The selectors have reaffirmed their faith in Harmanpreet Kaur by retaining her as captain of the Indian women's cricket team for the 2023 Asian Games in Japan, brushing aside the disappointment of the team's early exit from the ICC Women's T20 World Cup in England.

The 15-member squad, announced on Tuesday, is largely unchanged from the World Cup contingent, with Smriti Mandhana continuing as vice-captain as India gear up to defend the historic gold medal won at the 2013 Asian Games in Bangladesh.

The only change to the World Cup squad is the inclusion of young wicket-keeper-batter G Kamalini in place of Tasfia Bhutta. All-rounder Shreyanka Patil, who suffered an ankle injury during the World Cup, has been named subject to fitness clearance.

Shreyas keeps Sooryavanshi debut under wraps

DURHAM: India captain Shreyas Iyer refused to confirm whether teenage batting sensation Vaidhvi Sooryavanshi will make his international debut in the opening T20 against England on Wednesday, saying the team management would keep its playing combination confidential.

Addressing the media ahead of the series opener at Chester-le-Street, Shreyas praised the 15-year-old but declined to reveal if he would feature in the playing XI.

"You never know what is going to happen. Our team combination is something we discuss internally and can't reveal in the opposition," Shreyas said, adding that Sooryavanshi is "a brilliant talent" who will "certainly" emerge if he is selected.

The five-match series begins at Chester-le-Street with India yet to reveal their playing XI. Captain Shreyas Iyer had earlier declined to confirm whether Sooryavanshi would feature in the opening game.

England batter Harry Brook said the hosts have analysed the young left-hander extensively and are ready if he is selected. "We've got our tactics and

Wimbledon 2026: Swiatek survives Townsend scare, Anisimova and Pliskova advance

Defending champion Iga Swiatek survived a scare from American Taylor Townsend to reach the second round of Wimbledon 2026, while Amanda Anisimova and Karolina Pliskova also progressed with straight-set victories on Tuesday.

The world No 1 made a blistering start on Centre Court, taking the opening set in just 31 minutes. However, Townsend, backed by friends Naomi Osaka and Katerina Nikolic from the stands, fought back strongly to level the contest before Swiatek regained control to seal a 6-1, 2-0, 6-0 victory in two hours and two minutes.

Swiatek avoided becoming only the third defending women's singles champion to lose in the first round at Wimbledon, following Stefania Graf in 1994 and Martina Navratilova in 1995.

Last year's runner-up Amanda Anisimova began her campaign in commanding fashion, defeating Maria Sakkari in a straight-sets victory to reach the second round.

Former world No 1 Karolina Pliskova also advanced, registering her first Wimbledon main-draw victory since 2012 with a 6-3, 6-4 win over fellow Czech Tereza Smitkova.

Swiatek's victory was a testament to her resilience and skill, as she overcame a tough start to secure a comfortable win. Townsend's performance was a highlight for the underdog, showing her growth as a player.

Anisimova's win was a significant step for her, as she continued to build on her success from last year. Pliskova's victory was a morale booster for the Czech team.

Zim script history with record Test win over B'desh

Zimbabwe registered the biggest victory in their Test history, crushing Bangladesh by an innings and 85 runs in the one-off Test at the Harare Sports Club on Tuesday.

After electing to bowl, Zimbabwe's pace attack dismantled Bangladesh for just 40 in the first innings. Muttiah Muralitharan fought a lone battle while New Zealand's Nathan Aspinall starred with 4/61. Captain Blinman Ngarava, Blessing Muzaranda

and Brad Evans chipped in with two wickets apiece. Zimbabwe then seized control, with international cricketer, surpassing the record held by Sachin Tendulkar, who made his international debut at the age of 16.

Aussies cruise into Women's T20 WC final

Six-time champions Australia stormed into another ICC Women's T20 World Cup final after defeating West Indies by eight wickets in a one-sided first semifinal at The Oval on Tuesday.

After reclaiming West Indies to 137/6, Australia closed down the target with ease, reaching 127/2 with seven overs to spare to book their place in a record eighth final in 10 editions of the tournament.

Both Mooney anchored the chase with an unbeaten 61 off 36 balls, registering her eighth Women's T20 World Cup final-century to equal New Zealand great Suzie Bates' tournament record. Wimbledon 2026: Swiatek survives Townsend scare, Anisimova and Pliskova advance

Defending champion Iga Swiatek overcame a stern challenge from American Taylor Townsend to reach the second round of Wimbledon 2026, while Amanda Anisimova and Karolina Pliskova also progressed with straight-set victories on Tuesday.

The world No 1 made a blistering start on Centre Court, taking the opening set

in just 21 minutes. However, Townsend, backed by friends Naomi Osaka and Victoria Siimola from the stands, fought back strongly to level the contest before Swiatek regained control to seal a 6-1, 2-6, 6-0 victory in two hours and two minutes.

Swiatek avoided becoming only the third defending women's singles champion to lose in the first round at Wimbledon, following Stefani Graf in 1994 and Martina Hingis in 2003.

Last year's runner-up Amanda Anisimova began her campaign to defend her title by defeating North Macedonian Lina Gjorcheska 6-4, 6-2 in just over an hour to comfortably book her place in the second round.

Former world No 1 Karolina Pliskova also advanced, registering her first Wimbledon main-draw victory since 2022 with a 6-4, 6-4 win over fellow Czech Tereza Vulcova.
