Austral Gold Files Q1 2026 Quarterly Activities Report

Established gold producer Austral Gold Limited (Austral or the Company) (ASX: AGD; TSX-V: AGLD; OTCQB: AGLDF) is pleased to announce that it has filed its Q1 2026 Quarterly Activities Report. Q1 2026 Highlights

- **Quarterly production remained stable quarter-on-quarter, with an increase of 3% to 7,335 gold equivalent ounces (GEO), of which Casposo contributed 61%, or 4,456 GEO.**
- **Quarterly sales revenue increased by 43% to US\$34.1 million, an increase of US\$10.3 million from Q4 2025, reflecting higher realised gold and silver prices.**
- **Completed a brokered private placement** raising gross and net proceeds of A\$8.5 million and A\$7.9 million (US\$5.9 million and US\$5.5 million) in February 2026.
- **Balance sheet continued to strengthen during the quarter, ending with cash and cash equivalents of US\$24.3 million and a net cash position of US\$0.6 million after financial debt.**

Austral Gold Limited (Austral or the Company), which owns and operates the Casposo (Argentina) and Guanaco (Chile) gold and silver producing mines, is pleased to present its **Quarterly Activities Report for the three-month period ended 31 March 2026**.

During the March 2026 quarter, the Company continued to strengthen its operations and financial position, driven by a second consecutive quarter of processing Company-sourced material at Casposo, and by increased cash liquidity following a strategic private placement with Australian sophisticated and institutional investors.

Highlights

- **Quarterly production remained stable quarter-on-quarter, with an increase of 3% to 7,335 gold equivalent ounces (GEO), of which Casposo contributed 61%, or 4,456 GEO.**
- **Quarterly sales revenue increased by 43% to US\$34.1 million, an increase of US\$10.3 million from Q4 2025, reflecting higher realised gold and silver prices.**
- **Completed a brokered private placement** raising gross and net proceeds of A\$8.5 million and A\$7.9 million (US\$5.9 million and US\$5.5 million) in February 2026.
- **Balance sheet continued to strengthen during the quarter, ending with cash and cash equivalents of US\$24.3 million and a net cash position of US\$0.6 million after financial debt.**

- Capital growth initiatives progressed during the quarter. At Guanaco, expansion of the leach pad (strips 5 and 6) continued, increasing stacking and irrigation capacity, with commissioning expected in May 2026. Installation of a second secondary crusher also advanced and is expected to improve plant availability and support more consistent production. At Casposo, preliminary engineering studies commenced for the construction of a classification plant to enable reprocessing of material from dry tailings as part of mine planning activities.
- Continued advancement of an updated Technical Report for the Guanaco operation. The report will include an updated mine plan and Mineral Resource and Mineral Reserve Estimates. The report is being prepared in accordance with NI 43-101, with supporting technical disclosure aligned with the JORC Code (2012) Edition to satisfy ASX requirements. Completion and release are planned for Q2 2026.
- Casposo processed internally sourced material for a second consecutive quarter, with toll processing for ASX-listed Challenger Gold rescheduled from Q1 2026 to Q2 2026, following a tolling request received during the period.

EXPLORATION

- Exploration activities commenced across the Company's operating areas in Chile and Argentina during the quarter.
- Brownfield exploration at the Guanaco District is focused on evaluating the potential to expand the Mineral Resource base. At the Juncal Project in Chile (approximately 35 km from Amancaya), Phase 1 of a three-phase exploration program commenced during the quarter, with geological mapping and over 1,000 metres of channel sampling completed.
- Drilling programs have been designed for the Casposo and Manantiales properties in Argentina, targeting infill and brownfield opportunities, with drilling expected to commence in May 2026.

EQUITY INVESTMENTS

- During the quarter, 6.6 million shares of ASX-listed Unico Silver Limited ("Unico") were sold for proceeds of US\$4.7 million. Proceeds were primarily used to fund the exercise of 15.0 million options at A\$0.26 per share. At 31 March 2026, the Company held 15.7 million Unico shares, valued at US\$6.6 million (31 December 2025: US\$10.4 million, including shares and options).

FINANCIAL POSITION

- **Cash:** Total of US\$24.3 million at the end of Q1 2026, including proceeds from the brokered private placement completed in February 2026, which raised gross and net proceeds of A\$8.5 million and A\$7.9 million (US\$5.9 million and US\$5.5 million).
- **Financial Debt:** Decreased by US\$2.9 million to US\$23.7 million (of which US\$10.8 million was owed to related parties) in Q1 2026 (Q4 2025: US\$26.6 million), primarily due to scheduled repayments, with the Company also repaying a US\$1 million pre-export facility at Casposo and renewing a US\$1.9 million loan at Guanaco for an additional two-year term, as the loan expired in March 2026. Net financial debt decreased by US\$16.7 million during the period, resulting in a net cash position of US\$0.6 million.
- **Net current assets** increased by US\$20.7 million to US\$14.3 million in Q1 2026 (Q4 2025: net current liabilities of US\$6.4 million), reflecting higher cash balances and a reduction in current liabilities during the quarter, and resulting in a reversal from a net current liability to a net current asset position.

Forecasted Calendar Year (CY) 2026 Production and Costs

Forecast production guidance for Guanaco remains unchanged. However, production is expected to be at the lower end of the guidance range, reflecting lower-than-forecast production in Q1 2026. At Casposo, production exceeded guidance during the quarter, with full-year production dependent on the start of the Toll Agreement.

Guanaco Mine

- **Production:** 16,000–20,000 GEOs¹
- **Operating Costs:** Revised C1 annual average of US\$2,400-2,700/oz and AISC of US\$2,600-2,900/oz, compared to the previous estimate of US\$1,800-2,100/oz and US\$2,000-2,300/oz respectively.

Casposo Mine

- **Production:** 11,000–13,000 GEOs, based on six months of operations using Casposo-owned ore. During the other six months, the Casposo Plant is scheduled to process Hualilan ore under quarterly toll campaigns agreed with Challenger Gold under the toll processing-agreement.
- **Operating Costs:** C1 annual average of US\$2,200-2,400/oz and AISC of US\$2,400-2,600/oz.

¹ Notes

- Gold equivalent ounces (GEOs) were calculated using a silver-to-gold ratio (Ag:Au) of 95:1, in accordance with the following formula: $AuEq (g/t) = (g/t Au) + (g/t Ag) / 95$, where the factor 95 reflects metal prices of US\$3,800/oz for gold and US\$40/oz for silver.
- Gold and silver are expected to account for 97% and 3% at Guanaco, and 78% and 22% at Casposo.
- Metallurgical recovery rates are forecast at 85.0% for gold and 50.0% for silver at Guanaco, and 90% for gold and 79% for silver at Casposo, both based on the agitation leaching process.

Q1 2026 Exploration Overview

During Q1 2026, exploration activities focused on completing the design and planning of short-term and long-term exploration programs across Argentina and Chile with the launch of the exploration program at Juncal in Chile.

Paleocene Belt, Chile: Guanaco-Amancaya Mine Complex

- **Brownfield exploration advanced at the Guanaco District.** During the quarter, the geology team progressed an exploration program targeting brownfield areas, including Cerro Guanaquito, Dumbo Sur, and Perseverancia. The program is planned to include drilling at Dumbo Sur and Perseverancia, and trenching at Cerro Guanaquito, aimed at testing potential extensions of known mineralised systems in proximity to existing infrastructure. These targets exhibit geological and structural characteristics consistent with the Guanaco District, including high-sulphidation epithermal systems.
- **Preparation of an updated Technical Report for Guanaco has progressed.** The report is expected to incorporate an updated mine plan and Mineral Resource and Mineral Reserve estimates, with release targeted in Q2 2026 in accordance with NI 43-10, and supporting technical disclosure aligned with the JORC Code (2012) Edition to satisfy ASX requirements.
- **Greenfield exploration advanced at the Juncal Project.** During the quarter, activities included trenching, sampling and geological mapping at the Juncal Project (35 km southeast of Amancaya), a greenfield exploration target. The program is designed to evaluate a prospective large, underexplored epithermal vein system characterised by favourable geology, alteration, and structural controls that may be associated with gold-silver mineralisation at depth. Final assay results are expected in Q2 2026.

Triassic Choiyoi Belt, Argentina: Casposo-Manantiales Mine Complex

- **Brownfield exploration advanced at the Casposo District.** During the quarter, work focused on brownfield targets including Casposo Norte, Aurora, Lucía, and Amanda. Following the design of drilling programs for each vein, activities were concentrated on drill pad preparation.
- **Greenfield exploration planning at Cerro Amarillo (Manantiales) progressed during the quarter.** Activities focused on identifying geophysical contractors to execute planned survey programs. The geology team is evaluating contractor options, with execution targeted for Q2 2026.

Q1 2026 Financials Overview

Cash at the end of Q1 2026 was US\$24.3 million, totalling US\$35.2 million when combined with the fair value of 2,236 unrefined GEOs valued at US\$4,864/oz in inventory.

- **Operating cash flow (after working capital movements) of US\$10.4 million in Q1 2026, an increase of US\$0.4 million and US\$10.6 million compared to Q1 2025 and Q1 2025, respectively.** The improvement was driven by higher gold and silver prices and the contribution from two producing mines, with Casposo operating at competitive costs supported by the sequencing of the mine plan, including the processing of existing stockpiles. Changes in working capital reflects higher inventory and receivable balances, and reductions in accounts payable and employee entitlements, all of which contributed to a decrease in working capital.
- **Net cash from investing activities of US\$1.3 million during the quarter**, primarily reflecting A\$7.0 million (approximately US\$4.7 million) in net proceeds from the sale of Unico Silver equity investments, partially offset by the exercise of 15 million Unico options for A\$3.9 million (approximately US\$2.7 million), US\$0.5 million invested in sustaining capital expenditure, and US\$0.2 million invested in exploration and evaluation.
- **Net cash from financing activities totalled US\$2.1 million during the quarter**, mainly due to the brokered private placement which raised gross and net proceeds of A\$8.5 million and A\$7.9 million (US\$5.9 million and US\$5.5 million), net of repayments of borrowings, interest and lease obligations. During the quarter, the Company repaid a US\$1 million (9%) pre-export facility at Casposo and renewed a US\$1.9 million loan at Guanaco on a new 2-year term with monthly repayments at 8.31%.

- **Financial debt totalled US\$23.7 million as of 31 March 2026**, of which US\$10.8 million (46%) was owed to related parties. This represented a decrease of US\$2.9 million from 31 December 2025 and a decrease of US\$4.5 million from 31 March 2025. Short-term financial debt decreased by US\$2.4 million to US\$17.3 million compared to 31 December 2025, while total long-term debt decreased by US\$0.3 million to US\$6.2 million as of 31 March 2026.

Chile

Guanaco - Amancaya Mine Complex

The Guanaco mine was recommissioned in 2010 and commenced operations in 2011. The Amancaya mine, located approximately 60 km southwest of Guanaco and accessible via public road, commenced open-pit mining in March 2017, followed by underground operations, forming the Guanaco–Amancaya Mine Complex. Ore from Amancaya was transported to the Guanaco agitation leach plant for processing until depletion of the underground mine in 2024. In 2023, the Company completed construction of the Heap Reprocessing Project at Guanaco, which is currently the primary source of production for the complex.

Safety

During Q1 2026, there were three lost-time accidents (LTA's) and two no-lost-time accidents (NLTA's) involving Guanaco employees and contractors.

Production

Q1 2026 quarterly production at Guanaco totalled 2,879 GEOs (2,707 gold ounces and 9,780 silver ounces), generally in line with Q4 2025 and 7.3% below Q1 2025.

Production consisted of 1,624 GEOs from heap leaching and 1,255 GEOs from agitation leaching. This was below expectations due to lower feed grade and recoveries, particularly in agitation leaching, as well as ore moisture and weather-related operational constraints.

Installation of the second secondary crusher progressed during the quarter and is expected to improve plant availability and support more stable production going forward.

C1 cash cost was US\$2,811 per GEO, compared with US\$2,683 per GEO in Q4 2025 and US\$1,977 per GEO in Q1 2025. All-in sustaining cost (AISC) increased to US\$3,034 per GEO from US\$2,946 per GEO in Q4 2025 and US\$2,166 per GEO in Q1 2025.

The increase in unit costs was primarily due to lower production volumes, which resulted in higher fixed cost absorption per ounce. Further details on cost movements are provided on page 11.

Exploration

During Q1 2026, exploration activities focused on designing and planning short- and long-term programs, supported by the Company's improved financial position. Across all targets, proposed programs include geological and geophysical studies, surface sampling, trench and channel sampling (including chip and diamond-saw methods), and drilling.

Brownfield Projects

Cerro Guanaquito

The target is located immediately west of the Dumbo pit, an area with a history of drilling and mining. Based on existing geological and drilling data, additional drilling is planned to assess mineralization continuity and evaluate the potential for low-grade, bulk-tonnage gold mineralization.

Dumbo - Perseverancia

The target represents the southward extension of east-west and north-northeast-oriented mineralised systems characteristic of the Dumbo and Perseverancia sectors. Exploration activities are designed to evaluate the depth continuity of these structures and their potential to host additional mineralisation within more favourable host rocks beneath the epiclastic unit.

Greenfield Projects

Juncal

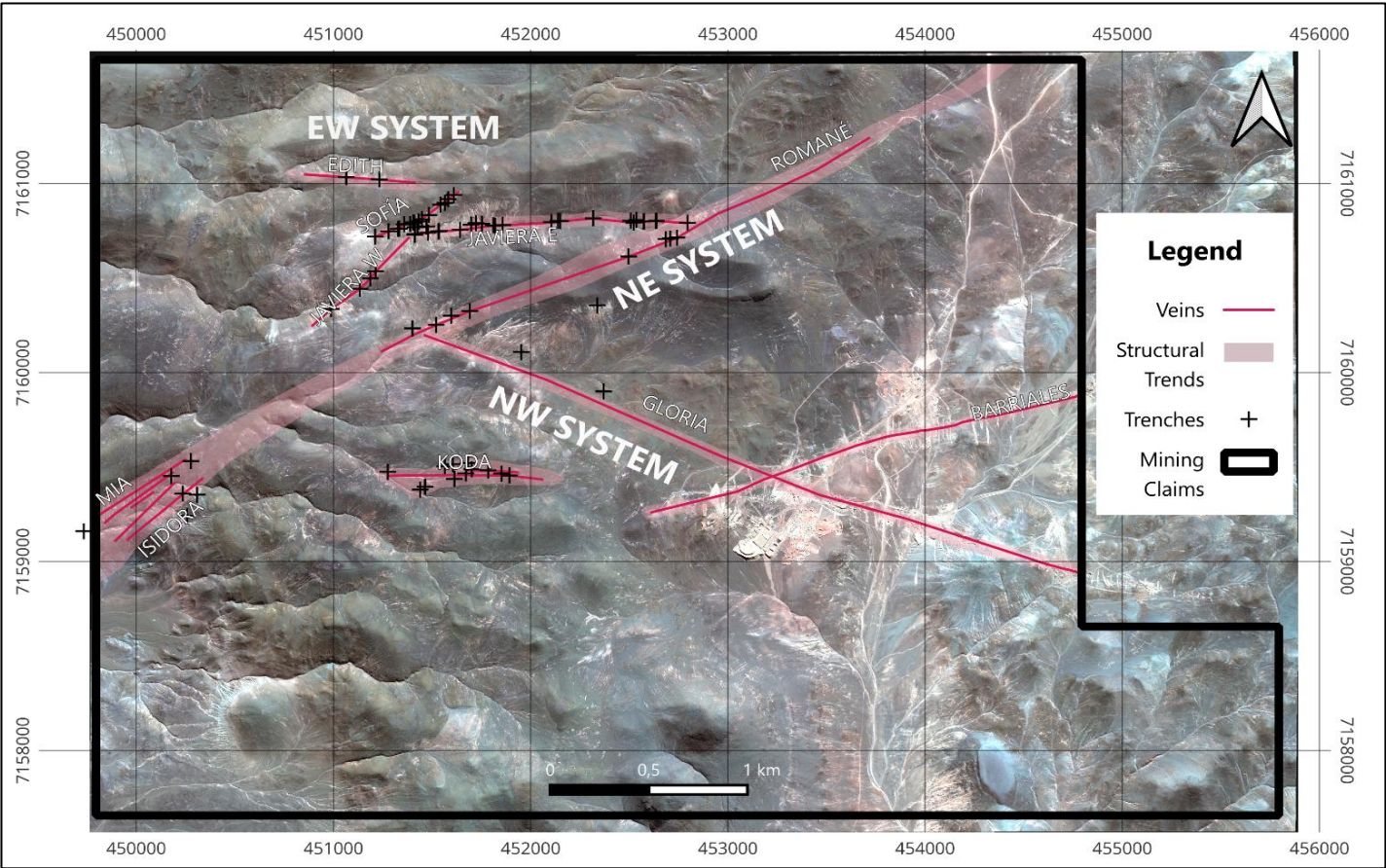
During the quarter, surface sampling was conducted across mapped veins within the project area, including the construction and sampling of 53 trenches. Assay results are pending.

Based on field observations to date, the structural framework of the project area has been interpreted, identifying three principal structural systems based on vein geometry and spatial distribution: N70°–75°W (Gloria vein system), N60°–75°W (Romane vein system), and east-west (Edith vein system). Planning also advanced for a drone-based magnetometry survey to support target generation, with execution scheduled for Q2 2026.

Argentina

Casposo-Manantiales Mine Complex

The Casposo mine is located in the department of Calingasta, San Juan Province, Argentina, approximately 150 km from the city of San Juan, covering an area of 100.21 km². It is a low-sulphidation epithermal gold-silver deposit situated on the eastern margin of the Cordillera Frontal geological province.

The Casposo mine was placed on care and maintenance in the June 2019 quarter. Exploration activities commenced in December 2019 and have continued with the objective of recommencing processing operations. In late 2024, the Company initiated refurbishment of the Casposo Plant following execution of a toll treatment agreement for third-party mineralised material, with processing operations restarting in October 2025.

The Manantiales project is located immediately west of Casposo. Exploration and exploitation rights were granted by the Instituto Provincial de Exploraciones y Explotaciones Mineras de la Provincia de San Juan (IPEEM) in 2019.

Safety

During Q1 2026, there were zero lost-time accidents (LTA's) and zero no-lost-time accidents (NLTA) involving employees and contractors of Casposo.

Production

Q1 2026 quarterly production at Casposo was 4,456 GEOs (2,765 gold ounces and 97,488 silver ounces), an increase of 4.0% from 4,283 GEOs (2,780 gold ounces and 108,314 silver ounces) in Q4 2025, following the commissioning phase completed in Q3 2025.

During the quarter, production was primarily sourced from stockpiles, with plant operations generally in line with budget. Operating performance was affected by variable reagent consumption as ongoing metallurgical adjustments continued, while tailings washing and filtration performance remained stable throughout the quarter.

Mine activities focused on open pit development at Mercado and Julieta. Operations were impacted by lower equipment productivity, material handling constraints and sequencing delays. These impacts were partially offset by mine planning optimisation work completed during the quarter, which improved alignment between medium-term and short-term mine plans.

C1 cash cost was US\$1,456 per GEO, compared with US\$1,387 per GEO in Q4 2025. All-in sustaining cost (AISC) was US\$1,638 per GEO, compared with US\$1,650 per GEO in Q4 2025.

Toll Processing Agreement

During the quarter, ASX-listed Challenger Gold Limited submitted a tolling request to commence delivery of material to Casposo, enabling the establishment of stockpiles ahead of the start of tolling operations. Processing of material from Hualilán is expected to commence in Q2 2026.

Exploration

During Q1 2026, exploration activities focused on designing the short- and long-term programs. Across all targets, planned programs include geological studies, surface sampling, trench and channel sampling (including chip and diamond-saw methods), and drilling.

Brownfield Projects

The next three targets are being assessed for their potential to support additional open-pit mining.

Casposo Norte

Casposo Norte is defined by an east-west-oriented structure that was historically exploited via a shallow open pit. The structure remains open along strike and at depth. The planned drilling program is designed to evaluate these extensions.

Aurora

The Aurora system comprises north-south-oriented structures that represent a second phase of mineralisation within the Casposo District. Drill pads have been designed, and a drilling program is planned to commence in Q3 2026.

Amanda

Given its proximity to Mercado and the mine's main infrastructure, the Amanda sector has been prioritised within the exploration program. The area exhibits accessible zones and surface mineralisation, supporting further evaluation. A drilling program is planned to assess the potential for mineralisation and is scheduled to commence in Q2 2026.

Greenfield Projects

Conceptual exploration models have been developed for each target. Drilling is required to assess the continuity of mineralisation at depth and along strike, with potential for both open-pit and underground mining methods.

Cerro Amarillo

Preparation of a tender process for geophysical surveys at the Cerro Amarillo exploration area progressed during the quarter. The process includes both domestic and international contractors. Contract award is targeted for Q2 2026, with program commencement expected thereafter.
