Chairman's Review

Dear Fellow Shareholders

Background

The past year has been a hectic one for Gullewa, on one hand Allegiance Coal Limited was floated towards the end of the year and on the other, the crises of the North Atlantic Nations continues to roll on without any sign of massive deterioration or of solution. The complexity has been further increased by a slowdown in China, in part exacerbated by the changeover in leadership now in progress.

Of some concern are the falling prices of all minerals as production increases but the rate of increase in demand slows. In Australia both the Federal and State governments have continued to increase regulation and costs which threaten the viability of both mining and exploration.

As I commented last year, at times like these we must bear in mind the massive and continuing industrialisation of Asia continuing. We must ensure that Australia continues to supply the minerals needed for this expansion and not be relegated to being a marginal supplier by more competitive countries in Africa, South America, Russia and Asia. This is the challenge!! Governments, both State and Federal, must change their attitude and assist rather than hinder the exploration industry. It is our industry that provides future wealth.

Allegiance Coal Limited – AHQ – Australia – Gullewa 57.75%

The floating of Allegiance Coal Limited was successfully completed in May, 2012 when \$7,000,000 was raised. A pre-IPO raising was put in place in November, 2011 which raised \$2,500,000. It appeared that the timing was opportune for the raising, however subsequent market action has been most disappointing as far as the share price is concerned. The fact that all other exploration companies are similarly effected does not ameliorate the hurt.

Intermittent rains in our key areas of Back Creek in the Surat Basin and Kilmain in the Bowen Basin have markedly slowed our ability to drill in these areas. However, at Back Creek a reduced cost effective programme has been completed and results of the analyses and resource estimation are awaited.

At the time of writing it appears that unusually wet weather may preclude drilling at Kilmain due to flooded rivers.

Central Iron Ore – CIO – TSXV Canada – Gullewa 36.1%

CIO is quoted in Toronto and has continued to obtain encouraging exploration results in their **Yilgarn iron ore** region, both for magnetite and DSO (direct shipping ore). A drilling programme was completed in August, 2012 and analysis of the results are expected later this year.

On our South Darlot Project, a drilling programme is scheduled to commence in September, 2012 on the Barrick Gold Joint Venture area in the northern Yilgarn gold fields of Western Australia. On completion of this programme CIO will trigger the 50% stage of the farm-in. We are particularly enthusiastic about the prospectivity of the area.

Great caution is now required to preserve funds while being able to pursue opportunities which arise in downturns such as we are now navigating. It would be nice to have a little encouragement from the State and Federal governments to help us through these difficult times. We are, however, well placed to prosper in the upturn ahead.

Review of Operations

Allegiance Coal Limited (Gullewa 57.75%)

Allegiance Coal is an Australian public company listed in Australia (ASX: AHQ) which is focussed on exploration and development of coal in Queensland. The following activities were undertaken by Allegiance Coal Limited or its subsidiaries:

- Raised \$2.5 million in pre-IPO funds in September 2011.
- Listed on ASX on 29 May 2012 after raising \$7 million.
- Drilling within Back Creek Project (EPC 1297) undertaken throughout the tenement. A target of 60 to 80 million tonnes⁽¹⁾ was previously estimated for the project.
- Drilling within Kilmain Project (EPC1298) of three drill holes in the north of the tenement. Intersection of 3.1m of Castor/Pollux Seam enabled a target of 100 to 200 million tonnes⁽¹⁾ to be determined. Analysis of the coal cores from the Aries and Castor/Pollux Seams indicated presence of a coking fraction.
- The Company's subsidiary Moreton Coal Pty Ltd continued to evaluate the potential for the early development of its Mintovale open cut coal project. The project is based on MDL138 which is south of Boonah in the Scenic Rim Shire.
- The number of granted exploration tenements remains at 13.
- Land access agreements were concluded in relation to EPC 1297 Lochaber in order to advance exploration within the tenement.
- The company continued discussions with neighbours to conclude data swapping arrangements to enhance understanding of the geology of the tenements and to reduce where possible unnecessary exploration costs.

Central Iron Ore (Gullewa 36.1%)

CIO is an Australian public company listed in Canada (TSX-V: CIO) which is currently focused on the exploration and development of gold and iron ore projects located in Western Australia. The activities following were undertaken by or for CIO:

- Appointed Ms Katherine Garvey as CIO's Company secretary.
- Entered into an agreement for the A\$4 million sale of the Eureka Gold Project to Greenstone Minerals Limited.
- Completed an integration of the British King data with the Barrick JV data and reviewed the available geophysical data to identify targets for on-going exploration.
- Ground-based gravity survey of two tenements in the South Darlot Gold Project.
- Obtained approval for a first phase of drilling in the South Darlot Gold Project.
- Flew a high-resolution heli-magnetic survey over the Perinvale South Iron Ore Hub.
- An initial target between 510 and 850 million tonnes of iron mineralisation at an expected grade of 30–40% Fe was estimated at the Perinvale South Iron Ore Hub⁽¹⁾.
- Detailed mapping and sampling on the Perinvale South and Diemals Iron Ore Hubs.
- Completed a geophysical review of the Perinvale North Iron Ore Hub.
- Increased the landholding at the Perinvale South Iron Ore Hub.
- Obtained approval for a first phase of drilling at Perinvale South.
- The number of granted tenements is 26 with a further seven applications pending.

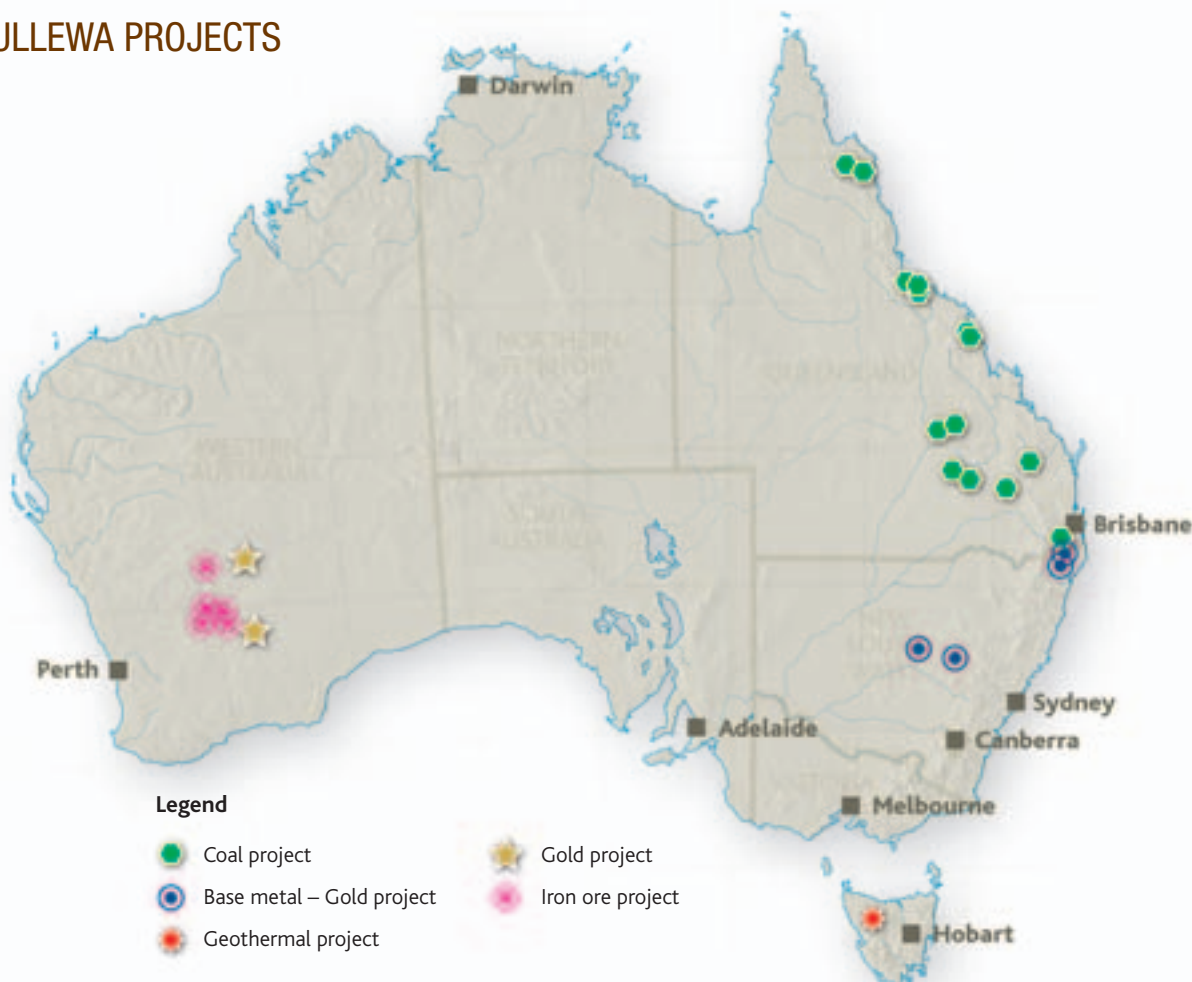

Two of the four blocks have been settled. The other two are under contract.
- **Pymble**
The property is on the market for sale.

Minerals

- Gullewa's wholly-owned subsidiaries hold 14 tenements in New South Wales.
- Identified two drill targets at its Dandaloo Project.

Review of Projects

GULLEWA PROJECTS



ALLEGIANCE COAL LIMITED (Gullewa 57.75%)

Allegiance Coal Limited raised a total of \$9.5 million during the year, \$2.5 million in pre-IPO funds in September 2011 and a further \$7 million to enable listing on ASX on 29, May 2012. The funding has enabled drill testing at three of the Company's projects, Back Creek, Kilmain and Lochaber.

Drilling was undertaken throughout the Back Creek Project (EPC 1297) tenement where a target of 60 to 80 million tonnes⁽¹⁾ was previously estimated for the project. The best intersection was in BC005, in the north of the tenement, which intersected 9.3 metres cumulative coal to a depth of 66.70 metres. Testwork on coal recovered from diamond drillholes has confirmed the presence of low ash thermal coal in some plies.

Within the Kilmain Project (EPC 1298), three drill holes were completed in the north of the tenement. The intersection of 3.1 metres of Castor/Pollux Seam enabled a target of 100 to 200 million tonnes⁽¹⁾ to be determined. Analysis of the coal cores from the Aries and Castor/Pollux Seams indicated presence of a coking fraction.



Back Creek Project (EPC 1297)

The Back Creek tenement area is located approximately 50 km northeast of Miles and 45 km southeast of Wandoan in the Surat Basin. The Taroom Measures are the dominant coal bearing formation throughout the tenement. Up to 25 coal plies are grouped into 11 main coal intervals forming three coal seams: Auburn, Bulwer and Condamine. The seams vary in thickness up to a maximum of 9.3 m although plies are commonly not laterally continuous.

The Company believes that the recent drilling confirms the excellent potential to define mineable resources in the northwestern and southern parts of the tenement.

Location: 45 km south east of Wandoan in the Surat Basin.

Area: 68 km²

Target: Low ash thermal coal

Tenement: EPC 1297

Proximity to Infrastructure: Planned Surat Basin rail line is 20 km to the west of the tenement connecting to the Port of Gladstone.

To the north of Back Creek and along strike, Stanmore Coal's The Range project has a Marketable Reserve of 94 million tonnes which is derived from a run of mine Coal Reserve of 117.5 million tonnes complying with the JORC Code⁽²⁾ and Cockatoo Coal's Bottle Tree project has reported 35 million tonnes of Inferred and Indicated Resources⁽³⁾.

In addition, down dip from Back Creek, Cockatoo Coal has reported significant coal intersections at its Bushranger project.

An initial drilling programme of 18 holes was completed by the Company in the northern part of the Back Creek tenement on privately owned land. Two holes were twinned so that bottom coal-bearing sections could be diamond core drilled to enable coal quality testwork to be undertaken. The initial programme involved 1,348 m of drilling including 34.16 m of core drilling. Coal intersection of 7.2 m of cumulative coal to a depth of 69.9 m within the Condamine and Bulwer coal seams was recovered in drill hole BC19C.

Widely spaced drilling was completed in this northern section by other companies in the 1960s and 1980s, and by Allegiance in 2011 as indicated above. A second drilling program by the Company was planned to infill the historic drilling to a spacing of approximately one kilometre, both in the north as well as in the Company's high priority areas to the south. Following the obtaining of approvals to access and drill within the Quandong and Barakula State Forests, located respectively in the north and southern part of EPC 129, a second drilling program entailing 31 drill sites was initiated and although heavy rains delayed the program. Drilling will be completed late in the September quarter 2012.

Analysis of the coal recovered from the cored holes in the initial program confirmed that the coal was low ash thermal coal with the potential for some plies to be able to be recovered and sold without requirement for washing. In one hole (BC038C) coal cores were canistered and gas analysed.

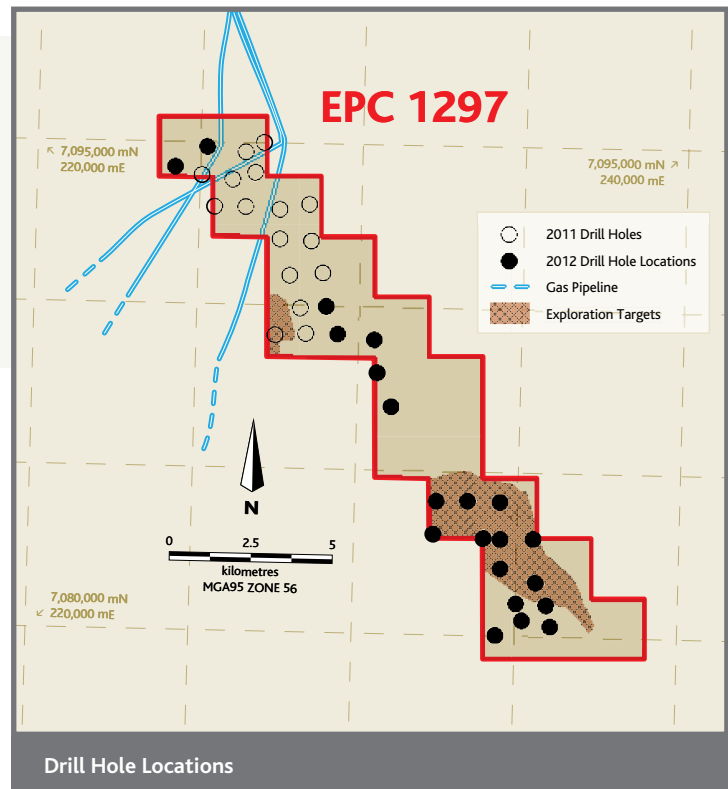
Potentially significant coal was intersected in drill hole BC005 with 9.3 m cumulative of coal being intersected to a depth of 66.70 m.

The second drilling program has included 1,696 m of non-cored geophysically logged holes as well as 203.75 m of diamond drilling.

Coal seam intersections in this second drilling program have been, for the most part, in-line with the modelling of the deposit based on previous data from within the tenement and data from swap arrangements with adjacent tenement holders.

The project has excellent potential to host a target of 60 to 80 million tonnes of shallow, open cut thermal coal⁽¹⁾.

The overall project planning is for first coal production in 2017 and full production of up to 5 million tonnes per annum by 2020 subject to the decisions on the building of the Surat Basin Rail Link.





Kilmain Project (EPCs 1298 and 1917)

The Kilmain tenement is located about 75 km southeast of Emerald in the Bowen Basin and is approximately 15 km west of the Rolleston rail line that connects to the Port of Gladstone.

Location: Approximately 300 km west of the Port of Gladstone in the Bowen Basin

Area: 56 km² (8.7 km² overlaps MDL 340)

Target: Coking/PCI and low ash thermal coal

Tenements: EPC 1298 and EPC 1917

Proximity to Infrastructure: Approximately 15 km west of the Rolleston rail line which connects to the port of Gladstone.

The project area is located down dip from BHP's Togara South Project (MDL340) which has total resources of 2.015 billion tonnes⁽⁴⁾. To the west, is Bandanna Energy's Arcturus project that has open cut and underground resources of 206.3 million tonnes⁽⁵⁾. The planned Arcturus underground mine's eastern longwall blocks are truncated by the western boundary of EPC 1298 Kilmain and show clear potential for the resources to extend well into the Kilmain tenement⁽⁵⁾.

Drilling commenced in mid September, 2011 of three partially cored deep holes in the northeast of the tenement. The drilling intersected the 3.1 m thick conjoined Castor/Pollux Seam and gave rise to a review of the target for Kilmain from the original 100 to 200 million tonnes⁽¹⁾.

Bottom depths of holes were between 470 and 500 m and cored to recover the Aries, Castor, Pollux and Orion Seams from each hole. All coal plies were sampled and analysed with results confirming the potential for washed coking, PCI or low ash thermal coal or an unwashed thermal or PCI coal product.

In one hole coal cores were canistered and gas analysed. The gas concentrations were considered too low to be of commercial interest by way of pre-drainage prior to mining.

Queensland Department of Natural Resources and Mines has advised that the amalgamation of EPC 1298 and EPC 1917 would proceed with the combined tenement to be granted for a period of four years (previously two years).

Drilling is planned to recommence in the first Quarter 2013 which should enable the estimation of an Inferred Resource in accordance with the JORC Code in the second Quarter 2013.

The Kilmain Project has potential for an underground deposit of coking/PCI/thermal coal within the Rangal Coal Measures and has an initial target of 100 to 200 million tonnes⁽¹⁾ of coal.

The overall project planning is for first coal production in 2017 and full production of up to 5 million tonnes per annum by 2020.

Other Projects

The Company's subsidiary, Moreton Coal Pty Ltd, continued to evaluate the potential for the early development of its Mintoale open cut coal project. The project is based on MDL 138 which is south of Boonah in Scenic Rim Shire.

At Lochaber, a field mapping program and drilling of two shallow, non coal intersecting holes in the western part of the tenement was completed in late 2011. The field mapping has provided further definition to planned drilling within the area which is proposed to involve some six holes in the central prospective area. There is an unconfirmed occurrence of coal in a nearby waterbore.

Activities on other projects included detailed data reviews, landholder access negotiations, some field reconnaissance and a study by Balance Resources on the infrastructure requirements for the Kilmain and Back Creek projects.

The Company has 13 granted tenements, and 12 pending applications of which nine are competing applications including one application for which the Company has been advised that it is the Priority Applicant. The remaining three applications are secondary applications.

HYDROMINING COAL AUSTRALIA PTY LTD (Gullewa 80%)

Hydromining Coal Australia Pty Ltd is the priority applicant for EPCA 2643 in the Biloela Sub-basin of the Bowen Basin. The target is lignite in the Tertiary Biloela Formation. This project is considered to have potential to test a non-entry mining method under development by the Company.

GULLEWA GEOTHERMAL PTY LTD (Gullewa 100%)

No work has been conducted during the year.



CENTRAL IRON ORE LIMITED (Gullewa 36.1%)

Central Iron Ore Limited ('CIO') is a TSXV-listed company exploring for gold and iron ore in the Yilgarn Craton of Western Australia. Gullewa completed the acquisition of a 49.1% interest during 2011. Subsequent capital raisings by CIO have reduced the equity held by Gullewa to 36.1%. The capital raised has been used to advance all of the Company's projects.

GOLD

South Darlot Gold Project

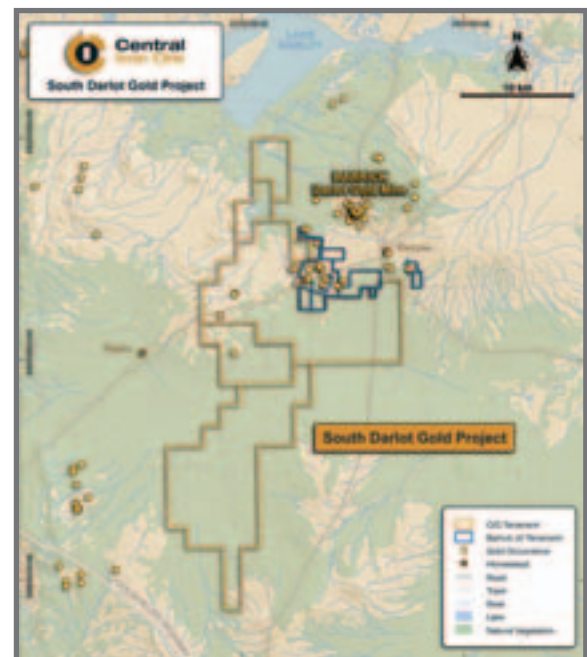
South Darlot Gold Project is approximately 320 km northwest of Kalgoorlie and includes the British King gold mine. The British King mine, which is 100% owned by CIO, is currently under care and maintenance. The Project is located 5km west of Barrick Gold Corporation's Darlot-Centenary gold mine in the Yandall Greenstone Belt. A review of the resources at the British King mine will be undertaken in the following year.

In February, 2011 CIO executed an agreement through its wholly-owned subsidiary, South Darlot Mines Pty Ltd, with Barrick (Plutonic) Limited and Barrick (Darlot) NL (together Barrick) to joint venture by way of earn-in to Barrick's Southern Darlot gold project area ('Joint Venture'). The Joint Venture tenements are situated southwest of Barrick's Darlot-Centenary gold mine and are contiguous with CIO's current holdings in the area.

Under the Agreement, CIO may progressively acquire an initial 51% interest, and management of the Joint Venture area, with an option to then increase its interest to 70% should it so choose. The agreed initial earn-in period is 24 months from the date of execution of the Agreement. The total spend required over this period is A\$450,000.

During the year CIO completed a high resolution ground gravity survey over M37/30, M37/631 and M37/632 covering approximately 13 km². In addition, available open file aeromagnetic data over the project was compiled, merged and processed. This data comprised 25 m line spacing over the Barrick Joint Venture area up to 400 m line spacing over the greater project area.

A drilling program to test several targets at the South Darlot Gold Project will be initiated in the September Quarter, which upon completion, will have earned CIO a 51% interest in the Barrick JV tenements.





Eureka Gold Project

The Eureka gold project is approximately 50 km north of Kalgoorlie and includes the Eureka open pit gold mine. The Eureka gold mine is currently under care and maintenance. The Company's current tenement package is 563 hectares.

On 5 December, 2011 CIO entered into an agreement for the A\$4 million sale of its Eureka Gold Project to Greenstone Minerals Limited (then known as Greenstone Minerals Pty Ltd) ("Purchaser"). The transaction involves the Purchaser paying CIO an AUD\$150,000 deposit and a further A\$3,850,000 in two tranches as follows:

- Tranche 1: The Purchaser must pay CIO A\$2,000,000 in cash on completion of the sale and purchase.
- Tranche 2: On the date that is twelve months from the date of the Purchaser's admission to the official list of the Australian Stock Exchange ("ASX"), the Purchaser must pay the following consideration to CIO:
- A\$850,000 cash; and
 - A\$1,000,000 in cash or shares in the Purchaser, at the Purchaser's election.

CIO and the Purchaser are in negotiations to vary the agreement so that completion of the sale and purchase is extended and is not conditional on an ASX listing of the Purchaser, and further, that the Tranche 2 payment is all payable in cash 12 months from the date of the variation. All consents, approvals, authorisations or clearances which are required for the sale and purchase (including any required TSXV approvals) have been obtained.

Eureka Open Pit Gold Mine



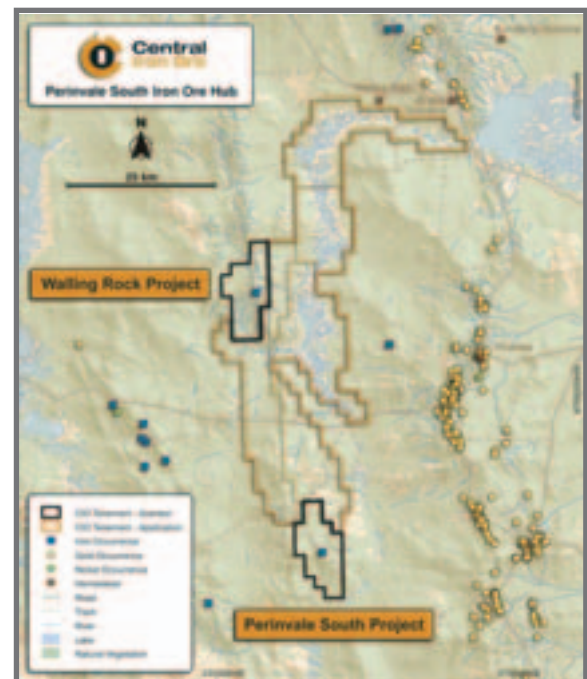
YILGARN IRON ORE PROJECT

The Company continued its strategy into iron ore via applying for further tenements in the Yilgarn Iron Ore province ("IOP") in Western Australia during the year. The applications have been made through the Company's 100% owned subsidiary Central West Resources Pty Ltd. The Company now has a total of 16 iron ore tenements covering 1,594 km², of which 10 tenements are granted and six tenements are pending applications. The Yilgarn IOP is increasingly being recognised as an attractive location for the development of iron ore, given its proximity to rail and access to ports.

Perinvale South Iron Ore Hub

3D and 2D magnetic modelling of a helimagnetic survey data over CIO's 100% owned Walling Rock Project has indicated a potential exploration target estimate of between 510 Mt to 850 Mt⁽¹⁾ (subject to a number of conditions see – CIO TSXV Announcement 10 February, 2012). Of this, 30 to 75 Mt is potentially enriched near-surface mineralisation above the primary bedrock mineralisation.

Detailed regolith mapping and rock-chip sampling programs were undertaken on the Walling Rock tenement. Coarse grained magnetite is exposed at surface and BIF ridges were mapped with a strike of 8 km and up to 110 m thick. Samples returned a peak grade of 43.11% Fe. Drilling of two diamond holes was completed at the end of the period to obtain samples for initial metallurgical test-work. Results are awaited.



Perinvale North Iron Ore Hub

In 2011, CIO entered into a farm-out agreement with the ASX listed Pacific Ore Limited ("Pacific") for CIO's Perinvale North Iron Ore Hub for A\$15 million. The Perinvale North Iron Ore Hub consists of Exploration Licence E57/818, covering an area of 120 km², and is located approximately 550 km northeast of Perth, Western Australia.



During the year, Pacific completed a mapping and rock chip sampling program at the Perinvale North Project. Surface rock chip channel samples targeted outcropping BIF. The most promising iron ore assay results were returned for samples of goethite cap material primarily located in the northern area of the Perinvale North Project. Whilst the grade of this material does not exceed 50% Fe, the lower silica content of these samples indicates that the degree of weathering in this area is nearing the point where secondary iron ore mineralisation may be encountered. In this respect it is important to note that the BIF area north of the sampled area is covered for a distance of over 1,100 m. There is potential for strongly weathered iron-rich BIF to exist within this area.

MINERALS

Gullewa's wholly-owned subsidiaries hold 14 tenements covering approximately 3,360 km² in New South Wales. The projects are located within two main regions, the Dubbo-Nyngan area in central New South Wales and the Grafton-Casino area in the northeast corner of the State.

Previously proposed drilling of two copper-gold prospects at Dandaloo was postponed and is now planned for late in 2012.

No field work was undertaken on any of the Company's New South Wales projects during the year.

Exploration Target Clarification

- (1) All statements pertaining to the Company's exploration target and statements as to the potential quantity and grade made in this Statement are conceptual in nature. There has been insufficient exploration undertaken to date to define a resource in accordance with the JORC Code, and it is uncertain if further exploration will result in the definition of a coal resource in accordance with the JORC Code.

Directors' Report

30 June 2012

The directors present their report, together with the financial statements, on the consolidated entity (referred to hereafter as the 'consolidated entity') consisting of Gullewa Limited (referred to hereafter as the 'company' or 'parent entity') and the entities it controlled for the year ended 30 June 2012.

Principal activities

The principal activities of the consolidated entity during the financial year were exploration and mining, property development and investments in equities.

Dividends

There were no dividends paid or declared during the current or previous financial year.

Review of Operations

The loss for the consolidated entity after providing for income tax and non-controlling interest amounted to \$4,045,431 (30 June 2011: \$2,188,542).

Gullewa Limited ('Gullewa')

Minerals

Through its wholly-owned subsidiaries, Gullewa holds 14 mineral exploration licences in New South Wales. Ten tenements are located within the central Lachlan Fold Belt where Gullewa is targeting copper-gold porphyry style deposits and orogenic gold deposits. Four tenements are located in the Clarence-Morton Basin in the North East of the State.

A proposed two-hole drilling program to test coincident soil geochemical anomalies and associated ground magnetic features was delayed because of the extensive rains during the summer period. The drilling was postponed until completion of harvesting towards the end of 2012.

Property

At Normanhurst, sales for two of the four blocks have been completed.

At St Ives, the sale of the property was completed.

Allegiance Coal Limited ('Allegiance') – Gullewa has 57.86% holding

On 24 May 2012, Allegiance was officially admitted to the Australian Securities Exchange ('ASX') after raising \$7,000,000 for 35,000,000 shares and 8,750,000 free Attaching Options, in an Initial Public Offering.

During November 2011, Allegiance raised \$2,500,000 of pre-Initial Public Offering capital from sophisticated investors.

Allegiance undertook exploration by way of drilling on Back Creek (EPC 1297), Kilmain (EPC 1298) and Lochaber (EPC 1672).

Back Creek

The drilling in the North enabled an Exploration Target of 60 to 80 million tonnes* to be determined. Drilling planned in the South for April 2012 was delayed due to extended wet weather.



Kilmain

Drilling of 3 holes in the North and intersection of 3.1m of Castor/Pollux Seam enabled an Exploration Target of 100 to 200 million tonnes* to be determined. Analysis of the cores from the Aries and Castor/Pollux Seams indicated presence of a coking coal fraction.

Lochaber

Two shallow holes were drilled without intersecting coal.

Allegiance's granted exploration tenements remain at 13. Allegiance has a total of 11 exploration tenement applications. Allegiance awaits a formal response on EPCA 2374 (Mt Marrow) where Mineral & Coal Investments Pty Limited (100% owned subsidiary of Allegiance) is the Priority Applicant.

Central Iron Ore Limited ('CIO') – Gullewa has 36.10% holding Iron Ore

CIO has expanded its position in the Yilgarn Iron Ore Province with the company now holding a total of 16 tenements covering a total of 1,594km². 10 tenements are granted and 6 tenements are pending applications.

Exploration by CIO has included a high resolution helimagnetic survey of the Walling Rock Project in the Perinvale South Iron Ore Hub. 2D and 3D modelling of the survey data, combined with field mapping and sampling of the project area, has enabled the potential estimation of an Exploration Target of 510Mt to 850Mt of iron*. A small drilling program of one of the outcropping units was completed subsequent to year end and confirmed the presence of BIF to a depth of over 250m.

Pacific Ore Limited ('Pacific') has advised that exploration on CIO's Perinvale North Iron Ore Hub has included mapping and rock chip sampling and has identified low silica goethite-capped BIF. Pacific can earn up to 90% of the project by spending \$15m on exploration.

Gold – South Darlot Gold Project

CIO has completed a high resolution gravity survey covering several mining leases forming part of the Barrick Joint Venture Project. Interpretation of the geophysical data, combined with a thorough compilation and interpretation of all historic surface sampling in the Barrick database, has identified numerous near-surface drilling targets. Drilling of some of these targets will be undertaken in the second half of 2012 and will assist CIO meeting its contractual obligations under the terms of the Joint Venture. CIO can earn up to 70% of the Joint Venture by funding exploration.

Significant changes in the state of affairs

On 8 July 2011 the company's 50% associate, Our Field Pty Ltd, completed the settlement of the sale of its property at St Ives.

On 16 August 2011 the Queensland Government issued an announcement suspending new and existing exploration tenements in and around South Queensland, and in and around urban centres across the remainder of the state. Moreton Coal Pty Limited, a 100% subsidiary of Allegiance Coal Limited ('Allegiance Coal'), holds a mineral development licence that will be impacted by this announcement. No legislation has yet been passed and the directors are currently investigating a case for compensation should any legislation pass. The capitalised exploration cost in Moreton Coal Pty Limited is \$287,479. Management anticipate further announcements on this issue during the 2013 financial year and will make an assessment of the impact on the consolidated entity at the appropriate time.

On 17 November 2011 the company announced that its subsidiary, Allegiance Coal had completed its pre-Initial Public Offering capital raising from sophisticated investors of \$2,500,000.

On 29 May 2012 the company announced that its subsidiary, Allegiance Coal had completed its Initial Public Offering, raising \$7,000,000. The company's interest in Allegiance Coal is now 57.86%.

There were no other significant changes in the state of affairs of the consolidated entity during the financial year.

Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year

Subsequent to the end of the financial year, contracts have been exchanged for lots C and D on the property at 123 Pennant Hills Road, Normanhurst and their cost will be recovered.

No other matter or circumstance has arisen since 30 June 2012 that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect the consolidated entity's operations, the results of those operations, or the consolidated entity's state of affairs in future financial years.

* Exploration Target

All statements as to Exploration Target of Allegiance and CIO and statements as to potential quality and grade are conceptual in nature. There has been insufficient exploration undertaken to date to define a coal or iron ore resource and identification of a resource will be totally dependent on the outcome of further exploration. Any statement contained herein as to exploration results or Exploration Target has been made consistent with the requirements of the JORC Code.



Likely developments and expected results of operations

Information on likely developments in the operations of the consolidated entity and the expected results of operations have not been included in this report because the directors believe it would be likely to result in unreasonable prejudice to the consolidated entity.

Notes to the Financial Statements

30 June 2012

Note 1: Significant accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

New, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The consolidated entity has adopted all of the new, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new, revised or amending Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

Any significant impact on the accounting policies of the consolidated entity from the adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations are disclosed in the relevant accounting policy. The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any significant impact on the financial performance or position of the consolidated entity.

The following Accounting Standards and Interpretations are most relevant to the consolidated entity:

AASB 2010-4 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from the Annual Improvements Project

The consolidated entity has applied AASB 2010-4 amendments from 1 July 2011. The amendments made numerous non-urgent but necessary amendments to a range of Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations. The amendments provided clarification of disclosures in AASB 7 'Financial Instruments: Disclosures', in particular emphasis of the interaction between quantitative and qualitative disclosures and the nature and extent of risks associated with financial instruments; clarified that an entity can present an analysis of other comprehensive income for each component of equity, either in the statement of changes in equity or in the notes in accordance with AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Instruments'; and provided guidance on the disclosure of significant events and transactions in AASB 134 'Interim Financial Reporting'.

AASB 2010-5 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards

The consolidated entity has applied AASB 2010-5 amendments from 1 July 2011. The amendments made numerous editorial amendments to a range of Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, including amendments to reflect changes made to the text of International Financial Reporting Standards by the International Accounting Standards Board.

AASB 124 Related Party Disclosures (December 2009)

The consolidated entity has applied AASB 124 (revised) from 1 July 2011. The revised standard simplified the definition of a related party by clarifying its intended meaning and eliminating inconsistencies from the definition. A subsidiary and an associate with the same investor are related parties of each other; entities significantly influenced by one person and entities significantly influenced by a close member of the family of that person are no longer related parties of each other; and whenever a person or entity has both joint control over a second entity and joint control or significant influence over a third party, the second and third entities are related to each other.

AASB 2010-6 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Disclosures on Transfers of Financial Assets

The consolidated entity has applied AASB 2010-6 amendments from 1 July 2011. These amendments add and amended disclosure requirements in AASB 7 about transfer of financial assets, including the nature of the financial assets involved and the risks associated with them. Additional disclosures are now required when (i) an asset is transferred but is not derecognised; and (ii) when assets are derecognised but the consolidated entity has a continuing exposure to the asset after the sale.

AASB 2011-1 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from the Trans-Tasman Convergence Project

The consolidated entity has applied AASB 2011-1 amendments from 1 July 2011. These amendments made changes to a range of Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations for the purpose of closer alignment to International Financial Reporting Standards ('IFRSs') and harmonisation between Australian and New Zealand Standards. The amendments removed certain guidance and definitions from Australian Accounting Standards for conformity of drafting with IFRSs but without any intention to change requirements.



AASB 1048 Interpretation of Standards (revised)

The consolidated entity has applied AASB 1048 (revised) for the year ended 30 June 2012. The revised standard identifies the Australian Interpretations and classifies them into two groups: those that correspond to an International Accounting Standards Board ('IASB') Interpretation (Table 1 – international equivalent), and those that do not (Table 2 – domestic interpretations). The standard has been updated to remove old or superseded interpretations and add new interpretations.

AASB 1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

The consolidated entity has applied AASB 1054 from 1 July 2011. The standard sets out the Australian-specific disclosures as a result of Phase I of the Trans-Tasman Convergence Project, which are in addition to International Financial Reporting Standards, for entities that have adopted Australian Accounting Standards.

Going concern

The consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

For the year ended 30 June 2012, the consolidated entity incurred a loss from continuing operations after tax of \$4,541,379 (2011: \$2,357,279). In the same period the consolidated entity had operating cash outflows of \$2,342,850 (2011: \$2,568,647).

A cash flow forecast for the next 12 months prepared by management has indicated that the consolidated entity will have sufficient cash assets to be able to meet its debts as and when they are due.

No adjustments have been made relating to recoverability and classification of recorded asset amounts and classification of liabilities that might be necessary should the consolidated entity not continue as a going concern.

Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the Corporations Act 2001, as appropriate for for-profit oriented entities. These financial statements also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ('IASB').

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for assets designated at fair value through profit or loss. Historical cost is generally based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the consolidated entity's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

Parent entity information

In accordance with the Corporations Act 2001, these financial statements present the results of the consolidated entity only. Supplementary information about the parent entity is disclosed in note 34.

Principles of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets and liabilities of all subsidiaries of Gullewa Limited ('company' or 'parent entity') as at 30 June 2012 and the results of all subsidiaries for the year then ended. Gullewa Limited and its subsidiaries together are referred to in these financial statements as the 'consolidated entity'.

Subsidiaries are all those entities over which the consolidated entity has the power to govern the financial and operating policies, generally accompanying a shareholding of more than one-half of the voting rights. The effects of potential exercisable voting rights are considered when assessing whether control exists. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the consolidated entity. They are de-consolidated from the date that control ceases.

Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between entities in the consolidated entity are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of the impairment of the asset transferred. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the consolidated entity.

The acquisition of subsidiaries is accounted for using the acquisition method of accounting. Refer to the 'business combinations' accounting policy for further details. A change in ownership interest, without the loss of control, is accounted for as an equity



transaction, where the difference between the consideration transferred and the book value of the share of the non-controlling interest acquired is recognised directly in equity attributable to the parent.

Non-controlling interest in the results and equity of subsidiaries are shown separately in the statement of comprehensive income and statement of financial position of the consolidated entity. Losses incurred by the consolidated entity are attributed to the non-controlling interest in full, even if that results in a deficit balance.

Where the consolidated entity loses control over a subsidiary, it derecognises the assets including goodwill, liabilities and non-controlling interest in the subsidiary together with any cumulative translation differences recognised in equity. The consolidated entity recognises the fair value of the consideration received and the fair value of any investment retained together with any gain or loss in profit or loss.

Operating segments

Operating segments are presented using the 'management approach', where the information presented is on the same basis as the internal reports provided to the Chief Operating Decision Makers ('CODM'). The CODM is responsible for the allocation of resources to operating segments and assessing their performance.

Revenue recognition

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the consolidated entity and the revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Sale of commodities

Revenue from the sale of commodities is recognised upon the delivery of commodities to customers and the associated risks of ownership have passed.

Sale of shares

Revenue on the sale of shares at fair value through profit or loss and available-for-sale assets is recognised on trade date when the risks and rewards of ownership have passed.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Rent

Rent revenue from investment properties is recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease term. Lease incentives granted are recognised as part of the rental revenue. Contingent rentals are recognised as income in the period when earned.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Income tax

The income tax expense or benefit for the period is the tax payable on that period's taxable income based on the applicable income tax rate for each jurisdiction adjusted by changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities attributable to temporary differences and unused tax losses and the adjustment recognised for prior periods, where applicable.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for temporary differences at the tax rates expected to apply when the assets are recovered or liabilities are settled, based on those tax rates that are enacted or substantively enacted, except for:

- When the deferred income tax asset or liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and that, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting nor taxable profits; or
- When the taxable temporary difference is associated with investments in subsidiaries, associates or interests in joint ventures, and the timing of the reversal can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses only if it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences and losses.



The carrying amount of recognised and unrecognised deferred tax assets are reviewed each reporting date. Deferred tax assets recognised are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that future taxable profits will be available for the carrying amount to be recovered. Previously unrecognised deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that there are future taxable profits available to recover the asset.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only where there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets against current tax liabilities and deferred tax assets against deferred tax liabilities; and they relate to the same taxable authority on either the same taxable entity or different taxable entity's which intend to settle simultaneously.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other receivables

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any provision for impairment.

Inventories

Investment properties are classified as inventory as they are in the process of being sold in the ordinary course of business. These are valued at the fair value on the date of reclassification.

Associates

Associates are entities over which the consolidated entity has significant influence but not control or joint control. Investments in associates are accounted for using the equity method. Under the equity method, the share of the profits or losses of the associate is recognised in profit or loss and the share of the movements in equity is recognised in other comprehensive income. Investments in associates are carried in the statement of financial position at cost plus post-acquisition changes in the consolidated entity's share of net assets of the associates. Dividends received or receivable from associates reduce the carrying amount of the investment.

When the consolidated entity's share of losses in an associate equals or exceeds its interest in the associate, including any unsecured long-term receivables, the consolidated entity does not recognise further losses, unless it has incurred obligations or made payments on behalf of the associate.

The requirements of AASB 139 are applied to determine whether it is necessary to recognise any impairment loss with respect to the consolidated entity's investment in an associate. When necessary, the entire carrying amount of the investment (including goodwill) is tested for impairment in accordance with AASB 136 'Impairment of Assets' as a single asset by comparing its recoverable amount (higher of value in use and fair value less costs to sell) with its carrying amount. Any impairment loss recognised forms part of the carrying amount of the investment. Any reversal of that impairment loss is recognised in accordance with AASB 136 to the extent that the recoverable amount of the investment subsequently increases.

Investments and other financial assets

Investments and other financial assets are measured at either amortised cost or fair value depending on their classification. Classification is determined based on the purpose of the acquisition and subsequent reclassification to other categories is restricted. The fair values of quoted investments are based on current bid prices. For unlisted investments, the consolidated entity establishes fair value by using valuation techniques. These include the use of recent arms length transactions, reference to other instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, and option pricing models.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the consolidated entity has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised or impaired.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are either: i) held for trading, where they are acquired for the purpose of selling in the short-term with an intention of making a profit; or ii) designated as such upon initial recognition, where they are managed on a



fair value basis or to eliminate or significantly reduce an accounting mis-match. Except for effective hedging instruments, derivatives are also categorised as fair value through profit or loss. Fair value movements are recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets

The consolidated entity assesses at the end of each reporting period whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or group of financial assets is impaired. Objective evidence includes significant financial difficulty of the issuer or obligor; a breach of contract such as default or delinquency in payments; the lender granting to a borrower concessions due to economic or legal reasons that the lender would not otherwise do; it becomes probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; the disappearance of an active market for the financial asset; or observable data indicating that there is a measurable decrease in estimated future cash flows.

The amount of the impairment allowance for loans and receivables carried at amortised cost is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the original effective interest rate. If there is a reversal of impairment, the reversal cannot exceed the amortised cost that would have been had the impairment not been recognised and is reversed to profit or loss.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the net cost of each item of property, plant and equipment over their expected useful lives as follows:

- Plant and equipment 5 years
- Motor vehicles 5 years

The residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date.

Leasehold improvements and plant and equipment under lease are depreciated over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the assets, whichever is shorter.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when there is no future economic benefit to the consolidated entity. Gains and losses between the carrying amount and the disposal proceeds are taken to profit or loss.

Leases

The determination of whether an arrangement is or contains a lease is based on the substance of the arrangement and requires an assessment of whether the fulfilment of the arrangement is dependent on the use of a specific asset or assets and the arrangement conveys a right to use the asset.

A distinction is made between finance leases, which effectively transfer from the lessor to the lessee substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of leased assets, and operating leases, under which the lessor effectively retains substantially all such risks and benefits.

Finance leases are capitalised. A lease asset and liability are established at the fair value of the leased assets, or if lower, the present value of minimum lease payments. Lease payments are allocated between the principal component of the lease liability and the finance costs, so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

Leased assets acquired under a finance lease are depreciated over the asset's useful life or over the shorter of the asset's useful life and the lease term if there is no reasonable certainty that the consolidated entity will obtain ownership at the end of the lease term.

Operating lease payments, net of any incentives received from the lessor, are charged to profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

Intangible assets

Intangible assets acquired as part of a business combination, other than goodwill, are initially measured at their fair value at the date of the acquisition. Intangible assets acquired separately are initially recognised at cost. Intangible assets are subsequently measured at cost less amortisation and any impairment. The gains or losses recognised in profit or loss arising from the derecognition of intangible assets are measured as the difference between net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the intangible asset. The method and useful lives of finite life intangibles are reviewed annually. Changes in the expected pattern of consumption or useful life are accounted for prospectively by changing the amortisation method or period.

Computer software

Significant costs associated with software are deferred and amortised on a straight-line basis over the period of their expected benefit, being their finite life of 5 years.



Exploration, evaluation and development assets

Exploration and evaluation expenditure in relation to separate areas of interest for which rights of tenure are current is carried forward as an asset in the statement of financial position where it is expected that the expenditure will be recovered through the successful development and exploitation of an area of interest, or by its sale; or exploration activities are continuing in an area and activities have not reached a stage which permits a reasonable estimate of the existence or otherwise of economically recoverable reserves. Where a project or an area of interest has been abandoned, the expenditure incurred thereon is written off in the year in which the decision is made.

Exploration and evaluation assets are initially measured at cost and include acquisition of rights to explore, studies, exploratory drilling, trenching and sampling and associated activities and an allocation of depreciation and amortisation of assets used in exploration and evaluation activities. General and administrative costs are only included in the measurement of exploration and evaluation costs where they are related directly to operational activities in a particular area of interest.

Exploration and evaluation assets are assessed for impairment when facts and circumstances suggest that the carrying amount of an exploration and evaluation asset may exceed its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount of the exploration and evaluation asset (or the cash-generating unit(s) to which it has been allocated, being no larger than the relevant area of interest) is estimated to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount but only to the extent that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in previous years.

Where a decision is made to proceed with development in respect of a particular area of interest, the relevant exploration and evaluation asset is tested for impairment and the balance is then reclassified to development.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Goodwill and other intangible assets that have an indefinite useful life are not subject to amortisation and are tested annually for impairment, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that they might be impaired. Other non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the consolidated entity prior to the end of the financial year| and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Borrowings

Loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received, net of transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Where there is an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date, the loans or borrowings are classified as non-current.

Finance costs

Finance costs attributable to qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the asset. All other finance costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred, including:

- interest on short-term and long-term borrowings

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the consolidated entity has a present (legal or constructive) obligation as a result of a past event, it is probable the consolidated entity will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the reporting date, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. If the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate specific to the liability. The increase in the provision resulting from the passage of time is recognised as a finance cost.



Employee benefits

Wages and salaries and annual leave

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, and annual leave expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are recognised in current liabilities in respect of employees' services up to the reporting date and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Long service leave

The liability for long service leave is recognised in current and non-current liabilities, depending on the unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date. The liability is measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

Defined contribution superannuation expense

Contributions to defined contribution superannuation plans are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Share-based payments

Equity-settled share-based compensation benefits are provided to directors and employees.

Equity-settled transactions are awards of shares, or options over shares, that are provided to employees in exchange for the rendering of services.

The cost of equity-settled transactions are measured at fair value on grant date. Fair value is independently determined using either the Binomial or Black-Scholes option pricing model that takes into account the exercise price, the term of the option, the impact of dilution, the share price at grant date and expected price volatility of the underlying share, the expected dividend yield and the risk free interest rate for the term of the option, together with non-vesting conditions that do not determine whether the consolidated entity receives the services that entitle the employees to receive payment. No account is taken of any other vesting conditions.

The cost of equity-settled transactions are recognised as an expense with a corresponding increase in equity over the vesting period. The cumulative charge to profit or loss is calculated based on the grant date fair value of the award, the best estimate of the number of awards that are likely to vest and the expired portion of the vesting period. The amount recognised in profit or loss for the period is the cumulative amount calculated at each reporting date less amounts already recognised in previous periods.

If equity-settled awards are modified, as a minimum an expense is recognised as if the modification has not been made. An additional expense is recognised, over the remaining vesting period, for any modification that increases the total fair value of the share-based compensation benefit as at the date of modification.

If the non-vesting condition is within the control of the consolidated entity or employee, the failure to satisfy the condition is treated as a cancellation. If the condition is not within the control of the consolidated entity or employee and is not satisfied during the vesting period, any remaining expense for the award is recognised over the remaining vesting period, unless the award is forfeited.

If equity-settled awards are cancelled, it is treated as if it has vested on the date of cancellation, and any remaining expense is recognised immediately. If a new replacement award is substituted for the cancelled award, the cancelled and new award is treated as if they were a modification.

Contributed equity

Ordinary shares are classified as equity.

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of new shares or options are shown in equity as a deduction, net of tax, from the proceeds.

Business combinations

The acquisition method of accounting is used to account for business combinations regardless of whether equity instruments or other assets are acquired.

The consideration transferred is the sum of the acquisition-date fair values of the assets transferred, equity instruments issued or liabilities incurred by the acquirer to former owners of the acquiree and the amount of any non-controlling interest in the acquiree. For each business combination, the non-controlling interest in the acquiree is measured at either fair value or at the proportionate share of the acquiree's identifiable net assets. All acquisition costs are expensed as incurred to profit or loss.



On the acquisition of a business, the consolidated entity assesses the financial assets acquired and liabilities assumed for appropriate classification and designation in accordance with the contractual terms, economic conditions, the consolidated entity's operating or accounting policies and other pertinent conditions in existence at the acquisition-date.

Where the business combination is achieved in stages, the consolidated entity remeasures its previously held equity interest in the acquiree at the acquisition-date fair value and the difference between the fair value and the previous carrying amount is recognised in profit or loss.

Contingent consideration to be transferred by the acquirer is recognised at the acquisition-date fair value. Subsequent changes in the fair value of contingent consideration classified as an asset or liability is recognised in profit or loss. Contingent consideration classified as equity is not remeasured and its subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity.

The difference between the acquisition-date fair value of assets acquired, liabilities assumed and any non-controlling interest in the acquiree and the fair value of the consideration transferred and the fair value of any pre-existing investment in the acquiree is recognised as goodwill. If the consideration transferred and the pre-existing fair value is less than the fair value of the identifiable net assets acquired, being a bargain purchase to the acquirer, the difference is recognised as a gain directly in profit or loss by the acquirer on the acquisition-date, but only after a reassessment of the identification and measurement of the net assets acquired, the non-controlling interest in the acquiree, if any, the consideration transferred and the acquirer's previously held equity interest in the acquirer.

Business combinations are initially accounted for on a provisional basis. The acquirer retrospectively adjusts the provisional amounts recognised and also recognises additional assets or liabilities during the measurement period, based on new information obtained about the facts and circumstances that existed at the acquisition-date. The measurement period ends on either the earlier of (i) 12 months from the date of the acquisition or (ii) when the acquirer receives all the information possible to determine fair value.

Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the profit attributable to the owners of Gullewa Limited, excluding any costs of servicing equity other than ordinary shares, by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the financial year, adjusted for bonus elements in ordinary shares issued during the financial year.

Diluted earnings per share

Diluted earnings per share adjusts the figures used in the determination of basic earnings per share to take into account the after income tax effect of interest and other financing costs associated with dilutive potential ordinary shares and the weighted average number of shares assumed to have been issued for no consideration in relation to dilutive potential ordinary shares.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the consolidated entity for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2012. The consolidated entity's assessment of the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations, most relevant to the consolidated entity, are set out below.

AASB 119 Employee Benefits (September 2011) and AASB 2011-10 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 119 (September 2011)

This revised standard and its consequential amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. The amendments eliminate the corridor approach for the deferral of gains and losses; streamlines the presentation of changes in assets and liabilities arising from defined benefit plans, including requiring remeasurements to be presented in other comprehensive income; and enhances the disclosure requirements for defined benefit plans. The amendments also change the definition of short-term employee benefits, from 'due to' to 'expected to' be settled within 12 months and will require annual leave that is not expected to be



wholly settled within 12 months to be discounted allowing for expected salary levels in the future period when the leave is expected to be taken. The adoption of the revised standard from 1 July 2013 is not expected to have a significant effect on the consolidated entity.

AASB 9 Financial Instruments, 2009-11 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 9 and 2010-7 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 9

This standard and its consequential amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013 and completes phase I of the IASB's project to replace IAS 39 (being the international equivalent to AASB 139 'Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement'). This standard introduces new classification and measurement models for financial assets, using a single approach to determine whether a financial asset is measured at amortised cost or fair value. To be classified and measured at amortised cost, assets must satisfy the business model test for managing the financial assets and have certain contractual cash flow characteristics. All other financial instrument assets are to be classified and measured at fair value. This standard allows an irrevocable election on initial recognition to present gains and losses on equity instruments (that are not held-for-trading) in other comprehensive income, with dividends as a return on these investments being recognised in profit or loss. In addition, those equity instruments measured at fair value through other comprehensive income would no longer have to apply any impairment requirements nor would there be any 'recycling' of gains or losses through profit or loss on disposal. The accounting for financial liabilities continues to be classified and measured in accordance with AASB 139, with one exception, being that the portion of a change of fair value relating to the entity's own credit risk is to be presented in other comprehensive income unless it would create an accounting mismatch. The consolidated entity will adopt this standard from 1 July 2013 but the impact of its adoption is yet to be assessed by the consolidated entity.

AASB 2010-8 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Deferred Tax: Recovery of Underlying Assets

These amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2012 and a practical approach for the measurement of deferred tax relating to investment properties measured at fair value, property, plant and equipment and intangible assets measured using the revaluation model. The measurement of deferred tax for these specified assets is based on the presumption that the carrying amount of the underlying asset will be recovered entirely through sale, unless the entity has clear evidence that economic benefits of the underlying asset will be consumed during its economic life. The consolidated entity is yet to quantify the tax effect of adopting these amendments from 1 July 2012.

AASB 10 Consolidated Financial Statements

This standard is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. The standard has a new definition of 'control'. Control exists when the reporting entity is exposed, or has the rights, to variable returns (e.g. dividends, remuneration, returns that are not available to other interest holders including losses) from its involvement with another entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its 'power' over that other entity. A reporting entity has power when it has rights (e.g. voting rights, potential voting rights, rights to appoint key management, decision making rights, kick out rights) that give it the current ability to direct the activities that significantly affect the investee's returns (e.g. operating policies, capital decisions, appointment of key management). The consolidated entity will not only have to consider its holdings and rights but also the holdings and rights of other shareholders in order to determine whether it has the necessary power for consolidation purposes. The adoption of this standard from 1 July 2013 may have an impact where the consolidated entity has a holding of less than 50% in an entity, has de facto control, and is not currently consolidating that entity.

AASB 11 Joint Arrangements

This standard is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. The standard defines which entities qualify as joint ventures and removes the option to account for joint ventures using proportional consolidation. Joint ventures, where the parties to the agreement have the rights to the net assets will use equity accounting. Joint operations, where the parties to the agreements have the rights to the assets and obligations for the liabilities will account for the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses separately, using proportionate consolidation. The adoption of this standard from 1 July 2013 will not have a material impact on the consolidated entity.

AASB 12 Disclosure of Interests in Other Entities

This standard is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. It contains the entire disclosure requirement associated with other entities, being subsidiaries, associates and joint ventures. The disclosure requirements have been significantly enhanced when compared to the disclosures previously located in AASB 127 'Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements', AASB 128 'Investments in Associates', AASB 131 'Interests in Joint Ventures' and Interpretation 112 'Consolidation – Special Purpose Entities'. The adoption of this standard from 1 July 2013 will significantly increase the amount of disclosures required to be given by the consolidated entity such as significant judgements and assumptions made in determining whether it has a controlling or non-controlling interest in another entity and the type of non-controlling interest and the nature and risks involved.



AASB 13 Fair Value Measurement and AASB 2011-8 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 13

This standard and its consequential amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. The standard provides a single robust measurement framework, with clear measurement objectives, for measuring fair value using the 'exit price' and it provides guidance on measuring fair value when a market becomes less active. The 'highest and best use' approach would be used to measure assets whereas liabilities would be based on transfer value. As the standard does not introduce any new requirements for the use of fair value, its impact on adoption by the consolidated entity from 1 July 2013 should be minimal, although there will be increased disclosures where fair value is used.

AASB 127 Separate Financial Statements (Revised)

AASB 128 Investments in Associates and Joint Ventures (Reissued)

These standards are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. They have been modified to remove specific guidance that is now contained in AASB 10, AASB 11 and AASB 12. The adoption of these revised standards from 1 July 2013 will not have a material impact on the consolidated entity.

AASB 2011-4 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards to Remove Individual Key Management Personnel Disclosure Requirement

These amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 July 2013, with early adoption not permitted. They amend AASB 124 'Related Party Disclosures' by removing the disclosure requirements for individual key management personnel ('KMP'). The adoption of these amendments from 1 July 2013 will remove the duplication of information relating to individual KMP in the notes to the financial statements and the directors report. As the aggregate disclosures are still required by AASB 124 and during the transitional period the requirements may be included in the Corporations Act or other legislation, it is expected that the amendments will not have a material impact on the consolidated entity.

AASB 2011-7 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from the Consolidation and Joint Arrangements Standards

The amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. The amendments make numerous consequential changes to a range of Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, following the issuance of AASB 10, AASB 11, AASB 12 and revised AASB 127 and AASB 128. The adoption of these amendments from 1 July 2013 will not have a material impact on the consolidated entity.

AASB 2011-9 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Presentation of Items of Other Comprehensive Income

These amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 July 2012. The amendments requires grouping together of items within other comprehensive income on the basis of whether they will eventually be 'recycled' to the profit or loss (reclassification adjustments). The change provides clarity about the nature of items presented as other comprehensive income and the related tax presentation. The adoption of the revised standard from 1 July 2012 will impact the consolidated entity's presentation of its statement of comprehensive income.

AASB 2012-2 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Disclosures – Offsetting Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities

The amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. The disclosure requirements of AASB 7 'Financial Instruments: Disclosures' (and consequential amendments to AASB 132 'Financial Instruments: Presentation') have been enhanced to provide users of financial statements with information about netting arrangements, including rights of set-off related to an entity's financial instruments and the effects of such rights on its statement of financial position. The adoption of the amendments from 1 July 2013 will increase the disclosures by the consolidated entity.

AASB 2012-3 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Offsetting Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities

The amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2014. The amendments add application guidance to address inconsistencies in the application of the offsetting criteria in AASB 132 'Financial Instruments: Presentation', by clarifying the meaning of "currently has a legally enforceable right of set-off"; and clarifies that some gross settlement systems may be considered to be equivalent to net settlement. The adoption of the amendments from 1 July 2014 will not have a significant impact on the consolidated entity.

AASB 2012-5 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Annual Improvements 2009–2011 Cycle

The amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. The amendments affect five Australian Accounting Standards as follows: Confirmation that repeat application of AASB 1 (IFRS 1) 'First-time Adoption of Australian Accounting Standards' is permitted; Clarification of borrowing cost exemption in AASB 1; Clarification of comprehensive information requirements when an entity provides a third balance sheet in accordance with AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements'; Clarification that servicing of equipment is covered by AASB 116 'Property, Plant and Equipment', if such equipment is used for more than one period; AASB 132 'Financial Instruments: Presentation' Clarification of the tax effect of distributions to holders of an equity instrument is recognised in the income statement; and clarification of the financial reporting requirements in AASB 134 'Interim



Financial Reporting' and the disclosure requirements of segment assets and liabilities. The adoption of the amendments from 1 July 2013 will not have a significant impact on the consolidated entity.

Interpretation 20 Stripping Costs in the Production Phase of a Surface Mine and AASB 2011-12 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Interpretation 20

This interpretation and its consequential amendments are applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2013. The Interpretation clarifies when production stripping costs should lead to the recognition of an asset and how that asset should be initially and subsequently measured. The Interpretation only deals with waste removal costs that are incurred in surface mining activities during the production phase of the mine. The adoption of the interpretation and the amendments from 1 July 2013 will not have a material impact on the consolidated entity.

Note 2: Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

Share-based payment transactions

The consolidated entity measures the cost of equity-settled transactions with employees by reference to the fair value of the equity instruments at the date at which they are granted. The fair value is determined by using either the Binomial or Black-Scholes model taking into account the terms and conditions upon which the instruments were granted. The accounting estimates and assumptions relating to equity-settled share-based payments would have no impact on the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next annual reporting period but may impact profit or loss and equity.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The consolidated entity determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The consolidated entity tests annually, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate impairment, whether goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets have suffered any impairment, in accordance with the accounting policy stated in note 1. The recoverable amounts of cash-generating units have been determined based on value-in-use calculations. These calculations require the use of assumptions, including estimated discount rates based on the current cost of capital and growth rates of the estimated future cash flows.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The consolidated entity assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the consolidated entity and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs to sell or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

Income tax

The consolidated entity is subject to income taxes in the jurisdictions in which it operates. Significant judgement is required in determining the provision for income tax. There are many transactions and calculations undertaken during the ordinary course of business for which the ultimate tax determination is uncertain. The consolidated entity recognises liabilities for anticipated tax audit issues based on the consolidated entity's current understanding of the tax law. Where the final tax outcome of these matters is different from the carrying amounts, such differences will impact the current and deferred tax provisions in the period in which such determination is made.



Recovery of deferred tax assets

Deferred tax assets are recognised for deductible temporary differences only if the consolidated entity considers it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences and losses.

Business combinations

As discussed in note 1, business combinations are initially accounted for on a provisional basis. The fair value of assets acquired, liabilities and contingent liabilities assumed are initially estimated by the consolidated entity taking into consideration all available information at the reporting date. Fair value adjustments on the finalisation of the business combination accounting is retrospective, where applicable, to the period the combination occurred and may have an impact on the assets and liabilities, depreciation and amortisation reported.

Note 3: Restatement of comparatives

Share options

Following a review of the share options on issue, it was noted that an error occurred in relation to the date options were issued by Allegiance Coal Limited. The actual date of the issue was 5 May 2011. The effect is that the share-based payment expense of \$315,270 should have been recorded in the results for the 30 June 2011 financial period.

The impact of the adjustment is to increase the loss for the 30 June 2011 financial period together with an increase in reported reserves in equity. There was no impact on net assets at 30 June 2011.

Reclassification of non-current assets classified as held-for-sale to inventories

During the financial year, the investment properties have been reclassified as inventory as they are in the process of being sold in the ordinary course of the business. This is a change from the classification in the prior year where they were classified as held-for-sale. As one of the principal activities of the business is property development it was deemed more appropriate to disclose the investment properties as inventory and the comparative has been restated accordingly for this change in classification.

Reclassification of goodwill to exploration, evaluation and development

The goodwill balance has been reclassified to exploration, evaluation and development as the goodwill arose on the purchase of Mineral and Coal Investments and should have formed part of exploration, evaluation and development rather than intangibles.

Note 28: Financial instruments

Financial risk management objectives

The consolidated entity's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. The consolidated entity's overall risk management program focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the financial performance of the consolidated entity. The consolidated entity uses different methods to measure different types of risk to which it is exposed. These methods include sensitivity analysis in the case of interest rate, foreign exchange and other price risks, ageing analysis for credit risk and beta analysis in respect of investment portfolios to determine market risk.

Risk management is carried out by the directors under policies approved by the Board of Directors ('Board'). These policies include identification and analysis of the risk exposure of the consolidated entity and appropriate procedures, controls and risk limits. The Board identifies, evaluates and hedges financial risks within the consolidated entity's operating units.

Market risk

Foreign currency risk

The consolidated entity is not exposed to significant foreign currency risk.

Price risk

The consolidated entity is exposed to equity securities price risk because of the listed investments held, classified as either at fair value through profit or loss, or available-for-sale investments. The consolidated entity is also exposed to price risk in the Australian housing market, due to its ownership of an investment property, although this risk is not significant to the consolidated entity. The consolidated entity does not hedge its price risks.

At 30 June 2012, if equity prices had been 10% higher or lower and all other variables were held constant the consolidated entity's net assets would increase/decrease by \$9,000 (2011: \$21,000) as a result of the change in the value of financial assets held at fair value through profit or loss and available-for-sale investments.

Interest rate risk

The consolidated entity's main interest rate risk arises from cash and cash equivalents.

The sensitivity analyses have been determined based on the exposure to interest rates and the stipulated change taking place at the beginning of the financial year and held constant throughout the reporting period.

At reporting date, if interest rates had been 50 basis points higher or lower and all other variables were held constant, the consolidated entity's net profit and net assets would increase/decrease by \$46,038 (2011: \$17,830).

Credit risk

Credit risk is managed on a consolidated entity basis. Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the consolidated entity. The consolidated entity has adopted a policy of only dealing with creditworthy counterparties and obtaining sufficient collateral where appropriate, as a means of mitigating the risk of financial loss from defaults. The consolidated entity does not have any significant credit risk exposure to any single counterparty or group of counterparties having similar characteristics. The credit risk on liquid funds is limited because the counterparties are banks with high credit-ratings assigned by international credit ratings agencies. The consolidated entity does not have any significant receivables.

The consolidated entity's maximum exposure to credit risk at the reporting date in relation to each class of recognised financial assets is the carrying amount as disclosed in the statement of financial position and notes to the financial statements, and the guarantee provided to an associate detailed in note 30.

Liquidity risk

Vigilant liquidity risk management requires the consolidated entity to maintain sufficient liquid assets (mainly cash and cash equivalents) and available borrowing facilities to be able to pay debts as and when they become due and payable.

The consolidated entity manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate cash reserves and realising its financial assets at fair value through profit or loss, or its available-for-sale investments to meet any forecast cash outflow commitments.

Remaining contractual maturities
