

A NEW MINERALISATION TREND IDENTIFIED

Garnet Skarn Deposit, Idaho

AVM has been working diligently on the Garnet Skarn Deposit and has completed a new technical review of all the exploration data. The review took a completely different approach when analysing the data at the Garnet Skarn deposit. The review looked at all the data with a fresh view of how the data influenced the deposit and how data collected by Anaconda Mining Company could be utilised in understanding the Skarn deposition across the property. Working with the Anaconda data and the data collected by AVM, the entire geological interpretation was reworked with a new interpretation of the project area.

HIGHLIGHTS

- **A New Mineralisation Trend has been identified at Garnet Skarn Deposit**
 - The new mineralisation area covers a larger portion of the project relating to the contact through the AVM mining claims.
- **A technical review of the project has uncovered new information on the deposit leading to a larger mineralisation zone.**
 - The Company digitised historical data, including drill hole data, geochemical samples, mining sections and historical summary reports.
- **The new mineralisation zone covers approximately 24% of the current claim area, leaving potential upside with further exploration.**
- **A new 3D model has been developed, with information forthcoming on the results from the modelling.**
- **New Exploration targets are being developed across the project with a new interpretation of the deposit, which will be released once complete.**

Commenting on the exploration program, Advance Chief Executive Officer Frank Bennett said:

"Our fresh-look review of exploration data from the Garnet Skarn Project, combined with existing site data from the Anaconda Mining Company, has produced exciting results. The new mineralization zone identifies a much larger area across the site, yet covers only 24% of the entire project. This still leaves large areas to be addressed in our next phases of exploration. The 3D model and exploration targets currently being developed look extremely positive and show the growing potential upside to the Garnet Creek Project."

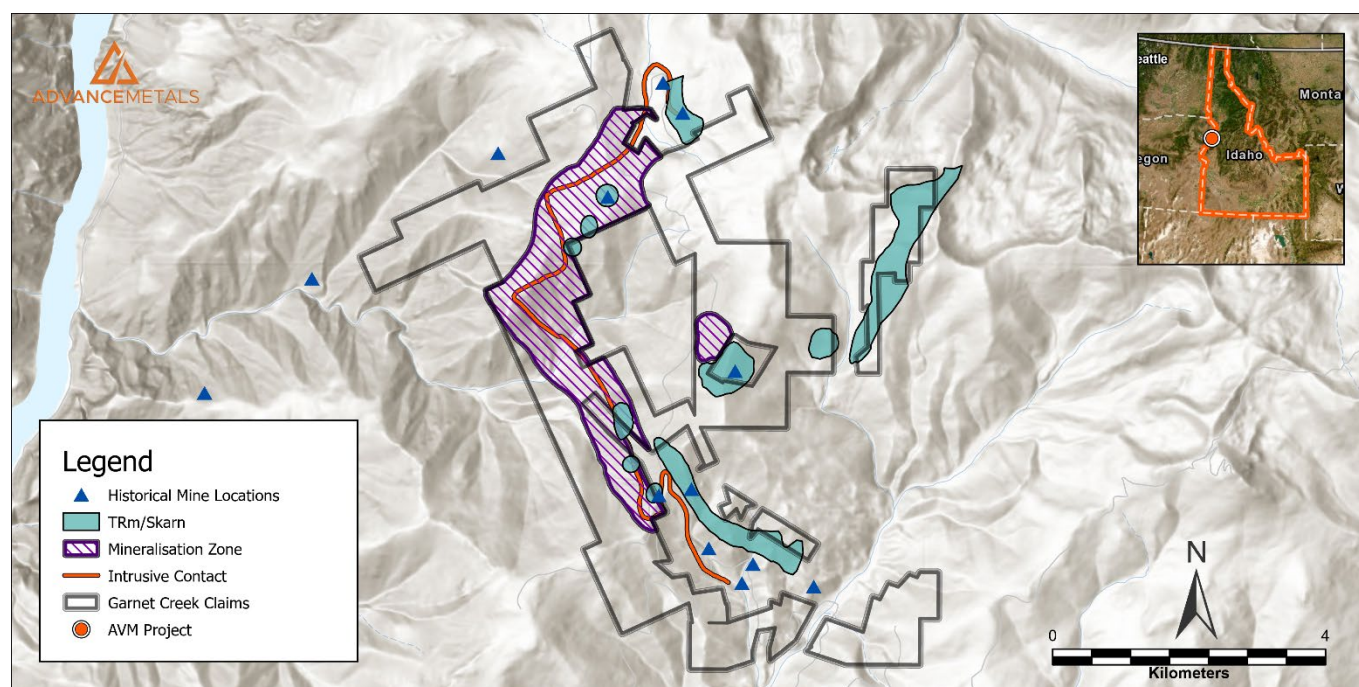


Figure 1: Mineralisation Zone

Advance Metals (ASX: AVM) is pleased to announce that the Company has completed a technical review of the Garnet Skarn Deposit in western Idaho with positive results. For this review, the Company digitised all historical information collected by the Anaconda Mining Company and developed a property-wide copper mineralisation zone (Figure 1).

The results from the review show that the potential across the property has significantly increased, comprising approximately 24% of the claimed property. Several new exploration targets are being developed. The new mineralisation trend covers a northwest-southeast contact where the Skarn outcropping has been identified across the project area.

Anaconda Historical Data Review

The AVM technical team completed a new review of all the historical information that Anaconda Mining collected over several decades. The analysis and new interpretation allowed the Company to look at the deposit from a new perspective. The data included drilling data, geochemical assays, mine plans and geophysical data.

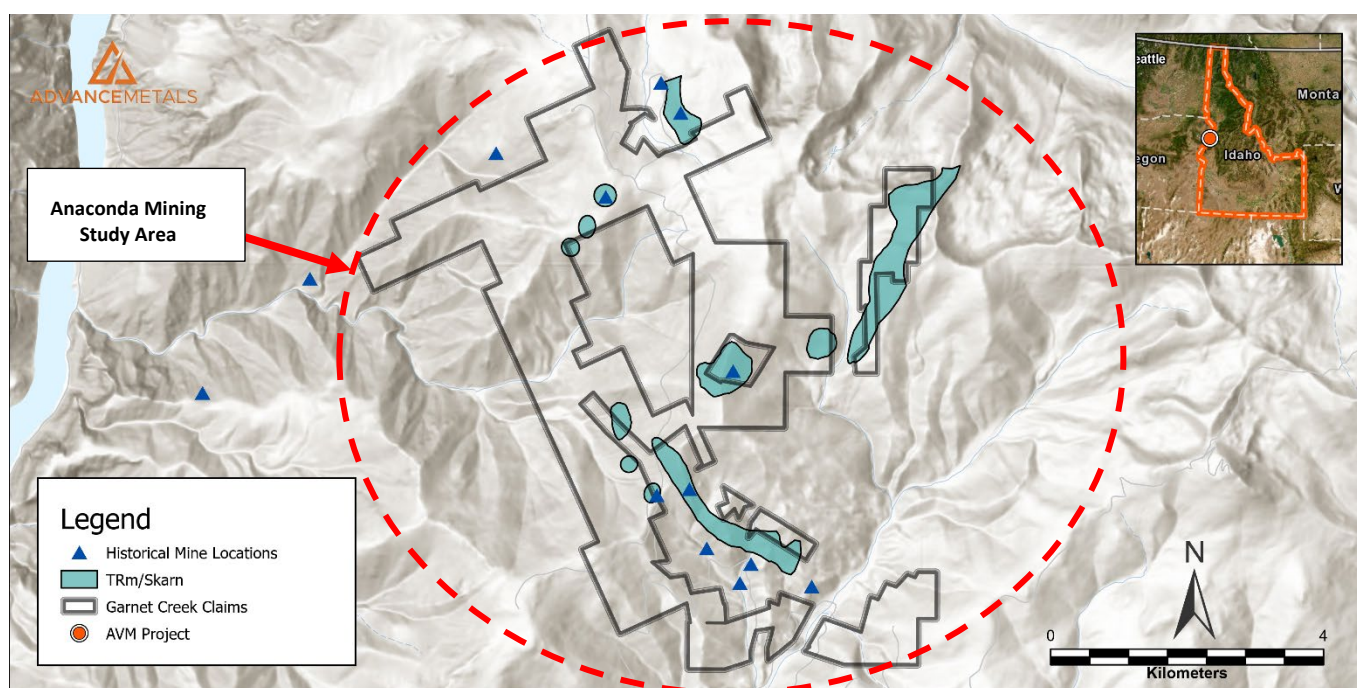


Figure 2. Anaconda Mining Company Area of Study

From 1919 – 1975, Anaconda Mining studied the Seven Devils Mining District. During this time, the Company completed several studies on properties adjacent to the Advance Metals Garnet Creek Project (Figure 2). Anaconda completed several studies, including drilling 58 drill holes adjacent to the Garnet Skarn Deposit.

The Anaconda Mining Company's thorough review of the properties provided a reasonable investment analysis in the Seven Devils Mining District. Anaconda's investigations revealed several key issues that led to their regional disengagement. These issues were difficult to navigate for the Company, including complex private land ownership, the remoteness of the properties, and the high logistics costs to surrounding processing plants.

In the several decades following Anaconda's interest, the Seven Devils Mining District has seen many improvements associated with the initial risks outlined. Private land ownership has changed. The road infrastructure is improved and maintained by Adams County. Global supply chain efficiencies have significantly reduced material logistics costs. With modern processes and market conditions, the risks associated with the properties can be well mitigated.

Mineralisation Zone

The Anaconda Mining Company identified a general mineralisation trend through fractured zones along the northeast trending thrust fault through the mining district. AVM exploration, including geochemical and geophysical results, has confirmed a large mineralisation zone across the Garnet Skarn property that aligns with this assessment.

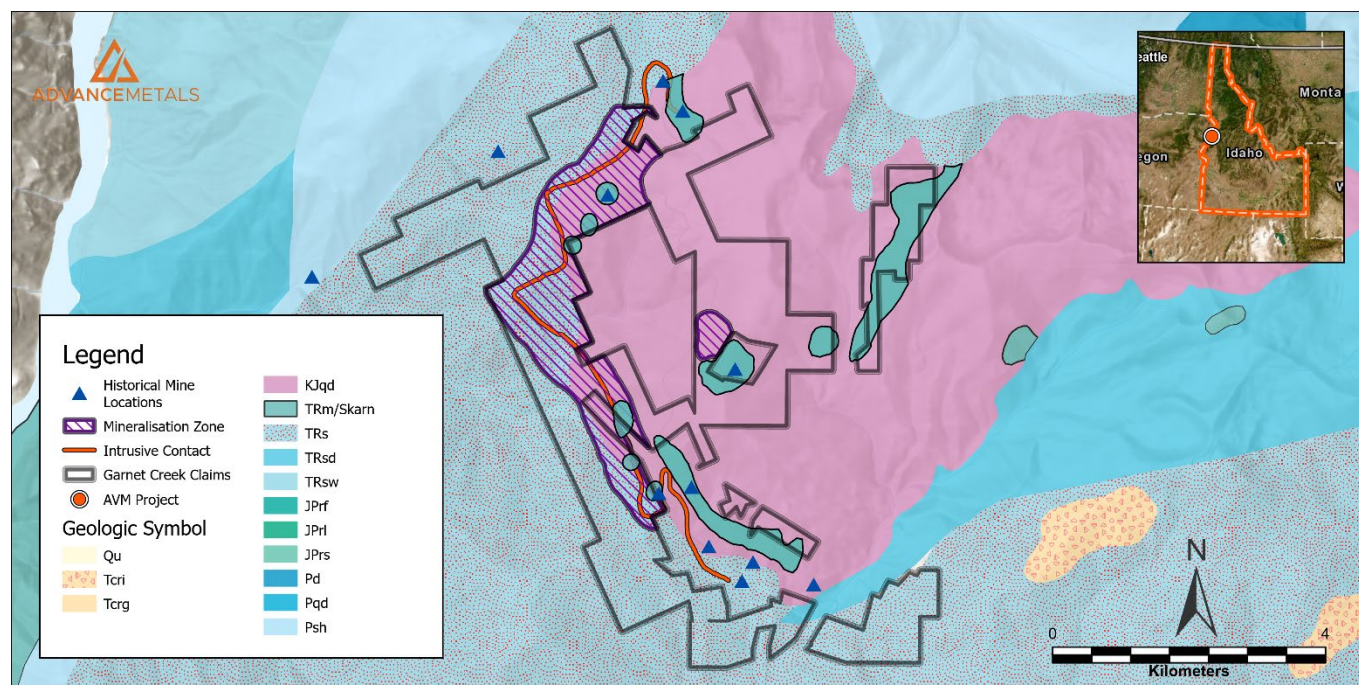


Figure 3: Mineralisation Zone and Geological Map

Work by AVM and previous companies has defined a significant skarn system with locally high-grade copper mineralisation (Figure 3). A zone of mineralisation has been constructed to represent this skarn system. Within the 4 km by 0.5 km target mineralisation zone, a minimum of four skarn zones have been identified, with more likely to be found pending further exploration (drilling, geophysics). Assuming similar depths (100 m) and aerial extent within the target zone, it is not unreasonable to assume an exploration potential of 20 to 30 million tons of copper in the grade range of 0.3 % to 0.7 % range.

An AVM soil and rock sampling campaign identified geochemical anomalies associated with mapped surface skarn across the project area. Select rock samples reach as high as 21.24% Cu on property. Sampled copper skarn at the project surface may suggest copper mineralisation at depth. The extent and grades of the known mineralisation and the strength of the skarn and porphyry mineralisation suggest that a large and capable mineralising system was active on the property.

Disseminated copper sulphide mineralisation within the Deep Creek Pluton was confirmed through sampling methods across the property. Given the favourable lithology and proximity to adjacent disseminated copper projects, Garnet Skarn likely hosts disseminated copper within the Seven Devils volcanic package at depth.

Cu mineralisation has been found in varying degrees within all project units, including quartz diorite, volcanoclastics, and flow rocks (Wise & Banghart, 1970). The best-known and highest-grade Cu mineralisation at the Garnet Skarn project is the skarn formed along the contact between the Deep Creek pluton and Martin Bridge limestone.

Peacock Mine drilling reports of a mineralised copper core continuous for 122 m (400 ft) confirm mineralised copper sulphides existing below the Quartz Diorite. Based on geochemical results and historical drilling, it is thought that mineralised copper and the associated carbonate system at depth may be connected with the secondary copper sulphide systems seen below the Peacock Mine. Further drilling and geophysical analysis of the mineralisation zone may reveal additional information about this carbonate system at depth.

Property Mineralisation

There is increasing evidence that porphyry mineralisation is present at depth and is potentially the source of the Cu skarn mineralisation. At least two stages of mineralisation have been identified in the Martin Bridge skarn: (1) primary sulphides and (2) secondary copper enrichment associated with the unit. Unweathered skarn is locally rich in primary Fe-Cu sulphides. The skarn is accompanied by secondary enrichment of chalcocite and bornite, interpreted to have formed during a hypogene oxidation event.

The primary mineralisation of skarn was likely introduced during the late stages of the main skarn event. Primary sulphide minerals include pyrite, chalcopyrite and bornite. Copper values locally range up to 21.24% Cu in primary mineralisation.

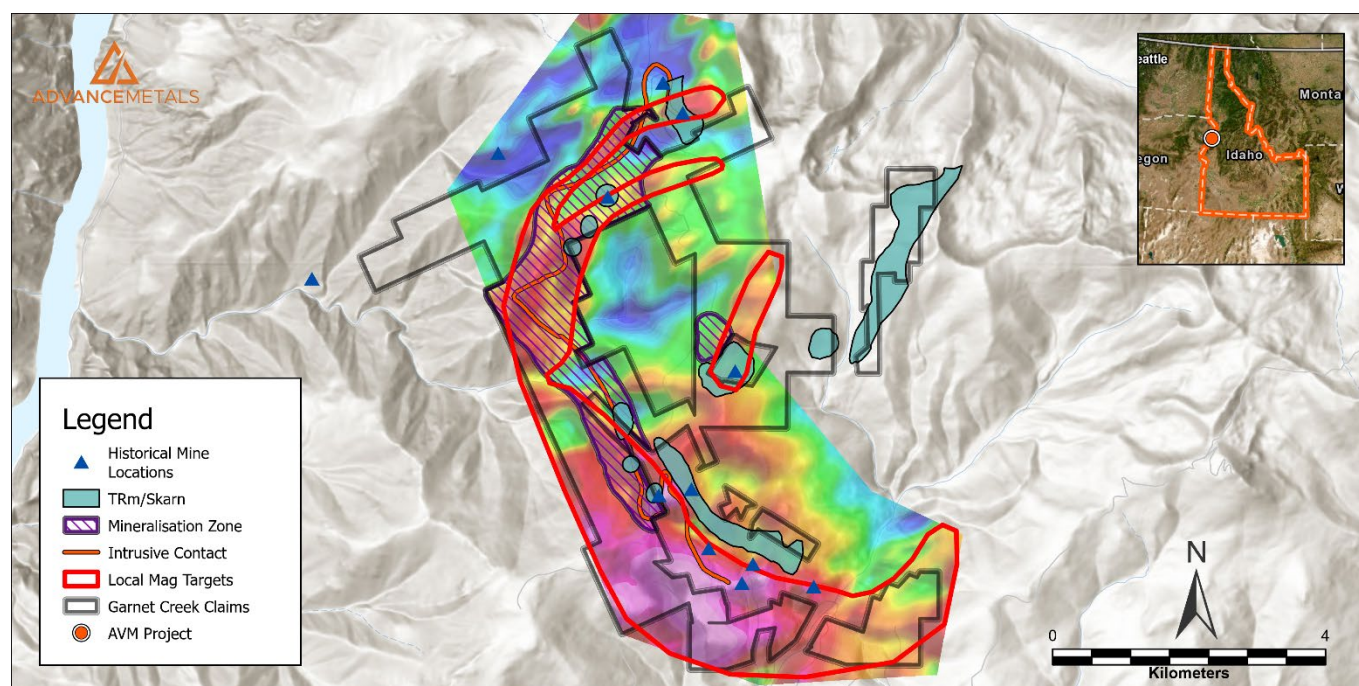


Figure 4: Mineralisation Zone and Aeromagnetic Data

Property mineralisation displays bornite, chalcopyrite, covellite, and chalcocite in irregular clusters and seams within tabular skarns. Malachite, azurite, and chalcocite may be supergene-enriched and abundant to depths of 91 m (300 ft) (Cook, 1954). The skarns also host molybdenum and tungsten in scheelite-powellite. Skarns, marble, and limestone are expansive at the surface (Figure 4).

A single drift of "oxidised skarn" located within 91 m (300 ft) from the surface at the historical Peacock Mine is responsible for much of the district's historical copper production. This lithology correlates with the skarn contacts mined in the Alaska Mine. This unit was likely formed during a hypogene oxidation event. Massive chalcocite and oxidised primary copper ores are found along the margins of the skarn. The chalcocite is especially abundant where the Cu-rich fluids encounter primary sulphides.

The chalcocite occasionally cuts and replaces pyrite or forms masses surrounding euhedral pyrite. Primary copper minerals were deposited where the oxidising fluid encountered no primary sulphides. The extent of this interpretation, analysed through a historical lens and confirmed through field investigation, has led the Company to develop an expansive zone of mineralisation across the Garnet Skarn property.

Next Steps

A 3D Model has been developed utilising the historical and recent exploration data showing the potential mineralisation. The Company is currently developing prospective new drill targets across the property. All of this information is being used to develop upgraded JORC Exploration targets for the Garnet Skarn Deposit.

Background

The 100% owned Garnet Skarn Project property is located on the southeast margin of the Seven Devils Mountains in Adams County, west-central Idaho, USA.

The property is within the Seven Devils Mining District and is approximately 68 km (42 mi) northwest of the town of Council, within the Payette National Forest. The property totals 1,022.6 hectares (2,527 acres). The property consists of 147 lode claims.

The Company recently undertook an in-depth technical review of historical documentation to digitise relevant information and develop GIS exploration models utilising historical drilling records. The process involved utilising GIS modelling software, AI programs, satellite remote sensing, and geological and geophysical analysis of the project area.

Analysis of the results has found strong exploration potential at the Garnet Skarn Project.

A geologist collected rock samples. Rock samples were collected at the surface using a steel rock hammer from the outcrop. Rock chip samples were geolocated and tagged using a GPS unit before being photographed and described in field notes.
