Hiremii Limited has adopted and has substantially complied with the ASX Corporate Governance Principles and Recommendations (Fourth Edition) ('Recommendations') to the extent appropriate to the size and nature of its operations. The directors present their report, together with the financial statements, on the consolidated entity (referred to hereafter as the 'consolidated entity') consisting of Hiremii Limited (referred to hereafter as the 'company' or 'parent entity') and the entities it controlled at the end of, or during, the year ended 30 June 2025.

Principal activities

During the financial year the principal continuing activities of the consolidated entity consisted of technology driven full-service labour hire and recruitment services.

Dividends

There were no dividends paid, recommended or declared during the current or previous financial year.

Operating and financial review

Hiremii is building AI-led recruitment and technology driven company with deep relationships in the energy and resources sector.

Hiremii Limited is a recruitment services business that is rolling out a novel, proprietary artificial intelligence ('AI') technology for candidate sourcing and selection. The technology offering is complemented by an established traditional recruitment subsidiary focused on resources and energy professionals, Inverse Group.

Highlights

- Commercial traction is growing through product validation with SME and enterprise customers. Launch of Hiremii Talent Community and enhanced job board integration positions the platform for accelerating commercial adoption in FY2026.
- Hiremii's domain-trained knowledge graph AI outperforms candidate-role matching accuracy when compared to large language models ('LLM') based solutions, and partnering with UWA and AWS continues to improve model capability in the energy and resources niche globally.
- Revenue of \$29.8m for the year was in line with FY24 revenue of \$30.1m. Gross profit of \$2.82m for the year was down 3.5% on FY24 gross profit of \$2.92m resulting from a lower proportion of permanent placements.
- The loss for the consolidated entity after providing for income tax amounted to \$1,168,850 (30 June 2024: \$932,861).
- Successful capital raise of \$525,000 before costs in partnership with Sequoia Corporate Finance in October 2025.
- Acquisition of Prince Migration & Education Pty Ltd was completed in July 2025 as in line with the strategy to lift EBITDA through cash positive acquisitions and adjacent market expansion.

The past financial year presented some challenges, but also significant progress on key strategic fronts. The one-off completion of a major contract in the second quarter of FY24 by one of our largest clients impacted our contractor book. Despite a weaker recruitment market, we maintained revenue within our traditional recruitment business, underpinned by renewed focus, streamlined operations, and a disciplined approach to identifying higher-value opportunities.

Our AI technology product division continues to build momentum. Following the launch of our Talent Community and global job board integration, we are now positioned for broader commercial deployment of our AI-powered recruitment platform. Feedback from enterprise and government engagements throughout the latter part of the year has been strongly validating particularly in the energy, resources, and technology sectors and we remain confident in our differentiated value proposition.

Our proprietary AI software, built around a domain-trained knowledge graph, continues to outperform generic LLM-based tools in real-world candidate matching. Combined with our ability to generate structured, high-quality job content at scale, we believe this sets Hiremii apart in delivering tangible hiring outcomes for our clients.

Hiremii expands enterprise engagement and sharpens commercial focus

Hiremii's cloud-based platform uses AI and machine learning to automate tedious onerous manual activities in recruiting. The AI more accurately identifies talent for customers and makes recruitment teams more productive.

Building a commercial foundation through strategic market engagement

Hiremii advanced its commercialisation strategy through targeted engagement with a number of organisations across the mining, technology and energy sectors. A series of structured discovery sessions and product trials delivered both strategic insights and validation, with strong interest in the platform's ability to address sector-specific talent acquisition challenges. These engagements have directly shaped Hiremii's FY26 product roadmap and accelerated customer-aligned development priorities.

The company's first major product enhancement for FY26 is an integration with Idibu, a global job board aggregator. This integration will unlock access to hundreds of job boards worldwide, including those most relevant to the Australian mining, energy, technology and government sectors. By expanding job distribution capabilities, this enhancement is expected to significantly increase sourcing efficiency for enterprise users.

Differentiated AI technology delivering measurable recruitment outcomes

Hiremii's AI advantage lies in its proprietary knowledge graph architecture a structured and deterministic approach to candidate matching that outperforms LLMs and general machine learning tools in live testing scenarios as a result of specialised algorithms.

Designed to model the complex relationships between skills, qualifications, and job requirements, the platform's AI delivers highly accurate and explainable matches a critical requirement in high-stakes hiring across regulated and technical industries.

Complementing this is Hiremii's use of generative AI, pre-trained on thousands of real-world job descriptions and role briefs from its recruitment subsidiary, Inverse Group. This enables superior quality in job ad creation, skills extraction and content personalisation ensuring precision and performance across the hiring lifecycle.

Accelerating platform adoption through talent community network effects

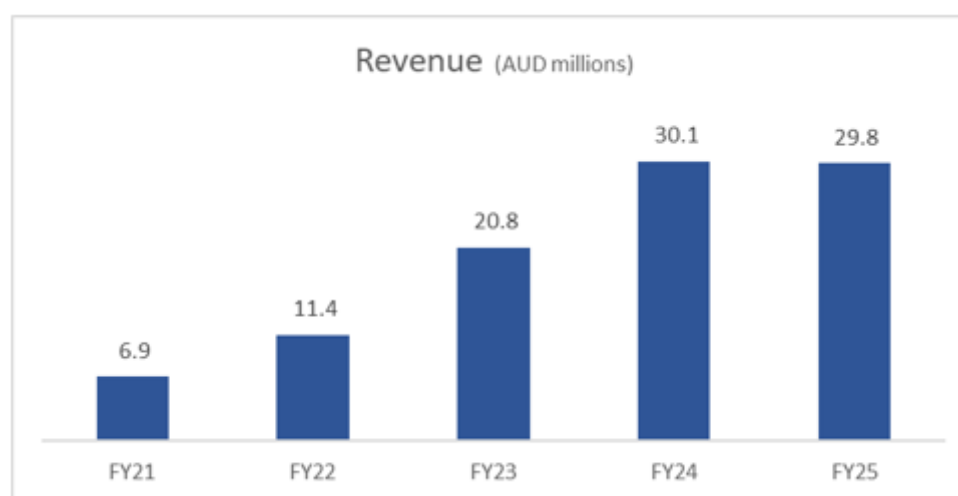
With a growing base of employers and jobseekers, Hiremii's Talent Community is now central to its go-to-market execution in FY26. By reducing friction in the recruitment process and lowering acquisition costs for employers, the platform is creating a scalable and differentiated path to customer acquisition particularly within high-demand sectors.

Employers benefit from seamless job advertising and direct access to qualified, industry-aligned candidates. Candidates gain exposure to more relevant roles and a streamlined application experience all within a trusted, AI-enabled hiring environment.

This dual-sided approach positions Hiremii to scale its commercial presence across enterprise, SME, and government clients with a clear focus on delivering measurable hiring outcomes, not just technology features.

Financial progress

Revenue of \$29,824,212 for the year was in line with FY24 \$30,064,648. Revenue levels were maintained despite the completion of a contract by a major client.



Gross margin of \$2,819,197 was maintained in line with FY24 \$2,920,491. The loss for the consolidated entity after providing for income tax amounted to \$1,168,850 (2024: \$932,861).

The operating expense proportion of revenue remained in line at 11.8% from 11.4% in FY24 (employee benefits, professional and consulting fees and general and administration expenses) through cost management in line with revenue performance.

Increased share-based payment costs up \$153,936 year-on-year were offset by reduced amortisation (reduced by \$164,970).

Prospects

Prospects for future revenue growth remain strong in the resources, energy and renewables markets domestically and globally. Hiremii is positioned to benefit from growth into adjacent service lines such as migration and into new market segments including technology.

The AI technology platform has been developed to take advantage of trends in agentic AI to improve effectiveness, while leveraging proprietary knowledge graph matching technology to outperform generalised LLM solutions being deployed in incumbents. The company's expertise in resources, energy and renewables markets ensures the solutions being developed have a competitive advantage over solutions attempting to serve all markets. Commercialisation is being achieved through working with the consolidated entity's established customer base and related opportunities.

Business risks

Hiremii continues to invest significantly in its recruitment technology. The growth and profitability of the technology platform is important for the business's long-term success and growth as a competitor and market disruptor. The development of the technology relies on third parties for ongoing development, with strong partnerships developed that are expected to continue, and without which would place the technology solutions in jeopardy. The artificial intelligence and machine learning elements of the technology platform are complex and sophisticated and if not well deployed and maintained can impact the reliability of the solutions provided to customers.

Continuing to develop the technology may require funding beyond the ability of the business to generate funds and access to cost effective capital may be important to continue the ability of the business to advance the technology and effectively grow the customer base.

Inverse Group continues to grow revenue and capability in the recruiting and labour hire markets which is important to drive value and achieve sustainability. Impeded growth would limit the business's ability to achieve its objectives. Inverse Group is well established in the Energy and Resources sector in Western Australia – should this sector decline this would impact the growth and profitability of the consolidated entity. Major customers provide significant revenue and should the business of these customers reduce, Inverse Group's revenue would be impacted. Inverse Group services a number of well-established businesses with minimal credit losses to date. A significant client experiencing financial difficulty would impact on the financial position of the consolidated entity, so stringent credit management processes are in place for all customers.

Significant changes in the state of affairs

There were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the consolidated entity during the financial year.

Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year

On 1 August 2025, the company completed the acquisition (announced on 9 July 2025) of 100% shares in Prince Migration & Education Pty (Ltd) ('Prince Migration'), a privately-owned, highly-regarded migration services company. This acquisition will provide Hiremii with a platform for strategic expansion into the East Coast of Australia access to scarce talent in Asia, and diversification of revenue into new services lines. Total consideration payable for the acquisition is up to \$650,000 through shares and performance rights from July 2025 to 30 June 2028, subject to certain conditions.

As part of the transaction, Hiremii has issued the following securities as consideration for the acquisition:

- 3,957,029 fully paid ordinary shares in Hiremii, will be subject to a 12-month voluntary escrow commencing from date of issue;
- 2,697,771 Class A performance rights, which will vest upon Prince Migration achieving earnings before interest and tax ('EBIT') of \$115,000 for the year ended 30 June 2026;
- 1,875,000 Class B performance rights, which will vest upon Prince Migration achieving EBIT of \$340,000 for the year ended 2027; and
- 1,500,000 Class C performance rights, which will vest upon Prince Migration achieving EBIT of \$600,000 for the year ended 30 June 2028.

The relevant disclosures for this business combination for the net assets acquired cannot be disclosed in these financial statements as the values are in the process of being determined.

On 22 July 2025, Inverse Group, Hiremii's recruitment and labour hire business, varied the agreements with Octet Finance Pty Ltd ('Octet') to extend the facility for a minimum period of 12 months to at least 21 July 2026.

On 15 September 2025, shareholders at a general meeting:

- Approved the re-election of Ms Yingyi Chen as Director;
- Ratified the prior issue of 10,000,000 Shares with one (1) free attaching Option for every three (3) Shares subscribed;
- Ratified the prior issue of 3,333,333 Placement Options;
- Ratified the prior issue of 750,000 Shares to Sequoia Corporate Finance Pty Ltd as Lead Manager to the placement;
- Ratified the prior issue 2,000,000 Performance Rights and the issue of 1,000,000 Shares to Calait Capital Pty Ltd to provide investor relationship management services;
- Ratified the prior issue of 3,957,029 Shares and the issue of 6,072,771 Performance Rights to Gaogao Group Pty Ltd to acquire 100% of the issued share capital in Prince Migration & Education Pty Ltd;
- Approved the issue of up to 461,440 Performance Rights to Mr Andrew Hornby under the Employee Incentive Plan; and
- Authorised and approved the renewal of the Company's Employee Incentive Plan.

No other matter or circumstance has arisen since 30 June 2025 that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect the consolidated entity's operations, the results of those operations, or the consolidated entity's state of affairs in future financial years.

Remuneration report (audited)

The remuneration report details the key management personnel remuneration arrangements for the consolidated entity, in accordance with the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001 and its Regulations.

Key management personnel ('KMP') are those persons having authority and responsibility for planning, directing and controlling the activities of the entity, directly or indirectly, including all directors.

The remuneration report is set out under the following main headings:

- Principles used to determine the nature and amount of remuneration;
- Details of remuneration;
- Service agreements;
- Share-based compensation;

Principles used to determine the nature and amount of remuneration

The objective of the consolidated entity's executive reward framework is to ensure reward for performance is competitive and appropriate for the results delivered. The framework aligns executive reward with the achievement of strategic objectives and the creation of value for shareholders, and it is considered to conform to the market best practice for the delivery of reward. The Board of Directors ('the Board') ensures that executive reward satisfies the following key criteria for good reward governance practices:

- competitiveness and reasonableness;
- acceptability to shareholders;
- performance linkage / alignment of executive compensation; and
- transparency.

The Nomination and Remuneration Committee is responsible for determining and reviewing remuneration arrangements for its directors and executives. The performance of the consolidated entity depends on the quality of its directors and executives. The remuneration philosophy is to attract, motivate and retain high performance and high quality personnel.

The Nomination and Remuneration Committee has structured an executive remuneration framework that is market competitive and complementary to the reward strategy of the consolidated entity.

The reward framework is designed to align executive reward to shareholders' interests. The Board has considered that it should seek to enhance shareholders' interests by:

- having economic profit as a core component of plan design;
- focusing on sustained growth in shareholder wealth, consisting of dividends and growth in share price, and delivering constant or increasing return on assets as well as focusing the executive on key non-financial drivers of value; and
- attracting and retaining high calibre executives.

Additionally, the reward framework should seek to enhance executives' interests by:

- rewarding capability and experience;
- reflecting competitive reward for contribution to growth in shareholder wealth; and
- providing a clear structure for earning rewards.

In accordance with best practice corporate governance, the structure of non-executive director and executive director remuneration is separate.

Non-executive directors' remuneration

Fees and payments to non-executive directors reflect the demands and responsibilities of their role. Non-executive directors' fees and payments are reviewed annually by the Nomination and Remuneration Committee. The Nomination and Remuneration Committee may, from time to time, receive advice from independent remuneration consultants to ensure non-executive directors' fees and payments are appropriate and in line with the market. The chairman's fees are determined independently to the fees of other non-executive directors based on comparative roles in the external market. The chairman is not present at any discussions relating to the determination of their own remuneration.

ASX listing rules require the aggregate non-executive directors' remuneration be determined periodically by a general meeting. The maximum remuneration for non-executive directors remains at \$300,000 per annum unless specifically approved by shareholders.

Executive remuneration

The consolidated entity aims to reward executives based on their position and responsibility, with a level and mix of remuneration which has both fixed and variable components.

The executive remuneration and reward framework has four components:

- base pay and non-monetary benefits;
- short-term performance incentives;
- long-term incentives; and
- other remuneration such as superannuation and long service leave.

The combination of these comprises the executive's total remuneration.

Fixed remuneration, consisting of base salary, superannuation and non-monetary benefits, are reviewed annually by the Nomination and Remuneration Committee based on individual and business unit performance, the overall performance of the consolidated entity and comparable market remunerations.

Executives may receive their fixed remuneration in the form of cash or other fringe benefits (for example motor vehicle benefits) where it does not create any additional costs to the consolidated entity and provides additional value to the executive.

The short-term incentives ('STI') program is designed to align the targets of the business units with the performance hurdles of executives. STI payments are granted to executives based on specific annual targets and key performance indicators ('KPI's') being achieved. KPI's include revenue growth, margin, technology commercialisation, safety and compliance.

The long-term incentives ('LTI') include share-based payments. Share-based payments in the form of options are awarded to executives over a period of three years based on long-term incentive measures. These include increase in shareholders' value relative to the entire market and the increase compared to the consolidated entity's direct competitors. The Nomination and Remuneration Committee reviewed the long-term equity-linked performance incentives specifically for executives during the year ended 30 June 2025.

Consolidated entity performance and link to remuneration

Remuneration for executives are directly linked to the performance of the consolidated entity. STI payments are dependent on KPI's highlighted above. Refer to the section 'Additional information' below for details of the earnings and total shareholders return.

The Nomination and Remuneration Committee is of the opinion that the adoption of performance-based compensation will assist in increasing shareholder wealth over the coming years.

Use of remuneration consultants

During the financial year ended 30 June 2025, the consolidated entity did not engage remuneration consultants.

Voting and comments made at the company's 2024 Annual General Meeting ('AGM')

At the 2024 AGM, 99.56% of the votes received supported the adoption of the remuneration report for the year ended 30 June 2024. The company did not receive any specific feedback at the AGM regarding its remuneration practices.

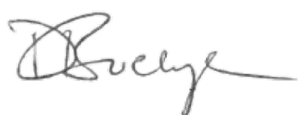

Note 1. General information

The financial statements cover Hiremii Limited as a consolidated entity consisting of Hiremii Limited and the entities it controlled at the end of, or during, the year. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars, which is Hiremii Limited's functional and presentation currency.

Hiremii Limited is a listed public company limited by shares, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Its registered office and principal place of business is:

A description of the nature of the consolidated entity's operations and its principal activities are included in the directors' report, which is not part of the financial statements.

The financial statements were authorised for issue, in accordance with a resolution of directors, on 29 September 2025. The directors have the power to amend and reissue the financial statements.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information

The accounting policies that are material to the consolidated entity are set out below. The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year, unless otherwise stated.

New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The consolidated entity has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period. The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any material impact on the financial performance or position of the consolidated entity.

The following Accounting Standards and Interpretations have been adopted from 1 July 2024:

- AASB 2020-1 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-Current and AASB 2022-6 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards - Non-current Liabilities with Covenants.
- AASB 2022-5 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Lease Liability in a Sale and Leaseback
- AASB 2023-1 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Supplier Finance Arrangements

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis, which contemplates continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and discharge of liabilities in the normal course of business.

As disclosed in the financial statements, the consolidated entity incurred a loss after tax of \$1,168,850 (2024: \$932,861) and had net cash outflows from operating activities of \$224,134 (2024: outflows of \$2,209,684) and net cash outflows from investing activities of \$216,989 (2024: \$289,016) for the year ended 30 June 2025. As at that date the consolidated entity had net current liabilities of \$859,457 (2024: net current liabilities of \$282,485).

Accordingly, the above matters give rise to a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt on the consolidated entity's ability to continue as a going concern as and therefore its ability to realise its assets and settle its liabilities in the ordinary course of business and at the amounts set out in the financial statements.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

The Directors believe that it is reasonably foreseeable that the consolidated entity will continue as a going concern and that it is appropriate for it to adopt the going concern basis in the preparation of these financial statements after consideration of following factors:

- Whilst the consolidated entity currently continues to trade at a loss with negative operating cash flows, the consolidated entity is forecasting increased sales revenue to be generated from its operating activities over the next 12 months;
- The Directors expect to maintain continued support from shareholders that have supported the consolidated entity's previous capital raisings such that the company could reasonably expect to be able to raise sufficient funds to meet future working capital needs;
- The invoice finance facility of up to \$2.5m is expected to continue to be available to finance working capital requirements and will be able to be increased if required and supported by the growth of the business;
- Management has the capacity to implement certain measures to reduce cash outflows in the area of corporate and administration; and
- Directors anticipate the availability of further funding, as needed, to be available through equity raisings.

Accordingly, the Directors believe that the consolidated entity will be able to continue as a going concern and that it is appropriate to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

The financial statements do not include any adjustments relating to the amounts or classification of recorded assets or liabilities that might be necessary if the consolidated entity does not continue as a going concern.

Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the Corporations Act 2001, as appropriate for for-profit oriented entities. These financial statements also comply with International Financial Reporting Standards Accounting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ('IASB').

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the consolidated entity's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements, are disclosed in note 3.

Parent entity information

In accordance with the Corporations Act 2001, these financial statements present the results of the consolidated entity only. Supplementary information about the parent entity is disclosed in note 25.

Principles of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate the assets and liabilities of all subsidiaries of Hiremii Limited ('company' or 'parent entity') as at 30 June 2025 and the results of all subsidiaries for the year then ended. Hiremii Limited and its subsidiaries together are referred to in these financial statements as the 'consolidated entity'.

Subsidiaries are all those entities over which the consolidated entity has control. The consolidated entity controls an entity when the consolidated entity is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power to direct the activities of the entity. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the consolidated entity. They are de-consolidated from the date that control ceases.

Intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains on transactions between entities in the consolidated entity are eliminated. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of the impairment of the asset transferred. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed where necessary to ensure consistency with the policies adopted by the consolidated entity.

The acquisition of subsidiaries is accounted for using the acquisition method of accounting. A change in ownership interest, without the loss of control, is accounted for as an equity transaction, where the difference between the consideration transferred and the book value of the share of the non-controlling interest acquired is recognised directly in equity attributable to the parent.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Where the consolidated entity loses control over a subsidiary, it derecognises the assets including goodwill, liabilities and non-controlling interest in the subsidiary together with any cumulative translation differences recognised in equity. The consolidated entity recognises the fair value of the consideration received and the fair value of any investment retained together with any gain or loss in profit or loss.

Operating segments

Operating segments are presented using the 'management approach', where the information presented is on the same basis as the internal reports provided to the Chief Operating Decision Makers ('CODM'). The CODM is responsible for the allocation of resources to operating segments and assessing their performance.

Foreign currency translation

Foreign currency transactions

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the entity's currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at financial year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in profit or loss.

Revenue recognition

The consolidated entity recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the consolidated entity is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the consolidated entity: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur. The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Rendering of services

Revenue from a contract to provide contractor services is recognised over time as the services are rendered based on either a fixed price or an hourly rate. Permanent placements services are recognised at a point in time when the contract of employment is executed.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

Research and development tax incentive

The research and development tax incentive ('RDTI') represents a refundable tax offset that is available on eligible research and development expenditure incurred by the consolidated entity. The RDTI is considered to be a form of government assistance and the accounting policy adopted is analogous to accounting for government grants.

The RDTI is recognised at fair value where there is a reasonable assurance that the incentive will be received and the consolidated entity will comply with all attached conditions.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

The RDTI relating to expenses is recognised as incurred at the point of time in profit or loss.

Research and development costs

Research costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred. Development costs will be capitalised if and when: it is probable that the project will be a success considering its commercial and technical feasibility; the consolidated entity is able to use or sell the asset; the consolidated entity has sufficient resources and intent to complete the development; and its costs can be measured reliably.

Income tax

The income tax expense or benefit for the period is the tax payable on that period's taxable income based on the applicable income tax rate for each jurisdiction, adjusted by the changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities attributable to temporary differences, unused tax losses and the adjustment recognised for prior periods, where applicable.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for temporary differences at the tax rates expected to be applied when the assets are recovered or liabilities are settled, based on those tax rates that are enacted or substantively enacted, except for:

- when the deferred income tax asset or liability arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and that, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting nor taxable profits; or
- when the taxable temporary difference is associated with interests in subsidiaries, associates or joint ventures, and the timing of the reversal can be controlled and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses only if it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences and losses.

The carrying amount of recognised and unrecognised deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date. Deferred tax assets recognised are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that future taxable profits will be available for the carrying amount to be recovered. Previously unrecognised deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that there are future taxable profits available to recover the asset.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only where there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets against current tax liabilities and deferred tax assets against deferred tax liabilities; and they relate to the same taxable authority on either the same taxable entity or different taxable entities which intend to settle simultaneously.

Hiremii Limited (the 'head entity') and its wholly-owned Australian subsidiaries have formed an income tax consolidated group under the tax consolidation regime. The head entity and each subsidiary in the tax consolidated group continue to account for their own current and deferred tax amounts. The tax consolidated group has applied the 'group taxpayer' approach in determining the appropriate amount of taxes to allocate to members of the tax consolidated group.

In addition to its own current and deferred tax amounts, the head entity also recognises the current tax liabilities (or assets) and the deferred tax assets arising from unused tax losses and unused tax credits assumed from each subsidiary in the tax consolidated group.

Assets or liabilities arising under tax funding agreements with the tax consolidated entities are recognised as amounts receivable from or payable to other entities in the tax consolidated group. The tax funding arrangement ensures that the intercompany charge equals the current tax liability or benefit of each tax consolidated group member, resulting in neither a contribution by the head entity to the subsidiaries nor a distribution by the subsidiaries to the head entity.

Current and non-current classification

Assets and liabilities are presented in the statement of financial position based on current and non-current classification.

An asset is classified as current when: it is either expected to be realised or intended to be sold or consumed in the consolidated entity's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting period; or the asset is cash or cash equivalent unless restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other assets are classified as non-current.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

A liability is classified as current when: it is either expected to be settled in the consolidated entity's normal operating cycle; it is held primarily for the purpose of trading; it is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting period; or there is no right at the end of the reporting period to defer the settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period. All other liabilities are classified as non-current.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are always classified as non-current.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

The consolidated entity has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue.

Contract assets

Contract assets are recognised when the consolidated entity has transferred goods or services to the customer but where the consolidated entity is yet to establish an unconditional right to consideration. Contract assets are treated as financial assets for impairment purposes.

Right-of-use assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the consolidated entity expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The consolidated entity has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

Lessor accounting

As a lessor, the consolidated entity classifies its leases as either operating or finance leases. A lease is classified as a finance lease if it transfers substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of the underlying asset and classified as an operating lease if it does not.

Lease receivables

For rental income from a sublease classified as a finance lease, a lease receivable is recognised at an amount equal to the net investment in the lease. Subsequent to initial measurement, the lease receivable is decreased by the sublease payment received, increased by interest revenue (unwinding of discounting), less any allowance for expected credit losses.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Intangible assets

Intangible assets acquired as part of a business combination, other than goodwill, are initially measured at their fair value at the date of the acquisition. Intangible assets acquired separately are initially recognised at cost. Indefinite life intangible assets are not amortised and are subsequently measured at cost less any impairment. Finite life intangible assets are subsequently measured at cost less amortisation and any impairment. The gains or losses recognised in profit or loss arising from the derecognition of intangible assets are measured as the difference between net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the intangible asset. The method and useful lives of finite life intangible assets are reviewed annually. Changes in the expected pattern of consumption or useful life are accounted for prospectively by changing the amortisation method or period.

Goodwill

Goodwill arises on the acquisition of a business. Goodwill is not amortised. Instead, goodwill is tested annually for impairment, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that it might be impaired, and is carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses. Impairment losses on goodwill are taken to profit or loss and are not subsequently reversed.

Technology platform

Significant costs associated with the development of the revenue generating technology platform for recruitment, including artificial intelligence and candidate matching capabilities, are deferred and amortised on a straight-line basis over the period of their expected benefit, being their finite life of 2 years when brought into use. The technology platform was ready for use on 17 January 2023.

Trademarks

Significant costs associated with trademarks are capitalised and amortised on a straight-line basis over the period of their expected benefit, being their finite life of 10 years.

Customer relationships

Customer relationships acquired in a business combination are amortised on a straight-line basis over the period of their expected benefit, being their finite life of 2 years.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Goodwill and other intangible assets that have an indefinite useful life are not subject to amortisation and are tested annually for impairment, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that they might be impaired. Other non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount.

Recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value-in-use. The value-in-use is the present value of the estimated future cash flows relating to the asset using a pre-tax discount rate specific to the asset or cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Assets that do not have independent cash flows are grouped together to form a cash-generating unit.

Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the consolidated entity prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

Contract liabilities

Contract liabilities represent the consolidated entity's obligation to transfer goods or services to a customer and are recognised when a customer pays consideration, or when the consolidated entity recognises a receivable to reflect its unconditional right to consideration (whichever is earlier) before the consolidated entity has transferred the goods or services to the customer.

Borrowings

Loans and borrowings are initially recognised at the fair value of the consideration received, net of transaction costs. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities when the consolidated entity does not have a right to defer settlement of the liability for at least 12 months after the reporting period.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Lease liabilities

A lease liability is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments to be made over the term of the lease, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the consolidated entity's incremental borrowing rate. Lease payments comprise of fixed payments less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees, exercise price of a purchase option when the exercise of the option is reasonably certain to occur, and any anticipated termination penalties. The variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Lease liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The carrying amounts are remeasured if there is a change in the following: future lease payments arising from a change in an index or a rate used; residual guarantee; lease term; certainty of a purchase option and termination penalties. When a lease liability is remeasured, an adjustment is made to the corresponding right-of use asset, or to profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is fully written down.

Finance costs

Finance costs attributable to qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the asset. All other finance costs are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are measured at the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on high quality corporate bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

Defined contribution superannuation expense

Contributions to defined contribution superannuation plans are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Share-based payments

Equity-settled and cash-settled share-based compensation benefits are provided to employees.

Equity-settled transactions are awards of shares, or options over shares, that are provided to employees in exchange for the rendering of services. Cash-settled transactions are awards of cash for the exchange of services, where the amount of cash is determined by reference to the share price.

The cost of equity-settled transactions are measured at fair value on grant date. Fair value is independently determined using an option pricing model that takes into account the exercise price, the term of the option, the impact of dilution, the share price at grant date and expected price volatility of the underlying share, the expected dividend yield and the risk free interest rate for the term of the option, together with non-vesting conditions that do not determine whether the consolidated entity receives the services that entitle the employees to receive payment. No account is taken of any other vesting conditions.

The cost of equity-settled transactions are recognised as an expense with a corresponding increase in equity over the vesting period. The cumulative charge to profit or loss is calculated based on the grant date fair value of the award, the best estimate of the number of awards that are likely to vest and the expired portion of the vesting period. The amount recognised in profit or loss for the period is the cumulative amount calculated at each reporting date less amounts already recognised in previous periods.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

The cost of cash-settled transactions is initially, and at each reporting date until vested, determined by applying a pricing model, taking into consideration the terms and conditions on which the award was granted. The cumulative charge to profit or loss until settlement of the liability is calculated as follows:

- during the vesting period, the liability at each reporting date is the fair value of the award at that date multiplied by the expired portion of the vesting period.
- from the end of the vesting period until settlement of the award, the liability is the full fair value of the liability at the reporting date.

All changes in the liability are recognised in profit or loss. The ultimate cost of cash-settled transactions is the cash paid to settle the liability.

Market conditions are taken into consideration in determining fair value. Therefore any awards subject to market conditions are considered to vest irrespective of whether or not that market condition has been met, provided all other conditions are satisfied.

If equity-settled awards are modified, as a minimum an expense is recognised as if the modification has not been made. An additional expense is recognised, over the remaining vesting period, for any modification that increases the total fair value of the share-based compensation benefit as at the date of modification.

If the non-vesting condition is within the control of the consolidated entity or employee, the failure to satisfy the condition is treated as a cancellation. If the condition is not within the control of the consolidated entity or employee and is not satisfied during the vesting period, any remaining expense for the award is recognised over the remaining vesting period, unless the award is forfeited.

If equity-settled awards are cancelled, it is treated as if it has vested on the date of cancellation, and any remaining expense is recognised immediately. If a new replacement award is substituted for the cancelled award, the cancelled and new award is treated as if they were a modification.

Issued capital

Ordinary shares are classified as equity.

Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of new shares or options are shown in equity as a deduction, net of tax, from the proceeds.

Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the profit attributable to the owners of Hiremii Limited, excluding any costs of servicing equity other than ordinary shares, by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the financial year, adjusted for bonus elements in ordinary shares issued during the financial year.

Diluted earnings per share

Diluted earnings per share adjusts the figures used in the determination of basic earnings per share to take into account the after income tax effect of interest and other financing costs associated with dilutive potential ordinary shares and the weighted average number of additional ordinary shares that would have been outstanding assuming conversion of all dilutive potential ordinary shares.

Goods and Services Tax ('GST') and other similar taxes

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to the tax authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Note 2. Material accounting policy information (continued)

Commitments and contingencies are disclosed net of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority.

New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Note 3. Critical accounting judgements, estimates and assumptions

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. The judgements, estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities (refer to the respective notes) within the next financial year are discussed below.

Share-based payment transactions

The consolidated entity measures the cost of equity-settled transactions with employees by reference to the fair value of the equity instruments at the date at which they are granted. The fair value is determined by using Trinomial Lattice model taking into account the terms and conditions upon which the instruments were granted. The accounting estimates and assumptions relating to equity-settled share-based payments would have no impact on the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next annual reporting period but may impact profit or loss and equity.

Estimation of useful lives of assets

The consolidated entity determines the estimated useful lives and related depreciation and amortisation charges for its plant and equipment and finite life intangible assets. The useful lives could change significantly as a result of technical innovations or some other event. The depreciation and amortisation charge will increase where the useful lives are less than previously estimated lives, or technically obsolete or non-strategic assets that have been abandoned or sold will be written off or written down.

Goodwill

The consolidated entity tests annually, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate impairment, whether goodwill has suffered any impairment, in accordance with the accounting policy stated in note 2. The recoverable amounts of cash-generating units have been determined based on value-in-use calculations. These calculations require the use of assumptions, including estimated discount rates based on the current cost of capital and growth rates of the estimated future cash flows.

Impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill

The consolidated entity assesses impairment of non-financial assets other than goodwill at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the consolidated entity and to the particular asset that may lead to impairment. If an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. This involves fair value less costs of disposal or value-in-use calculations, which incorporate a number of key estimates and assumptions.

Note 4. Operating segments

Identification of reportable operating segments

The consolidated entity operates in one segment being the provision of labour hire and recruitment services in one geographic region, Australia. This is based on the internal reports that are reviewed and used by the Board of Directors (who are identified as the Chief Operating Decision Makers ('CODM')) in assessing performance and in determining the allocation of resources. There is no aggregation of operating segments.

Note 4. Operating segments (continued)

The information reported to the CODM is on at least a monthly basis. The financial information presented in these financial statements is the same as that presented to the CODM based on the profit/(loss) after income tax.

Major customers

During the year ended 30 June 2025 the consolidated entity had 3 major customers that contributed \$16.9m to the total consolidated entity's revenue: \$10.5m (35%), \$3.4m (11%) and \$3.0m (10%). In FY2024, 2 major customers contributed \$12.7m to the total consolidated entity's revenue: \$6.8m (22%) and \$6.0m (20%).

Impairment testing

Goodwill acquired through business combinations has been allocated to the Inverse Group cash-generating unit.

The recoverable amount of the consolidated entity's goodwill has been determined by a value-in-use calculation using a discounted cash flow model, based on a 3 year projection period approved by management and extrapolated for a further 2 years using a steady rate, together with a terminal value.

Key assumptions are those to which the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit is most sensitive.

The following key assumptions were used in the discounted cash flow model for the Inverse Group cash-generating unit:

- 20% (2024: 21%) pre-tax discount rate; and
- 0.3% (2024: 30%) per annum projected revenue growth rate for the first year, 19% (2024: 27%) for the second year, 3% (2024: 24%) for the third, with 3% (2024: 3%) growth rate after the third year in the model.
- Inclusion of a terminal value with no growth included.

The discount rate of 20% pre-tax reflects management's estimate of the time value of money and the consolidated entity's weighted average cost of capital adjusted for the Inverse Group business, the risk free rate and the volatility of the share price relative to market movements.

Management believes the projected revenue growth rate is prudent and justified, based on the historic and expected business performance.

There were no other key assumptions for the Inverse Group cash-generating unit.

Based on the above, no impairment charge has been applied as the carrying amount of goodwill exceeded its recoverable amount for the Inverse Group cash-generating unit.

Sensitivity

As disclosed in note 2, the directors have made judgements and estimates in respect of impairment testing of goodwill. Should these judgements and estimates not occur the resulting goodwill carrying amount may decrease. The sensitivity is as follows:

- Revenue growth would need to decrease to below 10% over the first two years for the Inverse Group business before goodwill would need to be impaired, with all other assumptions remaining constant.

Management believes that these are no reasonably possible changes in the key assumptions on which the recoverable amount of Inverse Group cash-generating unit's goodwill is based would not cause the cash-generating unit's carrying amount to exceed its recoverable amount.

Invoice finance facility

On 16 October 2023, Inverse Group, Hiremii's recruitment and labour hire business, entered into agreements with Octet Finance Pty Ltd ("Octet") for a financing facility totalling \$2,000,000 ("Facility") to provide working capital for growth. The revolving Facility of up to \$2m and not exceeding 80% of accounts receivable was for a minimum period of 15 months and is secured against accounts receivable together with a general security provided by group companies as guarantors, limited to the value of the Facility. During the 2025 financial year the facility limit was increased to \$2.5m. The Facility has been varied to put a minimum period of 12 months to at least 21 July 2026 in place.

The interest rate is variable based on the BBSW plus a margin, at 30 June 2025 totalled 9.62% (2024: 10.15%). The unused facility at 30 June 2025 was \$1,010,972.

Insurance premium funding

The facility, used to fund the consolidated entity's insurance premiums, has a term of 12 months and is repaid in monthly instalments.

Financial risk management objectives

The consolidated entity's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk including interest rate risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. The consolidated entity's overall risk management program focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the financial performance of the consolidated entity. The consolidated entity uses different methods to measure different types of risk to which it is exposed. These methods include sensitivity analysis in the case of interest rate risk and ageing analysis for credit risk.

Risk management is carried out by senior finance executives ('finance') under policies approved by the Board of Directors ('the Board'). These policies include identification and analysis of the risk exposure of the consolidated entity and appropriate procedures, controls and risk limits. Finance identifies, evaluates and mitigates financial risks within the consolidated entity's operating units. Finance reports to the Board on a monthly basis.

Market risk

Interest rate risk

The consolidated entity's main interest rate risk arises from borrowings. Borrowings obtained at variable rates expose the consolidated entity to interest rate risk. The consolidated entity's borrowings obtained at fixed rates expose the consolidated entity to fair value risk. All other financial assets and liabilities in the form of receivables and payables are non-interest bearing. The consolidated entity does not engage in any hedging or derivative transactions to manage interest rate risk.

The consolidated entity is not exposed to any significant interest rate risk.

Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the consolidated entity. The consolidated entity has a strict code of credit, including obtaining agency credit information, confirming references and setting appropriate credit limits. The consolidated entity obtains guarantees where appropriate to mitigate credit risk. The maximum exposure to credit risk at the reporting date to recognised financial assets is the carrying amount, net of any provisions for impairment of those assets, as disclosed in the statement of financial position and notes to the financial statements. The consolidated entity does not hold any collateral.

The consolidated entity has adopted a lifetime expected loss allowance in estimating expected credit losses to trade receivables through the use of a provisions matrix using fixed rates of credit loss provisioning. These provisions are considered representative across all customers of the consolidated entity based on recent sales experience, historical collection rates and forward-looking information that is available. Expected credit losses were recorded for the financial year of \$nil (2024: \$nil).

Generally, trade receivables are written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovery. Indicators of this include the failure of a debtor to engage in a repayment plan, no active enforcement activity and a failure to make contractual payments for a period greater than 1 year.

Liquidity risk

Vigilant liquidity risk management requires the consolidated entity to maintain sufficient liquid assets (mainly cash and cash equivalents) and available borrowing facilities to be able to pay debts as and when they become due and payable.

The consolidated entity manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate cash reserves and through continuous monitoring of budgeted and actual cash flows.

Note 32. Events after the reporting period

On 1 August 2025, the company completed the acquisition (announced on 9 July 2025) of 100% shares in Prince Migration & Education Pty (Ltd) ('Prince Migration'), a privately-owned, highly-regarded migration services company. This acquisition will provide Hiremii with a platform for strategic expansion into the East Coast of Australia access to scarce talent in Asia, and diversification of revenue into new services lines. Total consideration payable for the acquisition is up to \$650,000 through shares and performance rights from July 2025 to 30 June 2028, subject to certain conditions.

As part of the transaction, Hiremii has issued the following securities as consideration for the acquisition:

- 3,957,029 fully paid ordinary shares in Hiremii, will be subject to a 12-month voluntary escrow commencing from date of issue;
- 2,697,771 Class A performance rights, which will vest upon Prince Migrating achieving earnings before interest and tax ('EBIT') of \$115,000 for the year ended 30 June 2026;
- 1,875,000 Class B performance rights, which will vest upon Prince Migration achieving EBIT of \$340,000 for the year ended 2027; and
- 1,500,000 Class C performance rights, which will vest upon Prince Migration achieving EBIT of \$600,000 for the year ended 30 June 2028.

The relevant disclosures for this business combination for the net assets acquired cannot be disclosed in these financial statements as the values are in the process of being determined.

On 22 July 2025, Inverse Group, Hiremii's recruitment and labour hire business, varied the agreements with Octet Finance Pty Ltd ('Octet') to extend the facility for a minimum period of 12 months to at least 21 July 2026.

On 15 September 2025, a general meeting of the company was held where all resolutions were passed, including the approval of shares and options that were issued during the financial year ended 30 June 2025. Refer to Matters subsequent to the end of the financial year in Director's report for further information.

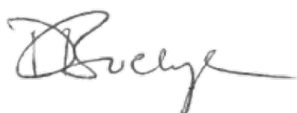

REPORT ON THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL REPORT

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Hiremii Limited (**Company**) and its subsidiaries (**Group**), which comprises the consolidated statement of financial position as at 30 June 2025, the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, the consolidated statement of changes in equity and the consolidated statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including material accounting policy information, the consolidated entity disclosure statement and the directors' declaration.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial report of the Group is in accordance with the *Corporations Act 2001*, including:

- (i) Giving a true and fair view of the Group's financial position as at 30 June 2025 and of its financial performance for the year then ended; and
- (ii) Complying with Australian Accounting Standards and the *Corporations Regulations 2001*.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report section of our report. We are independent of the Group in accordance with the auditor independence requirements of the *Corporations Act 2001* and the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We confirm that the independence declaration required by the *Corporations Act 2001*, which has been given to the directors of the Company, would be in the same terms if given to the directors as at the time of this auditor's report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

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Material Uncertainty Related to Going Concern

We draw attention to Note 1 in the financial report, which indicates that the group incurred a net loss of \$1,168,850 during the year ended 30 June 2025 and had net cash outflows from operating activities of \$224,134 for the year period ended 30 June 2025. As at that date, the group had net current liabilities of \$859,457. As stated in Note 1, these events or conditions, along with other matters as set forth in Note 1, indicate that a material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the group's ability to continue as a going concern. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Key audit matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgement, were of most significance in our audit of the financial report of the current period. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial report as a whole and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters. In addition to the matter described in the Material Uncertainty Related to Going Concern section, we have determined the matters described below to be the key audit matters to be communicated in our report.

If any such indication exists, the Group is required to estimate the recoverable amount of its other intangible assets.
