Clearing House Electronic Sub-Register System (CHES) and Issuer Sponsorship

The Company will apply to participate in CHES, for those investors who have, or wish to have, a sponsoring stockbroker. Investors who do not wish to participate through CHES will be issuer sponsored by the Company.

1.4 Key Risk Factors

If the Company's Submission is successful, it intends to apply for a Retention Lease in respect of the Permit or alternatively a Suspension and Extension of the Permit. The Company has commenced preparations in relation to a Retention Lease application (which includes the requirement for engineering and development studies relating to potential development options for the oil already discovered on the Permit). There is no guarantee that the application for a Retention Lease will be approved and a Retention Lease may not be granted, resulting in the Company not being able to improve the commercial viability of the Permit. Joint venture partner	During the financial year ended 30 June 2021, the Company signed a farmout and funding agreement and joint venture operating agreement in relation to the Permit with Quay Resource Investments Pty Ltd (Quay). Naylor (and associated entities), Mr Phillip Smith, Mr Brendan Brown and Ms Sihol Marito Gultom and the consequences of that effect will depend on a number of factors including the number of new Shares taken up by Eligible Shareholders and the issue of new Shares under the Shortfall Offer.

These present intentions may change as new information becomes available, as circumstances change or in the light of all material information at the relevant time.

As set out in Section 2.6, on the basis of the allocation policy, no person will acquire, through participation in the Shortfall Offer:

- (a) a holding of Shares of; or
- (b) increase their holding to,

an amount in excess of 19.99% of all the Shares on issue on completion of the Offer.

1.7 Potential dilution on non-participating Shareholders

Shareholders who accept their Entitlement in full and also apply for additional Shares under the Shortfall Offer may increase their relevant interests in the Company. This could result in the dilution of holdings of those who declined to accept their Entitlements in full and those who didn't apply for additional Shares.

In addition to potential control impacts set out in Section 1.6, Shareholders should note that if they do not participate in the Offer or are otherwise ineligible to participate in the Offer, their percentage holdings are likely to be diluted by approximately 33% (as compared to their holdings and number of Shares on issue as at the date of this Prospectus).

2. DETAILS OF THE OFFER

2.1 The Offer

1. The Company intends make a Retention Lease application or a Suspension and Extension application in respect of the Permit, pending certain other approvals. As part of the Retention Lease application process, the Company is required to prepare a works program and related budget which will require the completion of engineering and development studies. Refer to Section 1.4 for further information regarding the Retention Lease and Suspension and Extension application.
2. As stated in the Company's quarterly activities report (for the period ended 31 December 2022) released to ASX on 31 January 2023, the Company has reviewed a number of asset acquisition opportunities and is currently working on detailed due diligence on potential oil and gas exploration and development opportunities, with one particular opportunity in North America which may, if successful, complement its existing business plan and strategy.
3. Working capital and administration includes but is not limited to corporate administration and overhead costs and other expenses such as legal, tax and audit fees, insurance and travel costs, share registry costs, Directors' fees, ASX fees and regulatory compliance costs and expenses.

4. RIGHTS AND LIABILITIES ATTACHING TO SHARES

4.1 Rights and liabilities attaching to Shares

The following is a summary of the more significant rights and liabilities attaching to the Shares being offered pursuant to this Prospectus. This summary is not exhaustive and does not constitute a definitive statement of the rights and liabilities of Shareholders. To obtain such a statement, persons should seek independent legal advice.

Full details of the rights and liabilities attaching to Shares are set out in the Constitution, a copy of which is available for inspection at the Company's registered office during normal business hours.

(a) General meetings

Shareholders are entitled to be present in person, or by proxy, attorney or representative to attend and vote at general meetings of the Company.

Shareholders may requisition meetings in accordance with section 249D of the Corporations Act and the Constitution of the Company.

(b) Voting rights

Subject to any rights or restrictions for the time being attached to any class or classes of shares, at general meetings of shareholders or classes of shareholders:

- (i) each Shareholder entitled to vote may vote in person or by proxy, attorney or representative;
- (ii) on a show of hands, every person present who is a Shareholder or a proxy, attorney or representative of a Shareholder has one vote; and
- (iii) on a poll, every person present who is a Shareholder or a proxy, attorney or representative of a Shareholder shall, in respect of each fully paid Share held by him, or in respect of which he is appointed a proxy, attorney or representative, have one vote for each Share held, but in respect of partly paid shares shall have such number of votes as bears the same proportion to the total of such Shares registered in the Shareholder's name as the amount paid (not credited) bears to the total amounts paid and payable (excluding amounts credited).

(c) Dividend rights

Subject to the rights of any preference Shareholders and to the rights of the holders of any shares created or raised under any special arrangement as to dividend, the Directors may from time to time declare a dividend to be paid to the Shareholders entitled to the dividend which shall be payable on all Shares according to the proportion that the amount paid (not credited) is of the total amounts paid and payable (excluding amounts credited) in respect of such Shares.

The Directors may from time to time pay to the Shareholders any interim dividends as they may determine. No dividend shall carry interest as against the Company. (d) **Winding-up**

If the Company is wound up, the liquidator may, with the authority of a special resolution, divide among the Shareholders in kind the whole or any part of the property of the Company, and may for that purpose set such value as he considers fair upon any property to be so divided, and may determine how the division is to be carried out as between the Shareholders or different classes of Shareholders.

Subject to restrictions on the issue or grant of securities contained in the ASX Listing Rules, the Constitution and the Corporations Act (and without affecting any special right previously conferred on the holder of an existing share or class of shares), the Directors may issue Shares as they shall, in their absolute discretion, determine.

(h) **Variation of rights**

Under section 246B of the Corporations Act, the Company may, with the sanction of a special resolution passed at a meeting of Shareholders vary or abrogate the rights attaching to Shares.

If the Company's Submission is successful, it intends to apply for a Retention Lease in respect of the Permit or alternatively a Suspension and Extension of the Permit. The Company has commenced preparations in relation to a Retention Lease application (which includes the requirement for engineering and development studies relating to potential development options for the oil already discovered on the Permit). There is no guarantee that the application for a Retention Lease will be approved and a Retention Lease may not be granted, resulting in the Company not being able to improve the commercial viability of the Permit. If the application is not approved and a Retention Lease is not granted, the Company will be required to continue to comply with the expenditure requirements under the Permit conditions and the requirements of the associated work program by mid June 2023. Given the length of time required to undertake the Retention Lease application process, the Company will also be applying for a Suspension and Extension of the Permit in respect of the requirements of the work program before mid June 2023. There is a risk that the Company will not receive such a Suspension and

	Extension which may result in the Permit expiring before the end of 2023.
Joint venture partner	During the financial year ended 30 June 2021, the Company signed a farmout and funding agreement and joint venture operating agreement in relation to the Permit with Quay Resource Investments Pty Ltd (Quay). A summary of the key terms of this transaction are provided Company's ASX announcement dated 30 November 2020. Under the agreement, Quay was to earn a 50% working interest in the Permit by providing limited recourse debt finance to fund the estimated costs to drill the Idris appraisal well and certain back costs. Quay then had a success-based option to maintain its 50% working interest by providing further funds to the proposed joint venture to be applied towards a success based estimated stage 1 field development. The Company has continued to work co-operatively with Quay to extend the time period for remittance of funding, however the Company has not to date been successful in obtaining such funding and notwithstanding Quay's contractual obligations, there can be no guarantee that the Company will receive such funding in the future. Due to delays in receiving this funding, the Company has commenced presentations and discussions with a number of alternative interested farm in parties but has not received firm offers to date.
Key person retention risks	There is a risk that given the Company's limited financial resources and reduced remuneration arrangements for all key management personnel that the Company may not be able to continue to retain the requisite or most suitable personnel to be able to execute on its business plans. The total maximum remuneration of non-executive Directors is initially set by the Constitution and subsequent variation is by ordinary resolution of Shareholders in general meeting in accordance with the Constitution, the Corporations Act and the ASX Listing Rules, as applicable. The determination of non-executive Directors' remuneration within that maximum will be made by the Board having regard to the inputs and value to the Company of the respective contributions by each non-executive Director. The current amount has been set at an amount not to exceed \$500,000 per annum.

A Director may be paid fees or other amounts (i.e. non-cash performance incentives such as Options, subject to any necessary Shareholder approval) as the other Directors determine where a Director performs special duties or otherwise performs services outside the scope of the ordinary duties of a Director. In addition, Directors are also entitled to be paid reasonable travelling, hotel and other expenses incurred by them respectively in or about the performance of their duties as Directors.
