HIGHLIGHTS

- **Infill RC drilling program completed for Mineral Resource Estimate Upgrade.**
- **Geotechnical program completed for Mine Design inputs.**

Audalia Resources Limited (ASX: **ACP**) ("the Company") is pleased to present its report for the September 2025 quarter.

MEDCALF PROJECT

The Medcalf Project is a vanadium-titanium-iron project located some 470 kilometres south east of Perth near Lake Johnston, Western Australia. The Medcalf Project comprises of one granted exploration licence E63/1855, two miscellaneous licences L63/75 and L63/94 and two General Purpose licences G63/10 and G63/12 as well as mining lease M63/656. Together these licences cover a total area of 38 km².

The Medcalf Project lies in the southern end of the Archaean Lake Johnston greenstone belt. This greenstone belt is a narrow, north-northwest trending belt approximately 110 km in length. It is located near the south margin of the Yilgarn Craton, midway between the southern ends of the Norseman-Wiluna and the Forrestania-Southern Cross greenstone belts.

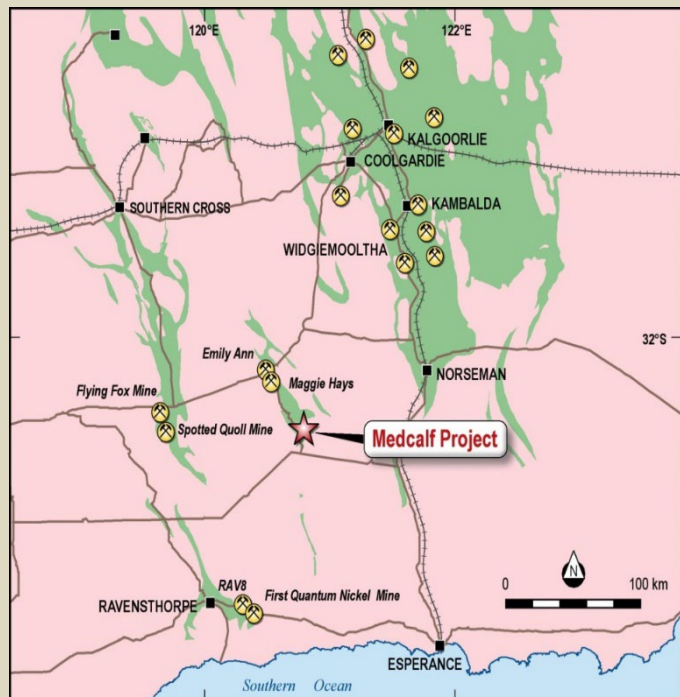


Figure 1: Medcalf Project - Location Map

Project Update

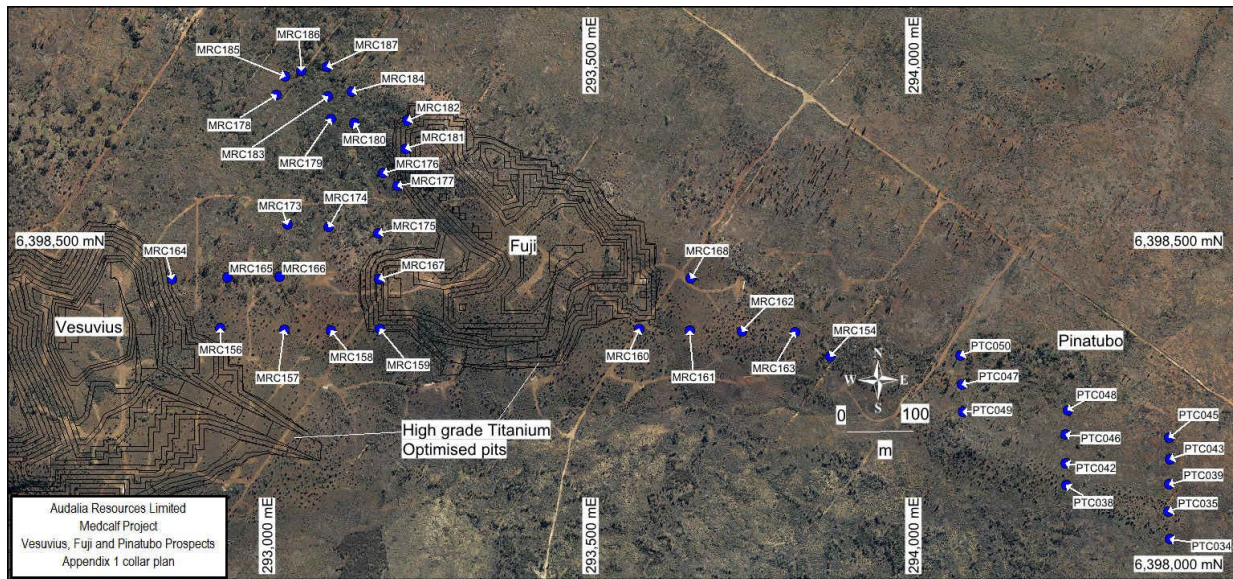


Figure 2 – Vesuvius, Fuji and Pinatubo drill hole location plan

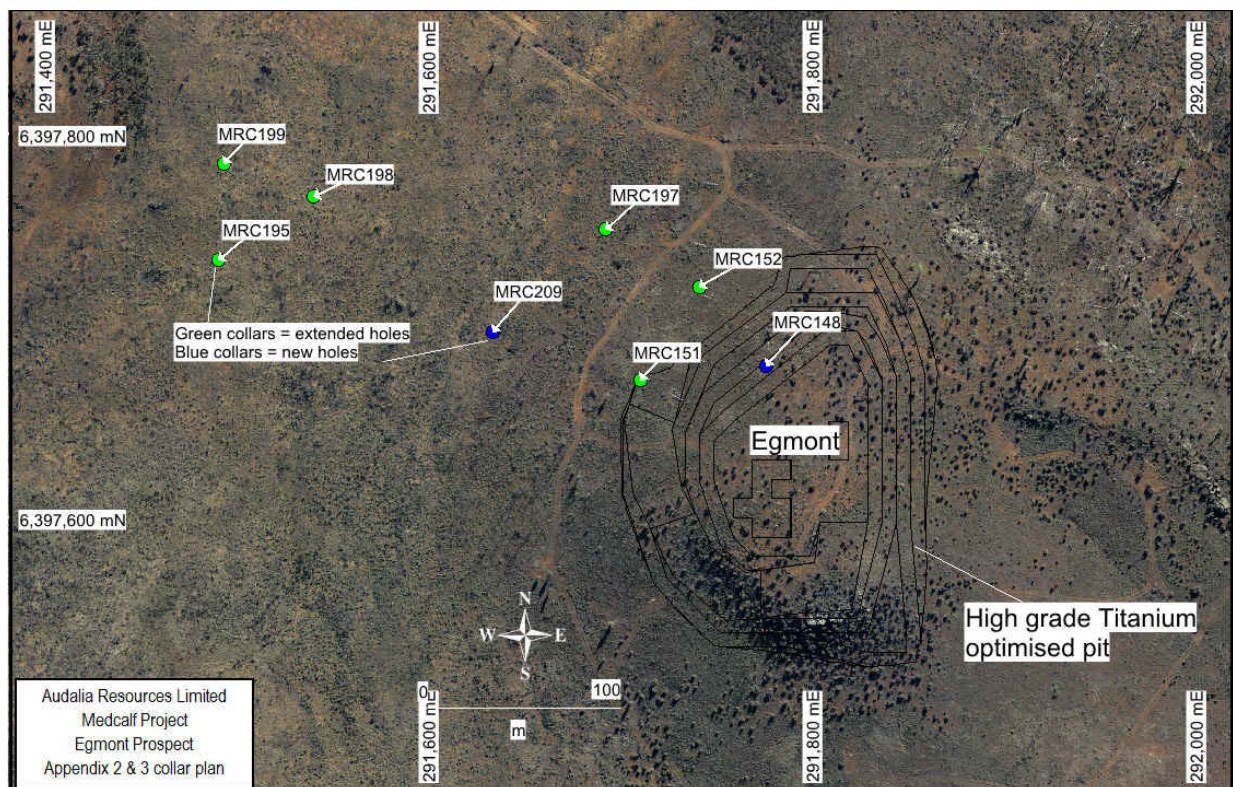


Figure 3 – Egmont drill location plan

During the September quarter, a RC drill infill program was completed at the main prospect area of Vesuvius, Fuji and Pinatubo. A total of 49 holes were drilled for 1,643m (Figures 2 & 3). A PQ core geotechnical program was also completed after the RC program. A total of 10 holes were drilled for 525.7m

RC infill program

The RC program designed by Cube Consulting is to upgrade the Inferred Resource category (highlighted in yellow) of the last reported JORC (2012) Resource shown in Table 1 below (Refer to the Company's ASX announcement dated 15 March 2022).

Table 1 – Current Mineral Resource Estimate. Note Fuji and Pinatubo prospects are combined in the Vesuvius total.

A total of 77 holes for 2,589m (including Egmont holes drilled in the December 2025 quarter) have been drilled for the Mineral Resource Upgrade (Table 2). All drill hole collars have been surveyed, and as at the end of the quarter, we were awaiting assay results from Intertek for the one-metre downhole samples.

All data including lithology has been handed to Cube Consulting to merge and complete an updated Mineral Resource estimate that will be completed next quarter.

Geotechnical Drill program

A geotechnical drill program designed by WML consultants was drilled by DDH1 Drilling after the completion of the RC infill drill program. A total of 9 PQ core holes for 500.7m was drilled for the geotechnical programs additional hole and one drilled to 25m for metallurgical testwork

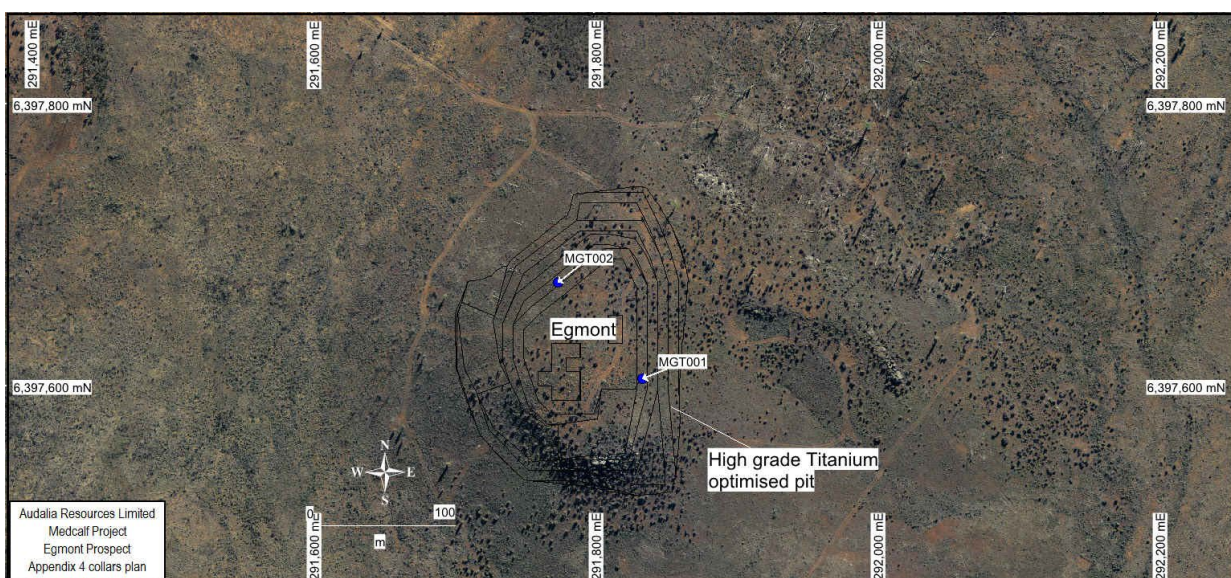


Figure 4- Egmont Geotechnical holes location plan

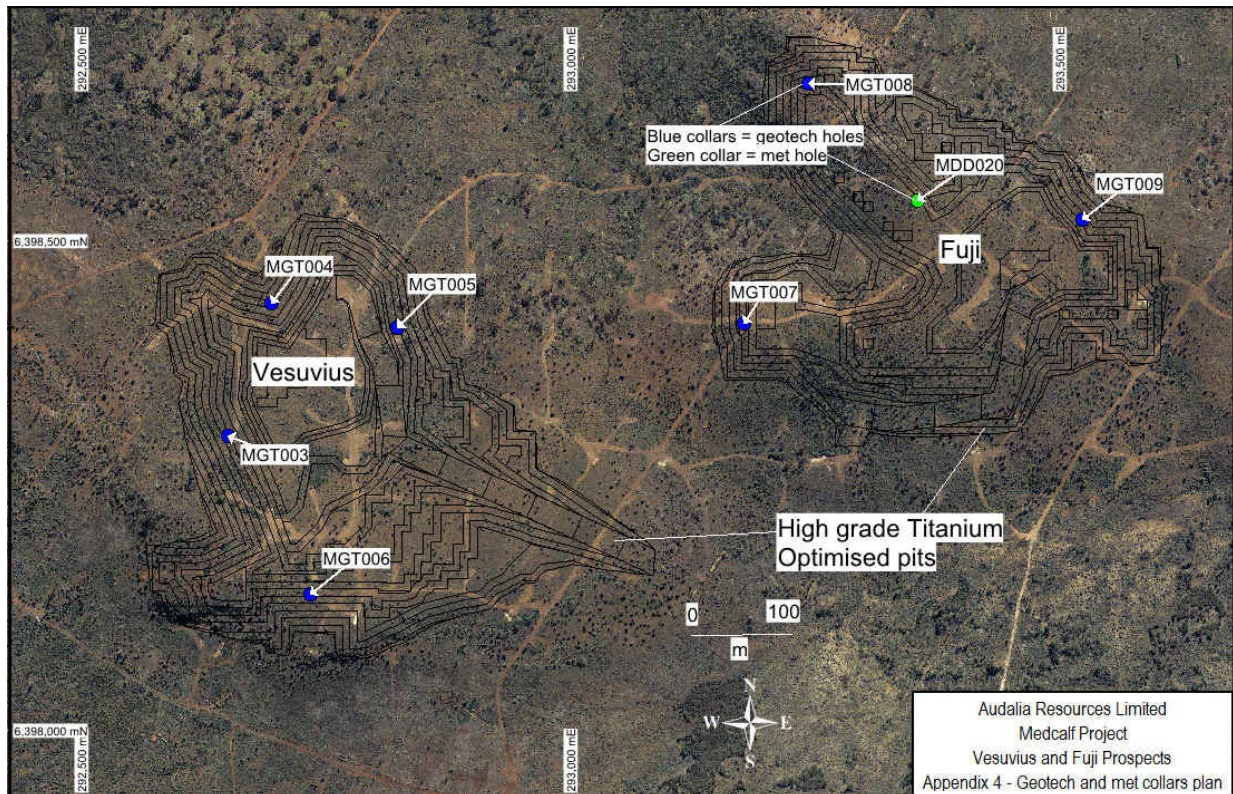


Figure 5- Vesuvius and Fuji Geotechnical holes and metallurgical hole location plan

The core was photographed and geotechnical logged on site and then transported back to a storage facility in Perth.

WML are currently assessing the data and finalising their report on the recommended pit slopes for the mine design that will form part of the mining approval.

Metallurgical program

Concurrently, a metallurgical testwork program designed by KeypointE Pty Ltd is underway at ALS laboratories to prepare the PQ core drilled from the Geotechnical program into defined intervals based on geology and metallurgy for size fraction testwork to be completed at AML.

Other Activities

The Company remains committed to obtain the remaining regulatory approvals and permits required to support the development of the project, including mining, crushing and screening operations to produce a high grade titanium and vanadium ore to the Asian markets.

The Company is advancing on negotiations with potential offtake partners and potential financiers for company or project level financing.

CORPORATE MATTERS

The Company had cash and cash equivalents as at 30 September 2025 of \$602,000 (30 June 2025: \$586,000) following payments for capitalised exploration and evaluation expenditure of \$464,000 (Q4 2025: \$372,000) and payments to related parties and their associates of \$23,000 (Q4 2025: \$46,000) during the September 2025 quarter.

	Answer: Audalia is in the exploration and evaluation phase of its flagship Medcalf Project and as a result, expects to have negative operating cash flows for the time being.

	Answer: Audalia manages its cash flow through ongoing budgeting, forecasting and financial reporting processes, using that information to make decisions about the Company's activities and to determine the form and timing of funding for those activities. Audalia has been able to demonstrate a record of securing funds when required (refer to ASX announcements dated 1 October 2025 – Completion of Placement of \$500,000, 11 November 2024 – Completion of Placement of \$2,000,000, 30 November 2020 - Completion of Placement of \$400,000, 28 September 2020 and 16 June 2020 - Funding Update, 6 March 2020 - Completion of Placement of \$360,000, 11 July 2019 – Update on funding and capital raising, 20 June 2018 – Shortfall on entitlement issue and 16 March 2018 – Update on Funding) and is confident that it will be able to continue to do so.
