ABOUT UNITED NETWORKS LIMITED

United Networks Limited (UNL or 'United') has evolved in FY17, from telecommunications services to a leading global mobile connectivity and real-time platform provider.

Our Customer Engagement Ecosystem (GAP), enables our enterprise partners to connect and engage with their end users through a variety of products and services. The GAP platform has been developed to be a real-time tracking, connectivity, value-added product and messaging platform, designed to create comprehensive offerings including duty of care solutions to our partners.

United has continued to maintain its local service provider business and does not own the wireless or fixed network infrastructure over which it provides services to its partners and end users. We utilise network operators' infrastructure to provide services to our partners.

United's GAP platform includes:

- Global Connectivity
- Duty of Care
- Live Messaging
- Value-added Services

Our strategy is to enter into relationships with Enterprise Partners by providing white-label solutions which they can offer direct to their client base. United takes the Enterprise Partners core product offering and adds value by bundling services which help travellers worldwide with their connectivity, messaging and duty of care in the event of crisis.

Today, the GAP platform has been re-branded to United Trust, which forms the pillar that allows our partners to engage with their end users to ensure they are safe, protected and connected at all times.

United is delivering a connected, caring community.

PERFORMANCE SUMMARY

The 2017 financial year was a building year for the future growth of the company. United undertook a successful IPO and listing on the ASX in January 2017.

The capital raised was deployed to drive three elements of the business:

1. Development of a cloud-based Customer Engagement Ecosystem (GAP) – creating new complementary products and revenue opportunities including; Wi-Fi, virtual wallet and new value-added services.
2. Expansion of the client-base with new global Enterprise Partners including Chubb Insurance and American Express.
3. Strengthen management with new Chief Operations Officer (COO); Neil Brener and new Business Development Managers.

With our strengthened management team and our Enterprise Partners, United has the basis for a strong and profitable business. Our focus is now on implementing the new partnerships and products to create value for our shareholders.

The next 12 months will be an implementation period for which United will start to realise the benefits from the development and investments made since listing.

NEW ENTERPRISE PARTNER RELATIONSHIPS

In FY17, United successfully negotiated a partner agreement with Chubb Insurance (Chubb). This incorporated Chubb Travel Insurance and American Express Travel Insurance (AMEX) launching the unlimited Wi-Fi App to their customers, as a value-added inclusion bundled with their travel insurance product.

DISRUPTIVE NEW PRODUCTS

Through our commitment to innovation and adding value to our partners, we are developing and deploying disruptive technology which will enable us to differentiate ourselves in the market. These developments are in line with customer distribution.

The United Networks Wi-Fi solution now connects to 64+ million hotspots globally and was launched as beta in January 2017 with its first major partner release in May 2017 with Chubb Insurance Australia.

United expects to continue to leverage the investment in the United Trust Platform (GAP) to enrich our datasets and improve overall client engagement and new product commercialisation.

DRIVING OPERATIONAL EFFICIENCIES

The United management team has been focused on increasing the depth of both the operational team and sales team globally. During this time United has employed a new COO, Neil Brener. Neil is an experienced Senior Executive with over 25 years in key strategic and operations positions. His roles have included Group COO, Divisional General Manager, and more recently, Head of Mergers and Acquisition and Head of Business Operations at ASX listed company Salmat.

Neil's responsibility is to drive operational enhancements and ensure systems and procedures are in place, to allow for growth in the business moving forward, as well as delivering superior customer service and operational excellence.

PERFORMANCE SUMMARY

EXPANDING SALES OPPORTUNITIES

United has executed on its business plan launching new Enterprise Partners and disruptive technology products.

Our development pipeline continues to grow and we expect a significant number of the advanced discussions to move from running trial programs to going live in FY18. We continue to focus on global participants in the insurance, travel, airline and banking sectors.

Subsequent to the FY17 year end, United has secured the services of Iain Pringle to head up global business development. Iain comes from being the Senior Manager of Retail, Travel and Virgin Partnerships at Virgin Atlantic and before this Head of Strategy at the Avios Group Limited.

With years of experience in consumer loyalty and partnerships with large airlines, Iain's experience is set to fast track the execution of our current pipeline and develop new opportunities.

We continue to work with existing partners and develop our relationships with their broad product offerings. United Networks is actively pursuing additional large B2C partners both nationally and internationally.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Revenue for the period was \$6.2 million, down 17.5% on the previous period as a result of the following items;

- A change in revenue model with one of our Key Enterprise Partners that took effect on the 1st of December 2016 resulting in delayed revenue recognition and a new commission-only model for the partner. With unearned/unbooked revenue as at the year end growing to \$332K
- Decreased order volume as a result of a change in the offer process that is in the process of being addressed.
- Delays in on-boarding and roll-out of the two new key global partners for the Wi-Fi App resulted in targets not being achieved for the period.
- An amount of \$419K in excess of the FY16 R&D grant accrual was received in the year. An accrual of \$600K has been made for FY17 which is in-line with the previous year.

United as has reported a net operating loss of \$1,037,177. A significant proportion of the loss incurred was as result of the following items;

- Non-recurring costs expensed in the year of \$445K relating to the expenses of the IPO
- Increased cost of management and business development resources employed to execute on the growth strategy.
- Increased investments in the deployment of 2 new global partner opportunities with the United Wi-Fi App. These are now available and included with the partners travel insurance as a value-added solution across 3 countries.
- Increased cost of ensuring the security of the GAP platform including penetration and vulnerability testing conducted across all sites and locations.
- Ongoing audit, compliance and listing costs of \$202K.

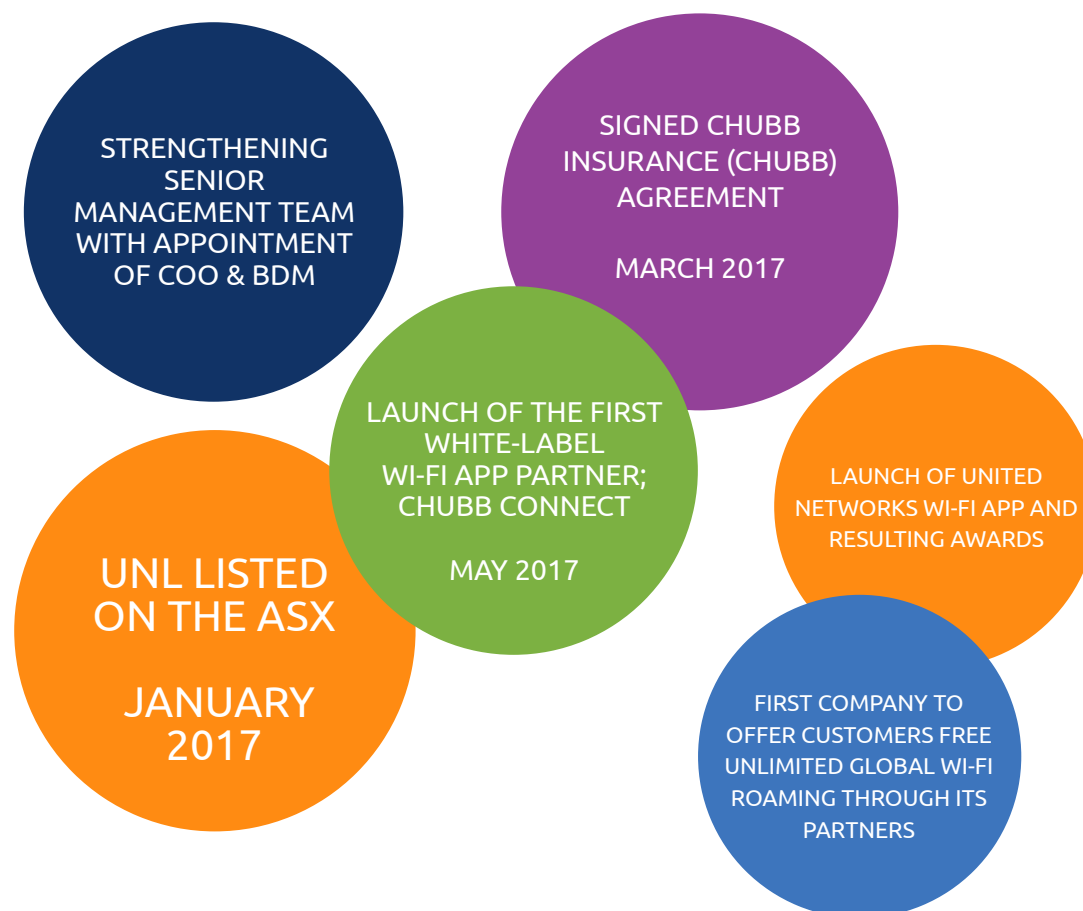

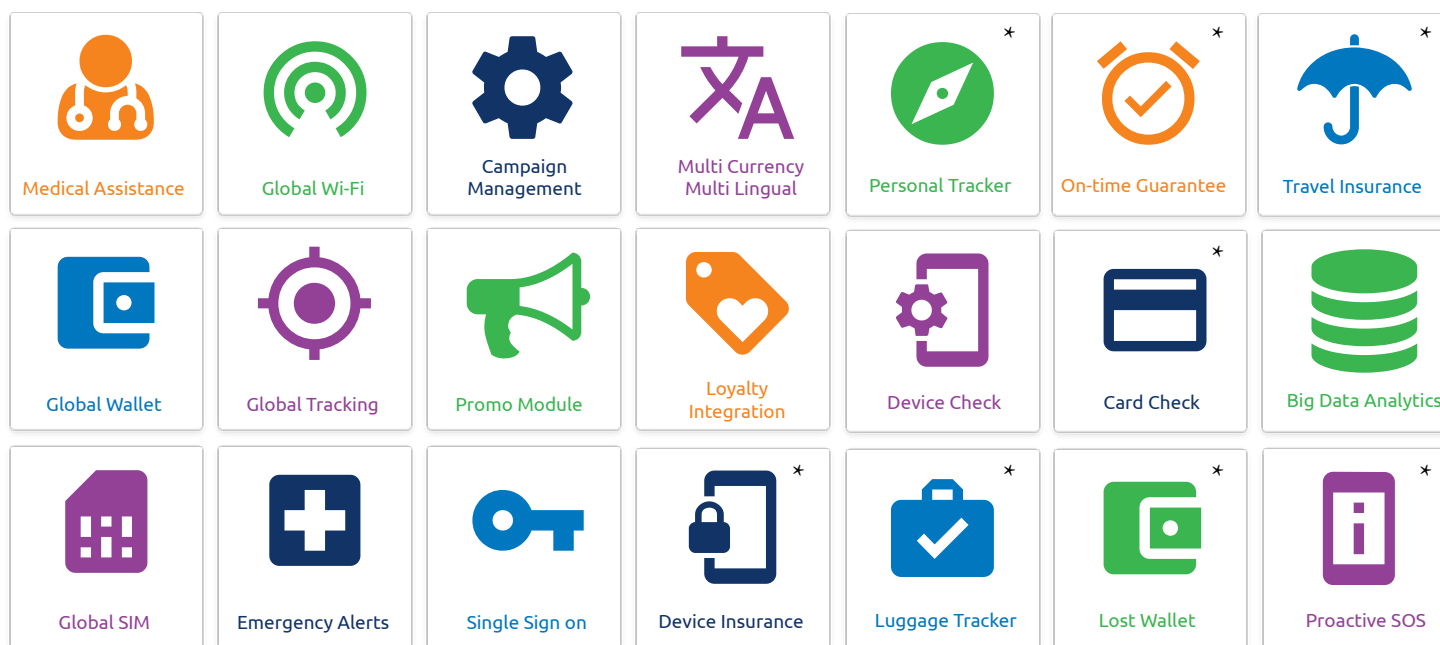

In FY17, United invested in further developing its Location Based Services (LBS) in order to introduce new value-added services focusing on duty of care.

The United Trust (formerly referred to as GAP) has evolved from its traditional CRM, billing and product support capacity to a complete trusted ecosystem which allows partners to engage directly with their end customers across multiple products giving a 360 degree view of the customers activities.

The following features were added to the United Trust Platform in FY17:

- ✓ Multilingual and Multicurrency
- ✓ A combination of Wi-Fi and SIM product
- ✓ A promotional and campaign module
- ✓ An enhancement of the LBS module allowing for proactive SOS messaging

2017 A BUILDING YEAR - GLOBAL SIM

UNITED GLOBAL SIM

United Global SIM continues to provide travellers with the connectivity and security they need at low affordable pricing. UNL has maintained their competitive position in terms of pricing, convenience and value to its partners and their customers.

KEY METRICS FOR FY17

- Average revenue per subscriber grew by over 28% to \$89.42 revenue per SIM up from \$70.00 in FY16
- The Global SIM partner's offer conversion rate remained at 10.9%, which is consistent with the previous year.
- 68,335 Global SIM orders were received in FY17 a 21% decline on FY16.

In Q4 2017, United was able to lower its data pack pricing as a result of new roaming agreements with upstream partners. Data is still a key driver in mobile roaming with industry statistics from GSMA Intelligence showing mobile data traffic growing at 20-30% per year¹.

This has allowed United to continue to be highly competitive within a fast-changing market. As a result of the price movements, we have seen an increase by consumers in the amount of data they are willing to pre-purchase and an increase in the average revenue per subscriber as a result of bigger data pack inclusions.

In the period, one of the key partners changed its go-to-market strategy (as outlined in the July 2016 update). This has directly impacted the volume of Global SIM cards dispatched. This change has affected Activations and SIM sales in FY17. As of Q4 2017, United had partially restored this volume and is actively working with the partner to increase the volumes and Activations moving forward.

The Trust's location based emergency services is a complementary advantage to the Global SIM product. It was used in multiple events throughout the year, supported by our insurance and retail partners. With the location data collected from the SIM card, United was able to pro-actively locate and contact end-users whilst also communicating this information to insurance partners.

NEW PARTNERSHIPS

In the period, United Networks successfully partnered with new resellers; ESY International in Canada, Queensland University of Technology in conjunction with Customer Care and the launch of Etihad Airlines offer for pilots.

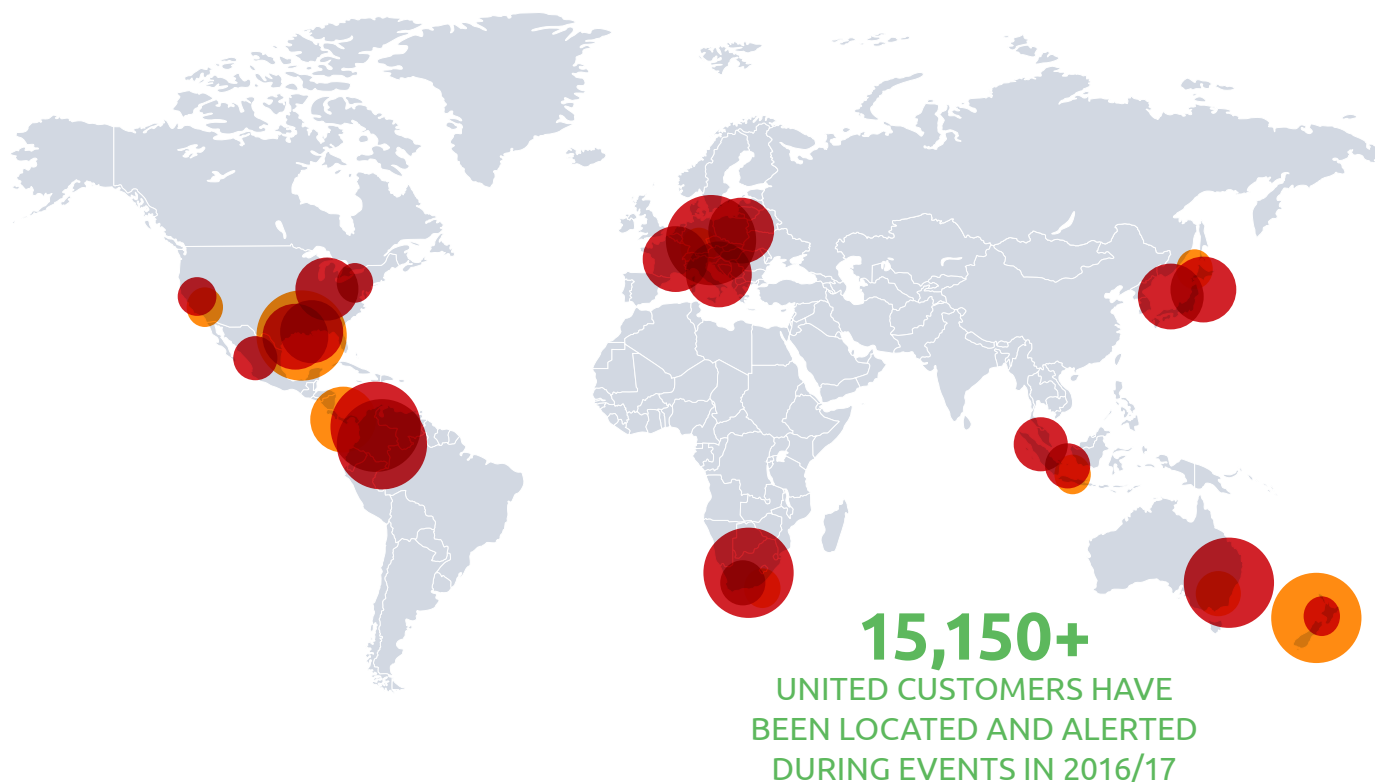

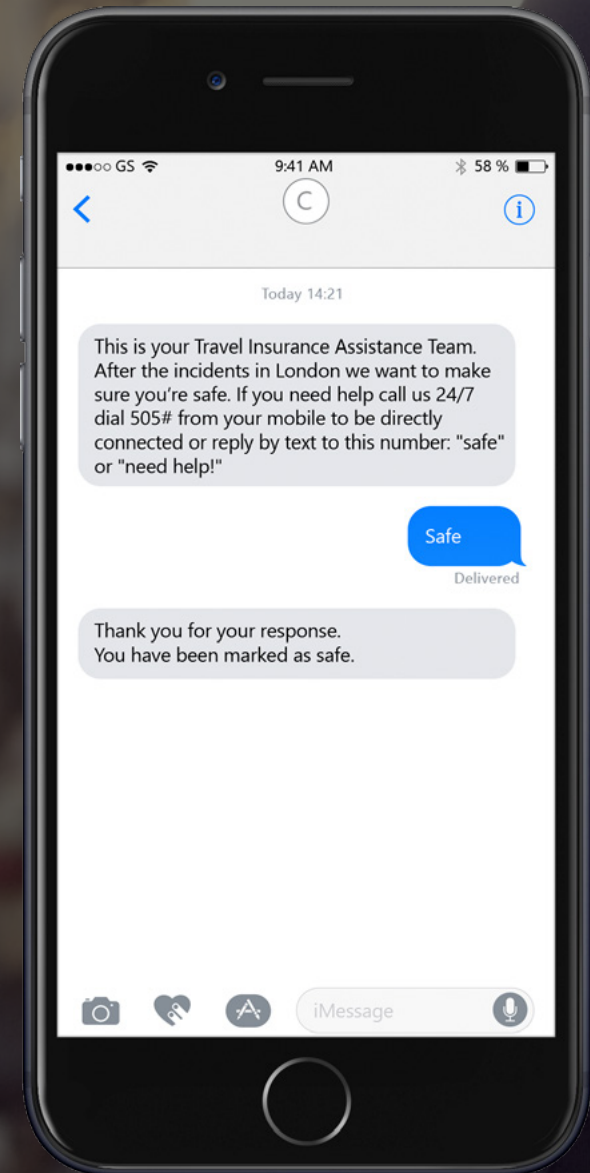
*This is your Travel Insurance Assistance Team. After the incidents in London, we want to make sure you're safe. If you need help call us 24/7 dial *205# from your mobile to be directly connected.*

On the 3rd of June, the London Bridge terror attacks took place. United's Trust was able to locate and alert 266 customers who were in the direct impact region within minutes of the event occurring.

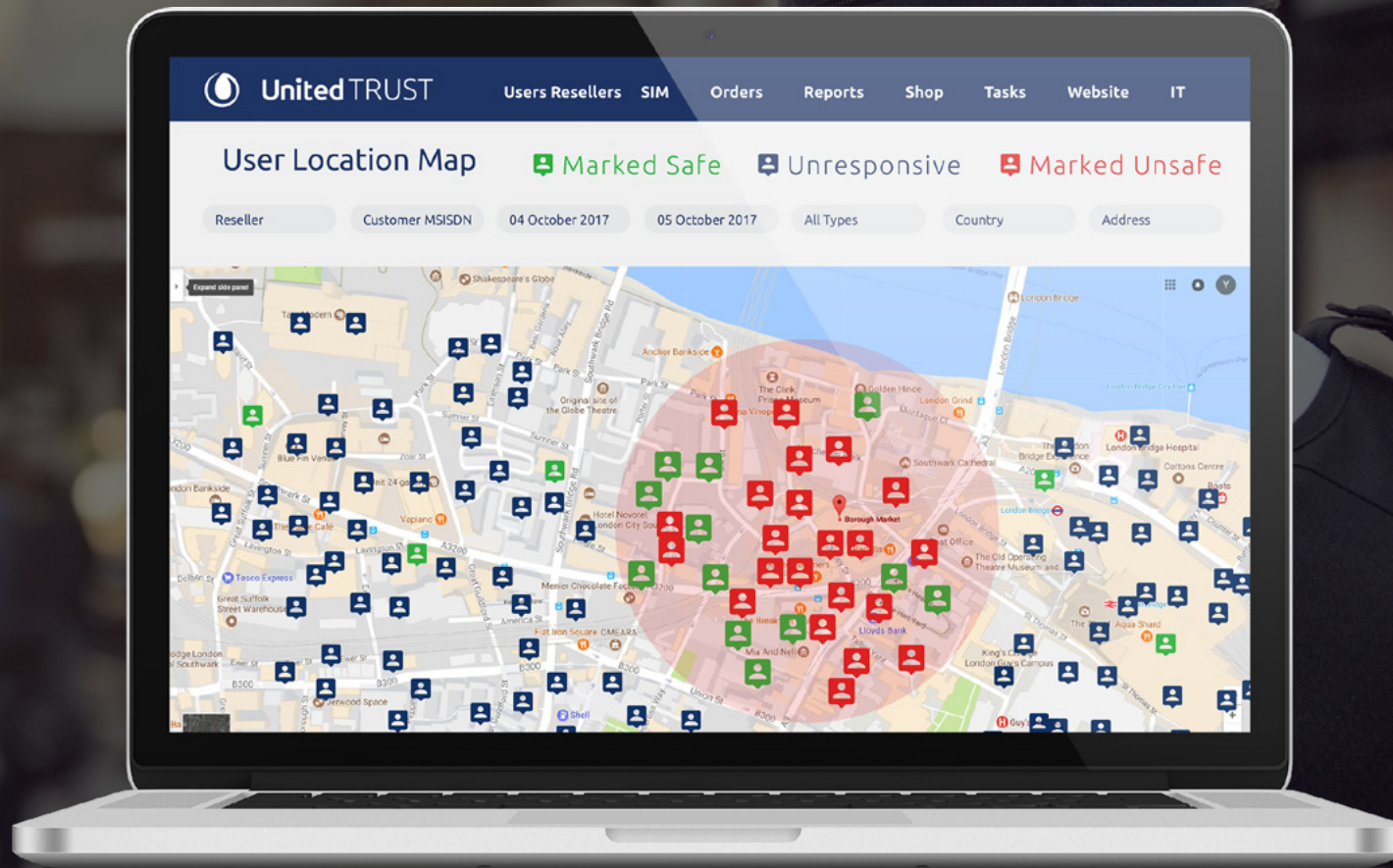
The Trust platform was able to send real-time messages via USSD, SMS and email that connected travellers directly with the emergency assistance team.

Since the event occurred, United has upgraded its platform to receive responses from customers through SMS and in-app messages. The directly affected customers are then alerted to the travel insurance partners. United's upgraded SOS Alerts function has been used in multiple natural disaster and terror attacks, providing travellers with peace of mind when they travel.

The United Trust allows United's partners to send appropriate alerts when an event occurs. Partners can send proactive and reactive messages in real-time as the event unfolds. One of the greatest challenges for insurance companies in managing traveller risk in crises is their ability to openly engage with customers.

SUCCESSFUL LAUNCH OF UNITED NETWORKS WI-FI

The Global Wi-Fi App allows end-users to connect to unlimited data across more than 64 million worldwide Hotspots. The connectivity alone, is a great benefit to consumers as data consumption continues to grow.

The key benefit comes from the App's ability to tie in with the Trust platform's Location Based Services module. United has successfully partnered with some of the world's leading financial and insurance companies including Chubb Insurance and American Express to distribute the Wi-Fi App directly to their end customers.

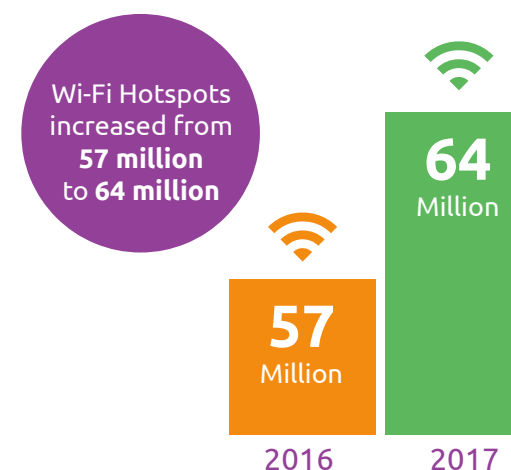

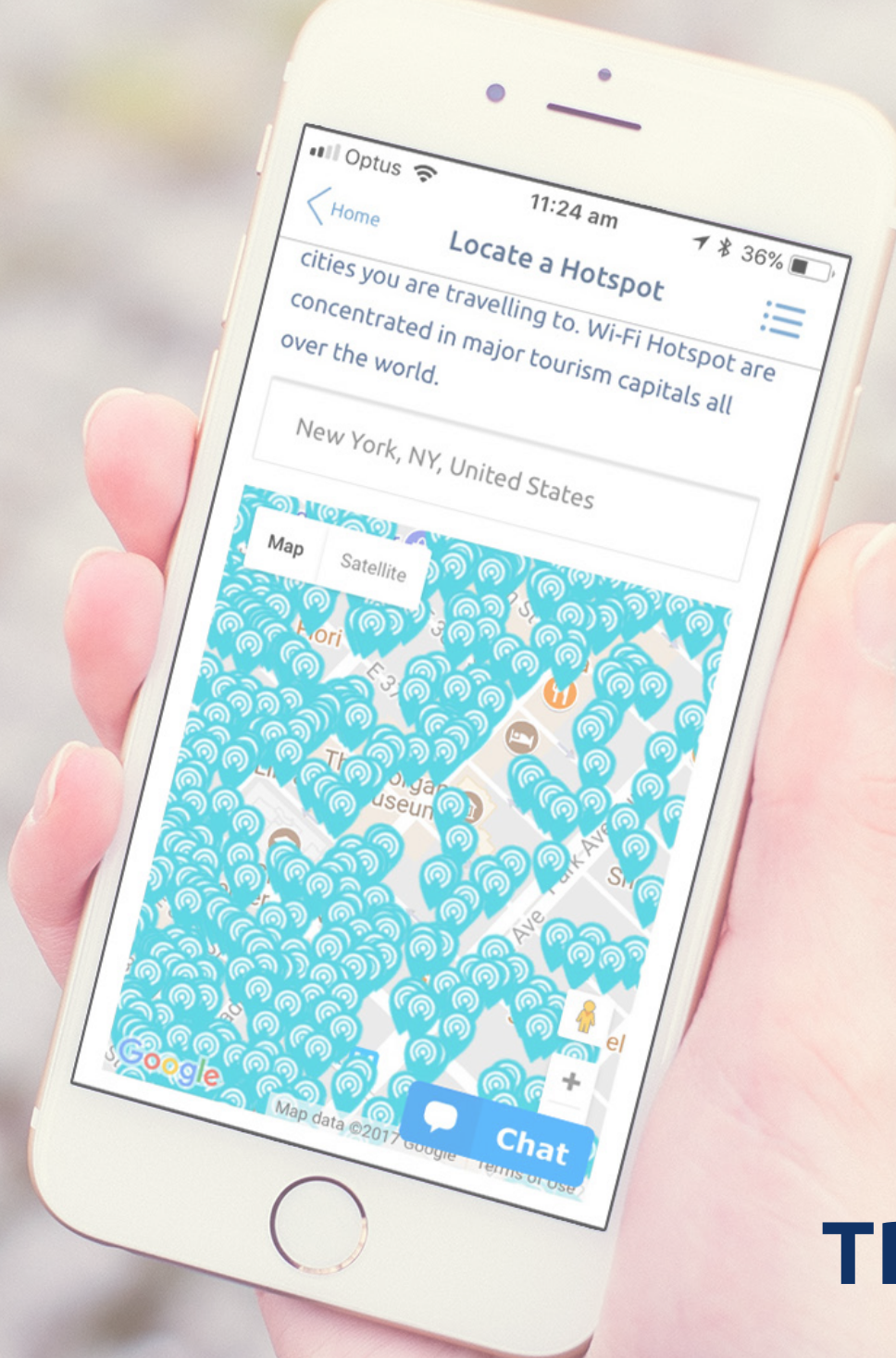
As a result of these key partnerships, the United Wi-Fi App is being offered for free to the end customers with the partner paying a wholesale rate for connectivity. This has allowed United to achieve its goal of offering free unlimited mobile Wi-Fi roaming to the end customers.

NEW KEY PARTNERS AND INTERNATIONAL EXPANSION - CHUBB TRAVEL INSURANCE AND AMERICAN EXPRESS

In 2017 United Networks secured a successful new partner; Chubb Travel Insurance. United launched the Chubb Connect product in May and has since expanded across a number of partners and countries in the Asia Pacific Region. United is currently executing on a roll-out strategy with Chubb across direct and partner channels.

United is set to expand into other territories over the course of FY18. Since year-end, United has rolled out offers for American Express in Australia and New Zealand and Chubb Direct in Australia, New Zealand and Singapore.

NEW PRODUCT - UNITED LUGGAGE TRACKER

United will be releasing a new GPS and GSM tracker device targeted at travellers, which can be used for both luggage and personal tracking. The device will utilise established GSM and GPS location based technology which has been developed within the United Trust platform.

United's Travel Tracker allows you to track your luggage anywhere in the world in real-time. It will be incorporated into the Trust platform and existing United Networks App allowing travellers to access their SIM, Wi-Fi, SOS Alerts and Tracker all on the one mobile application.

The Travel Tracker is currently in development and will be in market by early 2018. United has received pre-committed orders from current partners who will be bundling the solutions with the United's suite of products in market.

A number of different trackers will be available.

UNITED GLOBAL SOS ALERTS

United Networks is developing a new App product; the United Global SOS Alerts which is due to launch in late 2017. United Global SOS Alerts will further assist United's partners in supporting their customers in times of crises. The Trust platform will have the ability to smartly use customer location and travel data to serve real-time notifications when emergency events occur.

United's Trust will uniquely classify disaster and emergency event feeds and creates this emergency event in the Trust system. Emergency events are then automatically alerted to the customers through the GAP Platform which utilises SMS, USSD, Email and in-app notifications.

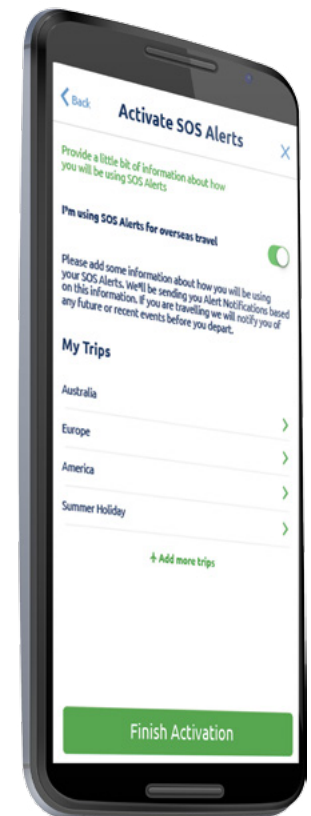
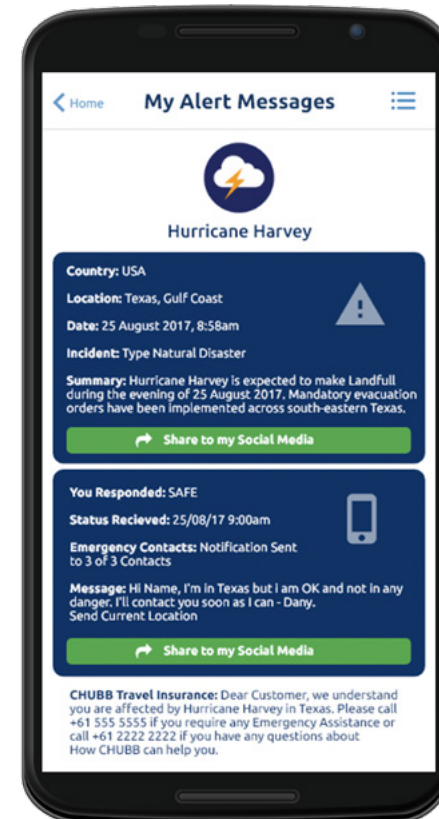

RISKS

RISK MANAGEMENT

The company operates within a highly competitive, technology based industry and is exposed to a range of risks that have the potential to impact on the financial, operational and strategic performance of the business. In executing the company's strategy, risk management is an integral factor in considering the best way to create shareholder value.

BOARD RESPONSIBILITY

The Board is responsible for establishing the level of risk which it expects the management of the company to operate within. This responsibility extends to ensuring an appropriate risk management framework is in place.

RISK MANAGEMENT AND AUDIT COMMITTEE

The Board has established a Risk Management and Audit Committee (RMA Committee) to assist the Board to discharge its corporate governance duties in relation to implementing and maintaining appropriate policies and procedures relating to risk management, financial reporting, external and internal control and auditing.

The RMA Committee is chaired by Charbel Nader (as independent director) and its other members are Anthony Ghattas (non-executive director) and Nicholas Ghattas (the Managing Director). Whilst the majority of this committee does not currently consist of independent directors, the Board believes that the breadth and depth of knowledge, skills and experience of the committee members, and the provisions of the charter of this committee which governs them, effectively ensure the transparency, focus and independent judgement needed to oversee the audit, reporting and risk management functions.

The Risk Management and Audit Committee Charter details the role of this committee which is to:

- Create a structure of review and authorisation designed to ensure the integrity of the company's financial reporting;
- Review and monitor the independence and effectiveness of the external auditors and internal controls if any; and
- Review the effectiveness of the company's compliance and risk management functions.

RISK MANAGEMENT FRAMEWORK

The United Risk Management Framework enables the company to establish clear processes and structures to identify, assess and monitor various risks.

The key elements of the framework include:

- The Board and CEO who provide ultimate oversight and accountability for risk management and defining the risk parameters. The board has identified the material business risks and agreed to the strategy in managing each risk.
- The Risk Management and Audit Committee assists the Board in fulfilling its corporate governance and oversight.
- Management, who work within the agreed risk parameters.

KEY RISKS

United continues to execute on its business strategy to grow the business and deliver value to shareholders. There are a number of risks associated with an investment in the Company, which may affect its financial performance, financial position, cash flows, distribution, growth prospects and share price.

Some of the key areas of risk identified for United are:

- Changes in Industry, Market and Customer Demand
- Supplier and Vendor Relationships
- Loss of Key Enterprise Partners
- Hacker Attacks, Data Security and Integrity
- Growth Prospects
- Reputation
- Regulatory

Risk	Mitigation Strategy
Industry, Market and Customer Demand Change Due to the nature of the technology industry and its ever-changing environment, there may be external environmental changes which affect the business' core offering. These can be changes in industry standards, competitor offerings, changes to popular technology/software and a shift in customer demands.	United identifies the threats posed to its business through external risks such as changes in the industry, market and customer demand. Management are constantly engaged with partners to identify and understand change in trends. United have developed a flexible and scalable solution which facilitates changes to current and future products to accommodate change in trends.
Supplier and Vendor Relationship United relies on various key supplier relationships in certain parts of its business. The loss or impairment of any of these relationships could impact United's business.	United values its key relationships with suppliers and one of Management's core objectives is to maintain a positive and productive relationship with these Key Enterprise Partners. The Trust platform allows flexibility as to reduce our reliance on any single supplier or vendor and we are constantly evaluating alternatives as a backup, if required.
Loss of Key Enterprise Partners A substantial portion of United's revenues is generated from its Key Enterprise Partners. The loss of any Key Enterprise Partner or the loss of business from Key Enterprise Partners would adversely impact United's business and financial results.	United continues to maintain a strong relationship with its Key Enterprise partners. In FY17 United has reduced its exposure by signing new partner agreements and introducing new product revenue streams. The diversification of the international roaming business and Wi-Fi business coupled with the growth in new partners, allows United to mitigate the impact of losing any single partner or Key Enterprise Partners.
Hacker Attacks, Data Security and Integrity United relies on the availability of its websites, hosting servers and the websites and systems of various third-party providers to provide services to clients and to attract new clients. Such websites, servers and systems could be subject to data theft, disruption or denial of service (DoS) attacks and unauthorised access from hackers.	United takes its customers' privacy and data security very seriously and continuously works to develop and enhance security systems. To mitigate these risks, United closely follows best practices and uses industry leading intrusion detection tools, detailed monitoring, enterprise firewalls and data centres. As a part of the the ongoing requirements, United continues to perform penetration and vulnerability testing across all sites and solutions combined with ongoing enhancements to its security, monitoring and payment gateways.
Growth Prospects and Acquisitions United's growth prospects are dependent upon a number of factors, including customer take-up and successful execution of expansion plans. If United fails to execute any expansion plans, its financial performance is likely to be negatively affected.	As part of its expansion strategy, the Company continues to pursue acquisitions of, or significant investments in, complementary companies, services, technologies and/or products to create new revenue streams. Any such future transactions are accompanied by the risks commonly encountered in making acquisitions of companies, products and technologies.

Reputation The success of United's business depends on the maintenance of good client relationships and its reputation for providing high quality products and services. United's reputation could be significantly damage if: • United does not meet customer expectations; • it is involved in litigation claims relating to its product performance or customer service; or • it is subject to negative media coverage.	United currently has strategies in place to measure customer satisfaction, which identifies and highlights the ways in which we can improve. As part of this strategy, the company runs a continual improvement program to ensure the performance of the service exceeds our clients' expectations. The enhancement of the duty of care platform will increase the reputation of United as a trusted partner, providing relevant real-time engagement solutions for end customers.
United's Regulatory Position At the date of this report, the telecommunications services provided by United do not require a special license or permit in the jurisdictions they are offered. 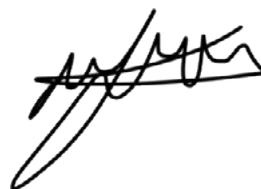

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS 30 JUNE 2017

NOTE 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out either in the respective notes or below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

NEW OR AMENDED ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND INTERPRETATIONS ADOPTED

The consolidated entity has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period. None of the new standards and amendments to standards affected any of the amounts recognised in the current period or any prior period.

During the financial year ended 30 June 2016, the consolidated entity elected to early adopt AASB 15 'Revenue from contracts with customers' and AASB 16 'Leases'. AASB 15 and AASB 16 are applicable to annual financial reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018 and 1 January 2019 respectively. Any other new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

BASIS OF PREPARATION

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the Corporations Act 2001, as appropriate for for-profit oriented entities. These financial statements also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ('IASB').

HISTORICAL COST CONVENTION

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for, where applicable, financial assets and liabilities at fair value through profit or loss.

CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the consolidated entity's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 2.

PARENT ENTITY INFORMATION

In accordance with the Corporations Act 2001, these financial statements present the results of the

consolidated entity only. Supplementary information about the parent entity is disclosed in note 27.

PRINCIPLES OF CONSOLIDATION

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets and liabilities of all subsidiaries of United Networks Limited ('company' or 'parent entity') as at 30 June 2017 and the results of all subsidiaries for the year then ended. United Networks Limited and its subsidiaries together are referred to in these financial statements as the 'consolidated entity'.

Subsidiaries are all those entities over which the consolidated entity has control. The consolidated entity controls an entity when the consolidated entity is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the activities of the entity. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the consolidated entity. They are deconsolidated from the date that control ceases.

Inter-company transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between entities in the consolidated entity are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of the impairment of the asset transferred.

NOTE 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES CONTINUED

Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the consolidated entity.

The acquisition of subsidiaries is accounted for using the acquisition method of accounting. A change in ownership interest, without the loss of control, is accounted for as an equity transaction, where the difference between the consideration transferred and the book value of the share of the non-controlling interest acquired is recognised directly in equity attributable to the parent.

Where the consolidated entity loses control over a subsidiary, it derecognises the assets including goodwill, liabilities and non-controlling interest in the subsidiary together with any cumulative translation differences recognised in equity. The consolidated entity recognises the fair value of the consideration received and the fair value of any investment retained together with any gain or loss in profit or loss.

INCOME TAX

The income tax expense or benefit for the period is the tax payable on that period's taxable income based on the applicable income tax rate for each jurisdiction, adjusted by the changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities attributable to temporary differences, unused tax losses and the adjustment recognised for prior periods, where applicable.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for temporary differences at the tax rates expected to be applied when the assets are recovered or liabilities are settled, based on those tax rates that are enacted or substantively enacted, except for:

- When the deferred income tax asset or liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and that, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting nor taxable profits; or
- When the taxable temporary difference is associated with interests in subsidiaries, associates or joint ventures, and the timing of the reversal can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses only if it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences and losses.

The carrying amount of recognised and unrecognised deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date. Deferred tax assets recognised are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that future taxable profits will be available for the carrying amount to be recovered.

Previously unrecognised deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that there are future taxable profits available to recover the asset.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only where there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets against current tax liabilities and deferred tax assets against deferred tax liabilities; and they relate to the same taxable authority on either the same taxable entity or different taxable entities which intend to settle simultaneously.

United Networks Limited (the 'head entity') and its wholly-owned Australian subsidiaries have formed an income tax consolidated group under the tax consolidation regime. The head entity and each subsidiary in the tax consolidated group continue to account for their own current and deferred tax amounts. The tax consolidated group has applied the 'separate taxpayer within group' approach in determining the appropriate amount of taxes to allocate to members of the tax consolidated group.

In addition to its own current and deferred tax amounts, the head entity also recognises the current tax liabilities (or assets) and the deferred tax assets arising from unused tax losses and unused tax credits assumed from each subsidiary in the tax consolidated group. Assets or liabilities arising under tax funding agreements with the tax consolidated entities are recognised as amounts receivable from or payable to other entities in the tax consolidated

group. The tax funding arrangement ensures that the inter-company charge equals the current tax liability or benefit of each tax consolidated group member, resulting in neither a contribution by the head entity to the subsidiaries nor a distribution by the subsidiaries to the head entity.

CURRENT AND NON-CURRENT CLASSIFICATION

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the consolidated entity's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the consolidated entity's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting

period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current. Deferred tax assets and liabilities are always classified as non-current.

INVESTMENTS AND OTHER FINANCIAL ASSETS

Investments and other financial assets are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs are included as part of the initial measurement, except for financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. They are subsequently measured at either amortised cost or fair value depending on their classification. Classification is determined based on the purpose of the acquisition and subsequent reclassification to other categories is restricted.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the consolidated entity has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership.

LOANS AND RECEIVABLES

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised or impaired.

IMPAIRMENT OF FINANCIAL ASSETS

The consolidated entity assesses at the end of each reporting period whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or group of financial

assets is impaired. Objective evidence includes significant financial difficulty of the issuer or obligor; a breach of contract such as default or delinquency in payments; the lender granting to a borrower concessions due to economic or legal reasons that the lender would not otherwise do; it becomes probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; the disappearance of an active market for the financial asset; or observable data indicating that there is a measurable decrease in estimated future cash flows.

The amount of the impairment allowance for loans and receivables carried at amortised cost is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the original effective interest rate. If there is a reversal of impairment, the reversal cannot exceed the amortised cost that would have been recognised had the impairment not been made and is reversed to profit or loss.

LEASES

A lease is a contract or part of a contract, that conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. All leases that the company enters into as lessee, except for short-term leases (leases of 12 months or less) and leases of low-value assets, are recognised in the statement of financial position.

For leases that are recognised in the statement of financial position, a right-of-use asset and a lease

NOTE 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES CONTINUED

liability are measured as the present value of the unavoidable future lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease, if that rate can be readily determined, or if that rate cannot be readily determined, the company's incremental borrowing rate. After the initial recognition of

the lease liability, the lease liability is remeasured to reflect changes to the lease payments and the amount of the re-measurement of the lease liability is recognised as an adjustment to the right-of-use asset.

The company accounts for a lease modification as a separate lease if the modification increases the scope of the lease by adding the right to use one or more underlying assets and the consideration for the lease increases by an amount commensurate with the stand-alone price for the increase in scope and any appropriate adjustments to that stand-alone price to reflect the circumstances of the particular contract.

A depreciation charge for the leased asset (included in 'other expenses') and an interest expense on the recognised lease liability (included in 'finance costs') is recognised. If the lease transfers ownership of the underlying asset to the company by the end of the lease term or if the cost of the right-of-use asset

reflects that the company will exercise a purchase option, the company depreciates the right-of-use asset from the commencement date to the end of the useful life of the underlying asset. Otherwise, the company depreciates the right-of-use asset from the commencement date to the earlier of the end of the useful life of the right-of-use asset or the end of the lease term.

For short-term leases or leases for which the underlying asset is of low value, the lease payments associated with those leases are recognised as an expense on either a straight-line basis over the lease term or another systematic basis if that basis is more representative of the pattern of the company's benefit.

IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS

Goodwill and other intangible assets that have an indefinite useful life are not subject to amortisation and are tested annually for impairment, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that they might be impaired. Other non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The

value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

FINANCE COSTS

Finance costs attributable to qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the asset. All other finance costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

GOODS AND SERVICES TAX ('GST') AND OTHER SIMILAR TAXES

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

NEW ACCOUNTING STANDARDS AND INTERPRETATIONS NOT YET MANDATORY OR EARLY ADOPTED

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted

by the consolidated entity for the annual reporting period ended 30 June 2017. The consolidated entity's assessment of the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations, most relevant to the consolidated entity, are set out below.

AASB 9 FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

This standard is applicable to annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2018. The standard replaces all previous versions of AASB 9 and completes the project to replace IAS 39 'Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement'. AASB 9 introduces new classification and measurement models for financial assets. A financial asset shall be measured at amortised cost, if it is held within a business model whose objective is to hold assets in order to collect contractual cash

flows, which arise on specified dates and solely principal and interest. All other financial instrument assets are to be classified and measured at fair value through profit or loss unless the entity makes an irrevocable election on initial recognition to present gains and losses on equity instruments (that are not held-for-trading) in other comprehensive income ('OCI'). For financial liabilities, the standard requires the portion of the change in fair value that relates to the entity's own credit risk to be presented in OCI (unless it would create an accounting mismatch). New simpler hedge accounting requirements are intended to more closely align the accounting treatment with the risk management activities of the entity. New impairment requirements will use an 'expected credit loss' ('ECL') model to recognise an allowance. Impairment will be measured under a 12-month ECL method unless the credit risk on a financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition in which case the lifetime ECL method is adopted. The standard introduces additional new disclosures. The consolidated entity will adopt this standard from 1 January 2018 but the impact of its adoption is yet to be assessed by the consolidated entity.

NOTE 2. CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS, ESTIMATES AND ASSUMPTIONS

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in

the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

ESTIMATION OF USEFUL LIVES OF ASSETS

The consolidated entity determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its property, plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

GOODWILL IMPAIRMENT

The consolidated entity tests annually, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate impairment, whether goodwill has suffered

any impairment. The recoverable amounts of cash-generating units have been determined based on value-in-use calculations. These calculations require the use of assumptions, including estimated discount rates based on the current cost of capital and growth rates of the estimated future cash flows. For information relating to the value-in-use calculations refer to note 13.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other indefinite life intangible assets

The consolidated entity assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill and other

indefinite life intangible assets at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the consolidated entity and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

RECOVERY OF DEFERRED TAX ASSETS

Deferred tax assets are recognised for deductible temporary differences only if the consolidated entity considers it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences and losses.

Identification of reportable operating segments

Operating segments are identified based on separate financial information which is regularly reviewed by the Board of Directors, representing the consolidated entity's Chief Operating Decision Makers (CODM), in assessing performance and determining the allocation of resources.

The consolidated entity operates in primarily one geographical segment, namely Australia. The primary business segment is telecommunications namely voice, data and value added services. As the consolidated entity operates in only one segment, the consolidated results are also its segment results. The consolidated entity operates in one geographical segment being Australia. Revenue from overseas customers is not material to the consolidated entity.

MAJOR CUSTOMERS

All revenue of the consolidated entity is from external customers. During the year ended 30 June 2017 approximately 51% (2016: 58%) of the consolidated entity's external sales revenue was derived from sales to a single customer.

ACCOUNTING POLICY FOR OPERATING SEGMENTS

Operating segments are presented using the 'management approach', where the information presented is on the same basis as the internal reports provided to the Chief Operating Decision Makers ('CODM'). The CODM is responsible for the allocation of resources to operating segments and assessing their performance.

SALE OF GOODS (TELECOMMUNICATIONS HARDWARE)

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when control of the products has transferred to the customer. This will usually occur on delivery of the goods. Amounts disclosed as revenue are net of sales returns and trade discounts.

RENDERING OF SERVICES

The consolidated entity generates revenues from after-sales service and maintenance provided as well as construction contracts for telecommunication solutions. Consideration received for those services is initially deferred, included in other liabilities and is recognised as revenue in the period when the service is performed. In recognising after-sales service and maintenance revenues, the consolidated entity considers the nature of the service and the customer's use of the related products, based on historical experience.

CONTRACTS FOR TELECOMMUNICATION SOLUTIONS

Construction contracts for telecommunication systems specify a fixed price for the development and installation of IT and telecommunication systems. When the outcome can be assessed reliably, contract revenue and associated costs are recognised by reference to the stage of completion of the contract activity at the reporting date. Revenue is measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable in relation to that activity. When the consolidated entity cannot measure the outcome of a contract reliably, revenue is recognised only to the extent of contract costs that have been incurred and are recoverable. Contract costs are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. In either situation, when it is probable that total contract costs will exceed total contract revenue, the expected loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

INTEREST

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

OTHER REVENUE

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

IMPAIRMENT TESTING

For the purpose of impairment testing, goodwill is allocated to a cash-generating unit or to a group of cash-generating units that are expected to benefit, among others, from the synergies of the business combination. The Group's cash-generating units are defined on the basis of the geographical market, normally country-related. The consolidated entity operates in primarily one geographical segment - Australia, and the carrying amount of goodwill has been allocated to Australia.

The recoverable amount of the consolidated entity's goodwill has been determined by a value-in-use calculation using a discounted cash flow model, based on a 1 year projection period approved by management and extrapolated for a further 4 years using a steady rate, together with a terminal value.

The following key assumptions were used in the discounted cash flow model:

- Pre-tax discount rate of 13.3% per annum;
- Revenue growth is based on management projections for 2018, and 5% increases for 2019 - 2022;
- Budgeted gross margin of 51%;
- Operating expenses is based on management projections for 2018, and 2.5% increases for 2019 - 2022;
- Long-term growth rate of 2.5%.

The discount rate of 13.3% pre-tax reflects management's estimate of the time value of money and the consolidated entity's weighted average cost of capital, the risk-free rate and the volatility of the share price relative to market movements.

Management believes the 2018 revenue projection and 5% increases through to 2022 is achievable and justified, based on the projected growth of new products and partners, two of which have been signed on since year-end and the roll-out is actively in place through out Asia-Pacific. The budgeted gross margin is based on past performance and management's expectations for the future.

Operating expenses do not vary significantly with revenue. Management forecasts these costs based on the current structure of the business, adjusting for inflationary increases but not reflecting any future restructurings or cost saving measures. The long-term growth rate is used to extrapolate cash flows beyond the 5-year forecast and is based on external forecasts.

Based on the above, the recoverable amount of the goodwill exceeded the carrying amount by \$2,258,045.

SENSITIVITY

As disclosed in note 2, the directors have made judgements and estimates in respect of impairment testing of goodwill. Should these judgements and estimates not occur the resulting goodwill carrying amount may decrease.

The sensitivities are as follows:

- A reduction in the revenue growth rate of 6% below management expectations for 2018 financial year would result in impairment, with all other assumptions remaining constant.
- A reduction in the revenue growth rate to 4% for the 2019 - 2022 financial years would result in impairment, with all other assumptions remaining constant.
- A reduction in the gross margin to 48% for the 2019 - 2022 financial years would result in impairment, with all other assumptions remaining constant.
- The discount rate would be required to increase to 13.9% before goodwill would need to be impaired, with all other assumptions remaining constant.

Management believes that other reasonable changes in the key assumptions on which the recoverable amount of goodwill is based would not cause the cash-generating unit's carrying amount to exceed its recoverable amount.

ACCOUNTING POLICY FOR INTANGIBLE ASSETS

Intangible assets acquired as part of a business combination, other than goodwill, are initially measured at their fair value at the date of the acquisition. Intangible assets acquired separately are initially recognised at cost. Indefinite life intangible assets are not amortised and are subsequently measured at cost less any impairment. Finite life intangible assets are subsequently measured at cost less amortisation and any impairment. The gains or losses recognised in profit or loss arising from the derecognition of intangible assets are measured as the difference between net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the intangible asset. The method and useful lives of finite life intangible assets are reviewed annually. Changes in the expected pattern of consumption or useful life are accounted for prospectively by changing the amortisation method or period.

GOODWILL

Goodwill arises on the acquisition of a business. Goodwill is not amortised. Instead, goodwill is tested annually for impairment, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that it might be impaired, and is carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses. Impairment losses on goodwill are taken to profit or loss and are not subsequently reversed.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

Research costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred. Development costs are capitalised when it is probable that the project will be a success considering its commercial and technical feasibility; the consolidated entity is able to use or sell the asset; the consolidated entity has sufficient resources; and intent to complete the development and its costs can be measured reliably. Capitalised development costs are amortised on a straight-line basis over the period of their expected benefit, being their finite life of 4 years.

SOFTWARE AND WEB DEVELOPMENT COSTS

Significant costs associated with software and web development costs are deferred and amortised on a straight-line basis over the period of their expected benefit, being their finite life of 4 years.

ORDINARY SHARES

Ordinary shares entitle the holder to participate in dividends and the proceeds on the winding up of the company in proportion to the number of and amounts paid on the shares held. The fully paid ordinary shares have no par value and the company does not have a limited amount of authorised capital. On a show of hands every member present at a meeting in person or by proxy shall have one vote and upon a poll each share shall have one vote.

INITIAL PUBLIC OFFERING

On 12 January 2017, the company was admitted to the official list of the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX). The settlement of the issue or transfer of shares as part of the company's initial public offering on 12 January 2017 resulted in the issue of 35,667,500 ordinary shares at the offer price of 20 cents per ordinary share. Transaction costs of \$631,725 were recognised directly in equity which represents the portion of transaction costs attributable to the issuance of new shares. Transaction costs of \$444,703 attributable to the listing were recognised in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income in the current reporting period.

CAPITAL RISK MANAGEMENT

The consolidated entity's objectives when managing capital is to safeguard its ability to continue as a going concern, so that it can provide returns for shareholders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain an optimum capital structure to reduce the cost of capital.

Total capital is calculated as 'total equity' as shown in the statement of financial position (including non-controlling interest) plus net debt.

The consolidated entity has no significant concentration of credit risk with respect to any single counter-party or group of counter-parties. 30 June 2016

ACQUISITION OF UNITED LIFESTYLE GROUP NETWORKS PTY LTD - 30 JUNE 2016

On 7 December 2015, United Networks Limited (UNL), the legal parent entity and legal acquirer, acquired 100% of the issued shares of United Lifestyle Group Networks Pty Limited (ULGN), who holds a 100% share interest in United Global Sim Limited, an entity incorporated in Hong Kong.

Under the terms of the transaction UNL issued 76,416,128 shares to the shareholders of United Lifestyle Group Networks Pty Limited, resulting in United Lifestyle Group Networks Pty Limited acquiring 100% of the legal parent entity's issued capital. Notwithstanding that the transaction took the format of a reverse acquisition as described in AASB 3 'Business Combinations', the transaction was not deemed a business combination on the basis that UNL did not meet the definition of a business as noted in that standard.

The group applied by analogy, the guidance in AASB 3 on reverse acquisitions, resulting in United Lifestyle Group Networks Pty Limited being identified as the accounting acquirer/parent and UNL being identified as the accounting acquiree. As the transaction is not within the scope of AASB 3, the transaction was treated as a share-based payment transaction accounted for in accordance with AASB 2 'Share-based payment' whereby ULGN is deemed to have issued shares in exchange for the net assets of UNL. In accordance with AASB 2, the difference between the fair value of the deemed consideration paid by ULGN and the fair value of the identifiable net assets of UNL, is required to be recognised as an expense. UNL had no net assets or net liabilities at the date of acquisition and the deemed consideration paid by ULGN was considered to be nil.

ACQUISITION OF UNITED GLOBAL SIM LIMITED

On 5 December 2015, United Lifestyle Group Networks Pty Limited (ULGN) acquired 100% of the issued shares of United Global Sim Limited (UGS), an entity incorporated in Hong Kong in consideration for the issue by ULGN of 16,000,000 fully paid ordinary shares to the shareholders of UGS.

UGS was acquired to be the platform for the development of the expansion of the global roaming offering. The goodwill of \$16,016,577 represents expected growth, expected future profitability and expected cost synergies.

ACCOUNTING POLICY FOR BUSINESS COMBINATIONS

The acquisition method of accounting is used to account for business combinations regardless of whether equity instruments or other assets are acquired. The consideration transferred is the sum of the acquisition-date fair values of the assets transferred, equity instruments issued or liabilities incurred by the acquirer to former owners of the acquiree and the amount of any non-controlling interest in the acquiree. For each business combination, the non-controlling interest in the acquiree is measured at either fair value or at the proportionate share of the acquiree's identifiable net assets. All acquisition costs are expensed as incurred to profit or loss.

On the acquisition of a business, the consolidated entity assesses the financial assets acquired and liabilities assumed for appropriate classification and designation in accordance with the contractual terms, economic conditions, the consolidated entity's operating or accounting policies and other pertinent conditions in existence at the acquisition-date. Where the business combination is achieved in stages, the consolidated entity remeasures its previously held equity interest in the acquiree at the acquisition-date fair value and the difference between the fair value and the previous carrying amount is recognised in profit or loss.

Contingent consideration to be transferred by the acquirer is recognised at the acquisition-date fair value. Subsequent changes in the fair value of the contingent consideration classified as an asset or liability is recognised in profit or loss. Contingent consideration classified as equity is not remeasured and its subsequent settlement is accounted for within equity. The difference between the acquisition-date fair value of assets acquired, liabilities assumed and any non-controlling interest in the acquiree and the fair value of the consideration transferred and the fair value of any pre-existing investment in the acquiree is recognised as goodwill.

If the consideration transferred and the pre-existing fair value is less than the fair value of the identifiable net assets acquired, being a bargain purchase to the acquirer, the difference is recognised as a gain directly in profit or loss by the acquirer on the acquisition-date, but only after a reassessment of the identification and measurement of the net assets acquired, the non-controlling interest in the acquiree, if any, the consideration transferred and the acquirer's previously held equity interest in the acquirer.

Business combinations are initially accounted for on a provisional basis. The acquirer retrospectively adjusts the provisional amounts recognised and also recognises additional assets or liabilities during the measurement period, based on new information obtained about the facts and circumstances that existed at the acquisition-date. The measurement period ends on either the earlier of (i) 12 months from the date of the acquisition or (ii) when the acquirer receives all the information possible to determine fair value.

REVERSE ACQUISITION

A reverse acquisition occurs when the acquirer is the entity whose equity interests have been acquired and the issuing entity is the acquiree. This might be the case when a private entity arranges to have itself 'acquired' by a smaller public entity as a means of obtaining a stock exchange listing. Although legally the issuing entity is regarded as the parent and the private entity is regarded as the subsidiary, the legal subsidiary is the acquirer if it has the power to govern the financial and operating policies of the legal parent so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

In a reverse acquisition, the cost of the business combination is deemed to have been incurred by the legal subsidiary in the form of equity instruments issued to the owners of the legal parent. The published price of the equity instruments of the acquirer is used to determine the cost of the combination, or where this is not available, the deemed fair value of its shares, and a calculation shall be made to determine the number of equity instruments the acquirer would have to issue to provide the same percentage ownership interest of the combined entity to the owners/shareholders of the acquirer as they have in the combined entity as a result of the reverse acquisition. The fair value of the number of equity instruments so calculated shall be used as the cost of the combination.

ACCOUNTING POLICY FOR SHARE-BASED PAYMENTS

Equity-settled and cash-settled share-based compensation benefits are provided to employees.

Equity-settled transactions are awards of shares, or options over shares, that are provided to employees in exchange for the rendering of services. Cash-settled transactions are awards of cash for the exchange of services, where the amount of cash is determined by reference to the share price.

The cost of equity-settled transactions are measured at fair value on grant date. Fair value is independently determined using either the Binomial or Black-Scholes option pricing model that takes into account the exercise price, the term of the option, the impact of dilution, the share price at grant date and expected price volatility of the underlying share, the expected dividend yield and the risk free interest rate for the term of the option, together with non-vesting conditions that do not determine whether the consolidated entity receives the services that entitle the employees to receive payment. No account is taken of any other vesting conditions.

The cost of equity-settled transactions are recognised as an expense with a corresponding increase in equity over the vesting period. The cumulative charge to profit or loss is calculated based on the grant date fair value of the award, the best estimate of the number of awards that are likely to vest and the expired portion of the vesting period. The amount recognised in profit or loss for the period is the cumulative amount calculated at each reporting date less amounts already recognised in previous periods.

NOTE 33. SHARE-BASED PAYMENTS CONTINUED

The cost of cash-settled transactions is initially, and at each reporting date until vested, determined by applying either the Binomial or Black-Scholes option pricing model, taking into consideration the terms and conditions on which the award was granted. The cumulative charge to profit or loss until settlement of the liability is calculated as follows:

- during the vesting period, the liability at each reporting date is the fair value of the award at that date multiplied by the expired portion of the vesting period.
- from the end of the vesting period until settlement of the award, the liability is the full fair value of the liability at the reporting date.

All changes in the liability are recognised in profit or loss. The ultimate cost of cash-settled transactions is the cash paid to settle the liability.

Market conditions are taken into consideration in determining fair value. Therefore any awards subject to market conditions are considered to vest irrespective of whether or not that market condition has been met, provided all other conditions are satisfied.

If equity-settled awards are modified, as a minimum an expense is recognised as if the modification has not been made. An additional expense is recognised, over the remaining vesting period, for any modification that increases the total fair value of the share-based compensation benefit as at the date of modification.

If the non-vesting condition is within the control of the consolidated entity or employee, the failure to satisfy the condition is treated as a cancellation. If the condition is not within the control of the consolidated entity or employee and is not satisfied during the vesting period, any remaining expense for the award is recognised over the remaining vesting period, unless the award is forfeited.

If equity-settled awards are cancelled, it is treated as if it has vested on the date of cancellation, and any remaining expense is recognised immediately. If a new replacement award is substituted for the cancelled award, the cancelled and new award is treated as if they were a modification.

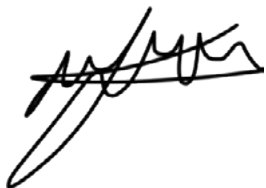

The directors of the Group are responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and the *Corporations Act 2001* and for such internal control as the directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.
