. In addition, future contracts may not be denominated in Canadian dollars and may expose the Company to foreign currency fluctuations and such fluctuations may materially affect its financial position and results.

Dependence on Key Individuals

The Company is dependent on a relatively small number of key personnel, the loss of any one of whom could have an adverse effect on it. The Company maintains key-person insurance on the life of its President and COO, Marcio Fonseca but does not maintain key-person insurance on the life of any of its other personnel. In addition, while certain of the Company's officers and directors have experience in the exploration of mineral producing properties, the Company will remain highly dependent upon contractors and third parties in the performance of its exploration and development activities. There can be no guarantee that such contractors and third parties will be available to carry out such activities on behalf of the Company or be available upon commercially acceptable terms.

Substantial Number of Authorized but Unissued Shares

The Company has an unlimited number of common shares which may be issued and authorized by the Company's Board without further action or approval of the Company's shareholders. While the Company's Board is required to fulfil its fiduciary obligations in connection with the issuance of such shares, the shares may be issued in transactions with which not all shareholders agree, and the issuance of such shares will cause dilution to the ownership interests of the Company's shareholders.

Potential Volatility of Market Price of Common Shares and Related Litigation Risks

Securities of publicly listed companies such as the Company have, from time to time, experienced significant price and volume fluctuations unrelated to the operating performance of particular companies. These broad market fluctuations may adversely affect the market price of the Company's common shares. In addition, the market price of the Company's shares is likely to be highly volatile. Factors such as gold prices, the average volume of shares traded, announcements by competitors, changes in stock market analysts' recommendations regarding the Company and general market conditions and attitudes affecting other exploration and mining companies may have a significant effect on the market price of the Company's common shares. It is likely that the Company's results or development and exploration activities may fluctuate significantly or may fail to meet the expectations of stock market analysts and investors and, in such event, the market price of the Company's common shares could be materially adversely affected. In the past, securities class action litigation has often been initiated following periods of volatility in the market price of a company's securities. Such litigation, if brought against the Company, could result in substantial costs and a diversion of management's attention and resources, which could have a material adverse effect on the Company's business, financial position and results of operations.

Future Sales of Common Shares by Existing Shareholders

Sales of a large number of common shares in the public markets, or the potential for such sales, could decrease the trading price of the common shares and could impair the Company's ability to raise capital through future sales of common shares. The Company has previously completed private placements at prices per share which may be, from time to time, lower than the market price of the common shares at the time of the offering announcement. Accordingly, a significant number of the Company's shareholders at any given time may have an investment profit in the common shares that they may seek to liquidate.

International Conflict

International conflict and other geopolitical tensions and events, including war, military action, terrorism, trade disputes and international responses thereto have historically led to, and may in the future lead to, uncertainty or volatility in global commodity and financial markets and supply chains. Russia's invasion of Ukraine has led to sanctions being levied against Russia by the international community and may result in

additional sanctions or other international action, any of which may have a destabilizing effect on supply chain disruptions may adversely affect the Company's business, financial condition and results of operations. The extent and duration of the current Russia-Ukraine conflict and related international action cannot be accurately predicted at this time and the effects of such conflict may magnify the impact of the other risks identified above, including those relating to commodity price volatility and global financial conditions. The situation is rapidly changing and unforeseeable impacts, including on the Company's shareholders and counterparties on which the Company rely and transact, may materialize and may have an adverse effect on the Company's business, results of operation and financial condition.

Conflicts of Interest

The Company provides no assurance that its directors and officers will not have conflicts of interest from time to time. The Company's directors and officers may serve as directors or officers of other mineral exploration and development companies or have significant shareholdings in other resource companies and, to the extent that such other companies may participate in ventures in which the Company may participate, the Company's directors and management may have a conflict of interest in negotiating and concluding terms respecting the extent of such participation. The interests of these companies may differ from time to time. In the event that such a conflict of interest arises at a meeting of the Company's directors, a director who has such a conflict will abstain from voting for or against any resolution involving any such conflict. From time to time several companies may participate in the acquisition, exploration and development of natural resource properties thereby allowing for their participation in larger programs, permitting involvement in a greater number of programs and reducing financial exposure in respect of any one program. It may also occur that a particular company will assign all or a portion of its interest in a particular program to another of these companies due to the financial position of the company making the assignment. In accordance with the laws of the Province of British Columbia, the directors of the Company are required to act honestly, in good faith and in the best interests of the Company. In determining whether the Company will participate in any particular exploration or mining project at any given time, the directors will primarily consider the upside potential for the project to be accretive to shareholders, the degree of risk to which the Company may be exposed and its financial position at that time.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND RISK MANAGEMENT

Financial instruments measured at fair value are classified into one of three levels in the fair value hierarchy according to the relative reliability of the inputs used to estimate the fair values. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are:

- Level 1 – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities;
- Level 2 – Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 – Inputs that are not based on observable market data

The fair value of cash is measured at Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy. The carrying value of receivables, and accounts payable and accrued liabilities approximate their fair value because of the short-term nature of these instruments.

Financial risk factors

The Company's risk exposures and the impact on the Company's financial instruments are summarized below:

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of loss associated with a counterparty's inability to fulfill its payment obligations. The Company's credit risk is primarily attributable to cash, receivables and value added tax. Management believes that the credit risk concentration with respect to financial instruments included in receivables is remote and has deposited cash in high credit quality financial institutions. Credit risk with respect to value added taxes due from a government agency is low in Canada and undeterminable in Mexico based on past refund practices of the Mexican tax authorities. Value added taxes are subject to review and potential adjustment by taxation authorities.

Liquidity risk

As of December 31, 2022, the Company had cash balance of \$902,238 to settle current liabilities of \$17,392,058 and has significant expenditure requirements pursuant to Mexican concession fees (Note 8) of the consolidated audited financial statements). The Company is exposed to liquidity risk. The funds raised (Note 11(c) and (d)) of the consolidated audited financial statements are not sufficient to cover its current liabilities as of December 31, 2022, and additional financing will be required. Additional funds will be required for property expenditures, retention of essential personnel, general and administration and to maintain its listing on the TSX.V

Market risk

Market risk is the risk of loss that may arise from changes in market factors such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates, and commodity and equity prices.

Interest rate risk

The Company has cash balances and no interest-bearing debt. The Company's current policy is to invest excess cash in investment-grade demand investments issued by its banking institutions. The Company periodically monitors the investments it makes and is satisfied with the credit ratings of its banks.

Foreign jurisdiction and currency risk

In conducting operations in Mexico, the Company is subject to considerations and risks not typically associated with companies operating in Canada. These include risks such as the political, economic, and legal environments. Among other things, the Company's results may be adversely affected by changes in the political and social conditions and by changes in governmental policies with respect to mining laws and regulations, anti-inflationary measures, currency conversion and remittance abroad, and rates and methods of taxation.

CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

The Company defines capital that it manages as shareholders' deficiency, consisting of issued common shares, stock options and warrants included in reserves, and subscriptions receivable.

The Company manages its capital structure and adjusts it, based on the funds available to the Company, to support the acquisition, exploration and development of exploration and evaluation assets. The Board of Directors does not establish quantitative return on capital criteria for management, but rather relies on the expertise of the Company's management to sustain future development of the business.

The properties in which the Company currently has an interest is in the exploration stage as such the Company has historically relied on the equity markets to fund its activities. The Company will continue to assess new properties and seek to acquire an interest in additional properties if it feels there is sufficient economic potential and if it has adequate financial resources to do so.

Management reviews its capital management approach on an ongoing basis and believes that this approach, given the relative size of the Company, is reasonable. The Company is not subject to externally imposed capital restrictions. There were no changes to the Company's approach to capital management during the year.

2022 Private Placement Financing

The following table provides an update on the estimated use of net proceeds raised in the 2022 brokered private placement financing as disclosed in the Company's Short Form Prospectus dated May 30, 2022, along with amounts expended. As of August 31, 2022, the following expenditures have been incurred:
