Independent Auditor's Report

To the Shareholders Alaska Hydro Corporation

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Alaska Hydro Corporation (the "Company"), which comprise the statements of financial position as at December 31, 2020 and 2019, and the statements of comprehensive loss, changes in equity and cash flows for the years then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects the financial position of the Company as at December 31, 2020 and 2019, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Company in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audits of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Material Uncertainty Related to Going Concern

We draw attention to Note 1 in the financial statements, which indicates that the Company does not generate cash flows from operations and, accordingly, the Company will need to raise additional funds through future issuance of securities or debt financing. As stated in Note 1, these events or conditions, along with other matters as set forth in Note 1, indicate that a material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in "Management's Discussion and Analysis", but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audits of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information, and in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audits or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with IFRS, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Company or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Company's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company to cease to continue as a going concern.

1. NATURE OF OPERATIONS AND GOING CONCERN

Alaska Hydro Corporation, formerly Project Finance Corp., (the “Company” or “Alaska Hydro”) was incorporated on October 16, 2006 under the British Columbia Business Corporations Act. Prior to September 3, 2010, the Company was a Capital Pool Company as defined in Policy 2.4 of the TSX Venture Exchange (the “Exchange”). On September 3, 2010 the Company completed its Qualifying Transaction (the “Qualifying Transaction”) pursuant to the rules and policies of the Exchange by acquiring the net assets and operations of Cascade Creek LLC. (“Cascade”), a development stage hydroelectric project. On that date the Company also changed its name to Alaska Hydro Corporation. The Company commenced trading on the Exchange as a Tier 2 Issuer on September 8, 2010 under its new name and trading symbol “AKH”. On January 21, 2019, the Company was assigned to trading on the Exchange as an NEX issuer. Alaska Hydro is a British Columbia corporation with its head office located at 2633 Carnation Street North Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada V7H 1H6.

On August 18, 2014 the Company submitted an application for a water license permit to generate electricity from a proposed More Creek hydroelectric project in northwest British Columbia with a nameplate capacity of 75MW.

The Company incurred a net loss of \$58,587 for the year ended December 31, 2020 (2019 – \$144,625). The Company had an accumulated deficit of \$5,051,105 at December 31, 2020. For the Company to continue as a going concern it is dependent upon its ability to raise sufficient financing and to obtain the required licenses for its More Creek Project and to ultimately generate income and cash flows from operations of that project.

The Company does not generate cash flows from operations and, accordingly, the Company will need to raise additional funds through future issuance of securities or debt financing. Although the Company has raised funds in the past, there can be no assurance the Company will be able to raise sufficient funds in the future, in which case the Company may be unable to meet its obligations as they come due in the normal course of business. It is not possible to predict whether financing efforts will be successful or if the Company will attain a profitable level of operations.

The current cash resources are not adequate to pay the Company’s accounts payable and to meet its minimum commitments at the date of these financial statements, including planned corporate and administrative expenses, and other project implementation costs. The existence of such material uncertainties creates significant doubt about the Company’s ability to continue as a going concern. These financial statements do not give effect to adjustments that would be necessary to the carrying amounts and classifications of assets and liabilities should the Company be unable to continue as a going concern.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

a) Statement of compliance

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (“IFRS”) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board. The Company has consistently applied the same accounting policies throughout all periods presented.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Measurement Basis

These financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis except for certain financial instruments, which are measured at fair value as explained in the accounting policies set out below. All amounts are expressed in Canadian dollars unless otherwise stated.

b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and bank deposits. As at December 31, 2020 and 2019, the Company had no cash equivalents.

c) Power Project Development Costs

Power project development costs, incurred prior to the determination of the economic feasibility of the power project and a decision to proceed with development are charged to operations as incurred.

If a project is deemed to be economically feasible and a decision to proceed with the project is made by the Company, costs associated with the development of the project are capitalized and subsequently amortized over the life of the project. Capitalized costs of unsuccessful projects are written off as impaired in the period that a project is abandoned or when recovery of the costs is no longer regarded as assured.

d) Foreign Currency Translation

The functional and presentation currency of Alaska Hydro is the Canadian dollar.

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated to the functional currency of the entity at the exchange rate in existence at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the statements of financial position date are retranslated at the period-end date exchange rates. Non-monetary items which are measured using historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction. Non-monetary items that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair value was determined.

e) Long-lived Assets and Impairment

Long-lived assets are reviewed by management for possible impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that their carrying value may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognized when the carrying amount of an asset exceeds the estimated undiscounted future cash flow expected to result from the use of the asset and its eventual disposition.

f) Earnings/Loss per Share

Earnings (Loss) per share is calculated using the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the reporting period. The Company uses the treasury stock method for computing diluted loss per share. This method assumes that any proceeds obtained upon exercise of outstanding options or warrants would be used to purchase common shares at the average market price during the period.

g) Share Issue Costs

Professional, consulting, regulatory and other costs directly attributable to financing transactions are recorded as deferred financing costs until the financing transactions are completed, if the completion of the transaction is considered likely; otherwise they are expensed as incurred. Share issue costs are charged to share capital when the related shares are issued. Deferred financing costs related to financing transactions that are not completed are charged to expenses.

h) Use of Estimates and Judgements

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make certain estimates and assumptions. These estimates affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates include expected future tax rates and fair value measurements for financial instruments. Financial results as determined by actual events could differ from those estimates.

Management has applied its judgement in the evaluating the Company's going concern prospects and related disclosures.

i) Financial Instruments

Classification

The Company classifies its financial instruments in the following categories: at fair value through profit and loss ("FVTPL"), at fair value through other comprehensive income (loss) ("FVTOCI") or at amortized cost. The Company determines the classification of financial assets at initial recognition. The classification of debt instruments is driven by the Company's business model for managing the financial assets and their contractual cash flow characteristics. Equity instruments that are held for trading are classified as FVTPL. For other equity instruments, on the day of acquisition the Company can make an irrevocable election (on an instrument-by-instrument basis) to designate them as at FVTOCI. Financial liabilities are measured at amortized cost, unless they are required to be measured at FVTPL (such as instruments held for trading or derivatives) or if the Company has opted to measure them at FVTPL.

Measurement

Financial assets and liabilities at amortized cost

Financial assets and liabilities at amortized cost are initially recognized at fair value plus or minus transaction costs, respectively, and subsequently carried at amortized cost less any impairment. Cash, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, due to related parties and the convertible promissory note are classified in this category.

Financial assets and liabilities at FVTPL

Financial assets and liabilities carried at FVTPL are initially recorded at fair value and transaction costs are expensed in the statement comprehensive loss. Realized and unrealized gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value of the financial assets and liabilities held at FVTPL are included in the statement of comprehensive loss in the year in which they arise. There are no financial instruments classified in this category as at December 31, 2020 and 2019.

i) Financial Instruments (continued)

Financial assets at FVTOCI

These assets are subsequently measured at fair value. Interest income calculated using the effective interest method, foreign exchange gains and losses and impairment are recognized in profit or loss. Other net gains and losses are recognized in other comprehensive loss ("OCI"). On derecognition, gains and losses accumulated in OCI are reclassified to profit or loss. There are no financial instruments classified in this category as at December 31, 2020 and 2019.

Equity investments at FVTOCI

These assets are subsequently measured at fair value. Dividends are recognized as income in profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents a recovery of part of the cost of the investment. Other net gains and losses are recognized in OCI and are never reclassified to profit or loss. There are no financial instruments classified in this category as at December 31, 2020 and 2019.

Impairment of financial assets at amortized cost

The Company recognizes a loss allowance for expected credit losses on financial assets that are measured at amortized cost. At each reporting date, the Company measures the loss allowance for the financial asset at an amount equal to the lifetime expected credit losses if the credit risk on the financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition. If at the reporting date, the financial asset has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the Company measures the loss allowance for the financial asset at an amount equal to the twelve month expected credit losses. The Company shall recognize in the statement of comprehensive loss, as an impairment gain or loss, the amount of expected credit losses (or reversal) that is required to adjust the loss allowance at the reporting date to the amount that is required to be recognized.

Derecognition

Financial assets

The Company derecognizes financial assets only when the contractual rights to cash flows from the financial assets expire, or when it transfers the financial assets and substantially all of the associated risks and rewards of ownership to another entity. Gains and losses on derecognition are generally recognized in the statement of comprehensive loss. However, gains and losses on derecognition of financial assets classified as FVTOCI remain within accumulated other comprehensive loss.

Financial liabilities

The Company derecognizes a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled or expire. The Company also derecognizes a financial liability when the terms of the liability are modified such that the terms and / or cash flows of the modified instrument are substantially different, in which case a new financial liability based on the modified terms is recognized at fair value. Gains and losses on derecognition are recognized in the statement of comprehensive loss.

j) Income Taxes

Income taxes are accounted for using the liability method of tax allocation. Under this method current income taxes are recognized for the estimated income taxes payable for the current year. Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are recognized for temporary differences between the tax and accounting bases of assets and liabilities. Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are measured using substantially enacted tax rates that apply for the years in which the temporary differences are expected to be recovered or settled. Deferred income tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable the asset will be realized.

j) Income Taxes (continued)

Flow-through shares are accounted for as compound instruments comprising liability and equity components upon issuance, with any premium received that can be reasonably determined being attributed to the tax benefit provided and considered a liability. Upon qualifying expenditures being incurred, this liability is reversed and recognized in income, and any deferred tax liability in respect to the amounts renounced to investors is recorded. Costs related to the liability component are also charged to profit or loss.

The Company estimates the value of the liability component using the residual method, whereby the quoted price of the Company's non-flow-through shares issued is compared to the price investors paid for the flow-through shares and any difference forms the premium amount.

k) Share-based compensation

The Company records all share-based payments at fair value. Share-based compensation expense for share option grants to employees and others providing similar services is based on the fair value of the stock options issued at the grant date, which is determined using the Black-Scholes Option-Pricing Model. Where equity instruments are granted to non-employees, they are recorded at the fair value of goods or services received in the Statements of Comprehensive Loss. When the value of goods or services cannot be reliably estimated, the Black-Scholes Option Pricing Model is used. Compensation expense for share options granted to non-employees is recognized as the options are earned and the services are provided. Compensation expense for share options granted to employees is amortized over the vesting period using a graded vesting assumption. On exercise of stock options, consideration paid together with fair value amount previously credited to contributed surplus is recorded as share capital.

l) New Accounting Standard Issued and Adopted

The Company did not adopt any new accounting standards during the year that had a material impact on its results and financial position.

4. MORE CREEK PROJECT

On August 18, 2014 the Company submitted an application for a water license permit to generate electricity from a proposed hydroelectric project in northwest British Columbia. As at December 31, 2020, the Company had spent \$10,500 on the applications for the Water License and Crown Land Tenure. In addition, the Company obtained the approval for the Investigative Use License on February 4, 2015. During the year ended December 31, 2020, the Company expensed consulting fees in the amount of \$7,776 (2019 - \$79,013) related to the project. The application fees of \$10,500 has been treated as deposits pending the granting of the license and tenure by the government.

On March 14, 2018, the Company announced the acceptance of an Investigative Licence for the Forrest Kerr Diversion Project.

5. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND BALANCES

At December 31, 2020, \$23,643 (2019 - \$15,443) was due to a private company controlled by R. Anderson, CFO of the Company.

During the year ended December 31, 2020, the Company incurred \$15,700 (2019 - \$16,000) to a private company controlled by R. Anderson, CFO of the Company for providing accounting services.

At December 31, 2020, \$7,770 (2019 - \$4,600) was due to M. Hoole, Director of the Company.

During the year ended December 31, 2020, the Company incurred \$10,950 (2019 - \$4,600) to M. Hoole, Director of the Company for providing management services.

These transactions are in the normal course of operations and are recorded at their exchange amounts, which is the consideration agreed upon by the related parties.

6. CONVERTIBLE PROMISSORY NOTE

During the year ended December 31, 2020, C. Grandison, Interim CEO of the Company, advanced \$45,000 to the Company (2019 - \$30,000). As at December 31, 2020, C. Grandison had advanced a total of \$100,000 to the Company.

On December 31, 2020, the Company converted these advances into a convertible promissory note with a principal balance of \$100,000 (the "Note"). The Note bears interest at 2.0% per annum and matures on January 15, 2026. The Note is convertible at the option of the lender into common shares of the Company at a price of \$0.065 per common share if exercised prior to December 31, 2021 and at a price of \$0.10 per common share after December 31, 2021. If the share price of the Company on the Exchange exceeds \$0.14 every day over a 30 day period, the Company has the option to convert the Note at the same terms as the lender. There is an early prepayment penalty of \$40,000 in the event of prepayment by the Company.

The Note is subject to Exchange approval.

7. SHARE CAPITAL

(a) **Authorized:** 100,000,000 common shares without par value.

(b) **Issued and Outstanding:**

At December 31, 2020, the Company has issued 44,238,353 (2019 - 44,238,353) shares, of which 5,868,603 (2019 - 5,868,603) shares have been surrendered to the Company and are held by the Company without cancellation and 38,369,750 (2019 - 38,369,750) are held by other shareholders.

(d) Options:

The Company grants stock options to directors, officers, employees and consultants as compensation for services, pursuant to its incentive Share Option Plan (the “Plan”) options issued must have an exercise price greater than or equal to the “Discounted Market Price” of the Company’s shares on the grant date. Options have a maximum expiry period of up to five years from the grant date and vest at such time as may be determined by the Board of Directors at the date of the grant. Options granted to consultants performing investor relations activities shall vest in stages over a 12-month period with a maximum of one-quarter of the options vesting in any three-month period. The number of options that may be issued under the Plan is limited to 8,214,179, 20% of the Company’s issued and outstanding shares at the date the Plan was amended.

On November 20, 2019, the Company granted 810,000 stock options to officers, directors and consultants of the Company. These options are exercisable at \$0.05 per common share, and expire five years from the grant date. The Company recognized share-based compensation of \$16,038 in respect of these options.

8. MANAGEMENT OF CAPITAL

The Company's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. The Company is subject to the usual Tier 2 Continuous Listing Requirements, which include, among other things, the requirement for adequate working capital in financial resources of the greater of \$50,000, and an amount required to maintain operations for a period of six months. At December 31, 2020 this requirement was not met, and accordingly, the Company is currently trading on the NEX. The Company seeks to manage capital to provide adequate funding for its projects while minimizing dilution for its existing shareholders. As the Company is a development stage venture issuer it has limited ability presently to raise money by long term or any other kind of debt. For practical purposes and subject to limited exceptions all of its capital management is directed towards management of its issues of equity including warrants. There is very limited flexibility in its capital management.

As at December 31, 2020, the Company has approximately \$1,593,000 (2019 - \$1,532,000) of non-capital loss carry forwards available to reduce taxable income for future years. These loss carry forwards expire between 2030 and 2040.

10. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS AND RISK

Financial Instruments

As at December 31, 2020, the Company's financial instruments consist of cash, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, due to related parties and convertible promissory note.

Liquidity Risk

All of the Company's current financial liabilities have contractual maturities of 30 days or less or are due on demand and are subject to normal trade terms. The Company does not have investments in any asset backed commercial paper or similar instruments.

The Company does not generate cash flows from operations and accordingly the Company will need to raise additional funds through future issuance of securities or debt financing. Although the Company has raised funds in the past, there can be no assurance the Company will be able to raise sufficient funds in the future, in which case the Company may be unable to meet its obligations as they come due in the normal course of business. It is not possible to predict whether financing efforts will be successful or if the Company will attain a profitable level of operations.

The current cash resources are not adequate to meet the Company's minimum commitments at the date of these financial statements, including planned corporate and administrative expenses, and other project implementation costs. These financial statements do not give effect to adjustments that would be necessary to the carrying amounts and classifications of assets and liabilities should the Company be unable to continue as a going concern.

Foreign Exchange Risk

As at December 31, 2020, the Company has no transactions that are in US funds and as a result, it is subject to minimal foreign exchange risk.

Fair Value

The Company classifies its fair value measurements in accordance with an established hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs in valuation techniques used to measure fair value as follows:

Level 1- Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

Level 2 -Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability either directly or indirectly, and

Level 3 - Inputs that are not based on observable market data

The Company does not have financial assets measured at fair value on a recurring basis as at December 31, 2020.
