The Cleansing Offer is being undertaken primarily for the purposes of section 708A(11) of the Corporations Act to remove any trading restrictions on the sale of certain Shares recently issued by the Company.

1 Details of the Cleansing Offer

1.1 The Cleansing Offer

The Company is offering, pursuant to this Prospectus, 1,000 new Shares (**New Shares**) each at an issue price of A\$0.004 per New Share (**Cleansing Offer**).

All of the New Shares offered under this Prospectus will rank equally with Shares on issue at the date of this Prospectus. Refer to Section 4.1 for a summary of the rights attaching to the New Shares.

The Company is only extending the Cleansing Offer to specific parties on invitation from the Directors. The Company will only provide Application Forms to these parties.

On 28 April 2026, the Company made the following announcements:

- (a) the Company provided a market update on the tenure status relating to its Niagara Bauxite and Simandou North Iron projects;
- (b) the Company signed a non-binding Memorandum of Understanding with Soguipami, the 100% Guinea government owned entity which is the equity partner in all Guinea mineral projects which proceed to mining, which has the potential to produce clarity around the status of the exploration permits;
- (c) the Company announced that its wholly owned subsidiary, Yarraloola Holdings Pty Ltd, had entered into an agreement with Skryne Hill Pty Ltd to acquire an 80% interest in the Yarraloola Project (**Yarraloola Acquisition**); and
- (d) the Company announced a placement to issue 562,500,000 new Shares at an issue price of A\$0.004 per Share to investors to raise approximately A\$2.25 million (before costs) (**Placement**).

Refer to the ASX announcements dated 28 April 2026 for further details in relation to the above matters.

The Placement will be conducted across two tranches:

- (a) Tranche 1 consists of a total of 131,000,000 new Shares issued pursuant to the Company's existing placement capacity under Listing Rule 7.1 (**Tranche 1 Placement Shares**). The Tranche 1 Placement Shares were issued on 6 May 2026. Refer to the Appendix 2A dated 6 May 2026 for further details on the Tranche 1 Placement Shares; and
- (b) Tranche 2 will consist of 431,500,000 new Shares (including Director participation), subject to receipt of shareholder approval to be sought at the Company's upcoming general meeting (**Tranche 2 Placement Shares**).

In addition to the Tranche 1 Placement Shares, the Company previously issued 23,809,524 Shares in respect of deferred consideration for Simandou North (**Simandou North Consideration Shares**). The Tranche 1 Placement Shares and the Simandou North Consideration Shares are together referred to as the **Relevant Shares**.

This Prospectus has been issued, and the Cleansing Offer is being undertaken, to facilitate the secondary trading of the Relevant Shares by the Company, as they were issued without disclosure under Part 6D.2 of the Corporations Act.

The Company will issue a further prospectus to facilitate the secondary trading of the Tranche 2 Placement Shares by the Company in due course.

1.2 Removal of Secondary Trading Restrictions

The Company is lodging this Prospectus to remove any trading restrictions that may have attached to the Relevant Shares that have not been offered for sale or sold.

Section 707(3) of the Corporations Act requires that a prospectus is issued in order for a person to whom securities were issued without disclosure under Part 6D of the Corporations Act to on-sell those securities within 12 months of the date of their issue.

Section 708A(11) of the Corporations Act provides an exemption from this general requirement where:

- (a) the relevant securities are in a class of securities of the company that are already quoted on ASX;
- (b) a prospectus is lodged with ASIC either:
 - (i) on or after the day on which the relevant securities were issued but before the day on which the sale offer is made; or
 - (ii) before the day on which the relevant securities are issued and offers of securities that have been made under the prospectus are still open for acceptance on the day on which the relevant securities were issued; and
- (c) the prospectus is for an offer of securities issued by the company that are in the same class of securities as the relevant securities.

The Company is seeking to raise only a nominal amount of \$4 (before expenses) under this Prospectus and, accordingly, the purpose of this Prospectus is not to raise capital.

1.3 **Purpose of this Prospectus**

The purpose of this Prospectus is to:

- (a) make the Cleansing Offer; and
- (b) ensure that the on-sale of the Relevant Shares does not breach section 707(3) of the Corporations Act by relying on the exemption to the secondary trading provisions in section 708A(11) of the Corporations Act.

1.4 **Minimum subscription**

There is no minimum amount to be raised under the Cleansing Offer.

1.5 **Closing Date**

The closing date for the Cleansing Offer is 5:00pm (AWST) on 7 May 2026 (**Closing Date**) or such other date as the Directors in their absolute discretion shall determine, subject to the requirements of the Listing Rules.

The Company reserves the right, subject to the Corporations Act and the Listing Rules to extend the Closing Date without prior notice. If the Closing Date is varied, subsequent dates may also be varied accordingly.

1.6 **Application Forms**

The Company will send this Prospectus, together with the Application Form, to selected persons whom the Directors determine are eligible to participate in the Cleansing Offer.

If you wish to subscribe for New Shares under the Cleansing Offer, you should complete and return the Application Form, which will be provided with a copy of this Prospectus by the Company at the Company's discretion, in accordance with the instructions in the Application Form.

If you are in doubt as to the course of action, you should consult your professional advisor.

Acceptance of a completed Application Form by the Company creates a legally binding contract between the Applicant and the Company for the number of New Shares accepted by the Company. The Application Form does not need to be signed to be a binding Acceptance of New Shares.

If the Application Form is not completed correctly, it may still be treated as valid. The Directors' decision as to whether to treat the Acceptance as valid and how to construe, amend or complete the Application Form is final.

1.7 Issue and Dispatch

All New Shares under the Cleansing Offer are expected to be issued on or before the dates specified in the proposed timetable.

It is the responsibility of Applicants to determine their allocation prior to trading in New Shares. Applicants who sell New Shares before they receive their holding statements will do so at their own risk.

1.8 Application Monies held on trust

All Application Monies received for the New Shares will be held on trust in a bank account maintained solely for the purpose of depositing Application Monies received pursuant to this Prospectus until the New Shares are issued. All Application Monies will be returned (without interest) if the New Shares are not issued.

1.9 ASX quotation

Application for Official Quotation of the New Shares offered pursuant to this Prospectus will be made within seven days of the date of this Prospectus.

If the New Shares are not admitted to Official Quotation by ASX before the expiration of three months after the date of issue of this Prospectus, or such period as varied by ASIC, the Company will not issue any New Shares and will repay all Application Monies for the New Shares within the time prescribed under the Corporations Act without interest.

ASX takes no responsibility for the contents of this Prospectus. The fact that ASX may grant Official Quotation to the New Shares is not to be taken in any way as an indication of the merits of the Company or the New Shares now offered for subscription.

1.10 CHESS

The Company participates in the Clearing House Electronic Sub-Register System, known as CHESS. ASX Settlement, a wholly owned subsidiary of ASX, operates CHESS in accordance with the Listing Rules and ASX Settlement Operating Rules.

Under CHESS, Applicants will not receive a certificate but will receive a statement of their holding of Shares. If you are broker sponsored, ASX Settlement will send you a CHESS statement.

The CHESS statement will set out the number of New Shares issued under this Prospectus, provide details of your holder identification number, the participant identification number of the sponsor and the terms and conditions applicable to the New Shares.

If you are registered on the Issuer Sponsored subregister, your statement will be dispatched by the Company's share registry and will contain the number of New Shares issued to you under this Prospectus and your security holder reference number.

A CHESS statement or Issuer Sponsored statement will routinely be sent to Shareholders at the end of any calendar month during which the balance of their Shareholding changes. Shareholders may request a statement at any other time; however, a charge may be made for additional statements.

1.11 Applicants outside Australia

This Prospectus and any accompanying Application Form do not, and are not intended to, constitute an offer of New Shares in any place or jurisdiction in which, or to any person to whom, it would not be lawful to make such an offer or to issue this Prospectus or the New Shares. The distribution of this Prospectus in jurisdictions outside Australia may be restricted by law and persons who come into possession of this Prospectus should seek advice on and observe any such restrictions. Any failure to comply with such restrictions may constitute a violation of applicable securities laws.

1.12 **Withdrawal**

The Directors may at any time decide to withdraw this Prospectus and the Cleansing Offer, in which case, the Company will return all Application Monies (without interest) in accordance with the Corporations Act.

1.13 **Risk factors**

An investment in New Shares under this Prospectus should be regarded as speculative. In addition to the general risks applicable to all investments in listed securities, there are specific risks associated with an investment in the Company, which are detailed in Section 3.

1.14 **Taxation implications**

The Directors do not consider it appropriate to give Applicants advice regarding the taxation consequences of subscribing for New Shares under the Cleansing Offer.

The Company, its advisers and its officers do not accept any responsibility or liability for any such taxation consequences to Applicants. As a result, Applicants should consult their professional tax adviser in connection with subscribing for New Shares under the Cleansing Offer.

1.15 **Major Activities and Financial Information**

A summary of the major activities and financial information relating to the Company can be found in the Company's consolidated financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2025 lodged with ASX on 9 March 2026 (**Annual Financial Report**). The Company has issued continuous disclosure notices (i.e. ASX announcements) since the lodgement of its Annual Financial Report.

The Company's continuous disclosure notices (i.e. ASX announcements) since the lodgement of its Annual Financial Report are detailed in Section 4.3.

Copies of the Annual Financial Report and continuous disclosure notices since the lodgement of the Annual Financial Report are available free of charge from the Company. The Directors strongly recommend that Applicants review these documents and all other announcements prior to deciding whether or not to participate in the Cleansing Offer.

1.16 **Privacy**

The Company collects information about each Applicant provided on an Application Form for the purposes of processing the Acceptance and, if the Acceptance is successful, to administer the Applicant's security holding in the Company.

By submitting an Application Form, each Applicant agrees that the Company may use the information provided by an Applicant on the Application Form for the purposes set out in this privacy disclosure statement and may disclose it for those purposes to the share registry, the Company's or its subsidiaries' agents, contractors and third party service providers, including mailing houses and professional advisers, and to ASX and regulatory authorities.

If you do not provide the information required on the Application Form, the Company may not be able to accept or process your Acceptance.

The information may also be used from time to time and disclosed to persons inspecting the register, bidders for securities in the context of takeovers, regulatory bodies, including the Australian Taxation Office, authorised securities brokers, print service providers, mail houses and the Company's share registry.

2.1 Effect on the Capital Structure

2.2 Effect of the Cleansing Offer on the Company

After paying for the expenses of the Cleansing Offer of approximately A\$8,206, there will be no proceeds from the Cleansing Offer. The expenses of the Cleansing Offer exceeding A\$4 (being the amount raised if the Cleansing Offer is fully subscribed) will be met from the Company's existing cash reserves.

The Cleansing Offer will have a minimal effect on the Company's financial position, being receipt of funds of A\$4 less the costs of preparing this Prospectus.

2.3 Market price of Shares

The Shares have been suspended since 21 May 2025. The last price of the Shares was \$0.02.

2.4 Dividend policy

The Directors are not able to say when and if dividends will be paid in the future, as the payment of any dividends will depend on the future profitability, financial position and cash requirements of the Company.

3 Risk Factors

The New Shares offered under this Prospectus are considered highly speculative. The proposed future activities of the Company are subject to a number of risks and other factors that may affect its future performance. Some of these risks can be mitigated by the use of safeguards and appropriate controls. However, many of the risks are outside the control of the Directors and management of the Company and cannot be mitigated.

The risks described in this Section 3 are not an exhaustive list of the risks faced by the Company or by investors in the Company. This Section 3 should be considered in conjunction with other information in this Prospectus. The risks described, and others not specifically referred to, in this Section 3 may in the future materially affect the financial performance and position of the Company and the value of the New Shares offered under this Prospectus. The New Shares to be issued pursuant to this Prospectus carry no guarantee with respect to the payment of dividends, return of capital or the market value of those New Shares. The risks described in this Section 3 also necessarily include forward looking statements. Actual events may be materially different to those described and may therefore affect the Company in a different way.

Investors should be aware that the performance of the Company may be affected and the value of its securities may rise or fall over any given period. None of the Directors or any person associated with the Company guarantees the Company's performance, the performance of the securities or the market price at which the securities will trade. The Directors strongly recommend that potential investors consider the risks detailed in this Section 3, together with information contained elsewhere in this Prospectus, and consult their professional advisers, before they decide whether to apply for securities.

3.1 Company Specific Risks

(a) Tenure, access and grant of applications

Mining and exploration tenements are subject to periodic renewal. There is no guarantee that tenements will be renewed (nor that tenement applications will be granted). There is a risk that applications for tenements within the Company's projects may not be granted.

During May 2025, media announcements were made by government spokespersons in Guinea concerning the potential cancellation of numerous exploration permits. The permits associated with the Niagara Bauxite and Simandou North Iron projects were included in two consecutive media announcements as pending cancellation or withdrawal. Despite these reports, the Company has not received any formal communication from the Guinean government regarding changes to the status of its exploration permits. The Company remains actively engaged with the Ministry of Mines and Geology, as well as other relevant authorities, to seek clarification regarding the status of the Company's exploration permits in Guinea.

On 28 April 2026, the Company announced that it had signed a non-binding Memorandum of Understanding with Soguipami, the 100% Guinea government owned entity which is the equity partner in all Guinea mineral projects which proceed to mining, which has the potential to produce clarity around the status of the exploration permits. While the Memorandum of Understanding with Soguipami is non-binding, it represents a mutual intent to engage to enable the timely clarification of tenure status relating to the Niagara and Simandou North projects and explore additional projects opportunities. The timing and nature of any resolution of the status of the Niagara and Simandou North projects is not clear, and, as a result, significant uncertainty remains.

The Company's projects are subject to relevant mining legislation. The renewal of the term of a granted tenement is also subject to government discretion, the Company's ability to meet the conditions imposed by relevant authorities is not certain, including compliance with the Company's work program requirements which, in turn, is dependent on the Company being sufficiently funded to meet those expenditure requirements. Renewal conditions may include increased expenditure and work commitments or compulsory relinquishment of areas of the tenements comprising the Company's projects. The imposition of new conditions or the inability to meet those conditions may adversely affect the operations, financial position and/or performance of the Company.

There is no assurance that such renewals will be given as a matter of course and there is no assurance that new conditions will not be imposed by the relevant granting authority. The consequence of forfeiture or involuntary surrender of a granted tenement for reasons beyond the control of the Company could be significant.

Pursuant to the tenements comprising the Company's projects, the Company is subject to payment and other obligations. In particular, tenement holders are required to expend the funds necessary to meet the minimum work commitments attaching to the tenements. Failure to meet these work commitments may render the tenement liable to be cancelled or its size reduced.

Further, if any contractual obligations are not complied with when due, in addition to any other remedies that may be available to other parties, this could result in dilution or forfeiture of the Company's interest in its projects.

There is a risk of inability to access the land required for operations on tenements. This may, for example, be as a result of weather, environmental restraints, native title, landholder's activities, regulatory or third party objections or other factors. Such difficulties may cause delays and cost overruns (and may prevent the carrying out of activities on tenements).

Interests in tenure may also be compromised or lost due to third party interests or claims.

(b) The Company has no history of earnings and no production or revenues

The Company has no history of earnings, and does not have any producing mining operations. The Company has experienced losses from exploration activities and the Company expects to continue to incur losses. No assurance can be given that the Company will be able to economically exploit any mineral deposit or enter into production.

The Company expects to continue to incur losses from exploration, studies and development activities in the foreseeable future.

(c) Future capital requirements

The Company's capital requirements depend on numerous factors. The Company will require further financing in addition to amounts raised under the Placement.

Additional funding will be required and may be raised by the Company via the issues of equity, debt or a combination of debt and equity or asset sales. Any additional equity financing will dilute shareholdings, and debt financing, if available, may involve restrictions on financing and operating activities. If the Company is unable to obtain additional financing as needed, it may be required to reduce the scope of its proposed operations and scale back its exploration, studies and development programmes as the case may be. There is no guarantee that the Company will be able to secure any additional funding or be able to secure funding on terms favourable to the Company.

If the Company is unable to obtain additional financing as needed, it may be required to reduce, delay or suspend its operations and this could have a material adverse effect on the Company's activities and could affect the Company's ability to continue as a going concern or remain solvent.

(d) Reliance on key personnel

The Company is reliant on a number of key personnel and consultants. The loss of one or more of these key contributors could have an adverse impact on the business of the Company. It may be difficult for the Company to continue to attract and retain suitably qualified and experienced people.

(e) New projects and acquisitions

On 28 April 2026, the Company announced that its wholly owned subsidiary, Yarraloola Holdings Pty Ltd, had entered into an agreement with Skryne Hill Pty Ltd to acquire an 80% interest in the Yarraloola Copper Project. Completion of the Yarraloola Acquisition is expected to occur in June 2026.

In addition to the Yarraloola Acquisition, the Company may make other acquisitions in the future as part of future growth plans. In this regard, the Directors will use their expertise and experience in the resources sector to assess the value of potential projects that have characteristics that the Directors consider are likely to provide returns to Shareholders.

There can be no guarantee that the Yarraloola Acquisition or any new project acquisition or investment will eventuate from these pursuits, or that any acquisitions will result in a return for Shareholders. Such acquisitions may result in use of the Company's cash resources and/or the issuance of equity securities, which will dilute shareholdings.

(f) **Sovereign risk**

Up to the time of the completion of the acquisition of the 80% interest in the Yarraloola Project, located in the Pilbara region of Western Australia (referred to above), the Company's core focus was mineral tenure located in Guinea. Changes may occur in the political, fiscal and legal systems which may affect the ownership or operations of the Company such as changes in exchange rates, control or fiscal regulations, regulatory regimes, political insurrection or labour unrest, inflation or economic recession.

During May 2025, media announcements were made by government spokespersons in Guinea concerning the potential cancellation of numerous exploration permits. The permits associated with the Niagara Bauxite and Simandou North Iron projects were included in two consecutive media announcements as pending cancellation or withdrawal. Despite these reports, the Company has not received any formal communication from the Guinean government regarding changes to the status of its exploration permits. The Company remains actively engaged with the Ministry of Mines and Geology, as well as other relevant authorities, to seek clarification regarding the status of the Company's exploration permits in Guinea.

On 28 April 2026, the Company announced that it had signed a non-binding Memorandum of Understanding with Soguijami, the 100% Guinea government owned entity which is the equity partner in all Guinea mineral projects which proceed to mining, which has the potential to produce clarity around the status of the Company's exploration permits.

(g) **Native title, land access and heritage risks**

The *Native Title Act 1993* (Cth) (**Native Title Act**) recognises and protects the rights and interests in Australia of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in land and waters, according to their traditional laws and customs. There is significant uncertainty associated with native title in Australia and this may impact on the Company's operations (assuming completion of the Yarraloola Acquisition) and future plans.

Native title can be extinguished by valid grants of land (such as freehold title) or waters to people other than the native title holders or by valid use of land or waters. It can also be extinguished if the indigenous group has lost its connection with the relevant land or waters. Native title is not necessarily extinguished by the grant of mining leases, although a valid mining lease prevails over native title to the extent of any inconsistency for the duration of the title.

Tenements granted before 1 January 1994 are valid or validated by the Native Title Act.

For tenements to be validly granted (or renewed) after 1 January 1994, the future act regime established by the Native Title Act must be complied with.

The existence of a native title claim is not an indication that native title in fact exists on the land covered by the claim, as this is a matter ultimately determined by the Federal Court. The lack of a native title claim is not an indication that native title does not exist on the land which is not currently the subject of a claim.

Land access is critical for exploration and evaluation to succeed. Access to land for exploration purposes can be affected by land ownership, including private (freehold) land, pastoral lease and regulatory requirements within the jurisdictions where the Company operates.

The Company must also comply with Aboriginal heritage legislation requirements, which require certain due diligence investigations to be undertaken ahead of the commencement of exploration and mining. This due diligence may include, in certain circumstances, the conduct of Aboriginal heritage surveys.

3.2 Industry Specific Risks

(a) Nature of mineral exploration and mining

The business of mineral exploration, development and production is subject to risk by its nature. Shareholders should understand that mineral exploration, development and mining are high-risk enterprises, only occasionally providing high rewards (with no guarantee of ever becoming producing assets).

The success of the Company depends, among other things, on successful exploration, feasibility of projects, securing and maintaining title to tenements and consents, successful design, construction, commissioning and operating of mining and processing facilities, successful development and production in accordance with forecasts and successful management of the operations. Exploration and mining activities may also be hampered by force majeure circumstances, land claims and unforeseen mining problems.

There is no assurance that exploration and development of the mineral tenement interests currently owned by the Company, or any other projects that may be acquired in the future, will result in the discovery of mineral deposits which are capable of being exploited economically. Even if an apparently viable deposit is identified, there is no guarantee that it can be profitably exploited. If such commercial viability is never attained, the Company may seek to transfer its property interests or otherwise realise value, or the Company may even be required to abandon its business and fail as a “going concern”.

Whether a mineral deposit will be commercially viable depends on a number of factors, which include, without limitation, the particular attributes of the deposit, such as size, grade and proximity to infrastructure, metal prices, which fluctuate widely, and government regulations, including, without limitation, regulations relating to prices, taxes, royalties, land tenure, land use, exporting of minerals and environmental protection. The combination of these factors may result in the Company expending significant resources (financial and otherwise) on tenements without receiving a return. There is no certainty that expenditures made by the Company towards the search and evaluation of mineral deposits will result in discoveries of an economically viable mineral deposit.

The Company has relied on and may continue to rely on consultants and others for mineral exploration and exploitation expertise. The Company believes that those consultants and others are competent and that they have carried out their work in accordance with internationally recognised industry standards. However, if the work conducted by those consultants or others is ultimately found to be incorrect or inadequate in any material respect, the Company may experience delays or increased costs in exploring or developing its tenements.

(b) Results of studies

Subject to the results of any future exploration and testing programs, the Company may progressively undertake a number of studies in respect to the Company’s current projects or any new projects. These studies may include scoping studies, pre-feasibility studies and bankable feasibility studies.

These studies may not occur, but if they are completed, they would be prepared within certain parameters designed to determine the economic feasibility of the relevant project within certain limits. There can be no guarantee that any of the studies will confirm the economic viability of the Company’s projects or the results of other studies undertaken by the Company (e.g. the results of a feasibility study may materially differ to the results of a scoping study).

Further, even if a study determines the economics of the Company’s projects, there can be no guarantee that the projects will be successfully brought into production as assumed or within the estimated parameters in the feasibility study, once production commences including but not limited to operating costs, mineral recoveries and commodity prices.

In addition, the ability of the Company to complete a study would be dependent on the Company's ability to raise further funds to complete the study as required.

The completion and announcement of the results of the Scoping Study for the Niagara Bauxite and Simandou North Iron projects is subject to the Company obtaining clarification on the status of the exploration permits, along with the redisclosure of the Mineral Resource and Exploration Target for the Niagara Bauxite project and the Exploration Target for the Simandou North Iron project.

(c) Resource and Reserve estimates

Ore reserve and mineral resource estimates are expressions of judgment based on drilling results, past experience with mining properties, knowledge, experience, industry practice and many other factors. Estimates which are valid when made may change substantially when new information becomes available. Mineral resource and ore reserve estimation is an interpretive process based on available data and interpretations and thus estimations may prove to be inaccurate. The Company has no ore reserves. Further, there is no guarantee that any of the Company's projects will become feasible and consequently no forecast is made of whether or not any ore reserve will be defined in future.

The actual quality and characteristics of mineral deposits cannot be known until mining takes place and will almost always differ from the assumptions used to develop resources. Further, ore reserves are valued based on future costs and future prices and, consequently, the actual ore reserves and mineral resources may differ from those estimated, which may result in either a positive or negative effect on operations.

Should the Company encounter mineralisation or formations different from those predicted by past drilling, sampling and similar examinations, resource estimates may have to be adjusted and mining plans may have to be altered in a way which could adversely affect the Company's operations.

Due to the uncertainty regarding the status of the Niagara Bauxite tenement, the Company is not reporting a Mineral Resource for the Niagara Bauxite project until the status of the permits is resolved.

(d) Operational risks

The operations of the Company may be affected by various factors which are beyond the control of the Company, such as failure to locate or identify mineral deposits, failure to achieve predicted grades in exploration or mining, operational and technical difficulties encountered in exploration and mining, difficulties in commissioning and operating plant and equipment, mechanical failure or plant breakdown, unanticipated metallurgical problems which may affect extraction costs, adverse weather conditions, industrial and environmental accidents, industrial disputes and unexpected shortages, delays in procuring, or increases in the costs of consumables (including fuel), spare parts, plant and equipment, fire, explosions and other incidents beyond the control of the Company. The operations of the Company may also be affected by various other factors, including failures in internal controls and financial fraud.

These risks and hazards could also result in damage to, or destruction of, production facilities, personal injury, environmental damage, business interruption, monetary losses and possible legal liability. While the Company currently intends to maintain insurance within ranges of coverage consistent with industry practice, no assurance can be given that the Company will be able to obtain such insurance coverage at reasonable rates (or at all), or that any coverage it obtains will be adequate and available to cover any such claims.

(e) Mine development

No mines have been developed by the Company. Possible future development of mining operations at the Company's projects or other tenements applied for or acquired by the Company may not occur and is dependent on a number of factors including, but not limited to, the acquisition and/or delineation of economically recoverable mineralisation, favourable geological conditions, the grant of tenure, availability of funding on reasonable terms for such development and favourable mining, processing, metallurgical, infrastructure, economic, heritage, environmental, engineering, social, government, native

title and other legal matters and receiving the necessary approvals from all relevant authorities and parties.

If the Company commences production on any existing or future projects, its operations may be disrupted by a variety of risks and hazards which are beyond the control of the Company, such as weather patterns, unanticipated technical and operational difficulties encountered in exploration, development, extraction and production activities, mechanical failure of operating plant and equipment, shortages or increases in the price of consumables, spare parts and plant and equipment, cost overruns, access to the required level of funding and contracting risk from third parties providing essential services.

No assurance can be given that the Company will achieve commercial viability through the development of existing or future projects.

(f) **Metallurgical risks**

The economic viability of mineralisation depends on a number of factors such as the development of an economic process route for metal concentrates, which may or may not ultimately be successful. Further, changes in mineralogy may result in inconsistent metal recovery.

(g) **Environmental regulation risk**

The Company's projects are subject to laws and regulations regarding environmental matters. The governments and other authorities that administer and enforce environmental laws and regulations determine these requirements. As with all exploration projects and mining operations, the Company's activities are expected to have an impact on the environment, particularly, if they result in mine development.

The cost and complexity of complying with the applicable environmental laws and regulations may prevent the Company from being able to develop mineral deposits. There are also risks that the Company may breach environmental laws and regulations, with consequential adverse effects on the financial position and performance of the Company.

Further, the Company will require approvals from relevant authorities before it can undertake activities that are likely to impact the environment. Failure to obtain such approvals will prevent the Company from undertaking its desired activities. The Company is unable to predict the effect of additional environmental laws and regulations which may be adopted in the future, including whether any such laws or regulations would materially increase the Company's cost of doing business or affect its operations in any area.

There can be no assurances that new environmental laws, regulations or stricter enforcement policies, once implemented, will not oblige the Company to incur significant expenses and undertake significant investments which could have a material adverse effect on the Company's business, financial condition and results of operations.

(h) **Environmental liabilities risk**

The Company's activities are subject to potential risks and liabilities associated with (without limitation) the potential pollution of the environment and the necessary disposal of mining waste products resulting from mineral exploration and production. Insurance against environmental risk (including potential liability for pollution or other hazards as a result of the disposal of waste products occurring from exploration and production) is not generally available to the Company (or to other companies in the minerals industry) at a reasonable price. To the extent that the Company becomes subject to environmental liabilities, the satisfaction of any such liabilities would reduce funds otherwise available to the Company and could have a material adverse effect on the Company. Laws and regulations intended to ensure the protection of the environment are constantly changing and are generally becoming more restrictive.

(i) **Climate change risk**

There are a number of climate-related factors that may affect the operations and financial position of the Company. Climate change or prolonged periods of adverse weather and climatic conditions (including rising sea levels, floods, hail, drought, water, scarcity,

temperature extremes and earthquakes) may have an adverse effect of the Company's operations and/or the Company's future financial performance.

Changes in policy, technological innovation and/or consumer/investor preferences may also adversely impact the operations and financial position of the Company or may result in less favourable pricing for its product, particular in the event of a transition to a lower carbon economy.

(j) **Occupational Health and Safety Risk**

The Company is committed to providing a healthy and safe environment for its personnel, contractors and visitors. However, exploration, development and other mining industry activities have inherent risks and hazards. While the Company provides appropriate instructions, equipment, preventative measures, first aid information and training to all stakeholders through its occupational, health and safety management systems, health and safety incidents may nevertheless occur. Any illness, personal injury, death or damage to property resulting from the Company's activities may lead to a claim against the Company.

3.3 **General Risks**

(a) **Securities investments**

There are risks associated with any securities investment.

There is no guarantee that an active trading market in the Shares will continue or that the price of Shares will increase. The prices at which Shares trade may fluctuate in response to a number of factors.

Further, the stock market is prone to price and volume fluctuations. There can be no guarantee that trading prices will be sustained. These factors may materially affect the market price of the Shares, regardless of the Company's operational performance.

Neither the Company nor the Directors warrant the future performance of the Company or any return on an investment in the Company.

(b) **Economic risk**

Changes in the general economic climate in which the Company operates may adversely affect the financial performance of the Company. Similarly, share market conditions may affect the value of the Company's quoted securities regardless of the Company's operating performance. Factors that may contribute to that general economic climate and the market price of Shares include, but are not limited to:

- (i) changes in government policies, taxation and other laws;
- (ii) the strength of the equity and share markets in Australia and throughout the world;
- (iii) movement in, or outlook on, exchange rates, interest rates and inflation rates;
- (iv) industrial disputes in Australia and overseas;
- (v) changes in investor sentiment toward particular market sectors or commodities;
- (vi) financial failure or default by an entity with which the Company may become involved in a contractual relationship; and
- (vii) natural disasters, social upheaval, war (such as impacts of the war in Ukraine, Gaza and the Middle East) or acts of terrorism.

(c) **Tax law and application**

The application of and changes in relevant tax laws (such as income tax, capital gains tax, goods and services tax (or equivalent), withholding tax and stamp duty), rules relating to deductible liabilities, or changes in the way those tax laws are interpreted, will or may impact the tax liabilities of the Company or the tax treatment of a Shareholder's investment. An interpretation or application of tax laws or regulations by a relevant tax authority that is

contrary to the Company's view of those laws may increase the amount of tax paid or payable by the Company.

Both the level and basis of tax may change. Any changes to the current rates of taxes and/or any changes in tax rules and tax arrangements may increase the amount of tax paid or payable by the Company and may also impact Shareholders.

(d) Commodity price volatility and exchange rate risks

The Company is exposed to the risks of commodity price volatility and exchange rate fluctuations increasing the Company's costs.

Also, if the Company achieves success leading to mineral production (which may not eventuate), the revenue it will derive through the sale of product will expose the potential income of the Company to commodity price and exchange rate risks.

Commodity prices and exchange rates fluctuate and are affected by numerous factors beyond the control of the Company.

(e) Dilution

In certain circumstances, the Directors may issue equity securities without any vote or action by Shareholders. When the Company issues equity securities, the percentage ownership of Shareholders may be reduced and diluted.

(f) Competition

Like many industries, the resources industry is subject to domestic and global competition. The Company has no influence or control over the activities or actions of its competitors and these activities or actions may positively or negatively affect the operating and financial performance of the Company's projects and business.

Many of these companies have greater financial and other resources than the Company and, as a result, may be in a better position to compete for future business opportunities. Many of the Company's competitors not only explore for and produce minerals, but also carry out refining operations and produce other products on a worldwide basis. There can be no assurance that the Company can compete effectively with these companies.

(g) Litigation risk

Legal proceedings may arise from time to time in the course of the Company's activities. Legal proceedings brought by third parties including but not limited to joint venture partners or employees could negatively impact the Company.

(h) Unforeseen expenses

The Company may incur unforeseen expenses. In those circumstances, the expenditure proposals of the Company may be adversely affected.

(i) Force Majeure

The Company's projects now or in the future may be adversely affected by risks outside the control of the Company such as labour unrest, civil disorder, war, subversive activities or sabotage, fires, floods, explosions or other catastrophes, epidemics or quarantine restrictions.

(j) Insurance

The Company intends to insure its operations in accordance with industry practice. However, insurance of all risks associated with exploration, development and mining activities is not always available and, where it is available, the cost may be prohibitively high. The occurrence of an event that is not covered or fully covered by insurance could have a material adverse effect on the business, financial condition and results of the Company.

(k) Change in regulations and regulatory risk

Any material adverse changes in government policies, legislation or shifts in political attitude in Guinea or Australia that affect mineral mining and exploration activities, tax laws, royalty regulations, government subsidies and environmental issues may affect the viability of a project or the Company. No assurance can be given that amendments to current laws and regulations or new rules and regulations will not be enacted, or that existing rules and regulations will not be applied in a manner which could substantially limit or affect the Company's business.

The Company's activities are subject to extensive laws and regulations relating to numerous matters such as regulatory and third party consents, conditions including environmental compliance and rehabilitation, taxation, employee relations, health and worker safety, waste disposal, protection of the environment, heritage matters, protection of endangered and protected species and other matters. The Company requires permits from regulatory authorities to authorise the Company's operations. These permits relate to matters such as exploration, development, production and rehabilitation activities.

Obtaining necessary permits can be a time-consuming process and there is a risk that the Company will not obtain these permits on acceptable terms, in a timely manner or at all. The costs and delays associated with obtaining necessary permits and complying with these permits and applicable laws and regulations could materially delay or restrict the Company from proceeding with the exploration or development of a project or the operation or development of a mine. Any failure to comply with applicable laws and regulations or permits, even if inadvertent, could result in material fines, penalties or other liabilities. In extreme cases, failure could result in suspension of the Company's activities or forfeiture of one or more tenements.

(l) Accounting standards

Australian Accounting Standards (**AAS**) are adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (**AASB**) and are not within the control of the Company and its Directors. The AASB may, from time to time, introduce new or refined AAS, which may affect the future measurement and recognition of key statement of profit or loss and statement of financial position items. There is also a risk that interpretation of existing AAS, including those relating to the measurement and recognition of key statement of profit or loss or statement of financial position items may differ. Any changes to the AAS or to the interpretation of those standards may have an adverse effect on the reported financial performance and position of the Company.

(m) Expected future events may not occur

Certain statements in this Prospectus (and in the Company's ASX announcements) constitute forward looking statements. Such forward looking statements involve known and unknown risks, uncertainties and other factors which may cause the actual results, performance and achievements of the Company to be materially different from any future results, performance or achievements expressed or implied by such forward looking statements. Given these uncertainties, prospective Shareholders should not place undue reliance on such forward-looking statements. In addition, under no circumstances should forward looking statements be regarded as a representation or warranty by the Company, or any other person referred to in this Prospectus, that a particular outcome or future event is guaranteed.

(n) Trading in securities of the Company may not be liquid

There is no guarantee that there will be an ongoing liquid market for securities of the Company. Accordingly, there is a risk that, should the market for Company's securities become illiquid, the Shareholders will be unable to realise their investment in the Company.

3.4 Investment Speculative

The above list of risk factors ought not to be taken as exhaustive of the risks faced by the Company or by investors in the Company. The above factors, and others not specifically referred to above, may in the future materially affect the financial performance of the Company and the value of the New Shares offered under this Prospectus. Therefore, the New Shares to be issued pursuant to this Prospectus carry no guarantee with respect to the payment of dividends, returns of capital or the market value of those New Shares. Potential investors should consider that the investment in

the Company is speculative and should consult their professional adviser before deciding whether to apply for the New Shares pursuant to this Prospectus.

4 Additional Information

4.1 Rights and Liabilities Attaching to New Shares

A summary of the rights attaching to Shares is set out below. The New Shares issued under this Prospectus will rank *pari passu* in all respects with existing Shares. This summary is qualified by the full terms of the Company's Constitution and does not purport to be exhaustive or to constitute a definitive statement of the rights and liabilities of Shareholders. These rights and liabilities can involve complex questions of law arising from an interaction of the Company's Constitution with statutory and common law requirements. For a Shareholder to obtain a definitive assessment of the rights and liabilities which attach to shares in any specific circumstances, the Shareholder should seek legal advice.

The following is a summary of the more significant rights and liabilities attaching to Shares to be issued pursuant to this Prospectus. This summary is not exhaustive and does not constitute a definitive statement of the rights and liabilities of Shareholders. To obtain such a statement, persons should seek independent legal advice.

Full details of the rights and liabilities attaching to Shares are set out in the Constitution, a copy of which is available for inspection at the Company's registered office during normal business hours.

(a) General meetings

Directors may call a meeting of Shareholders whenever they think fit. Shareholders may call a meeting as provided by the Corporations Act. All Shareholders are entitled to a notice of meeting. A quorum for a meeting of Shareholders is two Shareholders present in person or by proxy, attorney or representative (in the case of a company).

The Company will hold annual general meetings in accordance with the Corporations Act and the Listing Rules.

Shareholders are entitled to be present in person, or by proxy, attorney or representative (in the case of a company) to speak and to vote at general meetings of the Company.

(b) Voting

Subject to any rights or restrictions at the time being attached to any class or classes of shares, at a general meeting of the Company on a show of hands, every Shareholder present in person, or by proxy, attorney or representative (in the case of a company) has one vote and upon a poll, every Shareholder present in person, or by proxy, attorney or representative (in the case of a company) has one vote for any Share held by the Shareholder.

A poll may be demanded by the chairperson of the meeting, any 5 Shareholders entitled to vote on the resolution or by any one or more Shareholders holding not less than 5% of the total voting rights of all Shareholders entitled to vote on the resolution.

(c) Dividends

The Directors may determine all matters concerning dividends or other distributions in their discretion. The Directors may determine that cash payments will be made to, or at the direction of, any Shareholders on the basis of the value so fixed in order to adjust the rights of all parties. Any monies payable in respect of a Share may be paid wholly or partly by the distribution of specific assets. No interest will be payable by the Company in respect of any dividend or other distribution.

(d) Winding up

If the Company is wound up, the liquidator may, with the authority of a special resolution of the Company, divide among the shareholders in specie or in kind the whole or any part of the property of the Company, and may for that purpose set such value as he considers fair upon any property to be so divided, and may determine how the division is to be carried out as between the Shareholders or different classes of Shareholders.

The liquidator may, with the authority of a special resolution of the Company, vest the whole or any part of any such property in trustees upon such trusts for the benefit of the contributories as the liquidator thinks fit, but so that no Shareholder is compelled to accept any Shares or other securities in respect of which there is any liability.

(e) Transfer of shares

Generally, Shares in the Company are freely transferable, subject to formal requirements, and to the registration of the transfer not resulting in a contravention of or failure to observe the provisions of a law of Australia.

(f) Issue of further Shares

The Directors may, subject to any restrictions imposed by the Corporations Act and the Listing Rules, issue, cancel, or otherwise dispose of Shares to any persons on such terms and conditions as they see fit.

(g) Directors

The business of the Company is to be managed by or under the direction of the Directors.

Unless changed by the Company in general meeting, the minimum number of Directors is three. The existing Directors may appoint a new Director to fill a casual vacancy or as an addition to the Board. Any such Director must retire at the next following annual general meeting of the Company (at which meeting he or she may be eligible for election as a Director).

The Constitution contains provisions relating to the rotation and election of directors. No Director other than the managing director may hold office with re-election: (i) past the third annual general meeting following the Director's appointment or last election; or for more than three years, whichever is longer.

(h) Variation of shares and rights attaching to shares

Shares may be converted or cancelled with member approval and the Company's share capital may be reduced in accordance with the requirements of the Corporations Act and if applicable, the Listing Rules.

Class rights attaching to a particular class of shares may be varied or cancelled with the consent in writing of holders of 75% of the shares in that class or by a special resolution of the holders of shares in that class.

(i) Share buy backs

The Company may buy back Shares in itself in accordance with the provisions of the Corporations Act and the Listing Rules.

(j) Indemnity and insurance of officers

Under the Constitution, the Company may, to the maximum extent permitted by law, indemnify any current or former Director, officer or senior manager of the Company or a subsidiary of the Company against liabilities incurred by the person in that capacity, legal costs incurred defending civil or criminal proceedings or of an administrative or investigatory nature, and legal costs incurred in good faith in obtaining legal advice on issues relevant to the performance of their functions and discharge of their duties in his or her capacity as an officer of the Company.

To the extent permitted by law, the Company may pay or agree to pay the premium on any insurance policy for any person who is or has been a Director, officer or senior manager of the Company or a subsidiary of the Company against liability incurred by that person in that capacity, including a liability for legal costs.

(k) Changes to the constitution

The Constitution can only be amended by a special resolution passed by at least three quarters of the members present and voting at a general meeting of the Company. At least

28 days' written notice specifying the intention to propose the resolution as a special resolution must be given.

(l) Listing Rules

Provided the Company remains admitted to the Official List of the ASX, then despite anything in the Constitution, no act may be done that is prohibited by the Listing Rules, and authority is given for acts required to be done by the Listing Rules.

(m) Dividend policy

The Company does not intend to declare or pay any dividends in the immediately foreseeable future.

Any future determination as to the payment of dividends by the Company will be at the sole discretion of the Directors and will depend on the availability of distributable earnings and operating results and financial condition of the Company, future capital requirements and general business and other factors considered relevant by the Directors. No assurance in relation to the payment of dividends or franking credits attaching to dividends can be given by the Company.

4.2 Continuous Disclosure Obligations

The Company is a 'disclosing entity' (as defined in section 111AC of the Corporations Act) for the purposes of section 713 of the Corporations Act, and, as such, is subject to regular reporting and disclosure obligations. Specifically, like all listed companies, the Company is required to continuously disclose any information it has to the market which a reasonable person would expect to have a material effect on the price or the value of the Company's securities. The New Shares are in the same class as Shares that have been quoted on the official list of the ASX during the three months prior to the issue of this Prospectus.

This Prospectus is a 'transaction specific prospectus' to which the special content rules under section 713 of the Corporations Act apply. That provision allows the issue of a more concise prospectus in relation to an offer of securities in a class which has been continuously quoted by ASX in the three months prior to the date of the prospectus. In general terms 'transaction specific prospectuses' are only required to contain information in relation to the effect of the issue of New Shares on the Company and the rights attaching to the New Shares. It is not necessary to include general information in relation to all of the assets and liabilities, the financial position, profits and losses or prospects of the issuing company.

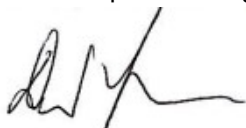
