Venue and Voting Information

The Annual General Meeting of the Shareholders to which this Notice of Meeting relates will be held at 9:00am (AEDT) on Friday 29 November 2024 at Works Boardroom, Works by Scentre Group, Level 5, 100 Market Street, Sydney, NSW, 2000 and as a virtual meeting (**Meeting**). To be able to hold this Meeting at both a physical and virtual venue, the Company is relying upon s249R(b) of the Corporations Act.

Shareholders will be able to vote (see the “Voting virtually at the Meeting” section of this Notice of Meeting below) and ask questions at the virtual meeting. Resolutions

Remuneration Report

1. Resolution 1 – Adoption of Remuneration Report

To consider and, if thought fit, to pass the following resolution as an **Ordinary Resolution**:

“That, for the purpose of Section 250R(2) of the Corporations Act and for all other purposes, approval is given for the adoption of the Remuneration Report as contained in the Company’s Annual Financial Report for the financial year ended 30 June 2024.”

Note: The vote on this Resolution is advisory only and does not bind the Directors or the Company.

Voting Exclusion Statement: In accordance with the Corporations Act, the Company will disregard any votes cast on Resolution 1 by or on behalf of a member of the Company’s key management personnel (including the Directors), whose remuneration details are included in the Remuneration Report (**KMP**), or any of that person’s Closely Related Parties (such as close family members and any controlled companies of those persons) (collectively referred to as **Restricted Voter**). However, the Company need not disregard a vote if:

- (a) it is cast by a person as a proxy appointed in writing that specifies how the proxy is to vote on Resolution 1; and
- (b) it is not cast on behalf of a Restricted Voter.

If you appoint the person chairing the Meeting (**Chair**) and you are not a Restricted Voter, by submitting the Proxy Form you authorise the person chairing the Meeting to exercise the proxy even though Resolution 1 is connected directly or indirectly with the remuneration of a KMP, and you will be taken to have directed the Chair to vote in accordance with his or her stated intention to vote in favour of Resolution 1. If you do not want your vote exercised in favour of Resolution 1, you should direct the person chairing the Meeting to vote “against”, or to abstain from voting on, this Resolution.

Election of Directors

2. Resolution 2 – Election of David Brudenell as Director

To consider and, if thought fit, to pass the following resolution as an **Ordinary Resolution**:

“That David Brudenell, a Director appointed as an additional Director and holding office until the next general meeting of the Company after his appointment in accordance with the Company's Constitution and ASX Listing Rule 14.4, be elected as a Director of the Company, effective immediately.”

3. Resolution 3 – Election of Adrian Bunter as Director

To consider and, if thought fit, to pass the following resolution as an **Ordinary Resolution**:

“That Adrian Bunter, a Director appointed as an additional Director and holding office until the next general meeting of the Company after his appointment in accordance with the Company's Constitution and ASX Listing Rule 14.4, be elected as a Director of the Company, effective immediately.”

4. Resolution 4 – Election of Jenny Fielding as Director

- (a) a person who is expected to participate in, or who will obtain a material benefit as a result of, the proposed issue (except a benefit solely by reason of being a holder of ordinary securities in the Company); or
- (b) an Associate of that person or those persons.

However, this does not apply to a vote cast in favour of Resolution 5 by:

- (i) a person as proxy or attorney for a person who is entitled to vote on the Resolution, in accordance with directions given to the proxy or attorney to vote on the Resolution in that way; or
- (ii) the Chair of the Meeting as proxy or attorney for a person who is entitled to vote on the Resolution, in accordance with a direction given to the Chair to vote on the Resolution as the Chair decides; or
- (iii) a holder acting solely in a nominee, trustee, custodial or other fiduciary capacity on behalf of a beneficiary provided the following conditions are met:
 - the beneficiary provides written confirmation to the holder that the beneficiary is not excluded from voting, and is not an associate of a person excluded from voting, on the Resolution; and
 - the holder votes on the Resolution in accordance with directions given by the beneficiary to the holder to vote in that way.

Issue of Securities to Directors

6. Resolution 6 – Approval of issue of ESOP Options to Jenny Fielding

To consider and, if thought fit, to pass with or without amendment, the following resolution as an **Ordinary Resolution**:

“That for the purposes of section 208 of the Corporations Act, ASX Listing Rule 10.14 and for all other purposes, the Shareholders of the Company approve issue and allotment of 1,000,000 unlisted ESOP Options (each exercisable at \$0.75 per option, expiring 3 years from the date of issue) under the Incentive Plan to Jenny Fielding (or her Nominee), a Director of the Company, and otherwise on the terms and conditions set out in the Explanatory Statement which accompanies and forms part of this Notice of Meeting. ”

Voting Exclusion Statement: The Company will disregard any votes cast in favour of Resolution 6 by or on behalf of:

- (a) a person referred to in rule 10.14.1, 10.14.2 or 10.14.3 who is eligible to participate in the Incentive Plan; or
- (b) an Associate of that person or those persons.

However, this does not apply to a vote cast in favour of Resolution 6 by:

- (i) a person as proxy or attorney for a person who is entitled to vote on the Resolution, in accordance with directions given to the proxy or attorney to vote on the Resolution in that way; or
- (ii) the Chair of the Meeting as proxy or attorney for a person who is entitled to vote on the Resolution, in accordance with a direction given to the Chair to vote on the Resolution as the Chair decides; or
- (iii) a holder acting solely in a nominee, trustee, custodial or other fiduciary capacity on behalf of a beneficiary provided the following conditions are met:
 - the beneficiary provides written confirmation to the holder that the beneficiary is not excluded from voting, and is not an associate of a person excluded from voting, on the Resolution; and
 - the holder votes on the Resolution in accordance with directions given by the beneficiary to the holder to vote in that way.

Voting Prohibition Statement: In accordance with section 250BD of the Corporations Act, a person appointed as a proxy must not vote, on the basis of that appointment, on Resolution 6 if:

- (a) the proxy is either:
 - (i) a member of the Company's Key Management Personnel; or
 - (ii) a closely related party of a member of the Company's Key Management Personnel; and
- (b) the appointment does not specify the way the proxy is to vote on the resolution.

However, the above prohibition does not apply if:

- (a) the proxy is the Chair of the Meeting; and
- (b) the appointment expressly authorises the Chair to exercise the proxy even if the Resolution is connected directly or indirectly with remuneration of a member of the Company's Key Management Personnel.

7. Resolution 7 – Approval of issue of Options to David Brudenell

To consider and, if thought fit, to pass with or without amendment, the following resolution as an **Ordinary Resolution**:

“That for the purposes of ASX Listing Rule 10.11 and for all other purposes, the Shareholders of the Company approve issue and allotment of 21,000,000 unlisted Options to David Brudenell (or his Nominee), a Director of the Company, and otherwise on the terms and conditions set out in the Explanatory Statement which accompanies and forms part of this Notice of Meeting.”

Voting Exclusion Statement: The Company will disregard any votes cast in favour of Resolution 7 by or on behalf of:

- (a) a person who is expected to receive the securities as a result of the proposed issue;
- (b) a person who will obtain a material benefit as a result of the issue of the securities (except a benefit solely by reason of being a holder of ordinary securities in the Company); or
- (c) an Associate of that person or those persons described in (a) or (b).

However, this does not apply to a vote cast in favour of Resolution 7 by:

- (i) a person as proxy or attorney for a person who is entitled to vote on the Resolution, in accordance with directions given to the proxy or attorney to vote on the Resolution in that way; or
- (ii) the Chair of the Meeting as proxy or attorney for a person who is entitled to vote on the Resolution, in accordance with a direction given to the Chair to vote on the Resolution as the Chair decides; or
- (iii) a holder acting solely in a nominee, trustee, custodial or other fiduciary capacity on behalf of a beneficiary provided the following conditions are met:
 - the beneficiary provides written confirmation to the holder that the beneficiary is not excluded from voting, and is not an associate of a person excluded from voting, on the Resolution; and
 - the holder votes on the Resolution in accordance with directions given by the beneficiary to the holder to vote in that way.

Voting Prohibition Statement: In accordance with section 250BD of the Corporations Act, a person appointed as a proxy must not vote, on the basis of that appointment, on Resolution 7 if:

- (a) the proxy is either:
 - (i) a member of the Company's Key Management Personnel; or
 - (ii) a closely related party of a member of the Company's Key Management Personnel; and
- (b) the appointment does not specify the way the proxy is to vote on the resolution.

However, the above prohibition does not apply if:

- (a) the proxy is the Chair of the Meeting; and

the appointment expressly authorises the Chair to exercise the proxy even if the Resolution is connected directly or indirectly with remuneration of a member of the Company's Key Management Personnel.

Full details of the business to be considered at the Annual General Meeting are set out below.

Ordinary business

Financial statements and reports

In accordance with the Constitution and the Corporations Act, the business of the Annual General Meeting will include receipt and consideration of the Annual Financial Report of the Company for the financial year ended 30 June 2024 together with the declaration of the Directors, the Director's Report, the Remuneration Report and the Auditor's Report.

In accordance with the amendments to the Corporations Act, the Company is no longer required to provide a hard copy of the Company's Annual Financial Report to Shareholders unless a Shareholder has specifically elected to receive a printed copy.

Whilst the Company will not provide a hard copy of the Company's Annual Financial Report unless specifically requested to do so, Shareholders may view the Company Annual Financial Report on its website at <https://liveverdure.com.au/governance/>

No resolution is required for this item, but Shareholders will be given the opportunity to ask questions and to make comments on the management and performance of the Company.

The Company's auditor will be present at the Meeting. During the discussion of this item, the auditor will be available to answer questions on the:

- Conduct of the audit;
- Preparation and content of the Auditor's Report;
- Accounting policies adopted by the Company in relation to the preparation of the financial statements; and
- Independence of the auditor in relation to the conduct of the audit.

Resolutions

Remuneration Report

Resolution 1 – Adoption of Remuneration Report

In accordance with section 250R(2) of the Corporations Act, the Company is required to present to its Shareholders the Remuneration Report as disclosed in the Company's Annual Financial Report.

The vote on the Resolution is advisory only and does not bind the Directors or the Company. The Remuneration Report is set out in the Company's Annual Financial Report and is also available on the Company's website at <https://liveverdure.com.au/governance/>.

However, if at least 25% of the votes cast are against the adoption of the Remuneration Report at the Meeting (subject of this Notice of Meeting), and then again at the 2025 Annual General Meeting (**2025 AGM**), the Company will be required to put to the vote a resolution (**Spill Resolution**) at the 2025 AGM to approve the calling of a further meeting (**Spill Meeting**). If more than 50% of Shareholders vote in favour of the Spill Resolution, the Company must convene the Spill Meeting within 90 days of the 2025 AGM. All of the Directors who were in office when the 2025 Directors' Report was approved, other than the Managing Director, will (if desired) need to stand for re-election at the Spill Meeting.

The Remuneration Report explains the Board's policies in relation to the nature and level of remuneration paid to KMPs (including Directors) and sets out remuneration details, service agreements and the details of any share-based compensation.

Voting

Note that a voting exclusion applies to Resolution 1 in the terms set out in the Notice of Meeting. In particular, the Directors and other Restricted Voters must not vote on this Resolution and must not cast a vote as proxy, unless the appointment gives a direction on how to vote, or the proxy is given to the Chair and you submit the Proxy Form, authorising the Chair to exercise the proxy even though Resolution 1 is connected directly or indirectly with the remuneration of a KMP and that in doing so you will be taken to have directed the Chair to vote in accordance with the Chair's stated intention to vote in favour of Resolution 1.

Shareholders are urged to read carefully the Proxy Form and to provide a direction to the proxy on how to vote on this Resolution.

Election of Directors

Resolution 2 – Election of David Brudenell as Director

The Company's Constitution provides that any Director appointed by the Board in addition to the existing Directors will hold office until the next following annual general meeting and is then eligible for re-election.

ASX Listing Rule 14.4 also provides that each additional director appointed during the year is to hold office until the next annual general meeting and is then eligible for election as a Director of the Company.

David Brudenell was appointed as an additional Director of the Company on 15 March 2024 and has since served as a Director of the Company. Under this Resolution, Mr Brudenell seeks election as a Director of the Company at this Meeting.

David's significant public, private and technology startup experience will be incredibly valuable to LV1 as the company continues to develop and scale new artificial intelligence ("A.I.") and machine learning ("M.L.") solutions within its recently incorporated R&D subsidiary ("Decidr.AI"). David will

work with Paul Chan and the Decidr.ai team to further develop and deploy Decidr solutions to profitably scale LV1's existing 13 Seeds and Edible Beauty brands, in Australia and internationally.

Currently, David is an executive at HR/fintech scale-up Flare. David's executive roles have included a decade as Executive Vice President at global market research company Pureprofile where he participated in its public listing (ASX:PPL), Executive at Fleet and Consumer Lending company Eclipx (ASX: ECX), and Chief Product and Digital Officer for Universum, which was sold to Axel Springer SE. During his 20 years of experience, David has participated in numerous start-up, venture capital, M&A and public markets activities.

David's recent technology experience also extends into Artificial Intelligence, where he led the Global Solutions & Advanced Research teams at Appen (ASX:APX), the largest provider of training data for artificial intelligence applications. This team worked at the frontier of generative AI and machine learning for the largest global technology companies and federal agencies.

David also serves as an advisor for several US-based Artificial Intelligence and Consumer companies.

Directors' recommendation

The Directors (excluding Mr Brudenell) recommend that Shareholders vote for this Resolution.

Resolution 3 – Election of Adrian Bunter as Director

The Company's Constitution provides that any Director appointed by the Board in addition to the existing Directors will hold office until the next following annual general meeting and is then eligible for re-election.

ASX Listing Rule 14.4 also provides that each additional director appointed during the year is to hold office until the next annual general meeting and is then eligible for election as a Director of the Company.

Adrian Bunter was appointed as an additional Director of the Company on 15 March 2024 and has since served as a Director of the Company. Under this Resolution, Mr Bunter seeks election as a Director of the Company at this Meeting.

Currently, Adrian is a partner of Modus Partners Australia, a boutique specialist technology, media and commerce financial advisory firm operating out of Australia and AsiaPac. He is an experienced professional adviser and non-executive director with almost 30 years' experience working with both established and early stage businesses to assist them with transactions and growth ranging from mergers and acquisitions, divestments of businesses, debt/equity raising, IPOs and strategy development and execution. Adrian's first 16 years of his career were with PwC working with private businesses before focusing purely on corporate advisory in the broad technology sector in specialist firms.

Adrian has worked with many early stage businesses as a hands-on adviser and angel investor to help commercialise, grow and to increase the value of the business. Adrian is also on the board of and advises several high growth, technology businesses, ranging from early-stage pre-revenue companies through to early-stage ASX listed companies Carly Holdings Limited (ASX:CL8) and 8Common Limited (ASX:8CO) through to larger high growth businesses, like ezyCollect and Australian unicorn, Employment Hero. Adrian is also a member of the Executive Committee of one of Australia's leading angel investing group, Sydney Angels.

Adrian is a Chartered Accountant, a Senior Associate of Finsia and has completed a Bachelor of Business and a Graduate Diploma in Applied Finance.

Directors' recommendation

The Directors (excluding Mr Bunter) recommend that Shareholders vote for this Resolution.

Resolution 4 – Election of Jenny Fielding as Director

The Company's Constitution provides that any Director appointed by the Board in addition to the existing Directors will hold office until the next following annual general meeting and is then eligible for re-election.

ASX Listing Rule 14.4 also provides that each additional director appointed during the year is to hold office until the next annual general meeting and is then eligible for election as a Director of the Company.

Jenny Fielding was appointed as an additional Director of the Company on 1 August 2024 and has since served as a Director of the Company. Under this Resolution, Ms Fielding seeks election as a Director of the Company at this Meeting.

Based out of NYC, Jenny Fielding brings a wealth of experience to LV1, with a background that spans law, finance, technology, and investment. After graduating from law school and working in finance, Jenny transitioned to technology as a founder of two mobile software companies. This experience fueled her passion for technology and innovation, leading her to a prominent career as an early-stage investor. Jenny is also an adjunct professor at Columbia University and Cornell Tech.

For 7.5 years, Jenny was the Managing Director at Techstars, where she led investments into companies that now have a market cap of over \$10B. She then cofounded Everywhere Ventures, a global venture capital firm. Jenny has been the first investor in over 250 tech-enabled companies, including five companies achieving unicorn (USD\$1B+) valuations.

Directors' recommendation

The Directors (excluding Ms Fielding) recommend that Shareholders vote for this Resolution.

ASX Listing Rule 7.1A (Additional 10% Capacity)

Resolution 5 – ASX Listing Rule 7.1A Approval of Future Issue of Securities

Broadly speaking, and subject to a number of exceptions, Listing Rule 7.1 limits the amount of equity securities that a listed company can issue without the approval of its shareholders over any 12-month period to 15% of the fully paid ordinary securities it had on issue at the start of that period.

Under Listing Rule 7.1A, however, an eligible entity can seek approval from its members, by way of a special resolution passed at its annual general meeting, to add an additional 10% capacity.

An eligible entity for the purposes of Listing Rule 7.1A is an entity that is not included in the S&P/ASX 300 Index and has a market capitalisation less than the amount prescribed by ASX (currently \$300 million).

As of 11 October 2024, the Company has a market capitalisation of approximately \$119 million and therefore is an eligible entity. If at the time of the Meeting the Company is no longer an eligible entity this Resolution will be withdrawn.

This Resolution seeks Shareholder approval by way of a special resolution for the Company to have the additional 10% capacity provided for in Listing Rule 7.1A to issue equity securities without Shareholder approval.

If this Resolution is passed, the Company will be able to issue equity securities up to the combined 25% limit in Listing Rules 7.1 and 7.1A without any further Shareholder approval.

If this Resolution is not passed, the Company will not be able to access the additional 10% capacity

to issue equity securities without Shareholder approval provided for in Listing Rule 7.1A and will remain subject to the 15% limit on issuing equity securities without Shareholder approval set out in Listing Rule 7.1.

Information Required by ASX Listing Rule 7.3A

The following information is provided to Shareholder for the purposes of Listing Rule 7.3A.

Period for which the approval will be valid

An approval under this Listing Rule 7.1A commences on the date of the annual general meeting at which the approval is obtained and expires on the first to occur of the following:

- (a) the date which is 12 months after the date of the annual general meeting at which the approval is obtained;
- (b) the time and date of the entity's next annual general meeting; and
- (c) the time and date on which Shareholders approve a transaction under Listing Rule 11.1.2 (a significant change to the nature or scale of activities) or 11.2 (disposal of main undertaking).

Minimum price at which the equity securities may be issued under Listing Rule 7.1A

Any equity securities issued under Listing Rule 7.1A.2 must be an existing quoted class of the Company's equity securities and issued for cash consideration.

The issue price per equity security must not be less than 75% of the volume weighted average market price of the equity securities in that class, calculated over 15 trading days on which trades in that class were recorded immediately before:

- (a) the date on which the price at the equity securities are to be issued is agreed by the Company and the recipient of the equity securities; and
- (b) if the equity securities are not issued within 10 trading days of the date in paragraph (a), the date on which the equity securities are issued.

Purposes for which the funds raised by an issue of equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1A may be used

As noted above, any equity securities issued under Listing Rule 7.1A.2 must be issued for cash consideration. Accordingly, every issue of equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1A.2 will have an accompanying proposed use of funds at the time of issue.

As at the date of this Notice, the Company has not formed an intention to offer any equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1A during the Listing Rule 7.1A mandate period, if Shareholders approve this Resolution. However, if Shareholders approved this Resolution and the Company did raise funds from the issue of equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1A, based on the Company's existing plans, the Company considers that the funds may be used for the following purposes:

- (a) further developing the Company's business and accelerating the Company's growth objectives; and
- (b) for the Company's working capital requirements.

Risk of economic and voting dilution to existing ordinary Securityholders

If this Resolution is approved, and the Company issues equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1A, the existing Shareholders' economic and voting power in the Company will be diluted.

There is a risk that:

- (a) the market price for the Company's equity securities in that class may be significantly lower on the issue date than on the date of the approval under Listing Rule 7.1A; and
- (b) the equity securities may be issued at a price that is at a discount (as described above) to

the market price for the Company's equity securities on the issue date;
which may have an effect on the amount of funds raised by the issue of equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1A.

Allocation policy for issues under Listing Rule 7.1A

The Company's allocation policy and the identity of the allottees of equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1A will depend on a number of factors, including:

- (a) the Company's intentions in relation to the possible issue of equity securities (for cash consideration) during the Listing Rule 7.1A mandate period;
- (b) the structure and timeframe of the capital raising opportunities available to the Company and any alternative methods for raising funds that are available to the Company (such as a pro rata offer or an offer under a share purchase plan);
- (c) the potential effect on the control of the Company;
- (d) the Company's financial position and the likely future capital requirements; and
- (e) advice from the Company's corporate or financial advisors.

Based on the Company's historical cashflow reports and capital raising activities in the past 12 months, the Company considers that it may raise funds during the Listing Rule 7.1A mandate period, although this cannot be guaranteed. Subject to the requirements of the Listing Rules and the Corporations Act, the Board of Directors reserve the right to determine at the time of any issue of equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1A, the allocation policy that the Company will adopt for that issue.

If and when the determination is made to proceed with an issue of equity securities during the Listing Rule 7.1A mandate period, details regarding the allottees and purposes of issue will be disclosed pursuant to the Company's obligations under Listing Rules 3.10.3 and 7.1A.4.

Offers made under Listing Rule 7.1A may be made to parties (excluding any related parties) including professional and sophisticated investors, existing Shareholders of the Company, clients of Australian Financial Service Licence holders and/or their nominees, or any other person to whom the Company is able to make an offer of equity securities.

The Company previously sought and obtained this shareholder approval (for the additional 10% capacity) on 29 November 2023. Since then, the Company has not issued or agreed to issue equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1A.2 in the 12 months preceding the AGM.

This Resolution is a Special Resolution. For a Special Resolution to be passed, at least 75% of the votes validly cast on the resolution by Shareholders (by number of ordinary shares) must be in favour of this Resolution.

Directors' recommendation

The Board of Directors recommend that Shareholders vote for this Resolution.

Issue of Securities to Director

Resolution 6 – Approval of issue of ESOP Options to Jenny Fielding

Background

Resolution 6 seeks Shareholder approval to issue and allot 1,000,000 unlisted ESOP options (**Director Options**) under the Incentive Plan to Ms Jenny Fielding (or her nominee), Director of the Company, which was agreed to by the Company (subject to Shareholder approval) as part of Ms Fielding's appointment to the Board on 1 August 2024.

Accordingly, the Company considers that the issue of the Director Options is an appropriate mechanism to remunerate Ms Fielding for her services and further align the interests of the Directors with Shareholders of the Company.

Director and Related Party Approvals

ASX Listing Rule 10.14 provides that a listed company must not permit any of the following persons to acquire securities under an employee incentive scheme unless it obtains the approval of its shareholders:

- (a) a director of the Company;
- (b) an associate of a director of the Company; or
- (c) a person whose relationship with the Company or a person referred to in Listing Rule 10.14.1 or 10.14.2 is such that, in ASX's opinion, the acquisition should be approved by the Company's shareholders.

As Ms Fielding is a Director of the Company, the proposed issue of Director Options constitutes the acquisition of securities under an employee incentive scheme for the purposes of Listing Rule 10.14 and therefore requires the approval of the Company's shareholders under Listing Rule 10.14.

To this end, Resolution 6 seeks the required Shareholder approval to issue the Director Options to Ms Fielding under and for the purposes of Listing Rule 10.14.

If approval is obtained under Listing Rule 10.14, in accordance with Listing Rule 10.12 (exception 8), separate approval is not required under Listing Rule 10.11. Listing Rule 7.1 limits the amount of equity securities that a listed company can issue without the approval of its shareholders over any 12 month period to 15% of the fully paid ordinary securities it had on issue at the start of that period. In accordance with Listing Rule 7.2 (exception 14), if this Resolution is passed, the issue of Director Options will be excluded in calculating the Company's 15% capacity to issue

equity securities under Listing Rule 7.1 without Shareholder approval over the 12-month period following the issue date.

If Resolution 6 is passed, the Company will be able to proceed with the proposed issue of Director Options.

If Resolution 6 is not passed, the Company will not be able to proceed with the proposed issue of Director Options.

Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act

Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act prohibits the Company from giving a financial benefit to a related party of the Company unless either:

- (a) the giving of the financial benefit falls within one of the exceptions to the provisions; or
- (b) Shareholder approval under Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act is obtained prior to the giving of the financial benefit.

The proposed issue of Options constitutes the giving of a financial benefit.

A “related party” for the purposes of the Corporations Act and the Listing Rules is widely defined and includes a director of a public company, a spouse of a director of a public company or an entity controlled by a director of a public company. The definition of “related party” also includes a person whom there is reasonable grounds to believe will become a “related party” of a public company.

As Ms Fielding is a current Director of the Company, she is considered to be a “related party” of the Company. Therefore, the proposed issue of Director Options to Ms Fielding (or her nominee) requires Shareholder approval under Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act and Listing Rule 10.14, unless the issue of Director Options falls within one of the exceptions to the provisions.

The Board (with the conflicted Director excluded) carefully considered the issue of Director Options and formed the view that the giving of the financial benefit to that Director was reasonable remuneration given the circumstances of the Company, the quantum and terms of the Director Options and the responsibilities held by that Director in the Company.

Accordingly, the Company considers that the issue of these Director Options to Ms Fielding falls within the “reasonable remuneration” exception as set out in section 211 of the Corporations Act, and relies on this exception for the purposes of Resolution 6. Shareholder approval under Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act is therefore not required for this issue.

Information Required by Listing Rule 10.15

The following information in relation to the issue of Director Options is provided to Shareholders for the purposes of Listing Rule 10.15:

- (a) The name of the person proposed to acquire the Director Options is Ms Jenny Fielding, Non-Executive Director.
- (b) Ms Fielding falls within the category as set out in Listing Rule 10.14.1 as she is a Director of the Company.
- (c) The maximum number of Director Options for which Shareholder approval is being sought is 1,000,000 Director Options to Jenny Fielding (or her nominee).
- (d) Details of Ms Fielding’s current total remuneration package (excluding superannuation) is an annual base fee of AUD \$48,000.
- (e) The Company has not previously issued securities to Ms Fielding under the Incentive Plan.
- (f) A Black Scholes validation (88% volatility, 4.49% risk free rate and 0% dividend yield) of the Incentive Options as at 1 October 2024 attributed a value to each Incentive Option of \$0.36350, resulting in an aggregate value of \$363,500 for the Incentive Options to be issued

to Ms Fielding.

- (g) The Director Options will be issued within three years from the date of this Meeting, if approved by Shareholders of the Company.
- (h) The Director Options are being issued for nil cash consideration pursuant to the terms of the Incentive Plan.
- (i) The material terms of the Director Options are as follows:

Exercise price	\$0.75 per Director Option
Expiry date	3 years from the date of issue

- (j) The Director Options will also be issued pursuant to the Incentive Plan. The Company has decided to choose this type of equity security as it assists in aligning the interests of the option holder with Shareholders of the Company.
- (k) The Director Options are proposed to be issued to Ms Fielding as part of her remuneration, which is not uncommon for Directors. The issue of incentive securities (such as options) is a cost effective and efficient reward, as opposed to alternative forms of incentives, such as additional cash payments.
- (l) A summary of key terms of the Incentive Plan is attached as Annexure A of this Notice of Meeting.
- (m) There will be no loan made to Ms Fielding in relation to the issue of Director Options.
- (n) Details of any securities issued under the Incentive Plan will be published in each annual report of the Company relating to a period in which securities have been issued, and that approval for the issue of securities was obtained under Listing Rule 10.14. Any additional persons who become entitled to participate in the Equity Incentive Plan after the resolution was approved and who were not named in the notice of meeting will not participate until approval is obtained under Listing Rule 10.14.

Recommendation

The Board of Directors (excluding Ms Fielding) recommends that Shareholders vote in favour of Resolution 6.

Resolution 7 – Approval of issue of Options to David Brudenell

Background

Resolution 7 seeks Shareholder approval to issue and allot 21,000,000 unlisted Options (**Brudenell Options**) in aggregate to Mr David Brudenell, Director of the Company.

On 11 October 2024, the Company announced that it had appointed David Brudenell as Executive Chairman of the Company. Pursuant to the terms of his engagement, David will be remunerated as follows:

- (a) \$350,000 per annum (exclusive of superannuation); and
- (b) a grant of 21,000,000 Brudenell Options for which Shareholder approval is being sought under Resolution 7 of this Notice of Meeting;

Mr Brudenell is proposed to receive the following:

The material terms of the Options are outlined in the table above and expiry date is 5 years from the date of issue.

Listing Rule 10.11

ASX Listing Rule 10.11 requires a listed company to obtain shareholder approval (unless one of the exceptions in ASX Listing Rule 10.12 applies) for the issue of securities to certain persons, including:

- (a) a related party;
- (b) a person who is, or was at any time in the 6 months before the issue of agreement, a substantial (30%+) holder in the Company;
- (c) a person who is, or was at any time in the 6 months before the issue or agreement, a substantial (10%+) holder in the Company and who has nominated a director to the board of the Company pursuant to a relevant agreement which gives them a right or expectation to do so;
- (d) an Associate of a person referred to in (a) to (c) above; and
- (e) a person whose relationship with the Company or a person referred to in (a) to (d) above is such that, in the ASX's opinion, the issue or agreement should be approved by Shareholders.

As Mr Brudenell is a Director of the Company, he is a related party for the purposes of Listing Rule 10.11. The proposed issue does not fall within any of the exceptions in Listing Rule 10.12, and therefore requires the approval of the Company's Shareholders under Listing Rule 10.11.

To this end, Resolution 7 seeks the required Shareholder approval to issue the Brudenell Options to Mr Brudenell under and for the purposes of Listing Rule 10.11.

If approval is obtained under Listing Rule 10.11, in accordance with Listing Rule 7.2 (exception 14), separate approval is not required under Listing Rule 7.1 and the issuance will not be included within the Company's 15% capacity.

If Resolution 7 is passed, the Company will be able to proceed with the proposed issue of Brudenell Options.

If Resolution 7 is not passed, the Company will not be able to proceed with the proposed issue of Brudenell Options, and may have to consider other ways to remunerate Mr Brudenell which are not as cost effective for the Company.

Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act

Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act prohibits the Company from giving a financial benefit to a related party of the Company unless either:

- (a) the giving of the financial benefit falls within one of the exceptions to the provisions; or

- (b) Shareholder approval under Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act is obtained prior to the giving of the financial benefit.

The proposed issue of options constitutes the giving of a financial benefit.

A “related party” for the purposes of the Corporations Act and the Listing Rules is widely defined and includes a director of a public company, a spouse of a director of a public company or an entity controlled by a director of a public company. The definition of “related party” also includes a person whom there is reasonable grounds to believe will become a “related party” of a public company.

The Board (with the conflicted Director excluded) carefully considered the issue of Brudenell Options and formed the view that the giving of the financial benefit to that Director was reasonable remuneration given the circumstances of the Company, the quantum and terms of the Brudenell Options and the responsibilities held by that Director in the Company.

Accordingly, the Company considers that the issue of these Brudenell Options to Mr Brudenell falls within the “reasonable remuneration” exception as set out in section 211 of the Corporations Act, and relies on this exception for the purposes of Resolution 7. Shareholder approval under Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act is therefore not required for this issue.

Information Required by Listing Rule 10.13

The following information in relation to the issue of Brudenell Options is provided to Shareholders for the purposes of Listing Rule 10.13:

- (a) The allottee is Mr David Brudenell or his nominee.
- (b) David Brudenell is a Director of the Company and is therefore a related party of the Company.
- (c) The maximum number of unlisted Brudenell Options to be issued is 21,000,000.
- (d) A summary of key terms of the Brudenell Options are set out in Annexure B of this Notice of Meeting.
- (e) The options will be issued within 1 month of Shareholder approval being obtained by the Company (or such later date to the extent permitted by any ASX waiver or modification of the Listing Rules).
- (f) The Brudenell Options will be offered for nil cash consideration
- (g) Details of Mr Brudenell current total remuneration package (excluding superannuation) is an annual base fee of \$350,000.
- (h) A Black Scholes validation (84.2% volatility, 4.49% risk free rate and 0% dividend yield) of the Incentive Options as at 10 October 2024 attributed an average value to each Brudenell Option of \$0.38760, resulting in an aggregate value of \$7,829,948 for the Options to be issued to David Brudenell.
- (i) Any funds received on exercise of the Brudenell Options will be used to provide additional funds for working capital.
- (j) The Brudenell Options are to be issued under an agreement between the Company and David Brudenell. The material terms of the agreement are set out in the above background section.
- (k) A voting exclusion statement is included above in the Notice of Meeting.

Recommendation

The Board of Directors (excluding Mr Brudenell) recommends that Shareholders vote in favour of Resolution 7.

Approval of Proportional Takeover Provisions

Resolution 8 – Renewal of Proportional Takeover Provisions

The Company wishes to renew the proportional takeovers provisions in its current Constitution. Further details in relation to this renewal are set out as follows:

Renewal of proportional takeover provisions

The Company's Constitution contains provisions concerning Takeover approval provisions in Schedule 5 of the Constitution (**Proportional Takeover Provisions**). The Proportional Takeover Provisions provide that the Company can refuse to register Shares acquired under a proportional takeover bid unless an approving resolution is passed by Shareholders.

Section 648G(1) of the Corporations Act provides that a company's proportional takeover provisions will cease to have effect at the end of three years from the date of adoption (or renewal, as the case may be). Schedule 5 of the Company's Constitution was last adopted by on 22 November 2019. The Company accordingly seeks the Shareholder approval of this Resolution for the renewal of the Proportional Takeover Provisions, which, for the purposes of the Corporations Act, requires the same process to amend or adopt a new constitution for the purposes of 136(2) of the Corporations Act. Shareholder approval will not result in a change to the wording of Schedule 5 of the Company's current Constitution.

The following information is provided for the purposes of Section 648G of the Corporations Act.

Proportional takeover bid

A proportional takeover bid is a takeover bid where the offer made to each Shareholder is only for a proportion of the Shareholder's Shares. If a Shareholder accepts, in full, an offer under a proportional takeover bid, the Shareholder will only dispose of a specified portion of their Shares in the Company and retain the balance of the Shares.

The Proportional Takeover Provisions are designed to assist Shareholders to receive proper value for their Shares if a proportional takeover bid is made for the Company by providing, in the Constitution, that:

- (a) in the event of a proportional takeover bid being made for Shares in the Company, Shareholders are required to vote and collectively decide whether to accept or reject the offer; and
- (b) the majority decision of the Company's members will be binding on all Shareholders.

Effect of the proposed provisions

Where offers have been made under a proportional takeover bid in respect of a class of securities in a company, the registration of a transfer giving effect to a contract resulting from the acceptance of an offer made under such a proportional takeover bid is prohibited unless and until a resolution to approve the proportional takeover bid is passed by Shareholders or otherwise, as pursuant to the terms of the Proportional Takeover Provisions.

In more detail, the effect of the Proportional Takeover Provisions is as follows:

- (a) if a proportional takeover bid is made for Securities of the Company, the Directors must ensure that a meeting of Shareholders is convened to vote on a resolution to approve that bid;
- (b) the bidder and persons associated with the bidder may not vote;
- (c) approval of the bid will require a simple majority of the votes cast;
- (d) the meeting must take place more than 14 days before the last day of the bid period (**Resolution Deadline**);

- (e) if the resolution is rejected before the Resolution Deadline, the bid cannot proceed and any transfers giving effect to takeover contracts for the bid will not be registered;
- (f) the bid will be taken to have been approved if, as at the end of the day before the Resolution Deadline, the resolution has not been voted on;
- (g) if the resolution is approved, the transfers must be registered (subject to other provisions of the Corporations Act and the Constitution); and
- (h) the Directors will breach the Corporations Act if they fail to ensure the resolution is voted on. However, the bid will still be taken to have been approved if it is not voted on within the Resolution Deadline.

The Proportional Takeover Provisions do not apply to full takeover bids. If the Proportional Takeover Provisions are renewed, they will cease to apply at the end of three years after renewal unless renewed by a Special Resolution of Shareholders.

Reasons for the proposed provisions

In the absence of the Proportional Takeover Provisions, a proportional takeover bid may result in control of the Company changing without Shareholders having an opportunity to dispose of all their Shares. By making a partial bid, a bidder can obtain practical control of the Company by acquiring less than a majority interest. Shareholders could be exposed to the risks of passing control to the bidder without payment of an adequate control premium for all their Shares and being left with a minority interest in the Company. Such Shareholders could suffer potential further loss if the takeover bid were to cause a decrease in the Share price or otherwise make the Shares less attractive and, therefore, more difficult to sell.

Knowledge of any acquisition proposals

As at the date of this Notice of Meeting, no Director is aware of any proposal to acquire, or to increase the extent of, a substantial interest in the Company.

Advantages and disadvantages during the period in which they have been in effect

The Directors consider that the Proportional Takeover Provisions had no advantages or disadvantages for them during the period in which they have been in effect.

The advantages and disadvantages of the Proportional Takeover Provisions for Shareholders include those set out below, which were applicable during the period in which they have been in effect.

Potential advantages and disadvantages

The renewal of the Proportional Takeover Provisions will enable the Directors to formally ascertain the views of the Shareholders in respect of a proportional takeover bid. Without such provisions, the Directors are dependent upon their perception of the interests and views of Shareholders. Other than this advantage, the Directors consider that the Proportional Takeover Provisions have no potential advantages or disadvantages for them and that they remain free to make a recommendation on whether an offer under a proportional takeover bid should be accepted.

The potential advantages of the Proportional Takeover Provisions for Shareholders include:

- (a) providing the right to discuss, in a meeting called specifically for that purpose, and then decide, by majority vote, whether an offer under a proportional takeover bid should proceed;
- (b) assisting the prevention of Shareholders being locked in as a minority;
- (c) increasing the bargaining power of Shareholders which may assist in ensuring that any proportional takeover bid is adequately priced;
- (d) potentially increasing the likelihood of a full takeover bid rather than a proportional takeover bid; and/or

- (e) enabling individual Shareholders to better assess the likely outcome of the proportional takeover bid, by knowing the view of the majority of Shareholders, which may assist in deciding whether to accept or reject an offer under the bid;

The potential disadvantages of the Proportional Takeover Provisions for Shareholders include:

- (a) imposing a hurdle to, and potentially discouraging the making of, provisional takeover bids which, in turn, may reduce any takeover speculation element in the price of Shares;
- (b) potentially reducing the likelihood of success of a proportional takeover bid;
- (c) possible reduction or loss of opportunities for Shareholders sell some or all of their Shares at a premium; and/or
- (d) potentially causing some Shareholders to form the view that the Proportional Takeover Provisions impose an unreasonable restriction on their ability to freely deal with their Shares.

Accordingly, the Company has prepared an updated Constitution (**New Constitution**) which renews Schedule 5 of the Constitution which prescribes the procedure to be followed when a proportional off-market bid is made.

Prior to the Meeting, a copy of the New Constitution is available for review by Shareholders at the Company's registered office during normal business hours. A copy of the New Constitution can also be sent to Shareholders of the Company upon a request being made to the Company Secretary elizabeth@confidantpartners.com.au. A complete signed copy of the New Constitution will be tabled at the Meeting.

Pursuant to section 136(2) of the Corporations Act, a modification to the Company's Constitution (which includes renewal of the Proportional Takeover Provisions) can only be effected by way of a Special Resolution passed by its Shareholders. ANNEXURE A – SUMMARY OF INCENTIVE PLAN

A summary of the terms of the Plan is set out below:

- (a) **(Eligible Participant):** Eligible Participant means a person that has been determined by the Board to be eligible to participate in the Plan from time to time and is an “ESS participant” (as that term is defined in Division 1A) in relation to the Company or an associated entity of the Company. This relevantly includes, amongst others:
- (i) an employee or director of the Company or an individual who provides services to the Company;
 - (ii) an employee or director of an associated entity of the Company or an individual who provides services to such an associated entity;
 - (iii) a prospective person to whom paragraphs (i) or (ii) apply;
 - (iv) a person prescribed by the relevant regulations for such purposes; or
 - (v) certain related persons on behalf of the participants described in paragraphs (i) to (iv) (inclusive).
- (b) **(Maximum allocation)** The Company must not make an offer of Securities under the Plan in respect of which monetary consideration is payable (either upfront, or on exercise of convertible securities) where:
- (i) the total number of Plan Shares (as defined in paragraph (m) below) that may be issued or acquired upon exercise of the convertible securities offered; plus
 - (ii) the total number of Plan Shares issued or that may be issued as a result of offers made under the Plan at any time during the previous 3 year period,
- would exceed 5% of the total number of Shares on issue at the date of the offer or such other limit as may be specified by the relevant regulations or the Company’s Constitution from time to time.
- The maximum number of equity securities proposed to be issued under the Plan for the purposes of Listing Rule 7.2, Exception 13 will be as approved by Shareholders from time to time (**ASX Limit**). This means that, subject to the following paragraph, the Company may issue up to the ASX Limit under the Plan without seeking Shareholder approval and without reducing its placement capacity under Listing Rule 7.1.
- The Company will require prior Shareholder approval for the acquisition of equity securities under the Plan to Directors, their associates and any other person whose relationship with the Company or a Director or a Director’s associate is such that, in ASX’s opinion, the acquisition should be approved by Shareholders. The issue of Securities with Shareholder approval will not count towards the ASX Limit.
- (c) **(Purpose):** The purpose of the Plan is to:
- (i) assist in the reward, retention and motivation of Eligible Participants;
 - (ii) link the reward of Eligible Participants to Shareholder value creation; and

- (iii) align the interests of Eligible Participants with shareholders of the Group (being the Company and each of its Associated Bodies Corporate), by providing an opportunity to Eligible Participants to receive an equity interest in the Company in the form of Securities.
- (d) **(Plan administration):** The Plan will be administered by the Board. The Board may exercise any power or discretion conferred on it by the Plan rules in its sole and absolute discretion, subject to compliance with applicable laws and the Listing Rules. The Board may delegate its powers and discretion.
- (e) **(Eligibility, invitation and application):** The Board may from time to time determine that an Eligible Participant may participate in the Plan and make an invitation to that Eligible Participant to apply for Securities on such terms and conditions as the Board decides. An invitation issued under the Plan will comply with the disclosure obligations pursuant to Division 1A.

On receipt of an invitation, an Eligible Participant may apply for the Securities the subject of the invitation by sending a completed application form to the Company. The Board may accept an application from an Eligible Participant in whole or in part. If an Eligible Participant is permitted in the invitation, the Eligible Participant may, by notice in writing to the Board, nominate a party in whose favour the Eligible Participant wishes to renounce the invitation.

A waiting period of at least 14 days will apply to acquisitions of Securities for monetary consideration as required by the provisions of Division 1A.

- (f) **(Grant of Securities):** The Company will, to the extent that it has accepted a duly completed application, grant the successful applicant (**Participant**) the relevant number of Securities, subject to the terms and conditions set out in the invitation, the Plan rules and any ancillary documentation required.
- (g) **(Terms of Convertible Securities):** Each 'Convertible Security' represents a right to acquire one or more Shares (for example, under an option or performance right), subject to the terms and conditions of the Plan.

Prior to a Convertible Security being exercised a Participant does not have any interest (legal, equitable or otherwise) in any Share the subject of the Convertible Security by virtue of holding the Convertible Security. A Participant may not sell, assign, transfer, grant a security interest over or otherwise deal with a Convertible Security that has been granted to them. A Participant must not enter into any arrangement for the purpose of hedging their economic exposure to a Convertible Security that has been granted to them.

- (h) **(Vesting of Convertible Securities):** Any vesting conditions applicable to the grant of Convertible Securities will be described in the invitation. If all the vesting conditions are satisfied and/or otherwise waived by the Board, a vesting notice will be sent to the Participant by the Company informing them that the relevant Convertible Securities have vested. Unless and until the vesting notice is issued by the Company, the Convertible Securities will not be considered to have vested. For the avoidance of doubt, if the vesting conditions relevant to a Convertible Security are not satisfied and/or otherwise waived by the Board, that Convertible Security will lapse.

- (i) **(Exercise of Convertible Securities and cashless exercise):** To exercise a Convertible Security, the Participant must deliver a signed notice of exercise and, subject to a cashless exercise of Convertible Securities (see below), pay the exercise price (if any) to or as directed by the Company, at any time prior to the earlier of any date specified in the vesting notice and the expiry date as set out in the invitation.

At the time of exercise of the Convertible Securities, and subject to Board approval, the Participant may elect not to be required to provide payment of the exercise price for the number of Convertible Securities specified in a notice of exercise, but that on exercise of those Convertible Securities the Company will transfer or issue to the Participant that number of Shares equal in value to the positive difference between the Market Value of the Shares at the time of exercise and the exercise price that would otherwise be payable to exercise those Convertible Securities.

Market Value means, at any given date, the volume weighted average price per Share traded on the ASX over the 5 trading days immediately preceding that given date, unless otherwise specified in an invitation.

A Convertible Security may not be exercised unless and until that Convertible Security has vested in accordance with the Plan rules, or such earlier date as set out in the Plan rules.

- (j) **(Delivery of Shares on exercise of Convertible Securities):** As soon as practicable after the valid exercise of a Convertible Security by a Participant, the Company will issue or cause to be transferred to that Participant the number of Shares to which the Participant is entitled under the Plan rules and issue a substitute certificate for any remaining unexercised Convertible Securities held by that Participant.
- (k) **(Forfeiture of Convertible Securities):** Where a Participant who holds Convertible Securities ceases to be an Eligible Participant or becomes insolvent, all unvested Convertible Securities will automatically be forfeited by the Participant, unless the Board otherwise determines in its discretion to permit some or all of the Convertible Securities to vest.

Where the Board determines that a Participant has acted fraudulently or dishonestly, or wilfully breached his or her duties to the Group, the Board may in its discretion deem all unvested Convertible Securities held by that Participant to have been forfeited.

Unless the Board otherwise determines, or as otherwise set out in the Plan rules:

- (i) any Convertible Securities which have not yet vested will be forfeited immediately on the date that the Board determines (acting reasonably and in good faith) that any applicable vesting conditions have not been met or cannot be met by the relevant date; and
- (ii) any Convertible Securities which have not yet vested will be automatically forfeited on the expiry date specified in the invitation.

A Participant may exercise any voting rights attaching to Plan Shares.
- (n) **(Disposal restrictions on Securities):** If the invitation provides that any Plan Shares or Convertible Securities are subject to any restrictions as to the disposal or other dealing by a Participant for a period, the Board may implement any procedure it deems appropriate to ensure the compliance by the Participant with this restriction.
- (o) **(Adjustment of Convertible Securities):** If there is a reorganisation of the issued share capital of the Company (including any subdivision, consolidation, reduction, return or cancellation of such issued capital of the Company), the rights of each Participant holding Convertible Securities will be changed to the extent necessary to comply with the Listing Rules applicable to a reorganisation of capital at the time of the reorganisation.

If Shares are issued by the Company by way of bonus issue (other than an issue in lieu of dividends or by way of dividend reinvestment), the holder of Convertible Securities is entitled, upon exercise of the Convertible Securities, to receive an allotment of as many additional Shares as would have been issued to the holder if the holder held Shares equal in number to the Shares in respect of which the Convertible Securities are exercised.

Unless otherwise determined by the Board, a holder of Convertible Securities does not have the right to participate in a pro rata issue of Shares made by the Company or sell renounceable rights.

- (p) **(Participation in new issues):** There are no participation rights or entitlements inherent in the Convertible Securities and holders are not entitled to participate in any new issue of Shares of the Company during the currency of the Convertible Securities without exercising the Convertible Securities.
- (q) **(Amendment of Plan):** Subject to the following paragraph, the Board may at any time amend any provisions of the Plan rules, including (without limitation) the terms and conditions upon which any Securities have been granted under the Plan and determine that any amendments to the Plan rules be given retrospective effect, immediate effect or future effect.

No amendment to any provision of the Plan rules may be made if the amendment materially reduces the rights of any Participant as they existed before the date of the amendment, other than an amendment introduced primarily for the purpose of complying with legislation or to correct manifest error or mistake, amongst other things, or is agreed to in writing by all Participants.

Cheques paid in connection with the exercise of Options must be in Australian currency, made payable to the company and crossed "Not Negotiable".
- (f) **(Shares issued on exercise):** Shares issued on exercise of Options will rank equally in all respects with then existing fully paid ordinary shares in the Company.
- (g) **(Quotation of Shares):** Provided that the Company is quoted on the official list of ASX Limited at the time, application will be made by the Company to ASX Limited for quotation of the shares issued pursuant to the exercise of the Options.
- (h) **(Timing of issue of Shares):** Within 5 business days after the receipt of an Exercise Notice the Company will allot and issue the Shares pursuant to the exercise of the Options. The Company makes no representation that the Shares will be freely tradeable upon issue and the holder acknowledges that the Shares may be subject to the on-sale restrictions contained in ss 706 and 707 of the *Corporations Act 2001* (Cth). In these circumstances, the holder agrees not to trade the Shares for so long as the Shares are subject to such restrictions.
- (i) **(Shareholder and regulatory approvals):**
 - (i) Notwithstanding any other provision of these terms and conditions, exercise of Options into Shares will be subject to the Company obtaining all required (if any) Shareholder and regulatory approvals for the purpose of issuing Shares to the holder.
 - (ii) If exercise of the Options would result in any person being in contravention of section 606 of the Corporations Act then the exercise of each Option that would cause the contravention will be deferred until such time or times that the exercise would not result in a contravention of section 606 of the Corporations Act.
