Slater Mining Corporation (the "**Corporation**") hereby offers through its agent, Woodstone Capital Inc. (the "**Agent**"), 2,000,000 common shares at a price of \$0.10 per common share (the "**Common Shares**") for gross proceeds of \$200,000. The purpose of this offering (the "**Offering**") is to provide the Corporation with a minimum of funds with which to identify and evaluate businesses or assets with a view to completing a Qualifying Transaction, as hereinafter defined. Any proposed Qualifying Transaction must be approved by the Exchange and, in the case of a Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction, as hereinafter defined, must also receive Majority of the Minority Approval, as hereinafter defined, in accordance with Exchange Policy 2.4 (the "**CPC Policy**"). The Corporation is a Capital Pool Company ("**CPC**"). It has not commenced commercial operations and has no assets other than a minimum amount of cash. Except as specifically contemplated in the CPC Policy, until the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction as hereinafter defined, the Corporation will not carry on any business other than the identification and evaluation of assets or businesses with a view to completing a proposed Qualifying Transaction. See "Business of the Corporation" and "Use of Proceeds".

Notes:

- (1) A commission of 10% of the gross proceeds of the Offering will be paid to the Agent. Additionally, a corporate finance fee of \$15,000 plus GST is payable to the Agent on closing of the Offering. The Agent has been paid an expense retainer of \$2,500 and will be reimbursed by the Corporation for its expenses including legal fees. The Agent will also be granted the Agent's Option referred to below. This prospectus qualifies the grant of the Agent's Option. See "Plan of Distribution - Agency Agreement and Agent's Compensation".
- (2) Before deducting the costs of this issue estimated at \$90,000 which includes listing fees, the corporate finance fee payable to the Agent, legal and audit fees and other expenses. See "Use of Proceeds".

This Offering is made on a best efforts basis by the Agent and is subject to a minimum aggregate subscription of 2,000,000 Common Shares for gross proceeds to the Corporation of \$200,000. The offering price of the Common Shares was determined by negotiation between the Corporation and the Agent. All funds received from subscriptions for Common Shares will be held by the Agent pursuant to the terms of the Agency Agreement, as hereinafter defined, between the Corporation and the Agent. If the minimum subscription is not raised within 90 days of the issuance of a receipt for the final prospectus or such other time as may be consented to by the Agent and persons or companies who subscribed within

that period, all subscription monies will be returned to subscribers without interest or deduction, unless the subscribers have otherwise instructed the Agent.

Pursuant to the Agency Agreement, the Agent will be granted a non-transferable option (the "**Agent's Option**") to purchase up to 200,000 Common Shares at a price of \$0.10 per share expiring 24 months from the date the Corporation's Common Shares are listed on the Exchange. The grant of the Agent's Option is qualified under this prospectus. See "Agency Agreement and Agent's Compensation". In addition, and subject to regulatory approval, the Corporation has granted to directors and officers of the Corporation options to purchase an aggregate of 900,000 Common Shares under the Corporation's share option plan. The grant of these options is also qualified under this prospectus. See "Options to Purchase Securities".

Other than the initial distribution of the Common Shares pursuant to this prospectus, the grant of the Agent's Option and the grant of options to the directors and officers of the Corporation, trading in all securities of the Corporation is prohibited during the period between the date receipts for this preliminary prospectus are issued by the Commissions, as hereinafter defined, and the time the Common Shares are listed for trading except, subject to prior acceptance of the Exchange, where appropriate registration and prospectus exemptions are available under securities legislation or where the applicable securities commission grants a discretionary order.

The Exchange has conditionally accepted the listing of the Corporation's Common Shares. Listing is subject to the Corporation fulfilling all of the listing requirements of the Exchange.

Investment in the Common Shares offered by this prospectus is highly speculative due to the nature of the Corporation's business and its present stage of development. This Offering is suitable only to those investors who are prepared to risk the loss of their entire investment. See "Risk Factors".

Woodstone Capital Inc., as Agent, offers these Common Shares on a best efforts basis, if, as and when subscriptions are accepted by the Corporation, subject to prior sale, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Agency Agreement referred to under "Plan of Distribution" and subject to the approval of certain legal matters by Anfield Sujir Kennedy & Durno, on behalf of the Corporation and by Miller Thompson LLP, on behalf of the Agent.

Pursuant to the CPC Policy, no purchaser of the Common Shares is permitted to directly or indirectly purchase more than 2% or 40,000 of the total number of Common Shares offered under this prospectus. In addition, the maximum number of Common Shares that may directly or indirectly be purchased by that purchaser, together with any Associates or Affiliates of that purchaser, is 4% or 80,000 of the total number of Common Shares offered under this prospectus.

Upon completion of the Offering, the Corporation must have a minimum of 200 shareholders with each shareholder beneficially owning at least 1,000 Common Shares free of resale restrictions exclusive of any Common Shares held by Non Arm's Length Parties to the Corporation.

Subscriptions will be received subject to rejection or allotment in whole or in part and the right is reserved to close the subscription books at any time without notice. It is expected that share certificates evidencing the Common Shares in definitive form will be available for delivery on the closing date.

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GLOSSARY

"Affiliate" means a company that is affiliated with another company as described below:

- (a) A company is an "Affiliate" of another company if:
 - (i) one of them is the subsidiary of the other; or
 - (ii) each of them is controlled by the same Person.
- (b) A company is "controlled" by a Person if:
 - (i) voting securities of the company are held, other than by way of security only, by or for the benefit of that Person; and
 - (ii) the voting securities, if voted, entitle the Person to elect a majority of the directors of the company.
- (c) A Person beneficially owns securities that are beneficially owned by:
 - (i) a company controlled by that Person; or
 - (ii) an Affiliate of that Person or an Affiliate of any company controlled by that Person.

"Agent" means Woodstone Capital Inc.

"Agency Agreement" means the engagement agreement dated July 30, 2008 between the Corporation and the Agent in connection with the Offering.

"Agent's Option" means the non-transferable option to be granted by the Corporation to the Agent entitling the Agent to acquire up to 200,000 Common Shares of the Corporation at an exercise price of \$0.10 per Common Share, expiring 24 months from the date of listing of the Common Shares on the Exchange.

"Aggregate Pro Group" means all Persons who are members of any Pro Group whether or not the Member is involved in a contractual relationship with the Corporation to provide financing sponsorship and other advisory services.

"Agreement in Principle" means any enforceable agreement or any other agreement or similar commitment which identifies the fundamental terms upon which the parties agree or intend to agree which:

- (a) identifies assets or a business to be acquired which would reasonably appear to constitute Significant Assets and the acquisition of which would reasonably appear to constitute a Qualifying Transaction;
- (b) identifies the parties to the Qualifying Transaction;
- (c) identifies the consideration to be paid for the Significant Assets or otherwise identifies the means by which the consideration will be determined; and

- (d) identifies the conditions to any further formal agreements to complete the transaction; and

in respect of which there are no material conditions to closing (other than receipt of shareholder approval and Exchange acceptance), the satisfaction of which is dependent upon third parties and beyond the reasonable control of the Non Arm's Length Parties to the CPC or the Non Arm's Length Parties to the Qualifying Transaction.

"**Associate**" when used to indicate a relationship with a Person, means:

- (a) an issuer of which the Person beneficially owns or controls, directly or indirectly, voting securities entitling him to more than 10 percent of the voting rights attached to all outstanding voting securities of the issuer;
- (b) any partner of the Person;
- (c) any trust or estate in which the Person has a substantial beneficial interest or in respect of which the Person serves as trustee or in a similar capacity; and
- (d) in the case of a Person who is an individual:
 - (i) that Person's spouse or child; or
 - (ii) any relative of that Person or of his spouse who has the same residence as that Person;

but:

where the Exchange determines that two Persons shall, or shall not, be deemed to be associates with respect to a Member firm, Member corporation or holding company of a Member corporation, then such determination shall be determinative of their relationships in the application of Rule D with respect to that Member firm, Member corporation or holding company.

"**Commissions**" means the British Columbia Securities Commission, the Alberta Securities Commission and the Ontario Securities Commission.

"**Common Shares**" means the common shares in the share capital of the Corporation, which are single voting common shares of the Corporation.

"**company**" unless specifically indicated otherwise, means a corporation, incorporated association or organization, body corporate, partnership, trust, association or other entity other than an individual.

"**Completion of the Qualifying Transaction**" means the date on which the Final Exchange Bulletin is issued by the Exchange.

"**Control Person**" means any Person that holds or is one of a combination of Persons that holds a sufficient number of any of the securities of an issuer so as to affect materially the control of that issuer, or that holds more than 20% of the outstanding voting securities of an issuer except where there is evidence showing that the holder of those securities does not materially affect the control of the issuer.

"Corporation" means Slater Mining Corporation, a corporation incorporated under the *Business Corporations Act* (British Columbia), having an office in the City of Vancouver, in the Province of British Columbia.

"CPC" means a corporation:

- (a) that has filed and obtained a receipt for a preliminary CPC prospectus from one or more of the Commissions in compliance with the CPC Policy; and
- (b) in regard to which the Final Exchange Bulletin has not yet been issued.

"CPC Policy" means Policy 2.4 "Capital Pool Companies" of the Exchange's Corporate Finance Manual.

"Escrow Agreement" means the escrow agreement dated July 18, 2008 among the Corporation, Olympia Trust Company, and certain founding shareholders of the Corporation.

"Exchange" or **"TSXV"** means the TSX Venture Exchange Inc.

"Final Exchange Bulletin" means the Exchange Bulletin issued following closing of the Qualifying Transaction and the submission of all required documentation and that evidences the final Exchange acceptance of the Qualifying Transaction.

"initial public offering" or **"IPO"** means a transaction that involves an issuer issuing securities from its treasury pursuant to its first prospectus.

"Insider" if used in relation to the Corporation, means:

- (a) a director or senior officer of the Corporation;
- (b) a director or senior officer of the company that is an Insider or subsidiary of the Corporation;
- (c) a Person that beneficially owns or controls, directly or indirectly, voting shares carrying more than 10% of the voting rights attached to all outstanding voting shares of the Corporation; or
- (d) the Corporation itself if it holds any of its own securities.

"Majority of the Minority Approval" means the approval of a Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction by the majority of the votes cast by shareholders, other than:

- (a) Non Arm's Length Parties to the CPC;
- (b) Non Arm's Length Parties to the Qualifying Transaction; and
- (c) in the case of a Related Party Transaction:
 - (i) if the CPC holds its own shares, the CPC; and
 - (ii) a Person acting jointly or in concert with a Person referred to in paragraph (a) or (b) in respect of the transaction;

at a properly constituted meeting of the common shareholders of the CPC.

"Member" means a Person who has executed the Members' Agreement, as amended from time to time, and is accepted as and becomes a member of the Exchange under the Exchange requirements.

"Members' Agreement" means the members' agreement among the Exchange and each Person who, from time to time, is accepted as and becomes a member of the Exchange under the Exchange requirements.

"Minimum Listing Requirements" means the minimum financial, distribution and other standards that must be met by applicants seeking a listing on a particular tier of the Exchange.

"NEX" means the market on which former Exchange and Toronto Stock Exchange issuers that do not meet Exchange tier maintenance requirements for Tier 2 issuers may continue to trade.

"Non Arm's Length Parties to the Qualifying Transaction" means the Vendor(s), any Target Company(ies) and includes, in relation to Significant Assets or Target Company(ies), the Non Arm's Length Parties of the Vendor(s), the Non Arm's Length Parties of any Target Company(ies) and all other parties to or associated with the Qualifying Transaction and Associates or Affiliates of all such other parties.

"Non Arm's Length Party" means:

- (a) in relation to a company, a Promoter, officer, director, other Insider or Control Person of that company (including an issuer) and any Associates or Affiliates of any of such Persons; and
- (b) in relation to an individual, means any Associate of the individual or any company of which the individual is a Promoter, officer, director, Insider or Control Person.

"Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction" means a proposed Qualifying Transaction where the same party or parties or their respective Associates or Affiliates are Control Persons in both the CPC and in relation to the Significant Assets which are to be the subject of the proposed Qualifying Transaction.

"Offering" means the offering of Common Shares in accordance with the terms of this prospectus.

"Person" means a company or individual.

"Principal" means:

- (a) a Person who acted as a Promoter of the issuer within two years before the IPO prospectus or the Final Exchange Bulletin;
- (b) a director or senior officer of the issuer or any of its material operating subsidiaries at the time of the IPO prospectus or Final Exchange Bulletin;
- (c) a 20% holder - a Person that holds securities carrying more than 20% of the voting rights attached to the issuer's outstanding securities immediately before and immediately after the issuer's IPO or immediately after the Final Exchange Bulletin for non IPO transactions; and
- (d) a 10% holder - a Person that:
 - (i) holds securities carrying more than 10% of the voting rights attached to the issuer's outstanding securities immediately before and immediately after the

issuer's IPO or immediately after the Final Exchange Bulletin for non IPO transactions; and

- (ii) has elected or appointed, or has the right to elect or appoint, one or more directors or senior officers of the issuer or any of its material operating subsidiaries.

In calculating these percentages include securities that may be issued to the holder under outstanding convertible securities in both the holder's securities and the total securities outstanding.

A company, trust, partnership or other entity more than 50% held by one or more Principals will be treated as a Principal and in calculating this percentage, securities of the entity that may be issued to the Principals under outstanding convertible securities are to be included in both the Principals' securities of the entity and the total securities of the entity outstanding.

A Principal's spouse and their relatives that live at the same address as the Principal will also be treated as Principals and any securities of the issuer they hold will be subject to escrow requirements.

"Pro Group" means;

- (a) Subject to subparagraphs (b), (c) and (d), "Pro Group" shall include, either individually or as a group:
 - (i) the Member;
 - (ii) employees of the Member;
 - (iii) partners, officers and directors of the Member;
 - (iv) Affiliates of the Member; and
 - (v) Associates of any parties referred to in subparagraphs (i) through (iv).
- (b) The Exchange may, in its discretion, include a Person or party in the Pro Group for the purposes of a particular calculation where the Exchange determines that the Person is not acting at arm's length to the Member;
- (c) The Exchange may, in its discretion, exclude a Person from the Pro Group for the purposes of a particular calculation where the Exchange determines that the Person is acting at arm's length of the Member;
- (d) The Member may deem a Person who would otherwise be included in the Pro Group pursuant to subparagraph (a) to be excluded from the Pro Group where the Member determines that:
 - (i) the Person is an Affiliate or Associate of the Member acting at arm's length of the Member;
 - (ii) the Associate or Affiliate has a separate corporate and reporting structure;

- (iii) there are sufficient controls on information flowing between the Member and the Associate or Affiliate; and
- (iv) the Member maintains a list of such excluded Persons.

"Promoter" has the meaning specified in section 1(1) of the *Securities Act* (British Columbia).

"Qualifying Transaction" means a transaction where a CPC acquires Significant Assets, other than cash, by way of purchase, amalgamation, merger or arrangement with another company or by other means.

"Related Party Transaction" has the meaning ascribed to that term under Appendix 5B - Ontario Securities Commission Rule 61-501, and includes a related party transaction that is determined by the Exchange to be a Related Party Transaction. The Exchange may deem a transaction to be a Related Party Transaction where the transaction involves Non Arm's Length Parties, or other circumstances exist which may compromise the independence of the issuer with respect to the transaction.

"Resulting Issuer" means the issuer that was formerly a CPC that exists upon issuance of the Final Exchange Bulletin.

"Seed Capital" or **"Seed Shares"** means securities issued before an issuer's IPO or by a private Target Company before a reverse take-over, change of business or Qualifying Transaction, regardless of whether the securities are subject to resale restrictions or are free trading.

"SEDAR" means System for Electronic Document Analysis and Retrieval.

"Significant Assets" means one or more assets or businesses which, when purchased, optioned or otherwise acquired by the CPC, together with any other concurrent transactions, would result in the CPC meeting the Minimum Listing Requirements.

"Sponsor" means a Member that meets the criteria specified in the Exchange Policy 2.2 which has an agreement with an issuer to undertake the functions of sponsorship as required by that policy and various other Exchange policies.

"Target Company" means a company to be acquired by the CPC as its Significant Asset pursuant to a Qualifying Transaction.

"Vendor" or **"Vendors"** means one or all of the beneficial owners of the Significant Assets (other than a Target Company(ies)).

PROSPECTUS SUMMARY

The following is a summary of the principal features of this distribution and should be read together with the more detailed information and financial data and statements contained elsewhere in this prospectus.

Business of the Corporation: The principal business of the Corporation will be the identification and evaluation of assets or businesses with a view to completing a Qualifying Transaction. The Corporation has not commenced commercial operations and has no assets other than a minimal amount of cash. The Corporation has not identified any potential acquisitions. An acquisition financed by the issuance of Common Shares could result in a change in control of the Corporation and may cause the shareholders' interests in the Corporation to be diluted. See "Business of the Corporation" and "Dilution".

Offering: 2,000,000 Common Shares are being offered under this prospectus at a price of \$0.10 per Common Share. In addition, the Corporation will grant to the Agent the Agent's Option to purchase up to 200,000 Common Shares at an exercise price of \$0.10 per Common Share which will be exercisable for a period of 24 months from the date of listing of the Common Shares on the Exchange. The grant of the Agent's Option is qualified under this prospectus. The Corporation has also granted options to purchase an aggregate of 900,000 Common Shares to directors and officers under the Corporation's share option plan. The grant of all of these stock options is also qualified under this prospectus. See "Options to Purchase Securities".

Use of Proceeds: The net proceeds of this Offering in the aggregate amount of \$840,000, together with the proceeds from the prior sales of Common Shares will be used to provide the Corporation with a minimum of funds with which to identify and evaluate assets or businesses for acquisition with a view to completing a Qualifying Transaction. The Corporation may not have sufficient funds to secure such businesses or assets once identified and evaluated and additional funds may be required. Until Completion of the Qualifying Transaction and except as otherwise provided in the CPC Policy, a maximum of the lesser of 30% of the gross proceeds realized or \$210,000 may be used for purposes other than evaluating businesses or assets. See "Use of Proceeds", "Business of the Corporation" and "Risk Factors".

Escrowed Securities: 10,300,000 of the currently issued and outstanding Common Shares of the Corporation have been deposited in escrow pursuant to the terms of

an Escrow Agreement and will be released from escrow in stages over a period of up to three years after the date of the Final Exchange Bulletin. See "Escrowed Securities".

Risk Factors:

Investment in the Common Shares must be regarded as highly speculative due to the proposed nature of the Corporation's business and its present stage of development. The Corporation was only recently incorporated and has no active business or assets other than cash. It does not have a history of earnings, nor has it paid any dividends and will not generate earnings or pay dividends until at least after the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction. **The Offering is only suitable to investors who are prepared to rely entirely on the directors and management of the Corporation and can afford to risk the loss of their entire investment.** The directors and officers of the Corporation will only devote part of their time and attention to the affairs of the Corporation and there are potential conflicts of interest to which some of the directors and officers of the Corporation will be subject in connection with the operations of the Corporation. Assuming completion of the Offering, an investor will suffer an immediate dilution on investment of 32% or \$0.032 per Common Share based on the gross proceeds of this Offering and prior issues, before deduction of selling commissions or related expenses of the Offering. There can be no assurance that an active and liquid market for the Corporation's Common Shares will develop and an investor may find it difficult to resell the Common Shares. Until Completion of the Qualifying Transaction, the Corporation will not carry on any business other than the identification and evaluation of assets or businesses with a view to completing a Qualifying Transaction. The Corporation has only limited funds with which to identify and evaluate possible Qualifying Transactions and there can be no assurance that the Corporation will be able to identify or complete a suitable Qualifying Transaction.

The Qualifying Transaction may involve the acquisition of a business or assets located outside of Canada. It may therefore be difficult or impossible to effect service or notice to commence legal proceedings upon any directors, officers and experts outside of Canada and it may not be possible to enforce against such persons or companies judgments obtained in Canadian courts predicated upon the civil liability provisions applicable to securities laws in Canada. See "Business of the Corporation", "Directors, Officers and Promoters", "Capitalization", "Dilution", "Risk Factors" and "Conflicts of Interest".

THE CORPORATION

The Corporation was incorporated on June 5, 2008 by Certificate of Incorporation issued pursuant to the provisions of the *Business Corporations Act* (British Columbia) under the name "Slater Mining Corporation."

The head office and the registered office of the Corporation is located at Suite 1600, 609 Granville Street, Vancouver, British Columbia, V7Y 1C3.

BUSINESS OF THE CORPORATION

Preliminary Expenses

Other than \$2,500 paid to the Agent as an advance retainer covering part of the Agent's legal fees and out of pocket expenses, Exchange filing fees of \$5,250 and professional fees in the amount of \$10,000, the Corporation has not incurred any expenses to date in proceeding with the Offering. However, certain of the Offering proceeds will be utilized to satisfy the obligations of the Corporation related to the Offering, including the expenses of its auditor, legal expenses and the Agent's legal counsel. See "Use of Proceeds".

Proposed Operations until Completion of a Qualifying Transaction

The Corporation proposes to identify and evaluate businesses and assets with a view to completing a Qualifying Transaction. Any proposed Qualifying Transaction must be accepted by the Exchange and in the case of a Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction is also subject to Majority of the Minority Approval in accordance with the CPC Policy. The Corporation has not conducted commercial operations. The Corporation currently intends to pursue a Qualifying Transaction in a resource sector but there is no assurance that this will, in fact, be the business sector of a proposed Qualifying Transaction or of the Corporation following the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction.

Until Completion of a Qualifying Transaction, the Corporation will not carry on any business other than the identification and evaluation of businesses or assets with a view to completing a potential Qualifying Transaction. With the consent of the Exchange, this may include the raising of additional funds in order to finance an acquisition. Except as described under "Private Placement for Cash" and "Restrictions on Use of Proceeds", the funds raised pursuant to this Offering and any subsequent financing will be utilized only for the identification and evaluation of potential Qualifying Transactions and not for any deposit, loan or direct investment in a potential acquisition.

The Corporation has not yet entered into an Agreement in Principle.

Method of Financing

The Corporation may use cash, bank financing, the issuance of treasury shares, public debt or equity financing or a combination of these for the purpose of financing its proposed Qualifying Transaction. **A Qualifying Transaction financed by the issue of treasury shares could result in a change in the control of the Corporation and may cause the shareholders' interest in the Corporation to be further diluted.**

Criteria for a Qualifying Transaction

The Corporation will consider acquisitions of assets or businesses operated or located both inside and outside of Canada, as permitted by the CPC Policy. All potential acquisitions will be screened initially by

management of the Corporation to determine their economic viability. Approval of acquisitions will be made by the board of directors. The board of directors will examine proposed acquisitions having regard to sound business fundamentals, utilizing the expertise and experience of the directors. The board of directors of the Corporation must approve any proposed Qualifying Transaction. In exercising their powers and discharging their duties in relation to a proposed Qualifying Transaction, the directors will act honestly and in good faith with a view to the best interests of the Corporation and will exercise the care, diligence and skill that a reasonably prudent person would exercise in comparable circumstances.

Filings and Shareholder Approval of a Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction

Upon the Corporation reaching an Agreement in Principle, the Corporation must issue a comprehensive news release, at which time the Exchange generally will halt trading in the Corporation's Common Shares until the filing requirements of the Exchange have been satisfied as set forth under "Trading Halts, Suspensions and Delisting". Within 75 days after issuance of such news release, the Corporation shall be required to submit for review to the Exchange either an information circular that complies with applicable corporate and securities laws or a filing statement that complies with Exchange requirements. An information circular must be submitted where there is a Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction. A filing statement must be submitted where the Qualifying Transaction is not a Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction. The information circular or filing statement, as applicable, must contain prospectus level disclosure of the Target Company and the Corporation, assuming Completion of the Qualifying Transaction, and be prepared in accordance with the CPC Policy and Form 3B1 or Form 3B2, as the case may be, of the Exchange. Upon acceptance by the Exchange, the Corporation must then either:

1. file the filing statement on SEDAR at least seven business days prior to closing of the Qualifying Transaction, and issue a news release which discloses the scheduled closing date for the Qualifying Transaction as well as the fact that the filing statement is available on SEDAR; or
2. mail the information circular and related proxy material to its shareholders in order to obtain the Majority of the Minority Approval of the Qualifying Transaction or other requisite approval, at a meeting of shareholders.

Unless waived by the Exchange, the Corporation will also be required to retain a Sponsor, who must be a Member of the Exchange, and who will be required to submit to the Exchange a Sponsor Report prepared in accordance with the policies of the Exchange. The Corporation will no longer be considered to be a CPC upon the Exchange having issued the Final Exchange Bulletin. The Exchange will generally not issue the Final Exchange Bulletin until the Exchange has received:

1. in the case of a Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction, confirmation of Majority of Minority Approval of the Qualifying Transaction;
2. confirmation of closing of the Qualifying Transaction; and
3. all post-meeting or final documentation, as applicable, otherwise required to be filed with the Exchange pursuant to the CPC Policy.

Upon issuance of the Final Exchange Bulletin, the CPC Policy will generally cease to apply, with the exception of the escrow provisions of the CPC Policy and the restrictions in the CPC Policy precluding the Corporation from completing a reverse takeover for a period of one year from the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction.

Minimum Listing Requirements

The Resulting Issuer must satisfy the Exchange's Minimum Listing Requirements for the particular industry sector in either Tier 1 or Tier 2 as prescribed under the applicable policies of the Exchange.

Trading Halts, Suspensions and Delisting

The Exchange will generally halt trading in the Common Shares from the date of the public announcement of an Agreement in Principle until all filing requirements of the Exchange have been satisfied, which includes the submission of a Sponsorship Acknowledgment Form where the Qualifying Transaction is subject to sponsorship. In addition, personal information forms, or, if applicable, declarations for all individuals who may be directors, senior officers, Promoters, or Insiders of the Resulting Issuer must be filed with the Exchange and any preliminary background searches that the Exchange considers necessary or advisable must also be completed before the trading halt will be lifted by the Exchange.

Even if all filing requirements have been satisfied and preliminary background checks completed, the Exchange may continue or reinstate a halt in trading of the Common Shares for public policy reasons including:

1. the unacceptable nature of the business of the Resulting Issuer; or
2. the number of conditions precedent to, or the nature and number of deficiencies required to be resolved prior to, completion of the Qualifying Transaction, are so significant or numerous as to make it appear to the Exchange that the halt should be reinstated or continued.

A trading halt may also be imposed by the Exchange where the Corporation fails to file the supporting documents relating to the Qualifying Transaction within a period of 75 days after public announcement of the Agreement in Principle or if the Corporation fails to file post-meeting or final documents, as applicable, within the time required. A trading halt may also be imposed if a Sponsor terminates its sponsorship.

The Exchange may suspend from trading or delist the Common Shares of the Corporation where the Exchange has not issued a Final Exchange Bulletin to the Corporation within 24 months of the date of listing. In the event that the Common Shares of the Corporation are delisted by the Exchange, within 90 days from the date of such delisting, the Corporation shall wind up and shall make a pro rata distribution of its remaining assets to its shareholders, unless shareholders, pursuant to a majority vote exclusive of the votes of Non Arm's Length Parties to the Corporation, determine to deal with the issuer or its remaining assets in some other manner. See "Filings and Shareholder Approval of a Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction."

Refusal of Qualifying Transaction

The Exchange, in its sole discretion, may not accept a Qualifying Transaction where:

1. the Resulting Issuer fails to satisfy the applicable Minimum Listing Requirements of the Exchange;
2. the aggregate number of securities of the Resulting Issuer owned, directly or indirectly, by:
 - (a) a Member firm of the Exchange;

(b) registrants, unregistered corporate finance professionals, employee shareholders and partners of such Member firm; and

(c) Associates of any such person;

collectively, would exceed 20% of the issued and outstanding securities of the Resulting Issuer;

3. the Resulting Issuer will be a financial institution, finance company, finance issuer or mutual fund, as defined in the securities legislation;
4. the majority of the directors and senior officers of the Resulting Issuer are not residents of Canada or the United States or are individuals who have not demonstrated positive association as directors or officers with public companies that are subject to a regulatory regime comparable to the companies listed on a Canadian exchange;
5. notwithstanding the definition of a Qualifying Transaction, there is any other reason for denying acceptance of the Qualifying Transaction.

USE OF PROCEEDS

The proceeds from this Offering and any prior sale of Common Shares, after deducting the expenses associated with this Offering, will only be sufficient to identify and evaluate a finite number of assets and businesses, and additional funds may be required to finance any acquisition to which the Corporation may commit.

Permitted Use of Funds

Until the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction and except as otherwise specifically provided by the CPC Policy and described in "Restrictions on Use of Proceeds", "Private Placements for Cash", and "Prohibited Payments to Non Arm's Length Parties", the gross proceeds realized from the sale of all securities issued by the Corporation will be used by the Corporation only to identify and evaluate businesses or assets and obtain shareholder approval for a proposed Qualifying Transaction.

The proceeds may be used for expenses incurred for the preparation of:

- valuations or appraisals;
- business plans;
- feasibility studies and technical assessments;
- sponsorship reports;
- engineering or geological reports;
- financial statements, including audited financial statements;
- fees for legal and accounting services; and
- Agents' fees, costs and commissions,

relating to the identification and evaluation of assets or businesses and in the case of a Non Arm's Length Qualifying Transaction, the obtaining of shareholder approval for the Corporation's proposed Qualifying Transaction.

In addition, with the prior acceptance of the Exchange, up to an aggregate of \$225,000 may be advanced as a refundable deposit or secured loan by the Corporation to a Vendor or Target Company, as the case may be, for a proposed arm's length Qualifying Transaction that has been publicly announced at least 15 days prior to the date of such advance, due diligence with respect to the Qualifying Transaction is well underway and either a Sponsor has been engaged or sponsorship has been waived. A maximum aggregate amount of \$25,000 may also be advanced as a non-refundable deposit, unsecured deposit or

advance to a Vendor or Target Company, as the case may be, to preserve assets without the prior acceptance of the Exchange.

Restrictions on Use of Proceeds

Until Completion of a Qualifying Transaction, not more than the lesser of 30% of the gross proceeds from the sale of all securities issued by the Corporation or \$210,000, will be used for purposes other than those described above. For greater certainty, expenditures which are not included as "Permitted Uses of Funds", listed above, include:

1. listing and filing fees (including SEDAR fees);
2. other costs for the issuance of securities (including legal, accounting and audit expenses) relating to the preparation and filing of this prospectus; and
3. administrative and general expenses of the Corporation, including:
 - (a) office supplies, office rent and related utilities;
 - (b) printing costs (including the printing of this prospectus and share certificates);
 - (c) equipment leases; and
 - (d) fees for legal advice and audit expenses, other than those described above under "Permitted Use of Funds".

No proceeds will be used to acquire or lease a vehicle.

Private Placements for Cash

After the closing of the Offering and until the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction, the Corporation will not issue any securities unless written acceptance of the Exchange is obtained before issuance. Prior to the Completion of a Qualifying Transaction, the Exchange generally will not accept a private placement by the Corporation where the gross proceeds raised from the issuance of securities both prior to and pursuant to the Offering, together with any proceeds anticipated to be raised upon closing of the private placement, will exceed \$2,000,000. The only securities issuable pursuant to such a private placement will be Common Shares. Subject to certain limited exceptions, any Common Shares issued pursuant to the private placement to Non Arm's Length Parties to the Corporation and to Principals of the Resulting Issuer will be subject to escrow.

Prohibited Payments to Non Arm's Length Parties

Except as described under "Options to Purchase Securities" and "Restrictions on Use of Proceeds", the Corporation has not made, and until the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction will not make, any payment of any kind, directly or indirectly, to a Non Arm's Length Party to the Corporation or a Non Arm's Length Party to the Qualifying Transaction, or to a person engaged in investor relations activities, by any means, including:

1. remuneration, which includes but is not limited to salaries, consulting fees, management contract fees or directors' fees, finders' fees, loans, advances and bonuses; and
2. deposits and similar payments.

Further, no such payment will be made on or after the Completion of a Qualifying Transaction if such payment relates to services rendered or obligations incurred prior to or in connection with the Qualifying Transaction.

Notwithstanding the above, the Corporation may reimburse a Non Arm's Length Party to the Corporation for reasonable expenses for office supplies, office rent and related utilities, equipment leases (excluding vehicle leases), and legal services (provided that neither the lawyer providing the legal services nor any member of the law firm providing the services is a Promoter of the Corporation or in the case of a law firm, no member of the firm owns greater than 10% of the outstanding Common Shares of the Corporation), and the Corporation may also reimburse a Non Arm's Length Party to the Corporation for reasonable out-of-pocket expenses incurred in pursuing the business of the Corporation described in "Permitted Use of Funds".

The foregoing restrictions on the use of proceeds and prohibitions on payments to Non Arm's Length Parties and persons engaged in investor relations activities continue to apply until the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction.

PLAN OF DISTRIBUTION

Agency Agreement and Agent's Compensation

Pursuant to the Agency Agreement dated July 30, 2008 between the Corporation and the Agent, the Corporation has appointed the Agent as its agent to offer for sale on a best efforts basis to the public 2,000,000 Common Shares at a price of \$0.10 per Common Share for gross proceeds of \$200,000 subject to the terms and conditions in the Agency Agreement. The Agent will receive a cash commission of 10% of the aggregate gross proceeds from the sale of the Common Shares. Additionally, a corporate finance fee of \$15,000 plus GST is payable to the Agent on closing of the Offering. The Agent has been paid an expense retainer of \$2,500 and the Agent will be reimbursed by the Corporation for its expenses, including legal fees.

The Corporation has also agreed to grant to the Agent a non-transferable Agent's Option to purchase up to 200,000 Common Shares representing 10% of the aggregate number of Common Shares offered to the public at an exercise price of \$0.10 per Common Share, which may be exercised for a period of 24 months from the date the Common Shares of the Corporation are listed on the Exchange. All of the Agent's Option is qualified under this prospectus. Not more than 50% of the Common Shares received on the exercise of the Agent's Option may be sold by the Agent prior to the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction. The remaining 50% may be sold after the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction. The Agent has agreed to use its best efforts to secure subscriptions for the Common Shares offered hereunder on behalf of the Corporation and may make co-brokerage arrangements with other investment dealers at no additional cost to the Corporation. The obligations of the Agent under the Agency Agreement may be terminated at its discretion on the basis of its assessment of the state of financial markets and may also be terminated on the occurrence of certain events as stated in the Agency Agreement.

Best Efforts Offering and Minimum Distribution

The total Offering consists of 2,000,000 Common Shares for total gross proceeds of \$200,000. Under the CPC Policy, no purchaser of the Common Shares is permitted to purchase more than 2% or 40,000 Common Shares sold under the Offering. In addition, the maximum number of Common Shares permitted to be purchased by that purchaser together with any Associates or Affiliates of that purchaser is 4% or 80,000 Common Shares sold under the Offering. The funds received from the Offering will be deposited with the Agent, and will not be released until minimum Offering gross proceeds of \$200,000 have been deposited and the Agent consents to the release thereof. The total subscription of \$200,000 must be raised within 90 days of the date a receipt for the final prospectus is issued, or such other time as

may be consented to by the Agent and persons or companies who subscribed within that period, failing which the Agent will remit the funds collected to the original subscribers without interest or deduction, unless subscribers have otherwise instructed the Agent.

Upon completion of the Offering, the Corporation must have a minimum of 200 shareholders with each shareholder beneficially owning at least 1,000 Common Shares free of resale restrictions, exclusive of any Common Shares held by Non Arm's Length Parties to the Corporation.

Other Securities to be Distributed

The Corporation also proposes to grant options to purchase 900,000 Common Shares to directors and officers of the Corporation in accordance with the policies of the Exchange. The grant of all of these options to the directors and officers of the Corporation is qualified for distribution under this prospectus.

Determination of Price

The Offering price of the Common Shares hereunder was determined by negotiation between the Corporation and the Agent.

Listing Application

The Exchange has conditionally accepted the listing of these Common Shares. Listing is subject to the Corporation fulfilling all of the listing requirements of the Exchange.

Subscriptions by and Restrictions on the Agent

All subscriptions by any member of the Aggregate Pro Group are subject to the applicable client priority rules and the general rule of the CPC Policy that no purchaser can: (i) directly or indirectly purchase more than 2% of the total Common Shares offered under this Offering; and (ii) together with any Associates or Affiliates purchase more than 4% of the total Common Shares offered under this Offering. Any Common Shares issued to any member of the Aggregate Pro Group prior to the date of this prospectus will be held in escrow pursuant to the CPC Policy.

Until Completion of the Qualifying Transaction, the aggregate number of Common Shares permitted to be owned directly or indirectly by the members of the Pro Group is 20% of the issued and outstanding Common Shares of the Corporation exclusive of Common Shares reserved for issuance at a future date. The Exchange will require that any securities issued to the Pro Group in connection with or in contemplation of the Qualifying Transaction will be required to be subject to a four month Exchange hold period and the securities certificate(s) legended accordingly, as prescribed by Exchange Policy 3.2 *"Filing Requirements and Continuous Disclosure"*.

The Agent has advised the Corporation that to the best of its knowledge and belief, the following directors, officers, employees or contractors or Associate or Affiliate of the foregoing have subscribed for Common Shares of the Corporation in the following amounts:

Restrictions on Trading

Other than the initial public offering of the Common Shares pursuant to this prospectus, the grant of the Agent's Option and the grant of options to the directors and officers of the Corporation, no securities of the Corporation will be permitted to be issued during the period between the date receipts for the preliminary prospectus are issued by the Commissions, and the time the Common Shares are listed for trading on the Exchange, except subject to prior acceptance of the Exchange, where appropriate registration and prospectus exemptions are available under securities legislation or where the applicable securities regulatory authorities grant a discretionary order.

DESCRIPTION OF SHARE CAPITAL

Common Shares

The Corporation is authorized to issue an unlimited number of Common Shares without nominal or par value of which, as at the date hereof, 13,600,000 are issued and outstanding as fully paid and non-assessable. In addition, a maximum of 2,000,000 Common Shares are reserved for issuance under this prospectus, 900,000 Common Shares are reserved for issuance pursuant to the Corporation's Option Plan (as hereinafter defined), and 200,000 Common Shares are reserved for issuance under the Agent's Option. See "Plan of Distribution".

Subject to the rights, privileges, restrictions and conditions attached to the preferred shares, the holders of Common Shares are entitled to dividends, if, as and when declared by the board of directors, to one vote per Common Share at meetings of the shareholders of the Corporation and, upon liquidation, to share equally in such assets of the Corporation as are distributable to the holders of Common Shares. All Common Shares to be outstanding after completion of this Offering will be fully paid and non-assessable.

Preferred Shares

The Corporation is authorized to issue an unlimited number of preferred shares (the "**Preferred Shares**") without nominal or par value. The Preferred Shares may be issued from time to time in one or more series, each consisting of a number of Preferred Shares as determined by the board of directors of the Corporation which also may fix the designations, rights, privileges, restrictions and conditions attaching to the shares of each series of Preferred Shares. There are no Preferred Shares issued and outstanding. The Preferred Shares of each series shall, with respect to payment of dividends and distribution of assets in the event of voluntary or involuntary liquidation, dissolution or winding-up of the Corporation or any other distribution of the assets of the Corporation among its shareholders for the purpose of winding-up its affairs, rank on a parity with the Preferred Shares of every other series and shall be entitled to preference over the Common Shares and the shares of any other class ranking junior to the Preferred Shares. The Preferred Shares of any series may be purchased for cancellation or made subject to redemption as determined by the board of directors of the Corporation.

To date, the Corporation has not paid any dividends on its outstanding Common Shares. The future payment of dividends will be dependent upon the financial requirements of the Corporation to fund further growth, financial condition of the Corporation and other factors which the board of directors of the Corporation may consider in the circumstances. It is not contemplated that any dividends will be paid in the immediate or foreseeable future.

Such options will be exercisable for a period of up to 5 years from the date of grant. In connection with the foregoing, the number of Common Shares reserved for issuance to: (a) any individual will not exceed 5% of the issued and outstanding Common Shares; and (b) all consultants in connection with the Offering will not exceed 2% of the issued and outstanding Common Shares. In addition, the Option Plan provides that no more than 2% of the issued Common Shares of the Corporation will be granted to any one consultant in any 12 month period; and no more than an aggregate of 2% of the issued Common Shares of the Corporation will be granted to an employee conducting investor relations activities in any 12 month period. The Corporation, as long as it is a CPC, will not grant options to any person providing investor relations activities, promotional or market-making services. Options may be exercised for up to 90 days following cessation of the optionee's position with the Corporation, provided that if the cessation of office, employment, directorship, or consulting arrangement was by reason of death, the option may be exercised within a maximum period of one year after such death, subject to the expiry date of such option. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Option Plan, if a participant does not continue as an eligible person of the Resulting Issuer following the Completion of the Qualifying

Transaction, then each option held by such participant shall terminate and therefore cease to be exercisable on the later of:

1. twelve months after the Completion of the Qualifying Transaction; and
2. 90 days after the participant ceases to be an eligible person of the Resulting Issuer.

Any Common Shares acquired pursuant to the exercise of options under the Option Plan prior to Completion of the Qualifying Transaction must be deposited in escrow and will be subject to escrow until the Final Exchange Bulletin is issued. See "Escrowed Securities".

The 10,000,000 Common Shares issued prior to this Offering at a price below \$0.10 per Common Share, all Common Shares held by or that may be acquired by Non Arm's Length Parties of the Corporation either under the Offering or otherwise prior to Completion of the Qualifying Transaction and all Common Shares acquired by members of the Aggregate Pro Group prior to this Offering will be deposited with Olympia Trust Company under the Escrow Agreement.

All Common Shares acquired on exercise of stock options prior to the Completion of a Qualifying Transaction must also be deposited in escrow and will be subject to escrow until the Final Exchange Bulletin is issued.

In addition, all Common Shares of the Corporation acquired in the secondary market prior to the Completion of a Qualifying Transaction by any person or company who becomes a Control Person are required to be deposited in escrow. Subject to certain exemptions permitted by the Exchange, all securities of the Corporation held by Principals of the Resulting Issuer will also be escrowed.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, Common Shares acquired by Principals of the Corporation or Principals of the Resulting Issuer pursuant to a private placement will not be subject to escrow provided that various conditions, as set forth in the CPC Policy, are met. See "Escrowed Securities on Private Placement".

Where the Common Shares of the Corporation which are required to be held in escrow are held by a non-individual (a "**holding company**"), each holding company pursuant to the Escrow Agreement, has agreed, or will agree, not to carry out any transactions during the currency of the Escrow Agreement which would result in a change of control of the holding company, without the consent of the Exchange. Any holding company must sign an undertaking to the Exchange that, to the extent reasonably possible, it will not permit or authorize any issuance of securities or transfer of securities that could reasonably result in a change of control of the holding company. In addition, the Exchange may require an undertaking from any control person of the holding company not to transfer the shares of that company.

Under the Escrow Agreement, 10% of the escrowed Common Shares will be released from escrow on the issuance of the Final Exchange Bulletin (the "**Initial Release**") and an additional 15% will be released on the dates 6 months, 12 months, 18 months, 24 months, 30 months and 36 months following the Initial Release.

If the Resulting Issuer meets the Exchange's Tier 1 Minimum Listing Requirements either at the time the Final Exchange Bulletin is issued or subsequently, the release of the escrowed Common Shares will be accelerated. An accelerated escrow release will not commence until the Resulting Issuer has made application to the Exchange for listing as a Tier 1 issuer and the Exchange has issued a bulletin that announces the acceptance for listing of the Resulting Issuer on Tier 1 of the Exchange.

The Exchange's prior consent must be obtained before a transfer within escrow of escrowed Common Shares. Generally, the Exchange will only permit a transfer within escrow to be made to incoming Principals in connection with a proposed Qualifying Transaction.

If a Final Exchange Bulletin is not issued, the escrowed Common Shares will not be released. Under the Escrow Agreement, each Non Arm's Length Party to the Corporation who holds escrowed Common Shares acquired at a price below the Offering price under this prospectus has irrevocably authorized and directed Olympia Trust Company, the escrow agent, to immediately:

1. cancel all of those escrowed Common Shares upon the issuance by the Exchange of a bulletin delisting the Common Shares of the Corporation; or
2. if the Corporation lists on NEX, either
 - (a) cancel all Seed Shares purchased by Non Arm's length Parties to the CPC at a discount from the IPO price, in accordance with section 11.2(a) of the CPC Policy, or
 - (b) subject to majority shareholder approval, cancel an amount of Seed Shares purchased by Non Arm's Length Parties to the CPC so that the average cost of the remaining Seed Shares is at least equal to the IPO price.

Escrowed Securities on Qualifying Transaction

Generally, if at least 75% of the securities issued pursuant to the Qualifying Transaction are "Value Securities", then all the securities issued to Principals of the Resulting Issuer pursuant to the Qualifying Transaction will be deposited into escrow pursuant to a value security agreement (the "**Value Security Escrow Agreement**"). "Value Securities" are securities issued pursuant to a transaction for which the deemed value of the securities at least equals the value ascribed to the assets, using a valuation method acceptable to the Exchange, or securities that are otherwise determined by the Exchange to be Value Securities and required to be placed in escrow under a Value Security Escrow Agreement. However, if at least 75% of the securities issued pursuant to the Qualifying Transaction are not Value Securities, all securities issued pursuant to the Qualifying Transaction will be deposited into a surplus security escrow agreement (a "**Surplus Security Escrow Agreement**").

The principal distinction between a Value Security Escrow Agreement and a Surplus Security Escrow Agreement is the time period for release of securities from escrow. In the case of a Resulting Issuer that will be a Tier 2 issuer when the Final Exchange Bulletin is issued, the Value Security Escrow Agreement provides for a three year escrow release mechanism with 10% of the escrowed securities being releasable at the time of the Final Exchange Bulletin, and 15% of the escrowed securities being releasable every 6 months thereafter, on each of the 6, 12, 18, 24, 30 and 36 month anniversaries of the Final Exchange Bulletin. In the case of a Resulting Issuer that will be a Tier 2 issuer when the Final Exchange Bulletin is issued, the Surplus Security Escrow Agreement provides for a six-year escrow release mechanism with:

1. 5% of the escrowed securities being releasable in 6 month intervals on each of the 6, 12, 18 and 24 month anniversaries of the Final Exchange Bulletin; and
2. 10% of the escrowed securities being releasable in 6 month intervals on each of the 30, 36, 42, 48, 54, 60, 66 and 72 months after the Final Exchange Bulletin.

In the case of a Resulting Issuer that will be a Tier 1 issuer when the Final Exchange Bulletin is issued, the Value Security Escrow Agreement provides for an 18 month escrow release mechanism with 25% of the escrowed securities being releasable at the time of the Final Exchange Bulletin, and with 25% of the escrowed securities being releasable every 6 months thereafter. In the case of a Resulting Issuer that will be a Tier 1 issuer when the Final Exchange Bulletin is issued, the Surplus Security Escrow Agreement provides for a three-year escrow release mechanism with:

1. 10% of the escrowed securities being releasable upon the issuance of the Final Exchange Bulletin; and
2. 15% of the escrowed securities being releasable in 6 month intervals on each of the 6, 12, 18, 24, 30 and 36 months after the Final Exchange Bulletin.

Escrowed Securities on Private Placement

2. the private placement is announced concurrently with the Agreement in Principle; and
 - (a) at least 75% of the proceeds from the private placement are not from Principals of the Corporation or the proposed Resulting Issuer;
 - (b) if subscribers, other than Principals of the Corporation or the proposed Resulting Issuer, will obtain securities subject to hold periods, then in addition to any resale restrictions under applicable securities legislation, any securities issued to such Principals will be subject to a four month hold period; and
 - (c) none of the proceeds of the private placement are allocated to pay compensation or to settle indebtedness owing to Principals of the Resulting Issuer.

Jay Sujir is currently a director of Escape Gold Inc. and a former director of American Bullion Minerals Limited, both of which companies have been subject to cease-trade orders in Alberta and British Columbia for extended periods of time for failure to file financial statements. Mr. Sujir had no association with these companies whatsoever at the time the financial statements became overdue or when the cease trade orders were made, and he became a director solely to assist in the resurrection of such companies.

Penalties or Sanctions

No director, officer, Insider or Promoter of the Corporation, or any shareholder holding sufficient securities of the Corporation to affect materially the control of the Corporation has been subject to any penalties or sanctions imposed by a court relating to securities legislation or by any securities regulatory authority or has entered into a settlement agreement with a securities regulatory authority, or has been subject to any other penalties or sanctions imposed by a court or regulatory body or self-regulatory authority that would be likely to be considered important to a reasonable investor making an investment decision.

Personal Bankruptcies

No director, officer, Insider or Promoter of the Corporation, or any shareholder holding sufficient securities of the Corporation to affect materially the control of the Corporation, or a personal holding company of any such persons, has, within the 10 years preceding the date of this prospectus, as applicable, become bankrupt, made a proposal under any legislation relating to bankruptcy or insolvency, or been subject to or instituted any proceedings, arrangement or compromise with creditors, or had a receiver, receiver manager or trustee appointed to hold their assets.

Conflicts of Interest

There are potential conflicts of interest to which the directors, officers, Insiders and Promoters of the Corporation may be subject in connection with the operations of the Corporation. All of the directors, officers, Insiders and Promoters are engaged in and will continue to be engaged in corporations or businesses which may be in competition with the search by the Corporation for businesses or assets in order to close a Qualifying Transaction. Accordingly, situations may arise where all of the directors, officers, Insiders and Promoters will be in direct competition with the Corporation. Conflicts, if any, will be subject to the procedures and remedies as provided under the *Business Corporations Act* (British Columbia).

Executive Compensation

Except as set out below or otherwise disclosed in this prospectus, prior to Completion of a Qualifying Transaction, no payment of any kind has been made, or will be made, directly or indirectly, by the Corporation to a Non Arm's Length Party to the Corporation or a Non Arm's Length Party to the Qualifying Transaction, or to any person engaged in investor relations activities in respect of the securities of the Corporation or any Resulting Issuer by any means, including:

- (a) remuneration, which includes but is not limited to:
 - (i) salaries;
 - (ii) consulting fees;
 - (iii) management contract fees or directors' fees;
 - (iv) finder's fees;
 - (v) loans, advances, bonuses; and
- (b) deposits and similar payments.

However, the Corporation may reimburse Non Arm's Length Parties for the Corporation's reasonable allocation of rent, secretarial services and other general administrative expenses, at fair market value ("**Permitted Reimbursement**"). However, there have been no reimbursements since incorporation. No reimbursement may be made for any payment made to lease or buy a vehicle.

Mr. Slater and Mr. Bushell have also been granted stock options pursuant to the Option Plan.

Following Completion of the Qualifying Transaction, it is anticipated that the Corporation shall pay compensation to its officers. However, no payment other than the Permitted Reimbursements will be made by the Corporation or by any party on behalf of the Corporation after Completion of the Qualifying

Transaction if the payment relates to services rendered or obligations incurred or in connection with the Qualifying Transaction.

DILUTION

Purchasers of Common Shares under this prospectus will suffer an immediate dilution of 32% or \$0.032 per Common Share on the basis of there being 15,600,000 Common Shares of the Corporation issued and outstanding following completion of the Offering. Dilution has been computed on the basis of total gross proceeds to be raised by this prospectus and from sales of securities prior to filing of this prospectus, without deduction of commissions or related expenses incurred by the Corporation.

RISK FACTORS

Investment in the Common Shares must be regarded as highly speculative due to the proposed nature of the Corporation's business and its present stage of development. The following are risk factors associated with the Corporation:

1. the Corporation was only recently incorporated, has not commenced commercial operations and has no assets other than cash. It has no history of earnings, and shall not generate earnings or pay dividends until at least after Completion of the Qualifying Transaction;

11. trading in the Common Shares of the Corporation may be halted at other times for other reasons, including for failure by the Corporation to submit documents to the Exchange in the time periods required;
12. the Exchange will generally suspend trading in the Corporation's Common Shares or delist the Corporation in the event that the Exchange has not issued a Final Exchange Bulletin within 24 months from the date of listing;
13. neither the Exchange nor any securities regulatory authority passes upon the merits of the proposed Qualifying Transaction;
14. in the event that management of the Corporation resides outside of Canada or the Corporation identifies a foreign business as a proposed Qualifying Transaction, investors may find it difficult or impossible to effect service of notice to commence legal proceedings upon any management resident outside of Canada or upon the foreign business and may find it difficult or impossible to enforce against such persons, judgments obtained in Canadian courts;
15. the Qualifying Transaction may be financed in whole or in part by the issuance of additional securities by the Corporation and this may result in further dilution to the investor, which dilution may be significant and which may also result in a change of control of the Corporation; and
16. subject to prior acceptance by the Exchange, the Corporation may be permitted to loan or advance up to an aggregate of \$250,000 of its proceeds to a target business without requiring shareholder approval and there can be no assurance that the Corporation will be able to recover that loan.

Other than as set forth above: a) no Person whose profession or business gives authority to a statement made by such Person and who is named in this prospectus has received or shall receive a direct or indirect interest in the property of the Corporation or any Associate or Affiliate of the Corporation; and b) as at the date hereof, the aforementioned Persons beneficially own, directly or indirectly, no securities of the Corporation or its Associates and Affiliates. 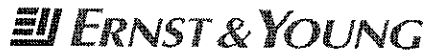

1. INCORPORATION

The Company was incorporated under the *Business Corporations Act* (British Columbia) on June 5, 2008 and is classified as a Capital Pool Company as defined in the TSX Venture Exchange ("TSX-V") Policy 2.4. The principal business of the Company is the identification and evaluation of assets or a business and once identified or evaluated, to negotiate an acquisition or participation in a business subject to receipt of shareholder approval and acceptance by regulatory authorities.

2. CONTINUANCE OF OPERATIONS

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles with the assumption that the Company will be able to realize its assets and discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business rather than through a process of forced liquidation.

The Company's continuing operations as intended are dependent upon its ability to identify, evaluate and negotiate an acquisition of, a participation in or an interest in properties, assets or businesses and its ability to raise capital sufficient to attain profitable operations. Such an acquisition will be subject to shareholder and regulatory approval.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the amount of revenues and expenses reported during the period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Deferred costs

Costs related to shares not yet issued are recorded as deferred costs. Deferred costs consist primarily of corporate finance fees and professional fees. These costs will be deferred until the issuance of the shares to which the costs relate, at which time, the costs will be charged against the related share capital or charged to operations if the shares are not issued. Any financing costs, which do not directly relate to the issuance of shares, are expensed as incurred.

Future income taxes

Future income taxes are recorded using the asset and liability method whereby future tax assets and liabilities are recognized for the future tax consequences attributable to differences between the financial statement carrying amounts of existing assets and liabilities and their respective tax bases. Future tax assets and liabilities are measured using the enacted or substantively enacted tax rates expected to apply when the asset is realized or the liability settled. The effect on future tax assets and liabilities of a change in tax rates is recognized in income in the period that substantive enactment or enactment occurs. To the extent that the Company does not consider it more likely than not that a future tax asset will be recovered, it provides a valuation allowance against the excess.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont'd...)

Loss per share

The Company uses the treasury stock method to compute the dilutive effect of options, warrants and similar instruments. Under this method the dilutive effect on earnings per share is recognized on the use of the proceeds that could be obtained upon exercise of options, warrants and similar instruments. It assumes that the proceeds would be used to purchase common shares at the average market price during the period.

Basic loss per share is calculated using the weighted-average number of shares outstanding during the period.

Stock-based compensation

The fair value method of accounting is used for stock-based awards. Under this method, the compensation cost of options are estimated at fair value at the grant date and charged to earnings over the vesting period, with the offsetting credit recorded as an increase in contributed surplus. If the stock options are exercised, the proceeds are credited to share capital and the fair value at the date of grant is reclassified from contributed surplus to share capital. For options subject to graded vesting, the Company calculates the fair value of the award as if it was one single award with one expected life and amortizes the calculated expense. The Company has not recorded any stock based compensation expense to date.

Adoped standards

The following accounting pronouncements are applicable to annual and interim periods beginning on or after October 1, 2007:

CICA 1535, Capital - Disclosure requires that a company disclose information that enables users of its financial statements to evaluate its objectives, policies and procedures for managing capital including disclosures of any externally imposed capital requirements and the consequences for non-compliance.

CICA 3862, Financial Instruments – Disclosure requires disclosure of information related to the significance of financial instruments to a Company's financial position and performance. A company is also required to disclose information related to the risks of its use of financial instruments and how those risks are managed.

CICA 3863, Financial Instruments – Presentation established standards for presentation of financial instruments. It deals with the presentation of financial instruments and the circumstances in which financial assets and financial liabilities are offset.

The adoption of these new pronouncements does not have a material effect on the Company's financial statements.

4. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Company classifies all financial instruments as either held-to-maturity, available-for-sale, held for trading or loans and receivables. Financial assets held to maturity, loans and receivables and financial liabilities other than those held for trading, are measured at amortized cost. Available-for-sale instruments are measured at fair value with unrealized gains and losses recognized in other comprehensive income. Instruments classified as held for trading are measured at fair value with unrealized gains and losses recognized on the statement of income. The Company currently only has funds held in trust which is classified as held for trading.

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5. MANAGEMENT OF CAPITAL

The Company's objectives when managing its capital include ensuring sufficient equity financing to fund acquisitions and future exploration programs in a way that maximizes the shareholder return given the assumed risks of its operations while at the same time safeguarding the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. The Company considers shareholders' equity as capital. Through the ongoing management of its capital, the Company will modify the structure of its capital based on changing economic conditions in the jurisdictions in which it operates. In doing so, the Company may issue new shares. Annual budgeting is the primary tool used to manage the Company's capital. Updates are made as necessary to both capital expenditure and operational budgets in order to adapt to changes in risk factors of proposed expenditure programs and market conditions within the mining industry. The Company has no externally imposed capital requirements.

During the period ended July 10, 2008, the Company issued 10,000,000 common shares at a price of \$0.05 per common share for total proceeds of \$500,000. These common shares will be held in escrow and will be released pro-rata to the shareholders as to 10% of the escrow shares upon issuance of notice of final acceptance of a Qualifying Transaction by the TSX-V and as to the remainder in six equal tranches of 15% every six months thereafter for a period of 36 months. These escrow shares may not be transferred, assigned or otherwise dealt with without the consent of the regulatory authorities. During the period, the Company also issued 3,600,000 common shares at a price of \$0.10 per common share for total proceeds of \$360,000.

Stock options

On July 9, 2008, the Company adopted an incentive stock option plan (the "Option Plan") which provides that the Board of Directors of the Company may from time to time, in its discretion, and in accordance with TSX-V regulations, grant to directors, officers, employees and technical consultants to the Company, non-transferable options to purchase common shares, provided that the number of common shares reserved for issuance will not exceed 10% of the issued and outstanding common shares and that the number of common shares reserves for issuance pursuant to options granted to all technical consultants will not exceed 2% of the issued and outstanding common shares. Such options will be exercisable for a period of up to 5 years from the date of grant. Vesting terms will be determined at the time of grant by the Board of Directors.

The proposed transaction is subject to regulatory approval.
