New Gold – Silver Results from Red Mountain Project

◆ Follow-up field work by Zenith returns highly encouraging gold and silver rock chip sample results up to 2.01 g/t gold and 52.5 g/t silver;

◆ Large 2km by 1.5km zoned soil anomaly with peak soil gold result of 1.6 g/t Au and peak silver soil value 2.1 g/t Ag;

◆ Red Mountain host rocks, alteration and geochemical association appear similar to that at a nearby operating gold mine, providing a potential geological model to assist targeting;

◆ Detailed geological mapping is planned along with trenching and/or drilling to test the true thickness of the poorly exposed gold-silver zones and to track mineralisation where it extends beneath shallow soil cover.

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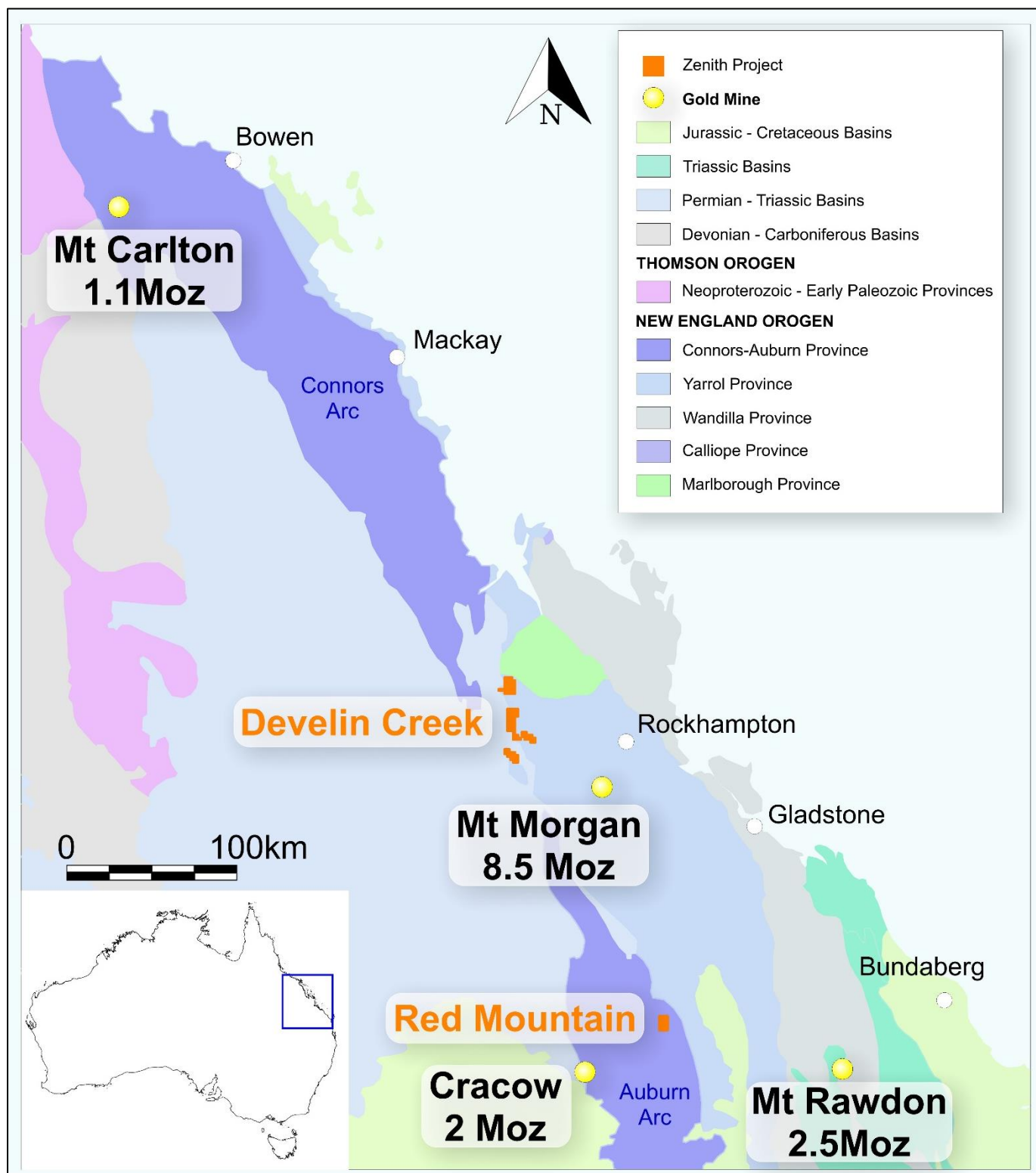


Figure 1: Red Mountain Project – Location Map

Zenith Minerals Limited (“Zenith” or “the Company”) is pleased to announce that it has received further encouraging gold and silver results from its 100% owned Red Mountain Project in Queensland. The Red Mountain project is located within ~100km of operating gold mines at Cracow and Mount Rawdon (Figure 1).

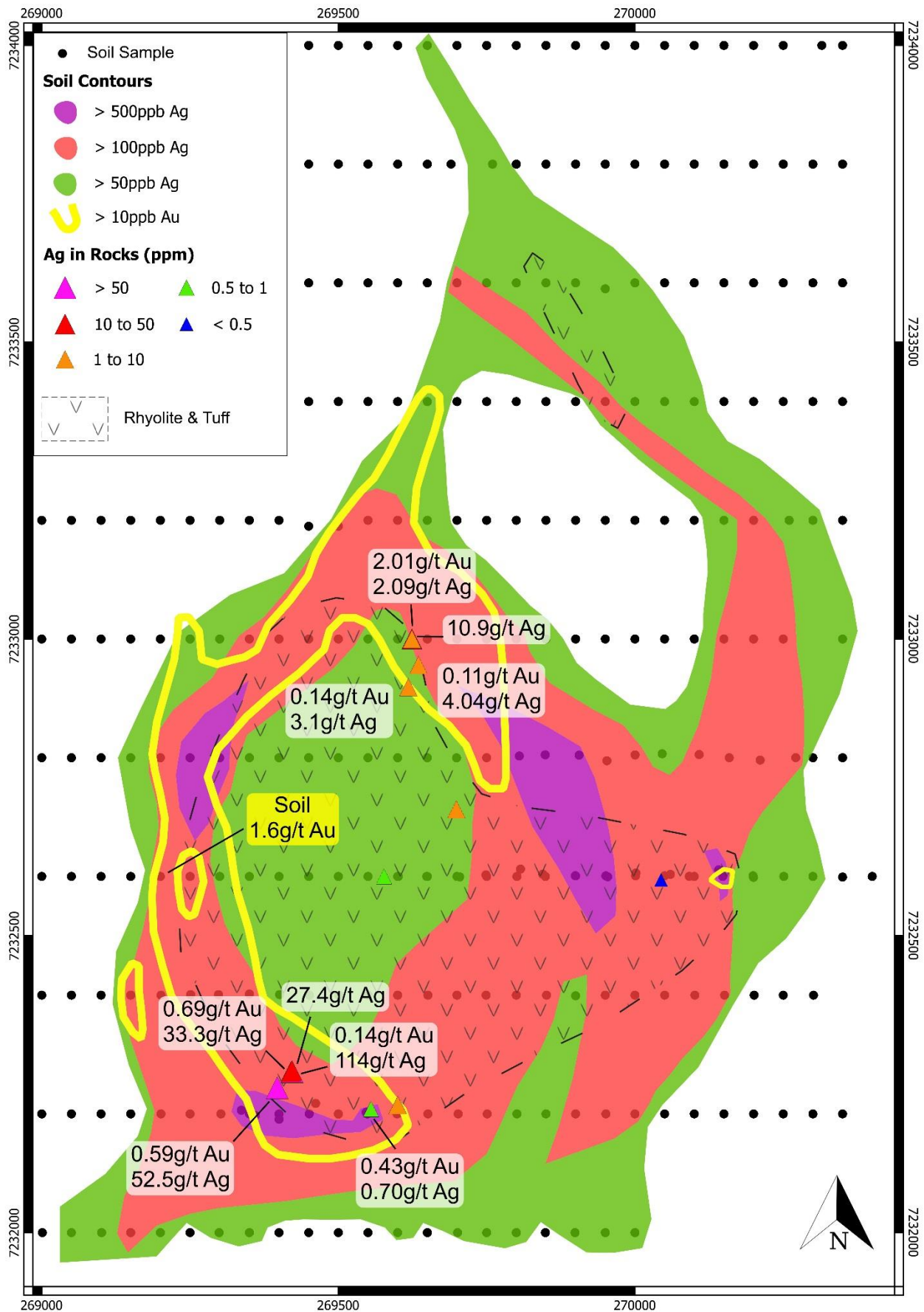


Figure 2: Red Mountain – Geochemical Results – Summary Map

Zenith’s maiden exploration program in 2017 at Red Mountain returned rock chip sample results up to 0.69 g/t gold and 114g/t silver. Recent field work by Zenith to follow-up these results has returned further highly encouraging silver and gold rock chip sample results up to 2.01 g/t gold and 52.5 g/t silver around 800 metres north of the best results from 2017 sampling. In addition, systematic geochemical sampling has now outlined a large 2km by 1.5km zoned soil anomaly with peak soil gold result of 1.6 g/t Au and peak silver soil value 2.1 g/t Au (Figure 2).

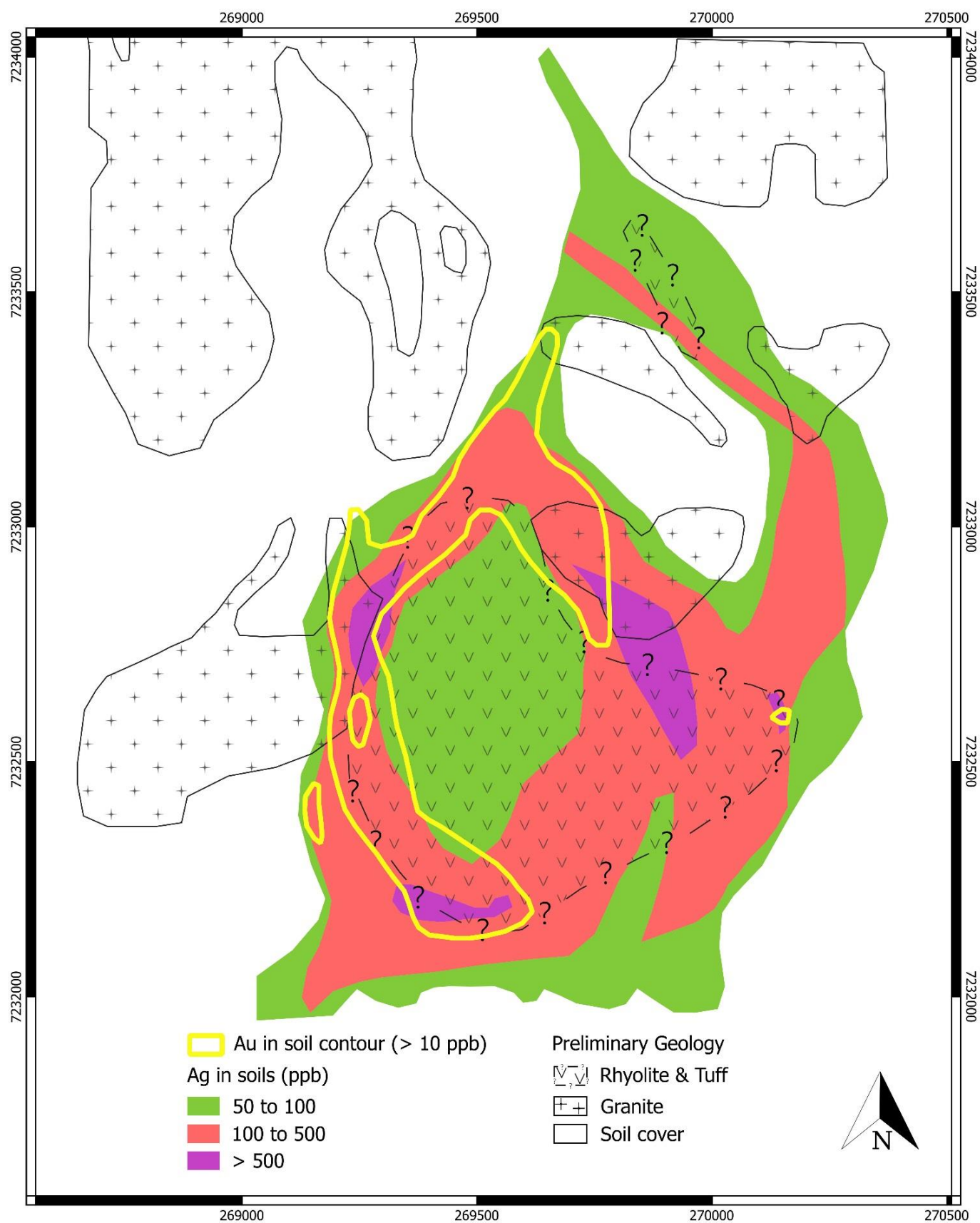


Figure 3: Red Mountain – Gold & Silver Soil Anomalies over Preliminary Geology Map

Based on preliminary reconnaissance mapping, mineralisation is hosted within felsic volcanic rocks including flow banded rhyolite, felsic tuff and volcanic breccia close to the contact with granite (Figure 3). Much of the area is obscured by soil cover.

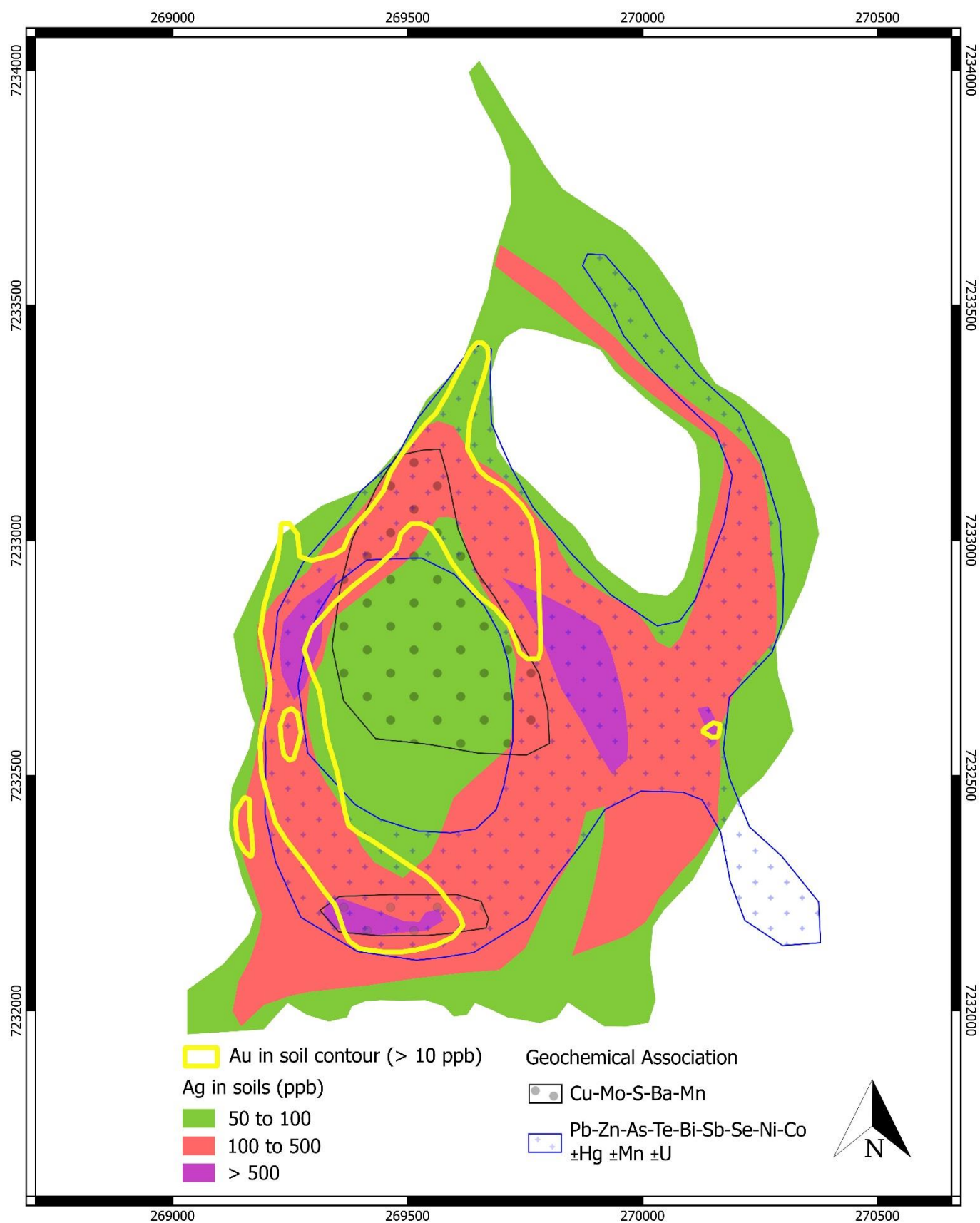


Figure 4: Red Mountain – Geochemical Associations Map

The large soil geochemical anomaly is distinctly zoned with a Cu-Mo-S-Ba-Mn core lying predominantly over the felsic rocks surrounded by an annular shaped gold-silver-Pb-Zn-As-Te-Bi-Sb-Se-Ni-Co +/- Hg-Mn-U anomaly that is generally close to the felsic rock – granite contact (Figure 4).

The Red Mountain host rocks, alteration and geochemical association are interpreted as having similarities to that at the nearby operating Mt Rawdon gold mine based on comparison to research published by Evolution Mining geologist Howard (2015). The similarity is encouraging and provides Zenith with a geological model to assist in targeting gold and silver mineralisation at Red Mountain.

Detailed geological mapping is planned along with trenching and/or drilling to test the true thickness of the poorly exposed gold-silver zones and to track mineralisation where it extends beneath shallow soil cover.

Red Mountain Background

A zone of gold and silver mineralisation was discovered by Zenith in mid-2017 at the 100% owned Red Mountain project in central Queensland (ZNC ASX Release 25th July 2017).

Mapping by Zenith in an area dominated by soil with minor sporadic rock outcrop identified discrete 2 to 3 metre wide manganese- and iron-rich fracture vein stockwork zones hosted in rhyolite and granodiorite with minor quartz. Rock chip sampling from these zones returned highly encouraging first pass silver and gold rock chip sample results up to 114g/t silver and 0.69 g/t gold in association with anomalous copper, lead, zinc, barium, cobalt, antimony and bismuth. A total of 7 rock samples were collected during this 2017 field work.

Soil samples taken at the same time by Zenith confirmed an area of anomalous silver soil geochemistry which outlined an open-ended, high-grade (>100 ppb) silver anomaly with individual soil results up to 1 g/t silver that provided target scale even prior to the new results the subject of this ASX release.

The Red Mountain project is located between two Evolution Mining gold mines Cracow and Mount Rawdon (Figure 1). Cracow is a low sulphidation epithermal gold deposit whilst Mount Rawdon is described in the literature as an epizonal intrusion related gold deposit (Howard, 2015).

The information in this report that relates to Exploration Results is based on information compiled by Mr Michael Clifford, who is a Member of the Australian Institute of Geoscientists and an employee of Zenith Minerals Limited.
