EXPERIENCE AND EXPERTISE

Mr Trewartha is a mining engineer with more than 23 years management and technical experience in gold, base metals, diamonds and iron. He has been involved in projects that cover greenfield exploration, feasibility studies, construction and mining, both in Australia and Africa.

Mr Trewartha started his career when he was recruited by De Beers to work at the Premier Diamond mine and Western Deep West Gold mine in South Africa. Jarek is a qualified Certified Practising Accountant who has worked extensively in the resource sector in various corporate and mine site roles. He holds a Bachelor of Commerce Degree, is a Chartered Secretary and Certified Practising Accountant.

Jarek is also Company Secretary and Chief Financial Officer of Core Exploration Limited (ASX:CXO) and Lincoln Minerals Limited (ASX:LML).

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

Crest's principal activity is the exploration for gold deposits in Western Australia.

OPERATING AND FINANCIAL REVIEW

Crest has projects comprising seventeen tenements in the highly prospective Eastern Goldfields and Mount Monger areas of Western Australia.

The net loss of the Company, from the year ended 30 June 2013, was \$1,345,757 (2012: \$1,011,691) after providing for income tax.

Crest Minerals was successfully admitted to the Official ASX list on 27 June 2012 and commenced its first full year of operations in 2012/13. Upon successfully listing on ASX, Crest earned an interest in its four exploration projects and immediately commenced exploration. During the financial year, Crest undertook numerous exploration drilling programs and incurred exploration expenditure of \$2.4 million primarily on its Majestic North Project.

Following the exploration program undertaken during the year, the Board made a prospectivity assessment of the carrying value of projects and determined to write down 80% of its Yundamindera project of \$241,085.

Administration expenditure was \$126,035 greater than the prior year due to commencement of operations following successful listing and associated expenditures.

In March 2013, the Company entered into a binding MOU to acquire the Comet Vale Project from Reed Resources Limited (ASX:RDR). Following extensive due diligence and efforts to raise capital to fund the project, Crest withdrew from the transaction and consequently wrote off \$100,000 related to a non-refundable deposit.

Following expenditure during the year, additional funding was required by the Company and a non-renounceable rights issue was completed on 27 June 2013 raising \$988,410.

MAJESTIC NORTH PROJECT

The Majestic North Project is located 50 kilometres east of Kalgoorlie and 5 kilometres north of the Trans Australia Railway Line. Access is via the Kalgoorlie-Bulong-Curtin Rd, which links Bulong to the Trans Access Road. The Majestic North Project is then accessed by station tracks up to Boundary Dam.

Prior to Crest, historical soil sampling, on the Majestic North Project, has defined a large gold anomaly, in excess of 3 kilometres in strike. Drilling of the southern part of the surface geochemical anomaly defined a large area of supergene mineralisation consistently at approximately 20 to 40 metres below the surface. The supergene gold mineralisation measures approximately 2000 metres in strike and is open both to the north and south.

Crest has undertaken complete auger coverage, ground magnetics, four aircore programmes and one reverse circulation programme on the southern four prospecting licenses at Majestic North - a total of 30,166 metres were drilled in 528 holes. An exploration resource was announced in May 2013 of 20,000 to 25,000 ounces for the gold in supergene contained within the foot print of a Paleochannel with multiple levels of mineralisation. Prospective geology has been outlined beneath the Paleochannel that may contain the source of the supergene mineralisation.

The deep RC programme defined narrow mineralisation in the Central region over a strike of 500 metres. The drilling beneath the best AC result in MN326 (4 m at 3.8gpt) only intersected elevated gold (in order of 0.2 gpt). This area still remains a priority target because of the prospective geology and the gold in primary intersection.

Access to the leases has been hindered by a heritage claim (May 2012). The limited access has increased costs for exploration and dramatically increased the approval process to progress the orderly targeting of the Majestic properties.

An application has been made for 103 sq km of exploration lease to the north and east of the Majestic properties.

These results indicate that the Majestic North Project may be a significant gold mineralised system. The Majestic North Project has good road access to the local gold processing facilities and has defined gold mineralisation. Crest intends to further define the supergene mineralisation with RC and undertake deeper drilling to discover the primary source.

MT IDA PROJECT

The Mt Ida Project is located approximately 200 kilometres north-northwest of Kalgoorlie-Boulder and approximately 80 kilometres northwest of Menzies. The Mt Ida Project is divided into two tenement areas, the Copperfield area, located to the immediate northwest of the main part of the Copperfield mining centre, and the Bell Bird area, covering the Bell Bird and Hoskin's Find workings in the eastern parts of the Copperfield - Mt Ida region.

The Mt Ida project area is located in the northern parts of the Mt Ida greenstone belt, which forms part of the Coolgardie Domain, itself the western-most domain of the Kalgoorlie Terrane. In the Copperfield - Mt Ida region, the Mt Ida greenstone belt can be further divided into a western stratigraphic association, which is dominated by banded iron formations and mafic volcanics, with minor interflow sediments.

The Mt Ida greenstone belt hosts a number of significant gold deposits, and also hosts a large number of current gold prospects and soil anomalies. The best known, previously mined deposits, occur at the Copperfield mining centre (Timoni lode system), the Bottle Creek deposits and in the northern parts of the Mt Ida mining centre (Boudie Rat & Forrest Belle deposits).

During the year close spaced surface auger was undertaken across the mineralised areas of the leases. A 67 hole Aircore programme on the Spotted Dog North prospect was also undertaken for 2973 metres of drilling. A zone of elevated mineralisation was defined on the eastern side of the prospect that requires follow up RC drilling. Analysis of the auger work and target generation is ongoing.

HEINES DAM PROJECT

The Heines Dam Project is located in the western-most parts of the Norseman-Wiluna greenstone belt and this portion of the belt forms part of the Coolgardie Domain itself the western-most part of the Kalgoorlie Terrane. The Heines Dam Project is located approximately 9 kilometres southwest of the Dunnsville mining centre in the Eastern Goldfields region and 45 kilometres northwest of Coolgardie.

The Heines Dam Project is located close to the gold anomalous Reptile shear, which hosts significant gold occurrences near its intersection with the regionally extensive Ida Fault, approximately 17 kilometres to the northwest. The Lizard, Blue Tongue and Iguana deposits are the largest of these gold occurrences and 400,000 ounces of gold collectively have been mined from those deposits.

Mining of these deposits was undertaken by Delta Gold Ltd in 2000 and 2001. The local interpreted solid geology of the E16/388 area is dominated by mafic volcanics (porphyritic basalt & dolerite) in the central and eastern parts and by felsic mica schists, commonly andalusite-bearing, in the west. These felsic rocks are interpreted to be after felsic volcanics/volcaniclastics and/or sediments and several andalusite localities have been identified by the Geological Survey of Western Australia.

Prior to listing the vendor undertook an Aircore program at the Echidna prospect. The identification of mineralisation on adjacent leases has indicated that the close spaced auger work is required on the north western edge of the lease. Follow up aircore and further auger is currently planned for the future.

YUNDAMINDERA PROJECT

The Yundamindera Project is located north of the Yundamindera mining centre in WA's Eastern Goldfields. The Yundamindera Project tenements cover approximately 100 square kilometres and are located approximately 70 kilometres east-southeast of Leonora, 50 kilometres southwest of Laverton, 20 kilometres north of the Yundamindera Homestead and 30 kilometres southeast of the Murrin Murrin nickel laterite mining operation.

A 41 hole AC programme was drilled across the best anomalous areas, the results were disappointing and Crest is re-assessing further work in the area.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN THE STATE OF AFFAIRS

There have been no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Company that occurred during the reporting period that has not otherwise been disclosed in this report or the financial statements.

DIVIDENDS

There were no dividends paid or declared during the reporting period or to the date of this report.

EVENTS ARISING SINCE THE END OF THE REPORTING PERIOD

Since the end of the reporting period, the Company held a General Meeting on 16 August 2013 to ratify a previous issue of listed options and to approve options to underwriters of the rights issue completed on 27 June 2013. The meeting sought ratification of the issue of 5,516,250 options already issued, the issue of 1,833,332 options to directors and 9,075,752 options to other parties. All options were ratified / approved at the General Meeting.

On 27 August, the Company announced that Managing Director Angus Middleton, resigned from the Company and Company Secretary and CFO, Jarek Kopias was appointed Director.

On 16 September, the Company announced that Chief Executive Officer Stephen Jones would cease employment with the Company on 16 December 2013 due to cost cutting measures.

No other matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the Company, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the Company in subsequent financial years.

LIKELY DEVELOPMENTS

The likely developments for the Company include the drilling and further evaluation of the Majestic North Project as well as the Company's other exploration interests.

Crest will also continue to identify and evaluate numerous other projects and opportunities.

The Directors of Crest Minerals Ltd present the Remuneration Report in accordance with the Corporations Act 2001 and the Corporations Regulations 2001.

A. Principles used to determine the nature and amount of remuneration

The Company's remuneration policy has been designed to align objectives of Directors and executives with objectives of shareholders and the business, by providing a fixed remuneration component and offering specific long-term incentives through the issue of options. The Board believes the remuneration policy to be appropriate and effective in its ability to attract and retain the best key management personnel and Directors to run and manage the Company. The key management personnel of the Company are the Board of Directors and Executive Officers.

The Board's policy for determining the nature and amount of remuneration for its members and key management personnel of the Company is as follows:

- The remuneration policy, setting the terms and conditions for the executive Directors and key management personnel, was developed by the Board. All key management personnel are remunerated on a consultancy or salary basis based on services provided by each person. The Board annually reviews the packages of key management personnel by reference to the Company's performance, executive performance and comparable information from industry sectors and other listed companies in similar industries.
- The Board may exercise discretion in relation to approving incentives, bonuses and options. The policy is designed to attract the highest calibre of key management personnel and reward them for performance that results in long-term growth in shareholder wealth.
- Key management personnel are also entitled to participate in employee share and option arrangements.
- The Board policy is to remunerate non-executive Directors at market rates for comparable companies for time, commitment and responsibilities. The Board determines payments to the non-executive Directors and reviews their remuneration annually, based on market practice, duties and accountability. Independent external advice is sought when required. The maximum aggregate amount of fees that can be paid to non-executive Directors is subject to approval by shareholders at the Annual General Meeting (currently \$300,000 per annum). Fees for non-executive Directors are not linked to the performance of the Company. However, to align Directors' interests with shareholder interests, the Directors are encouraged to hold shares in the Company and are able to participate in employee option plans, which may exist from time to time.

During the reporting year, there were no performance reviews of senior executives.

Performance based remuneration

The remuneration policy has been tailored to increase goal congruence between shareholders, directors and key management personnel. Currently, this is facilitated through the issue of options to key management personnel to encourage the alignment of personal and shareholder interests. The Company believes this policy will be effective in increasing shareholder wealth.

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Corporate Governance Statement

The Board is committed to achieving and demonstrating the highest standards of corporate governance. As such, Crest Minerals Ltd has adopted a corporate governance framework and practices to ensure they meet the interests of shareholders.

The Company complies with the Australian Securities Exchange Corporate Governance Council's Corporate Governance Principles and Recommendations 2nd Edition ('the ASX Principles'). This statement incorporates the disclosures required by the ASX Principles under the headings of the eight core principles. All of these practices, unless otherwise stated, were in place for the full reporting period.

Information about the Company's corporate governance practices are set out below. All of these practices were put in place subsequent to the listing of the Company in June 2012.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Company's Constitution provides that the number of Directors shall not be less than three. There is no requirement for any shareholding qualification.

If the Company's activities increase in size, nature and scope, the size of the Board will be reviewed periodically and the optimum number of Directors required to adequately supervise the Company's activities will be determined within the limitations imposed by the Constitution and as circumstances demand.

The membership of the Board, its activities and composition is subject to periodic review. The criteria for determining the identification and application of a suitable candidate for the Board shall include quality of the individual, background of experience and achievement, compatibility with other Board members, credibility within the Company's scope of activities, intellectual ability to contribute to Board duties and physical ability to undertake Board duties and responsibilities.

Directors are initially appointed by the full Board, subject to election by shareholders at the next Annual General Meeting. Under the Company's Constitution the tenure of a Director (other than Managing Director, and only one Managing Director where the position is jointly held) is subject to reappointment by shareholders not later than the third anniversary following their last appointment. Subject to the requirements of the Corporations Act, the Board does not subscribe to the principle of retirement age and there is no maximum period of service as a Director. A Managing Director may be appointed for the period and on any terms the Directors think fit and, subject to the terms of any agreement entered into, the appointment may be revoked on notice.

The Company is not currently of a size, nor are its affairs of such complexity, to justify the formation of other separate or special committees at this time. The Board as a whole is able to address the governance aspects of the full scope of the Company's activities and to ensure that it adheres to appropriate ethical standards.

APPOINTMENTS TO OTHER BOARDS

Directors are required to take into consideration any potential conflicts of interest when accepting appointments to other boards.

INDEPENDENT PROFESSIONAL ADVICE

The Board has determined that individual Directors have the right, in connection with their duties and responsibilities as Directors, to seek independent professional advice at the Company's expense. With the exception of expenses for legal advice in relation to Director's rights and duties, the engagement of an outside adviser is subject to prior approval of the Chairman and this will not be withheld unreasonably.

CONTINUOUS REVIEW OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

Directors consider, on an ongoing basis, how management information is presented to them and whether such information is sufficient to enable them to discharge their duties as Directors of the Company. Such information must be sufficient to enable the Directors to determine appropriate operating and financial strategies, from time to time, in light of changing circumstances and economic conditions. The Directors recognise that exploration is a business with inherent risks and that operational strategies adopted should, notwithstanding, be directed towards improving or maintaining the net worth of the Company.

CODE OF CONDUCT AND TRADING POLICY

The Company has adopted a Code of Conduct its executives that promotes the highest standards of ethics and integrity in carrying out their duties to the Company. Notes to the consolidated financial statements For the year ended 30 June 2013

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This consolidated general purpose financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001, Australian Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. Compliance with Australian Accounting Standards results in full compliance with the International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB). Crest Minerals Ltd is a listed company, registered and domiciled in Australia. Crest Minerals Ltd is a for profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The consolidated financial statements for the reporting period ended 30 June 2013 were approved and authorised by the Board of Directors on 23 September 2013.

The Financial Report has been prepared on an accruals basis, and is based on historical costs, modified by the measurement at fair value of selected on-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The significant policies which have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report are summarised below.

a) Segment reporting

An operating segment is a component of an entity that engages in business activities from which it may earn revenues and incur expenses (including revenues and expenses relating to transactions with other components of the same entity), whose operating results are regularly reviewed by the entity's chief operating decision maker to make decisions about resources to be allocated to the segment and assess its performance and for which discrete financial information is available. This includes start-up operations which are yet to earn revenues. Management will also consider other factors in determining operating segments such as the existence of a line manager and the level of segment information presented to the Board of Directors.

Operating segments have been identified based on the information provided to the chief operating decision makers – being the Board.

The Company aggregates two or more operating segments when they have similar economic characteristics, and the segments are similar in the nature of the minerals targeted.

Operating segments that meet the quantitative criteria, as prescribed by AASB 8, are reported separately. However, an operating segment that does not meet the quantitative criteria is still reported separately where information about the segment would be useful to users of the financial statements.

The Directors have considered the requirements of AASB 8 – Operating Segments and the internal reports that are reviewed by the Board in allocating resources have concluded that at this time there are no separately identifiable segments.

b) Finance income and expense

Finance income comprises interest income on funds invested, gains on disposal of financial assets and changes in fair value of financial assets held at fair value through profit or loss. Finance expenses comprise changes in the fair value of financial assets held at fair value through profit or loss and impairment losses on financial assets.

Interest income is recognised as it accrues in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, using the effective interest rate method. All income is stated net of goods and services tax (GST).

c) Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the items. Repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income during the reporting period in which they were incurred.

Depreciation is calculated using an accelerated diminishing value method to allocate asset costs over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

Exploration equipment	3 years
Office and IT equipment	3 years
Leasehold improvements	5 years

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

The assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted at the end of each reporting period. An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if its carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in the the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income. When revalued assets are sold, it is the Company's policy to transfer any amounts included in other revenues in respect of those assets to retained earnings.

d) Exploration, development and evaluation expenditure

Exploration and evaluation expenditure incurred is accumulated in respect of each identifiable area of interest. These costs are only carried forward to the extent that right of tenure is current and those costs are expected to be recouped through the successful development of the area (or, alternatively by its sale) or where activities in the area have not yet reached a stage which permits reasonable assessment of the existence of economically recoverable reserves and operations in relation to the area are continuing.

Accumulated costs, in relation to an abandoned area, are written off in full against profit in the period in which the decision to abandon the area is made.

When production commences, the accumulated costs for the relevant area of interest are amortised over the life of the area according to the rate of depletion of the economically recoverable reserves. A regular review is undertaken of each area of interest to determine the appropriateness of continuing to carry forward costs in relation to that area of interest.

Costs of site restoration are provided over the life of the facility from when exploration commences and are included in the costs of that stage. Site restoration costs include the dismantling and removal of mining plant, equipment and building structures, waste removal and rehabilitation of the site in accordance with clauses of the mining permits. Such costs have been determined using estimates of future costs, current legal requirements and technology on an undiscounted basis.

Any changes in the estimates for the costs are accounted on a prospective basis. In determining the costs of site restoration, there is uncertainty regarding the nature and extent of the restoration due to community expectations and future legislation. Accordingly, the costs have been determined on the basis that the restoration will be completed within one year of abandoning the site.

e) Financial instruments

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the provisions to the instrument. For financial assets this is equivalent to date that the Company commits itself to either the purchase or sale of the asset.

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified as 'fair value through profit and loss', in which case the costs are expensed to the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income immediately.

Classification and subsequent measurement

Financial instruments are subsequently measured at either fair value or amortised cost using the interest method or cost. Fair value represents the amount for which an asset could be exchanged, or a liability settle, between knowledgeable willing parties. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value.

- (i) **Loans and receivables**
Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Loans and receivables are included in current assets except for those not expected to mature within 12 months after the end of the reporting period.
- (ii) **Financial liabilities**
Non-derivative financial liabilities are subsequently measured at cost.

Impairment

At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

f) Impairment of assets

At each reporting date, the Company reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Where it is not probable to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

g) Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise when the Company provides money, goods or services directly to a debtor with no intention of selling the receivables. They are included in current assets, except for those with maturities greater than 12 months after the balance date which are classified as non-current assets.

Trade and other receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with carrying amount. These are included in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

h) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the Company prior to the end of the reporting period which are unpaid. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition. Trade and other payables are presented as current liabilities unless payment is not due within 12 months from the reporting date. They are recognised initially at their fair value and subsequently amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Trade and other payables are stated at amortised cost.

i) Income Tax

Tax expense recognised in profit or loss comprises the sum of deferred tax and current tax not recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Current income tax assets and/or liabilities comprise those obligations to, or claims from, the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) and other fiscal authorities relating to the current or prior reporting periods, that are unpaid at the reporting date. Current tax is payable on taxable profit, which differs from profit or loss in the financial statements.

Calculation of current tax is based on tax rates and tax laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred income taxes are calculated using the liability method on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities and their tax bases. Deferred tax on temporary differences associated with investments in subsidiaries and joint ventures is not provided if reversal of these temporary differences can be controlled by the Company and it is probable that reversal will not occur in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are calculated, without discounting, at tax rates that are expected to apply to their respective period of realisation, provided they are enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period. Deferred tax liabilities are always provided for in full.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset only when the Company has a right and intention to set-off current tax assets and liabilities from the same taxation authority.

Changes in deferred tax assets or liabilities are recognised as a component of tax income or expense in profit or loss, except where they relate to items that are recognised in other comprehensive income (such as the revaluation of land) or directly in equity, in which case the related deferred tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or equity, respectively.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

j) Earnings per share

- i) Basic earnings per share
Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the profit attributable to equity holders of the Company, excluding costs of servicing equity other than ordinary shares, by the weighted average number of ordinary shares outstanding during the financial year, adjusted for bonus elements in ordinary shares issued during the year.
- ii) Diluted earnings per share
Diluted earnings per share adjusts the figures used in the determination of basic earnings per share to take into account the after tax effect and other financing costs associated with dilutive potential ordinary shares and the weighted average number of additional ordinary shares that would have been outstanding assuming the conversion of all dilutive potential ordinary shares.

k) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the statement of financial position comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less.

l) Share-based payments

The Company has provided payment to related parties in the form of share-based compensation, whereby related parties render services in exchange for shares or rights over shares ('equity-settled transactions'). The cost of these equity-settled transactions is measured by reference to the fair value at the date at which they are granted. The fair value is determined using a Black and Scholes methodology depending on the nature of the option terms.

The Black and Scholes option pricing model takes into account the exercise price, the term of the option, the impact of dilution, the share price at grant date and expected price volatility of the underlying share, the expected dividend yield and the risk free interest rate for the term of the option.

The fair value of the options granted is adjusted to reflect market vesting conditions, but excludes the impact of any non-market vesting conditions. Non-market vesting conditions are included in assumptions about the number of options that are expected to become exercisable. At each balance date, the entity revises its estimates of the number of options that are expected to become exercisable.

The cost of equity-settled transactions is recognised, together with a corresponding increase in equity, over the period in which the performance conditions are fulfilled, ending on the date on which the relevant parties become fully entitled to the award ('vesting date').

The cumulative expense recognised for equity-settled transactions at each reporting date until vesting date reflects (i) the extent to which the vesting period has expired and (ii) the number of awards that, in the opinion of the directors of the Company, will ultimately vest. This opinion is formed based on the best available information at balance date. No adjustment is made for the likelihood of market performance conditions being met as the effect of these conditions is included in the determination of fair value at grant date.

Where the terms of an equity-settled award are modified, as a minimum an expense is recognised as if the terms had not been modified. In addition, an expense is recognised for any increase in the value of the transaction as a result of the modification, as measured at the date of modification.

m) Employee benefits

The Company provides post-employment benefits through various defined contribution plans.

A defined contribution plan is a superannuation plan under which the Company pays fixed contributions into an independent entity. The Company has no legal or constructive obligations to pay further contributions after its payment of the fixed contribution. The Company contributes to several plans and insurances for individual employees that are considered defined contribution plans. Contributions to the plans are recognised as an expense in the period that relevant employee services are received.

Short-term employee benefits, including annual leave entitlement, are current liabilities included in 'employee provisions', measured at the undiscounted amount that the Company expects to pay as a result of the unused entitlement.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

n) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis, except for the GST components of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

o) Critical accounting estimates and judgements

The Directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends of economic data, obtained both externally and within the Company.

i) Key estimates- impairment

The Company assesses impairment at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the Company that may lead to impairment of assets. Where an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined.

ii) Key judgements – exploration and evaluation expenditure

The future recoverability of capitalised exploration and evaluation expenditure is dependent on a number of factors, including whether the Company decides to exploit the related lease itself or, if not, whether it successfully recovers the related exploration and evaluation asset through sale.

Factors that could impact the future recoverability include the level of reserves and resources, future technological changes, which could impact the cost of mining, future legal changes (including changes to environmental restoration obligations) and changes to commodity prices.

To the extent that capitalised exploration and evaluation expenditure is determined not to be recoverable in the future, profits and net assets will be reduced in the period in which this determination is made.

In addition, exploration and evaluation expenditure is capitalised if activities in the area of interest have not yet reached a stage that permits a reasonable assessment of the existence or otherwise of economically recoverable reserves. To the extent it is determined in the future that this capitalised expenditure should be written off, profits and net assets will be reduced in the period in which this determination is made.

iii) Share-based payment transactions

The Company measures the cost of equity-settled transactions with management and other parties by reference to the fair value of the equity instruments at the date at which they are granted. The fair value is determined by the Board of Directors with reference to quoted market prices or using the Black-Scholes valuation method taking into account the terms and conditions upon which the equity instruments were granted. The assumptions in relation to the valuation of the equity instruments are detailed in note 11. The accounting estimates and assumptions relating to equity-settled share-based payments would have no impact on the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next annual reporting period but may impact expenses and equity.

p) Adoption of the new and revised accounting standards

i) Overall Considerations

The Company has adopted the following revisions and amendments to AASB's issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board and IFRS issued by the International Accounting Standards Board, which are relevant to and effective for the Company's financial statements for the annual period beginning 1 July 2012:

- a) AASB 2011-9 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Presentation of Items of Other Comprehensive Income (Applies annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 July 2012)
AASB 2011-9 requires entities to group items presented in Other Comprehensive Income on the basis of whether they are potentially re-classifiable to profit or loss subsequently, and changes the title of 'statement of comprehensive income' to 'statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income'.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

The adoption of the new and revised Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations has had no significant impact on the Company's accounting policies or the amounts reported during the current period. The adoption of AASB 2011-9 has resulted in changes to the Company's presentation of its financial statements.

q) Recently issued accounting standards to be applied in future accounting periods

The accounting standards that have not been early adopted for the year ended 30 June 2013, but will be applicable to the Company in future reporting periods are detailed below. Apart from these standards, we have considered other accounting standards that will be applicable in future reporting periods, however they have been considered insignificant to the Company.

- (i) *AASB 9 Financial Instruments, AASB 2009-11 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 9, AASB 2010-7 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 9 (December 2010) and AASB 2012-6 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Mandatory Effective Date of AASB 9 and Transition Disclosures (effective from 1 January 2015)*

AASB 9 introduces new requirements for the classification and measurement of financial assets and liabilities. These requirements improve and simplify the approach for classification and measurement of financial assets compared with the requirements of AASB 139. The main changes are:

- Financial assets that are debt instruments will be classified based on (1) the objective of the entity's business model for managing the financial assets; and (2) the characteristics of the contractual cash flows.
- Allows an irrevocable election on initial recognition to present gains and losses on investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading in other comprehensive income (instead of in profit or loss).
- Dividends in respect of these investments that are a return on investment can be recognised in profit or loss and there is no impairment or recycling on disposal of the instrument.
- Financial assets can be designated and measured at fair value through profit or loss at initial recognition if doing so eliminates or significantly reduces a measurement or recognition inconsistency that would arise from measuring assets or liabilities, or recognising the gains and losses on them, on different bases.

Where the fair value option is used for financial liabilities the change in fair value is to be accounted for as follows;

- The change attributable to changes in credit risk are presented in other comprehensive income (OCI) and;
- The remaining change is presented in profit or loss.

There will be no impact on the Company's accounting for financial liabilities, as the new requirements only affect the accounting for financial liabilities that are designated at fair value through profit or loss and the Company does not have any such liabilities. The de-recognition rules have been transferred from AASB 139 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement and have not been changed. The Company has not yet decided when to adopt AASB 9.

In addition, AASB 11 removes the option to account for jointly-controlled entities using proportionate consolidation. Instead, accounting for a joint arrangement is dependent on the nature of the rights and obligations arising from the arrangement. Joint operations that give the venturers a right to the underlying assets and obligations for liabilities are accounted for by recognising the share of those assets and liabilities. Joint ventures that give the venturers a right to the net assets are accounted for using the equity method.

When this standard is first adopted for the year ended 30 June 2014, there will be no impact on transactions and balances recognised in the financial statements because the joint arrangements in place relate to joint operations.

AASB 12 sets out the required disclosures for entities reporting under the two new standards, AASB 10 and AASB 11, and replaces the disclosure requirements currently found in AASB 127 and AASB 128. Application of this standard by the Company will not affect any of the amounts recognised in the financial statements, but will impact the type of information disclosed in relation to the Company's investments.

Amendments to AASB 128 provide clarification that an entity continues to apply the equity method and does not remeasure its retained interest as part of ownership changes where a joint venture becomes an associate, and vice versa. The amendments also introduce a "partial disposal" concept.

As this is a disclosure standard only, there will be no impact on amounts recognised in the financial statements. However, additional disclosures will be required for interests in associates and joint arrangements, as well as for unconsolidated structured entities.

- (ii) *AASB 13 Fair Value Measurement and AASB 2011-8 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 13 (effective 1 January 2013)*

AASB 13 explains how to measure fair value and aims to enhance fair value disclosures. Application of the new standard will impact the type of information disclosed in the notes to the financial statements. The Company is yet to undertake a detailed analysis of the differences between the current fair valuation methodologies used and those required by AASB 13. However, when this standard is adopted for the first time for the year ended 30 June 2014, there will be no impact on the financial statements because the revised fair value measurement requirements apply prospectively from 1 January 2013.

- (iii) *Revised AASB 119 Employee Benefits and AASB 2011-10 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from AASB 119 (September 2011)*

The AASB released a revised standard on accounting for employee benefits. It requires the recognition of all re-measurements of defined benefit liabilities/assets immediately in other comprehensive income (removal of the so-called 'corridor' method), the immediate recognition of all past service cost in profit or loss and the calculation of a net interest expense or income by applying the discount rate to the net defined benefit liability or asset. This replaces the expected return on plan assets that is currently included in profit or loss. The standard also introduces a number of additional disclosures for defined benefit liabilities/assets and could affect the timing of the recognition of termination benefits. The amendments will have to be implemented retrospectively. The Company does not have any defined benefit plans. Therefore, these amendments will have no impact on the Company.

- (iv) *AASB 2011-4 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards to Remove Individual Key Management Personnel Disclosure Requirements*

The Standard amends AASB 124 Related Party Disclosures to remove the individual key management personnel (KMP) disclosures required by Australian specific paragraphs. This amendment reflects the AASB's view that these disclosures are more in the nature of governance disclosures that are better dealt within the legislation, rather than by the accounting standards. When these amendments are first adopted for the year ending 30 June 2014, they are unlikely to have any significant impact on the Company.

- (v) *AASB 2012-2 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Disclosures – Offsetting Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities*

This Standard amends the required disclosures in AASB 7 to include information that will enable users of an entity's financial statements to evaluate the effect or potential effect of netting arrangements, including rights of set-off associated with the entity's recognised financial assets and recognised financial liabilities, on the entity's financial position.

This Standard also amends AASB 132 to refer to the additional disclosures added to AASB 7 by this Standard.

When this AASB 2012-2 is first adopted for the year ended 30 June 2014, there will be no impact on the Company as the Company does not have any netting arrangements in place.

- (vi) *AASB 2012-3 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Offsetting Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities*

AASB 2012-3 adds application guidance to AASB 132 to address inconsistencies identified in applying some of the offsetting criteria of AASB 132, including clarifying the meaning of "currently has a legally enforceable right of set-off" and that some gross settlement systems may be considered equivalent to net settlement. When AASB 2012-3 is first adopted for the year ended 30 June 2015, there will be no impact on the Company as this standard merely clarifies existing requirements in AASB 132.

- (vii) *Recoverable Amount Disclosures for Non-Financial Assets (Amendments to IAS 36)*

These narrow-scope amendments address disclosure of information about the recoverable amount of impaired assets if that amount is based on fair value less costs of disposal. When these amendments are adopted for the first time on 1 January 2014, they are unlikely to have any significant impact on the Company given that they are largely of the nature of clarification of existing requirements.

There are no other standards that are not yet effective and that are expected to have a material impact on the entity in the current or future reporting periods and on foreseeable future transactions.

Financial risk management policy

Risk management is carried out by the Managing Director under policies approved by the Board of Directors. The Board provides written principles for overall risk management, as well as policies covering specific areas, such as interest rate and credit risk.

a) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk arises from the possibility that the Company might encounter difficulty in settling its debts or otherwise meeting its obligations related to financial liabilities.

The Company manages liquidity risk by monitoring forecast cash flows and ensuring that adequate working capital is maintained for the coming months. Upcoming capital needs and the timing of raisings are assessed by the board.

Financial liabilities are expected to be settled within 12 months.

b) Interest rate risk

The Company's exposure to interest rate risk is the risk that a financial instrument's value will fluctuate as a result in changes in market interest rates. Cash is the only asset affected by interest rate risk as cash is the Company's only financial asset exposed to fluctuating interest rates.

The Company is exposed to interest rate risk on cash balances and term deposits held in interest bearing accounts. The Board constantly monitors its interest rate exposure and attempts to maximise interest income by using a mixture of fixed and variable interest rates, whilst ensuring sufficient funds are available for the Company's operating activities. The Company's net exposure to interest rate risk at 30 June 2013 approximates the value of cash and cash equivalents.

c) Sensitivity analysis

18. OPERATING SEGMENTS

The Directors have considered the requirements of AASB 8 – Operating Segments and the internal reports that are reviewed by the chief operating decision maker (the Board) in allocating resources have concluded that at this time there are no separately identifiable segments.

19. GOING CONCERN BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial report has been prepared on the basis of a going concern. During the year ended 30 June 2013 the Company recorded a net cash outflow from operating and investing activities of \$3,317,398 and an operating loss of \$1,345,757.

The forward looking cash projections of the Company indicate that it is reliant on the completion of further capital raising for continued operations. The Company will be seeking to raise equity to fund operations, including exploration and working capital.

If additional capital is not obtained, the going concern basis may not be appropriate, with the result that the Company may have to realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities, other than in the ordinary course of business and at amounts different from those stated in the interim financial report. No allowance for such circumstances has been made in the interim financial report.

20. EVENTS ARISING SINCE THE END OF THE REPORTING PERIOD

Since the end of the reporting period, the Company held a General Meeting on 16 August 2013 to ratify a previous issue of listed options and to approve options to underwriters of the rights issue completed on 27 June 2013. The meeting sought ratification of the issue of 5,516,250 options already issued, the issue of 1,833,332 options to directors and 9,075,752 options to other parties. All options were ratified / approved at the General Meeting.

On 27 August, the Company announced that Managing Director Angus Middleton, resigned from the Company and Company Secretary and CFO, Jarek Kopias was appointed Director.

On 16 September, the Company announced that Chief Executive Officer Stephen Jones would cease employment with the Company on 16 December 2013 due to cost cutting measures.

No other matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the Company, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the Company in subsequent financial years.

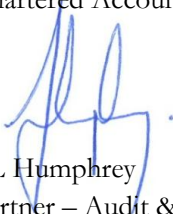
